Nazarian is inaugurated

On Saturday Oct. 27, approximately 700 people attended the inauguration of John Nazarian, the 8th President of Rhode Island College.

Before the ceremony, Nazarian stood patiently outside of Roberts Hall as last minute questions were being asked by reporters and people filled the auditorium. An airplane flying overhead carried a banner stating, "Congratulations John - Good Luck."

Nazarian has been acting President for the past 14 months, since taking over for Carol Guardo after her resignation. In May, the board of Governors for Higher Education appointed Nazarian as President in a 6-4 vote.

The ceremony began with a procession of 75 dignitaries who represented colleges and universities from across the country.

The first person to speak during the ceremony was Governor Edward Diprete. Diprete said, "John has made RIC a strong institution today...and will continue to prepare it well for the 21st century."

Lee Anne Peluso, President of Student Community Government, praised Nazarian as helping out "students, faculty, and staff to seek out new ideas."

Other speakers included, Eleanor M.

McMahon, Distinguished Visiting Professor from Brown University, and Joseph F. Kauffman, fifth President of Rhode Island College.

Henry J. Nardone, Vice Chairman of the Board of Governors for Higher Education, made a few comments before the installation of the President. Nardone informed the audience that a couple days ago, a few of Nazarian friends got together and raised \$40,000 for a scholarship in honor of the new president for what he has done for the college. Nardone also said, "No one loves this college more than President Nazarian." Afterwards the Willard Medallion, a symbol that represents office of presidency, which is worn at official and ceremonial occasion, was placed on Nazarian.

Nazarian came up to the podium and thanked the "Great faculty, students, and staff for supporting him in his candidacy." Nazarian went on and graciously thanked his family for his education, especially his parents and older brothers and sisters who helped him financially.

He also discussed the importance of education and the knowledge of other cultures.

The ceremony ended with the singing of the Alma Mater and musical selections by The American Band.

Student taps into campus computer to counterfeit checks

EAST LANSING, Mich, (CPS)- The U.S. Secret Service charged a Michigan State University student and a friend with using MSU's computers since July to manufacture fake cashier's checks worth more than \$50,000.

Officials said Student Anthony Grewel, 21, and friend David Martin, 23, scanned bank logos into a campus Macintosh computer and, using a common illustration program, allegedly printed counterfeit cashier's checks on a laser printer.

In announcing the arrest Oct.16, a Secret Service spokesman said the two had used the cash to buy a bicycle, some ski equipment, a dining room set and a \$17,000 computer.

URI student arrested in rape case

President Eddy responds at candlelight vigil

A 19 year old fraternity pledge raped a female student during a party at the University of Rhode Island Saturday night, while five or six men watched, URI police charged.

David Lallemand, a freshman from Westford, Mass., was sent to the Adult Correctional Institution without bail after his arraignment yesterday in District Court, Wakefield, on a charge of first-degree sexual assault.

The woman, an 18 year old freshman from Massachusetts, told URI police that she met Lallemand for the first time at the party and that she did not know the onlookers.

As of Friday, police had not discovered who the others were.

The woman told police she was talking to the group in an upstairs bedroom at Tau Kappa Epsilon fraternity when Lallemand, who stands 6 feet, 7 inches, threw her onto a sofa and raped her.

The woman was treated at about 1 a.m. at URI's infirmary and has since returned home to Massachusetts. Police learned of the incident about the same time from the school's Office of Residential Life.

Two police officers were stationed at the party to make sure alcohol use did not exceed six kegs of beer, the amount allowed by the university. URI Patrolman David W. Doweiko, who was stationed at the fraternity's front door, said about 150 people attended the party.

URI President Edward D. Eddy held a candlelight vigil Thursday night on the campus quadrangle. About 500 students attended the vigil and pledged "to end sexual assault and harassment here and everywhere."

Eddy said, "In gathering tonight, we are collectively apologizing to one among us whose rights and body were violated."

Justice Executed at Brown

Brown University's production Execution of Justice, the gripping portrayal of the trial of Dan White for the murders of San Francisco's Mayor George Moscone and Supervisor Harvey Milk, opened on October 25. The play, based on the true life tragedy of the 1978 murders, was written by Emily Mann and directed at Brown by Barbara Tannenbaum. On November 27, 1978, Dan White, former Policeman, Supervisor and Fireman, entered the Mayor's Office and shot George Moscone, Mayor of San Francisco. He then reloaded his gun and shot Supervisor Harvey Milk. Mann's Execution of Justice is the portrayal of Dan White's trial, as well as an exploration of the Judiciary System itself. The play examines not only a particular trial: how the court system was manipulated, and how gay rights may have played a part in the jury's decision, it also questions the entire institution of the courts, playing with the theme that justice is sometimes not served, but executed, or rather destroyed.

Brown's production of the Mann play is particularly effective when utilizing the four overhead television monitors which display film footage, images of a gun being fired, and phrases appropriate to the action taking place on the stage. The stage is a round, gray carpeted area, drawing the audience into the scenes, forcing the viewer to take an active part in the viewing of it. The play opens on a busy street in San Fransico, with the crowd stopped cold with the news of the deaths of Milk and Moscone. In this scene, as in later scenes, the response in San Francisco to the deaths is related to the response of the nation to the assassination of John Kennedy.

Dan White, played by Dan Weene, is portrayed during the trial as the

All-American boy. Weene gives the role the sensitivity it calls for, especially in scenes where White breaks down, claiming his psychological state at the time was completely out of his control.

Matt Dunne, as Prosecuting Attorney Tom Norman, elicits the sympathies, as well as anger and frustration, of the audience. Norman is sensitively portrayed as the "good guy" attempting to argue his case fairly and present solid evidence, rather than an unethical attorney whose sympathies lay with the defense, as some accusations claim. Dunne's portrayal of Norman's utter impotence in retaliating against White's of momentary insanity and psychological imbalance is not only sympathetic to Norman, but elicits understanding and sympathy from the audience as well.

Randy Becker is striking as Defense Attorney Douglas Schmidt. Knowing that his client is guilty, he appears to win his case solely on Dan White's reputation of always being a "good guy" previous to the murders. Becker's performance, badgering the witnesses for the people and coddling defense witnesses, especially "comforting" Dan gives the play the feel of a real courtroom, where the solid evidence can be temporarily suspended and theatrics deem the verdict.

The countless number of characters in Execution of Justice such as key witnesses for the People and for the Defense, as well as uncalled witnesses, relate the events surrounding the deaths, giving the audience new insight into a tale that was told and retold in the newspapers and on television. Each are individually pertinent to Mann's play.

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





The consciously aware students of Rhode Island College (aka the minority) may have noticed a growing trend as of late. That is the trend of environmental advocacy. For those not aware, this advocacy is the reason people want you to recycle cans, plastics, paper and to do the unmentionable; stop using aerosol hair sprays. (Oh how we shudder at the fashion implications!!!) Well, there is good reason to advocate care for the environment: To be precise, the environment is going to hell in a bucket and some of us aren't enjoying the ride. If people don't recognize the abuse soon, the repercussions could be at best tragic and at worst criminal.

A forerunner of environmental concern is a protection of the ozone layer. That seems to be a buzzword of late, 'ozone', as the media and commercial forces have identified abuse of the ozone and made a token tribute to it. But it has to go beyond tribute, it must go to the core of the problem and to a wide-spread initiative to correct it.

The ozone layer is a gaseous formation of oxygen 3 found in the atmosphere. This layer serves, among other things, to deflect harmful ultraviolet rays produced by the sun. Without this protection the world would be exposed to severe harm.

Well, the ozone has been depleting steadily since scientists first discovered abnormality in 1979. The ozone layer, which is normally 20 to 30 feet thick, has since thinned out considerably to approximately 12 feet in the temporal areas of the world, thus the hole. In 1987, the 'hole' was measured at twice the size of the United States, equaling 10% of the Southern Hemisphere- ten percent of the Southern Hemisphere is now exposed to harmful rays of the sun! But what does that have to do with Providence, RI? How convenient you should ask.

Ozone depletion has quite a lot to do with Providence. The depletion of the ozone layer is in direct correlation to the Greenhouse effect. Since U.V. rays are able to enter the ozone, they cannot exist in the same way. Instead, they remain and heat up the environment in the same manner a greenhouse does. Since the depleting of the ozone, the five hottest summers in recorded history have occurred, and in 1988, meteorologists recorded the hottest summer ever. Ecologists will tell you there is no action without reaction, and the action of ozone depletion causes the reaction of global warming and the Greenhouse effect. Perhaps that is why it is 80 degrees in October in Providence, RI.

Not only does ozone depletion lead to global warming but it also leads to medical problems. For every 1% decrease in the ozone layer there is a 5% increase in the chances of skin cancer. The increases access of U.V. rays into the atmosphere also leads to cornea damage. So without doubt the depletion of the ozone has quite a bit to do with

Now as conscious members of the human race we should be concerned with what leads to the depletion of this ozone layer. The core of the attack on the ozone is from a chemical reaction. Simply put, (recognizing a popular distaste for chemistry) the release of gases such as carbon dioxide and chloroflorocarbons (CFC's) into the atmosphere form a chlorine gas that destroys the ozone (03) molecules. The destruction by CFC's is primarily launched from aerosols (hair-sprays), air-conditioners, and polystyrene foam (aka Styrofoam). There is also a large release of carbon dioxide from automobiles, and ironically enough from the destruction of the rainforests; everything is relative.

The rape of the rainforests is by far the most criminal and savage attack on the earth and environment. Undisturbed, the rainforest houses an intricate

relationship between plants, insects, reptiles and animal. Approximately one-half of the species of life on the planet are located in the tropical rainforests. There are a catalogued 41,000 species of insect and an estimated 2 million more which have yet to be discovered. The most abundant species present in the forests are plant life. More than 43% of the world's plants are located in the rainforests.

If humankind was to explore the rainforests in a non-destructive manner, then the possibility for benefits would be immeasurable. Foremost, the diversity of plant life opens up a wide possibility of new medicines. Research has already enabled the conversion of rainforest plants into medicines to combat cancer, heart disease, arthritis, and glaucoma. Other extractive uses in the rainforest include compounds that can fight Alzheimer's and Down Syndrome. Yet, the corporate world does not explore the rainforest in this extractive manner, instead they pursue an exploitive approach. Nations, like the U.S. and Japan, are using the rainforests in a destructive, as opposed to a productive, manner. By extracting hardwoods from the rainforests, these nations disturb the delicate ecosystem of the tropical forests. That system is amazingly contingent on all factors and the absence of one species can dramatically alter it or even lead to its destruction.

One would hope that societies would abhor this criminal assault on the earth; yet instead nations world-wide including the U.S.A. are remissly approving of the destruction of the rainforests as a means of attaining profit. Yet, profit without consideration, is robbery. And the victims of this crime are Mother Earth and humankind. Now, what kind of sick bastard would abuse his

It is now up to humankind to act. It is up to us to act! This negligence and abuse on the environment cannot last. Basically, it's just not healthy. The solution is obvious; stop abusing the environment. A number of ways to stop biting the hand that feeds you are:

1-The refusal to support corporations that exploit the environment. For example, companies like the Mitsubishi Car Corp., who has investments in hardwood production. According to the Rainforest Action Network (RAN) when the severity of rainforest depletion was brought to the attention of Mitsubishi, instead of reducing exploitation, they installed flood lights to work 24 hours, and depleted the rainforest day and night.

2-Boycott the majority of fast-food restaurants that use beef grazed upon cleared rainforests: After roughly six years, this land becomes barren, and washed away. This means of attaining profit is senseless, heartless, and downright stupid.

3-Encourage the recycling of cans on your campus as well as the recycling of plastics and refusal to use styrofoam plates in the Donovan Dining Center.

4-Even a simple approach of using a pump hairspray, rather than a environment killing aerosol, would help.

5-And for the real radicals on this campus (like the ones who sit on the grass in front of the library), support groups like the Rainforest Action Network or Friend of the Rainforests.

It is now time to act. The period of profit over responsibility is over. This isn't funny anymore, it's serious. People on this planet, have to be accountable to the planet. paraphrase of Henry David Thoreau, "What's the use of having a house, if you don't have a planet to put it on?"
