Tragedy Strikes Donovan

An ordinary college dining center was recently transformed into a diner's nightmare when a clock above the main entrance sprang from its residence there and struck an innocent co-ed on her head.

The scene of the tragedy was Rhode Island College's own Donovan Dining Center, on Tuesday, March 10. The precise time of the unfortunate event remains unknown due to the condition the clock was in after ricocheting off the victim's head, onto a salad on a nearby table, and onto the floor. Witnesses, however, place the time at approximately 5:30.

Prof. Ted Loopstin, the naked professor from Rhode Island College who mysteriously disappeared.

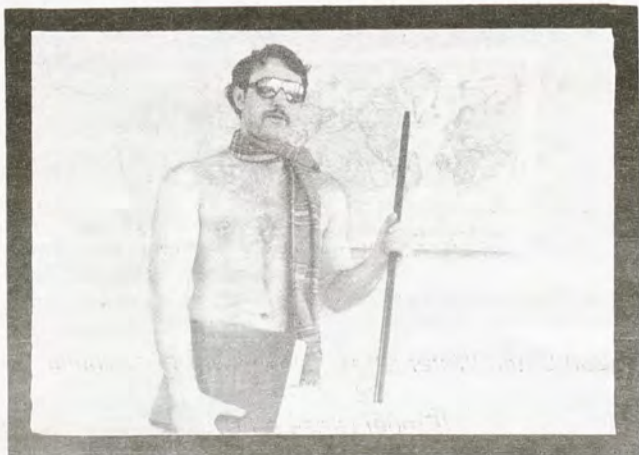
I followed the trail to Stockholm where I ran into a brick wall. I could find no information about the naked professor. This could be due to the fact

RI College Textbook Ban

In a controversial decision many Rhode Islanders consider radical, US District Judge A. Walker Foot yesterday banned all the books in the Rhode Island College Bookstore, plus most books in the on-campus Adams Library.

The decision came after a three-month long trial which made national headlines. Judge Foot declared the Bible unconstitutional, despite objections by a coalition of 15 local pastors and ministers.

Judge Foot attracted media attention last month during a television press conference when he said that most American colleges and universities brainwash students. He said that most schools "taught secular humanism" and that young people should not be allowed to make their own choices about such things. Foot said most people were "not capable of making morally correct choices" and that the authorities should step in to monitor people's reading habits.

When asked by reporters if people should have the freedom to choose for themselves what books, papers and magazines to read, Judge Foot said that he thought that was "too risky." He continued, "anything departing from standard Roman Catholic Doctrine as put forth by the Pope in the Vatican is what I call secular humanism... that's too dangerous to allow."

During the highly publicized trial, which had several changes of venue, Foot repeatedly disallowed evidence introduced by defense attorney Rawlins Lovett against prosecuting attorney Geraldine Scheffrin. Lovett represented

Adeline Margetta, director of the Rhode Island Freedom of Choice Coalition. When Lovett stated on behalf of his client that the community should not have "one person's opinion forced on them to the point where they had no choice", Foot threatened to hold him in contempt of court.

When Lovett objected, saying the Bible guarantees all mankind freedom of choice and the divine gift of free will, Foot overruled, warning him not to "stray from the issue".

In an interview with *The Anchor* after the verdict was given, Foot said he based his decision on Judge W. Brevard Hand's verdict on the Alabama case.

Foot ordered the removal of all the books in the Rhode Island College bookstore, saying they failed to "adequately state and define proper religious values". he also ordered the removal of all but 200 books from the school's library for the same reason.


"By September", he said, "the students will be completely shielded from contact with the concepts of secular humanism."

Scheffrin is expected to appeal the decision.

Meanwhile, police have already begun removing the offending books from the campus, against protests from students, faculty and administration.

"I still think, and will continue to think", said Foot, "that students should be taught basic Judeo-Christian values without being shown opposing viewpoints. We have to isolate people from any influence of secular humanism... people just can't make up their own minds."



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Squirrel Population Is Cause Of Browne Elevator Problems

The administration was unavailable for comment. They were no longer "tied up", but in important strategy meetings with representatives from the Foxy Lady and could not be disturbed.

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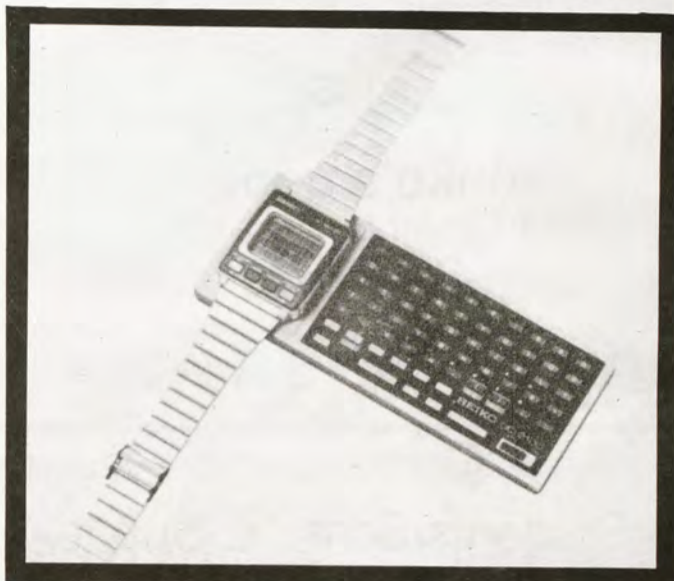

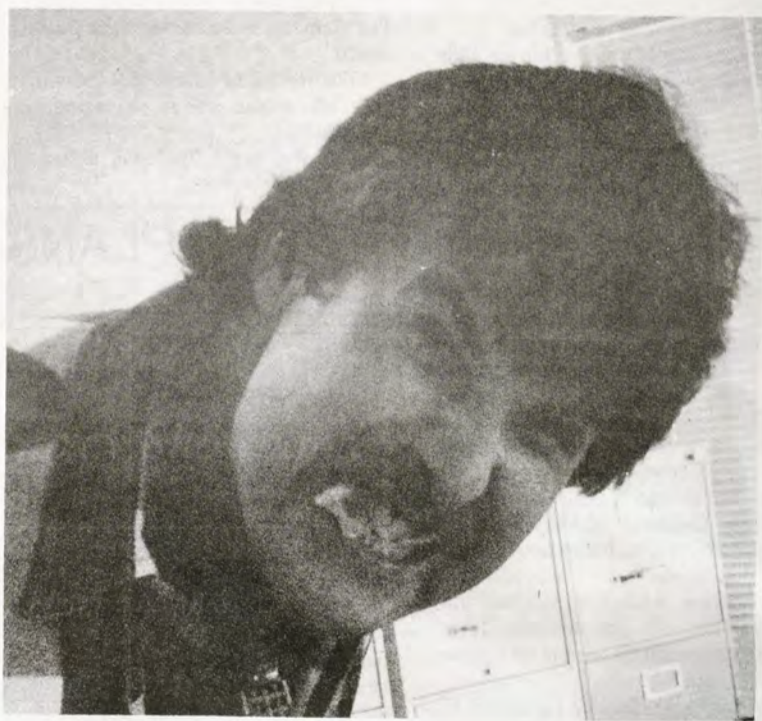
The Rhode Island College Administration, in an attempt to change the registration policy at the college, has come through with flying colors once again.

2 Killed, 931 Injured as Civic Center Crumbles to Sand

Mayor Joe Paolino declared Providence closed today in memory of "the fine American youth of Providence" who were killed or injured or even deafened in last night's heavy metal concert disaster at the Civic Center.

Enraged Student Attacks Telephone Operator at RI College

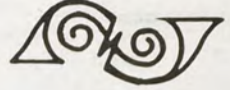

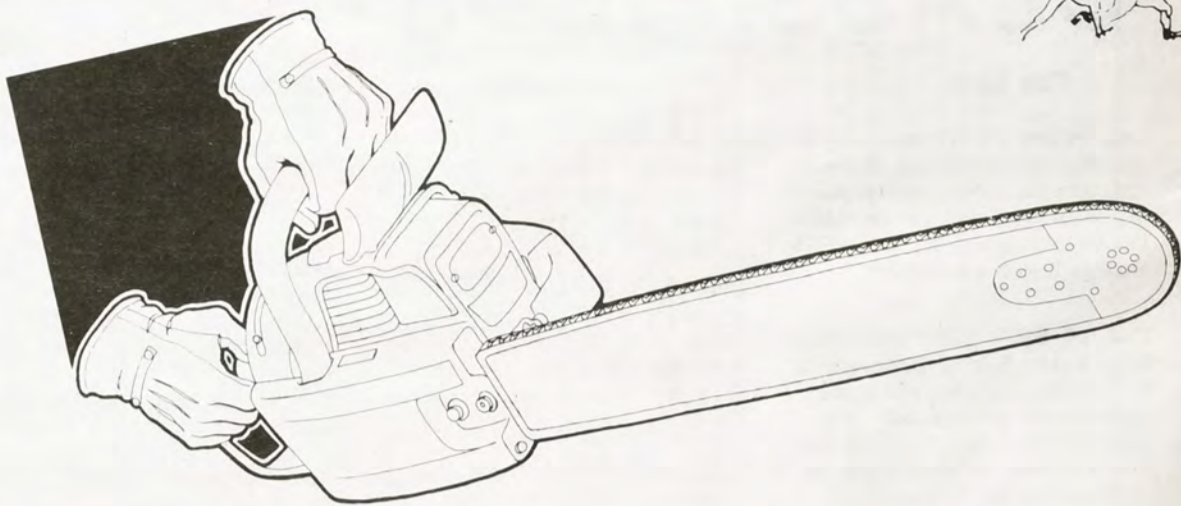
Earlier this winter, did you curse the ice on the sidewalks as you slipped to class? If you did, you were not alone. Almost every student at one time or another could be heard complaining.
