

Community Objects to **Building Recreational Center**

In a meeting of the Board of Governors last December, the surrounding community of Rhode Island College spoke out about their concerns of the proposed building of the new recreational center. President Guardo responded by submitting a letter to address their complaints, in which she said, "We want to serve the needs of our students as ell as maintain good relationships with our neighboring community." The center will be located in what used to be the Department of Children and Their Families that is near the outdoor swimming pool currently used by Rhode Island College students and the community. An objection voiced by the community is that they do not want to have parking lots, for the center, near their homes. President Guardo responded ot this concern, in her letter, by stating that the architects are studying the matter, but she affirms that the area will be landscaped to obscure the view of the parking lots form the neighboring homes, as much as is possible. She also addressed the concern of traffic, by saying that the architect's plans will recommend specific steps to minimize the impact of traffic "with the possibility of rerouting the traffic flow. If the community agrees with these plans, the center could be under construction as early as December of 1987. The center would consist of more

than one floor and would have weight rooms, indoor tennis courts, indoor swimming pool, sauna, basketball courts, etc. which would significantly expand the existing recreational/intramural center at Whipple Gym, and would also be opened days and nights until 11:00 pm.

However, in a recent meeting, the community group called the Neighborhood Group of Concerned Citizens, felt that their concerns had not been fully addressed by Dr. Guardo and her staff. In response, Gary Penfield, Dean of Students, feels that the "project is threatened", and "unless there is student support," it will not be allowed to go forward. In collaboration with Richard Farley, president of Student Government, Mr. Penfield is urging students to support building the center, because it is the students who would most benefit from it. Thus, Mr. Farley will be writing a letter to students asking them to show their support by writing to the Board of Governors and to the college administration. In addition, he will be urging students to attend the next Board of Governers meeting which is scheduled for March 5, 1987 in Roberts Hall at 6:00 pm when, among their other business, they will be discussing the recreational center. for more information, contact Student Government secretary at 456-8088. New Salad Bar in Donovan

The new salad bar will be similar to the ones in restaurants such as Ponderosa, but according to Kate Gallagher, the nutritionist on campus, "it will be better." The bar will be made up of three rows, with the two outer rows consisting of the same. trimmings, such as turkey, ham and roast beef; julienne carrots, cucumbers, broccoli, cauliflower and cheese. The middle row will be made up of tuna, pepperoni, eggs, kidney beans, sesame seeds, granola, fruit cocktail, and melon. there will also be soups such as cream of broccoli, corn chowder and minestroni at the end of bar, along with the salad dressing, which will be labeled. Thus, it will make many students give up their favorite game of guessing which dressing is which.

In addition, there will be a sandwich bar where students can request what they like on their sandwiches. They will even have access to two microwaves. The Bannister Gallery is currently presenting its newest exhibition in its Winter/Spring series. The display entitled "Different Drummers" is a diverse collection of professional photographers' work from all aspects of the photography field. Among these experts are professional studio photographers, r'otojournalists, freelancers, and others. The display includes works by John Owens, Shirley Brook, Joseph Rossi, Len West, Angelo Marinosci, Peter Sylvia, Mary Hughes, Joseph White, Grace Trofa, and Berga Ara Zobian. All these artists are former photography students at Rhode Island College.

The exhibition not only displays a rich myriad of talent but also shows those students who want to take up careers in photography the various opportunities availble.

Indeed, the photographers present many truly different types of photography. However, the viewer need not be a photography connoiseur to appreciate the exhibition. Although, the photography specialist will surely appreciate the use of light, color, form and techniques employed.

One of the most compelling works is the trilogy by Angelo Marinosci. This series, entitled simply "Madonna I, II, and III" offer an uncanny flavor of Marinosci's use of the mystery. black/white effect is remarkable. The relation of the black clothing to the white skin of the model make for an interesting study in contrast. In addition, the selection of the model and the method in which it is presented gives the viewer a sense of spiritual tension which imprints the photos indelibly in the memory of the percipient.

Another interesting selection is that of Joseph Rossi. Rossi presents a truly unique medium of expression. His works use a "sectional" method of photography which is comprised of several small snapshots combined to produce larger images. These photos are an exciting display of talent which is simplistic and yet unusually complex.

In addition, Berge Ara Zobign presents a formidable array of foreign photos. Among the countries represented are Armenia and the Soviet Union. The works express the true feeling and human-ness of the subjects.



Peace Corps representatives will be on campus March 3rd to speak to persons interested in Peace Corps. Prospective volunteers are welcome to sign up in the Office of Career Services for an interview which will be scheduled for Tuesday, March 3rd between 9am and 4pm.

Volunteers serve in 63 developing countries in Africa, Asia, Latin America, the Caribbean and the South Pacific. During their 2 years of service, they receive a living allowance, paid travel and training, complete medical care, and a post-service readjustment

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

Pat Metheny: Man of Many **Projects**

Although Pat Metheny's unique sound never attempts to imitate the styles of other musicians, he had many major influences on him when he first picked up the guitar. "There were two in particular on the guitar," said Metheny,"Wes Montgomery and Jim Hall. Both of these guys seemed to transcend the instrument and just play music. There were other people too, Gary Burton, Herbie Hancock, Sonny Rollins, John Coltrane, and Ornette (Coleman). Plus there were lots of drummers, Roy Hanes, Elvin Jones, Jack DeJohnnette ... These guys all had specific things that were very important to me when I was learning to play. I could listen to their music and discover.

After 10 years, 12 albums, and 3 Grammys with ECM records, Metheny made a transition over to the Geffen label. " I felt it was time for a change more than anything else," He stated. "ECM is a German company and out main audience is here, so it makes sense to record here with Geffen. Also as time went on. I wanted to take more control over the records by producing them myself. ECM is basically a production company with their own producers, so although I did some production with them, I was sort of the exception to the rule. Now, the way it's set up, I have my own production company (Pat Metheny Productions) where we can do pretty much whatever we want. It's really an ideal situation."

Aside from his sessions with both the Pat Metheny Group and the many other jazz artists he has worked with, Metheny has taken a special interest over the past few years in composing soundtracks for film and television, including "The Falcon and the including "The Falcon and the Snowman." What was it that drew his attention to soundtracks? "I always enjoyed that stuff (filmscores). I dug listening to when I was a kid, finding out who the composers were and what

Pat Metheny Group: Always Welcome in Providence

On Sunday, February 22, the Pat Metheny Group came to The Providence Performing Arts Center and treated a nearly sold-out crowd to two and a half hours of virtually non-stop music. The Group is made up of Lyle Mays on keyboards, Paul Wertico on drums, Steve Rodby on bass, and new members Armando Marsal on percussion, and Mark Litford and Dave Blaymeyer on vocals and whatever else they could think of.

This is Metheny's best lineup ever and they faithfully performed an hour or so of their older material including the opening fanfare "Forward March", "Phase Dance", "Are You Going With Me?", "Farmer's Trust", and "Dalton Lee" from the motion picture, The Falcon and the Snowman. The rest of the show consisted of fresh, new material that they'll be taking into the studio in about a week or so.

Metheny and Mays travelled back and forth through space with their rich, creative improvisational skills while the rest of the Group provided an intricate framework around them. One of the crowd's favorite moments was a hot drum solo by Paul Wertico, who treated each drum, tom, and cymbal with careful attention.

Its been a long time since Metheny last brought his Group to Providence and, hopefully, they'll be back after their new album is released.

the scores were. I've always enjoyed movies and kind of followed them as a fan, so I was kind of curious to see if I could do it, and it's fun. Now that I've done a bunch of them, I'm not as intrigued anymore. I've enjoyed playing live and making records more than anything.

Last year's release of Song X with Ornette Coleman gave us a look at hard driving, fully improvisational side of Pat Metheny, different from the cyclical bouyancy that comes out of his earlier works. "It was not so much about a style or a sound, it was about the spirit of that kind of playing and that's what has always drawn me to playing Ornette's tunes and, eventually, to doing this project with him," commented Metheny. When asked whether the Song X sound would bleed over into his Group sound, Metheny replied, "It's stylistically different from the group and I don't plan on asking the guys in the Group to play in a way that's not natural or comfortable for them. I like to hear people play in an intense manner, however it is that they hear music. It's not the style, but the spirit that counts. For me, playing with Ornette was unbelievable in that he has the ability to come up with fresh, new things at a faster rate than almost anyone else. In terms of stylistic direction, that (Song X) has more to do with Ornette than me, so it's unlikely the sound will carry over to my group. But I'm sure we'll do other projects again in the future."

Metheny is currently working on a new Group album, causing him to put a solo album that was in the making on the back burners for a while. "Right after our Providence date, we're going into the studio," revealed the guitarist, "So what you see will be the premiere of a whole bunch of new stuff." Will it follow the Brazilian vein of <u>First</u> <u>Circle</u>, the last group album? "Yeah, I think so," reflected Metheny, "The group is bigger with more possibilities for orchestration and we lean toward the Brazilian sound pretty easily. Also, the two vocalists are both famastic. This addition has been the best so far. The group has so much depth and the level of musicianship is so high. It's really nice.



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Pat has played with some of the most innovatibe musicians of the past twenty years or so, including a surprise appearance with Santana at Live Aid. When speaking about the experience, Metheny relates, "It was pretty scary actually with all of those people looking up at me. There was no rehearsal or soundcheck, which is ok if you're sitting at a bar. But, all in all, it was really exciting.

Who else would Pat Metheny like to perform or record with in the near future? "Well, I'm planning a project with Milt Nashimento, who's a fantastic Brazillian musician that I've worked with before. Also, one of my favorite composers is Steve Breich. He called me to perform a piece that he wrote for electric guitar. That'll be in November. Also, I've always wanted to play with Elvin Jones, a great drummer that, for some reason, I've never worked with before."

So, with that, we'll let Mr. Metheny get back to his jam-packed schedule. Thanks for the chat, and we'll be looking forward to the new album soon.



Alumnus Performs in Chamber Music Series



Browne Elevator Lets Student Down on the Way Up

On Friday, February 27, at 2:30 am, Browne Hall resident Gail Giambazi found herself a victim of the malfunction of one of the hall's two elevators. For close to an hour, the elevator remained immobile, trapping

the victim between the sixth floor and upper limits of the building. "It was scary at first," said Giambazi, "[but] when security arrived, they made me feel more comfortable. They were talking to me, along with my friends."

Security, unable to open the doors, notified the Providence Fire Department, who arrived and eventually freed the student.

"Something like that should not be expected to happen," asserted Giambazi. "I'm not paying my tuition to get stuck

in an elevator." Her feelings reflect those of a large proportion of the dorm's residents. The incident has sparked a rising concern among occupants for their personal safety.

The elevators, maintained by Otis Elevator Company, break down frequently, forcing the students to use the stairwell. For students on the upper levels of the six story residence hall, such breakdowns are more than a minor inconvenience - they are a major obstacle, and a threat to residents' well-being.

The repair crew arrived at 3:45 am to make the necessary repairs. By 7:00 am, the elevator was again in working order. The question remains however, for just how long will the elevators remain in operating condition and could such a traumatic event occur in the near future?

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
