During recent budget hearings, Student Government proposed that RIC-TV produce a video yearbook in place of a yearbook.

This is not a surprise to the staff, due to the fact that in the last 10 years yearbook sales have steadily declined. Sales of this years book have been the worst.

Many of their financial problems come from the obvious fact that people don't realize that a Yearbook exists. The Yearbook staff attributes this to general ap-

athy on campus, poor organization during previous years and finally, lack of help. At this time the Yearbook organization is made up of four members who will produce a Yearbook by

Kessler has helped to keep the organization together in the last year. As for the proposal of a video yearbook, Kessler says, "videos last about five years, but a book lasts forever."

Another part of the succession of problems she sees, is the moving from their original office, Student Union room 205 to sharing space with the Anchor office, Student Union room 308. This has caused problems for the organization because they cannot con-

Withrow stated that it was "beneficial [for those who attended the workshop] to see films and discuss personal viewpoints on date (or acquaintance) rape because people may have different expectations when they're on a date." Highlights writings from Rhode Island

"A lot of students have been surprised that hearing and going to a reading is not a dreadful experience. Hearing a story or hearing poems read to you is actually fun." Tom Cobb, Associate Professor of English

This year's celebration of the arts has focused on writing. The Performing Arts Committee has created Writing Rhode Island: Imaging the Landscape, an event that has been bringing writers from and around Rhode Island to Rhode Island College

Thomas Cobb, Associate Professor in the English Department; Elaine Perry from the Theater Department, and Larry Sykes from the Art Department are the members of the Performing Arts Committee involved in this event.

Writing Rhode Island includes readings, a panel and a reader's theater production from writers such as Galway Kinnell, John Casey, Ann Hood, Daniel Asa Rose, Jeffrey Greene and Jean McGarry.

The theme of this event is Rhode Island. "This is a month long celebration of writing about Rhode Island and from Rhode Island," said Cobb, chairperson of the subcommittee in charge of the event.

Cobb arranged and organized the activities by obtaining grants and gifts from various organizations. The State Council on the Arts was the primary source of funds for the activity. This organization gave \$4,000.00. The Providence Journal Company gave \$2,000.00 and Rhode Island College gave \$900.00.

"This is the first time we've ever done anything quite like this," said Cobb. "And may be the last time we ever do anything quite like this. It is a very expensive project." The printing involved for advertising an event like this is too much and the money collected to Cobb was only given for this particular event.

However, the event has been very successful. A lot of people showed up for the first reading and for the second it seemed that the word was spread around because Ann Hood, the second guest writer, brought in a full house.

The grand opening of the event took place on April 6, with the winner of the National Book Award for his novel *Spartina*, John Casey. Casey read a short story, "Snow White and Others."

The next writer who will be coming to Rhode Island is Galway Kinnell who is scheduled to read at the Providence Public Library Auditorium on Wednesday, April 22 at 8:00 PM.

Cobb thought that the event would be an interesting program. One that would call attention to the fact that there is a lot of writing going on and coming out of Rhode Island. "Rhode Island is not an island," he said, "there are a lot of people around who are also from Rhode Island involved with Rhode Island."

Cobb described Writing Rhode Island: Imaging the Landscape as a vehicle of communication between RIC and the community. "We are not only bringing the community to the college but also taking the college out to the community."

hopes that everyone will learn to be more careful. Winslow also stated that men and women should understand "that no means no.

The Women's Center, who planned a workshop on self-defense and a performance from Gorilla Theater, wanted people to think about rape. Along with the "watchcat" keychains that are on sale and free whistles they distributed, they placed a board with thought provoking remarks written on it, along with markers, in the quad to get a response from students. The reception of the board was mixed.

A member of the Women's Center expressed that the Center felt that while the response had been positive, there was a "surprising lack of interest." The Center, wanting to stress women's rights, feels that women have been taught to be submissive and not to fight

back. They also stressed that people should learn that when a woman says no to sexual demands, that she means no. The Women's Center wanted to hold "Speak Out," a group of dialogues of statements from rape victims and rapist which would have been performed by Gorilla Theater, in the Donovan Dining Center, but were told that the subject of rape was too disturbing for college students to hear about while eating.

Some of the remarks on the board in the quad were very provoking, one being: "No one will believe you anyway." Some were profound: "Rape is about power," (and the response, scribbled next to it) "yes but sex is about power, too." One response seemed to sum up the feelings of many involved in the awareness week: "When a woman is crying, she is not having fun

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EPA's Reilly finds recession: "Tough sled'n"

In 1989, William Reilly took over the Administration of the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) with the pledge to keep Mr. Bush to his promise or becoming "the environmental president." However with the bad economic times the United States has experienced recently, and the constant pressure by Mr. Bush's personal environmental policy along with the White House administration's aim to weaken the Environmental rules the EPA administers, Reilly has found the pledge difficult to keep.

On Environmental Grounds

Still, William Reilly has managed to keep EPA's rules strong enough to secure their emphasis. Over the past three years, the EPA has met industries challenge and has dished out almost a billion dollars in violation fees to industrial polluters, and has even had several industrial managers sent to jail to pay for the culpability of their polluting actions. That type of "hard ball" by EPA administration has been uncommon since the governmental agency was started by Richard Nixon in 1970. But Reilly's toughest challenge has been the deregulation emphasis of environmental law by the Bush White House.

Reilly took a slight pay cut when he excepted Mr. Bush's offer to become EPA's chief in 1989 (although he still makes \$130,000 a year). The grandson of a policeman and son of a small business owner, Reilly did not come from American aristocratic roots. He did however manage to accept a history degree from Yale, an urban studies degree from Columbia, and a law degree from Harvard. Prior to becoming head of the EPA, he headed the policy and research division of the Conservation Foundation and the World Wildlife Federation where he gained much experience in the problems of environmental advocacy in the Third World.

The twenty years experience Reilly gained in the environmental movement, seems to have prepared him for the difficult challenge of holding off the tidal wave of environmental law deregulation proposals orienting from the White House and the White House council of competitiveness headed by Mr. Quayle. Especially in a time of recession, American industry complains of governmental regulations as

being to tight for industry to be global competitive. White house policy typically tries to serve the industrial interest. The first and easiest rules to cut are environmental rules. Says Richard Ayres, a Washington lawyer and long time EPA critic, "It's like the White House is creating a shadow EPA that's becoming increasingly larger and more intrusive in its involvement. That's certainly got to make the job of anybody who runs the EPA tougher." Ayres was referring to the deregulation forces of the White House council of competitiveness. In a recent battle with the EPA, the White House policy sought to change the a technical rule involving how often industry must file for permits to emit air pollution. The permit rule, the corner stone of the landmark 1990 Clean Air Act, requires business obtain regulatory approval when they change manufacturing operations that would increase air emissions. The EPA also holds that by law, private environmental groups have the right to challenge the emission changes. Just hours before a showdown meeting between the EPA and the White House Council, the Council produced a sixteen page report that indicated the Justice Department supported the council's position when asked to confirm the report by the Wall Street Journal, the Justice Department had no comment.

In a bind, Reilly boycotted the meeting at the White House sending two EPA staff members in his place. The council canceled the meeting.

The EPA is currently charging the White House Council with misrepresenting the position of the Justice Department. Reilly was said to be angered also by the fact that several White House staff members, all hostile to the EPA's position, were invited to the meeting.

This is not the first time Reilly used the boycott to the advantage of the EPA. Once with a fight with former White House Chief of Staff, John Sununu, Reilly avoided a meeting involving federal acid rain requirements and eventually preserved the regulations.

That Reilly has shown the ability to shirk administration hardball tactics has caused him to lose friends around White House staff meetings. Often administration officials complain that Reilly is not a "team player."

However, staff members' opinions aside, if Mr. Bush is going to claim any success in his promise to be the "environmental president" in the upcoming election, he has William Reilly and only Reilly to thank.


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Baseball: A Few **Thoughts**



As part of RIC END 1992, Rhode Island College Programming will be sponsoring a road race on Sunday, April 26. The second annual 5 K Fund Run will begin at 12:00 noon here on the campus.

Last year, the proceeds from the race were donated to a memorial fund at the Smith Hill Center. This year, however, the money raised will be given to the RIC Athletic Department, to help replace things that were lost in the fire that destroyed Walsh Gym in early January.

Women's Softball Team Earns Doubleheader Split





The Anchormen played extremely well and it was expected that they would win the match without having to play the doubles matches.





Smithereens play RIC Monday night

An Interview with Jim Babjak

Monday night, April 20th, as part of the RIC End celebration, veteran rockers The Smithereens will be appearing in the Donovan Dining Center. In preparation for this event, we recently spoke with Jim Babjak, guitarist for the band.

Anchor: Have you ever had any regrets about the decisions you have made in the band?

Babjak: No. We've been very fortunate to be able to make a living doing something we love. We're not as successful as we'd like to be but we do have two gold albums. Today it's tough for many bands to get an album released in the first place.

Anchor: Is there anything you've gotten out of this job that you wouldn't have gotten from another?

Babjak: I would have done anything. I'm a survivor. Playing music is what I've always wanted to do. We played dives for years with people telling us we're not good enough. We were rejected by every record label, even the small independent ones. We finally got signed by Enigma. They just got a tape with a phone number. No photos, no bio, no nothing. They never even saw us live they were just signing everyone. We got lucky. It sold 400,000 copies and recently went gold. The label didn't know how to handle a hit record. "Blood and Roses" was gaining momentum but they couldn't handle it.

Anchor: Are the changes in musical style on the albums a conscious effort?

Babjak: If you look back at the other albums, even the first one, we had a lot of different styles. When we were growing up everything influenced us, Motown, the British Invasion, Country, it wasn't one band. Well, I could say The Who maybe even more than The Beatles because I love

to hear Townsend play. I also like The Kinks.

Anchor: Why did it take you three albums to have one of the songs you wrote used?

Babjak: I'll probably have more songs on the next album. I'm writing on the road now because I have two young boys at home and they take up all my time. When we write at home we'll send the parts to each other on tape. I was always embarrassed to write lyrics but on this particular album I was forced in to it. Pat (DiNizio) had four other songs written that didn't have lyrics yet. The music was recorded but we were afraid that they wouldn't make the album so I sat down and my wife said to listen to the lyrics on the radio. They're just bad poetry. I said I can do that so I had four Black Russians, smoked a pack of cigarettes and wrote it in an hour. I wish it was that easy all the

Anchor: When a song is penned do you usually know how the rest of the band will take to it?

Babjak: We've been playing for so long that when a song is written we already know how we'll play it. My writing tends to be haphazard. I like to keep it simple, not too heavy. We write about everyday life and relationships, not necessarily from personal experience. The new song that I wrote called "Face the World With Pride" was written after the Judge Thomas hearings. The song calls for women to stand up for themselves but the references are very subtle. It's the type of song where someone can say "that's happened to me."

Anchor: Have you ever had any experiences that you could describe as a "Spinal Tap" experience?

Babjak: Oh. every day! The first thing that comes to mind is when "Blood




The Smithereens are (l to r) Mike Mesaros, Pat DiNizio, Dennis Diken and Jim Babjak.

and Roses" first started to get played we had a talent agency set us up as opening for ZZ Top in front of 20,000 people. Ted Nugent was supposed to open but five minutes before we went on he had to cancel, for whatever reason. People started booing and throwing bottles at us during our set. It was a horrible experience but actually a good lesson. Also, some promoters don't know how to be accommodating for a band. You want certain things

in the dressing room, towels and water for example and the basic things. Sometimes you end up with these bar rags. We also don't like to waste food. When we started, we would ask for everything and get it. We soon realized that the food was going to waste. As a matter of fact, what we're doing is collecting the stuff and giving it to the homeless. It's the right thing to do."

Tom Cochrane takes on a "Mad, Mad World"

Opens for Smithereens Monday night

After seven albums with the band Red Rider, 38 year old singer and guitarist Tom Cochrane has reached the peak of his career with his first true solo album Mad Mad World. This 13 song album reflects on life, it s trial and tribulations, coping and music. If you liked "Lunatic Fringe," you won't be disappointed with this one, but don't despair because "Life is a Highway."

The first cut, "Life is a Highway," is Cochrane's way of saying "everyone has problems but don't let them get you down." It is a rocking tune that seems to meander along, like a Mustang on the highway at 70. It cruises without a care in the world. In a recent *Anchor* interview, Cochrane said "it was a reflection on my experiences in Africa," with the group Worldvision.

"You see these people suffering, and yet they seem to find some joy in the world. They know things are bad, but it doesn't get to them." "Life" went to number one in Canada, Portugal, and the Netherlands, and beat out Bryan Adams' single "(Everything I Do) I Do It For You" for a Juno, the Canadian version of a Grammy. In fact, Cochrane took home four Junos that night, besting Adams in all categories including best album, song writer, and entertainer of the year. "Bryan and I are good friends, we respect each other, and each other's work," Cochrane said.

The album wanders through such subjects as child abuse, in the single "All the King's Men," drug addiction in "Get Back Up," and violence against women in "Emotional Truth." "It's about how men have to come to terms with their own emotions and create some new ones" Cochrane said. "Get Back Up" is about the impersonal experiences of drug addiction, and how you may not want to help, but you just keep the person walking back and forth, all night if they have to."

The album was recorded in Toronto, and then in Memphis. When asked if it was written to be recorded in Memphis, Cochrane said "it could have been recorded anywhere, but I like Memphis, the people there are friendly. I also like New Orleans, but you don't know what you'll run into at night there."

One track that stands out in particular is "Friendly Advice," about truth and honesty in relationships. Cochrane writes: "And your jive friends might say/ this is how we survive/ but I know in my own mind/ can't you see it's a clever disguise/ that it's only friendly advice/ and I hope that you'll see in time/ just who your best friend was, baby." Pretty heavy stuff for a guy who dropped out of college.

Tom Cochrane's Mad Mad World is one of the best albums I've heard in a long time. Although "Life Is a Highway" is the only song on radio now, and only on a few stations at that, the rest of the album matches the song, not in speed, but in intensity. This album gets five Anchors, yes, five. If you don't believe it, check out Tom Cochrane tonight at 9 p.m. in Donovan Dining Center, he will not disappoint.



Nybras: Evil Incarnate

If you are a metalhead in the least, or evil at heart, run to the nearest cool record store and buy *Divine Failure* by **Nybras**. This heavy-hitting three-song demo packs a major crunch and pulls together well.

The intro, titled "Infesting the Flock," features vocalist Kenny Ruhle (formerly of Head Rot) howling indignantly about



his superiority to God. (This tape is fairly Satanic.) Once the song "Nybras" begins, you know these guys are serious. A powerful, crunching riff peppered with tempo changes and Ruhle's unique grunts sound like the stuff you'd expect to hear blasting from Marshall half-stacks in hell. The riffs blend in together well, without sounding like a bunch of songs slammed together.

"Divine Failure" is a less successful song, as it opens with the vocals scattered in a random fashion about a simple thrash riff. The musicians pull back together during the next part of the song, which also features a killer doom riff. "Anno Domine," the final track, is a great song, but features nothing overly spectacular.

While the demo sounds great, with total production costing less than \$150, Will Maher's snare does tend to get lost on the general mayhem of the ultra-speed segments. Josh Maher's condensed bass sound has a trebly edge, which works fine overall. The guitar sounds are different, though. R.I.C. student Joel Stone's bassheavy guitar tends to be overpowered by Jay Rossi's very trebly guitar. Combined with Rossi's annoying habit of getting tangled in his tuned-down strings, Nybras gets a reputation for being sloppy that they don't deserve. (I've recently been told that Rossi is no longer in the band.) Careful listening should demolish that preconception. After all, they didn't have the cash to redo every track they fouled up.

Don't get the idea that Nybras is loose and chaotic. The few-and-far-between screwups are expected on cheap first demos. This sounds like a third demo. Lovers of death and destruction should definitely check out Nybras. Divine Failure is an overwhelmingly successful effort that has received praise from professionally recording death metal bands and even people who traditionally hate the genre. Don't even bother finishing this article. Grab five bucks and buy the damn tape.

Wayne- They shoot! They score! The most excellent lyrics say it all:




Jeff- That's worse than any shameless plug I've ever done. You just like to sing, Wayne.

The Jesus and Mary Chain and their unbiblical sounds are back yet again with their new LP Honey's Dead. The Scottish rockers who produce a sound that is described as a "feedback-filled Beach Boys voyage to hell" has changed a lot since their first LP "Darklands" creating such hits as "Head On," later covered by The Pixies, and "Blues From a Gun," both from their last album Automatic, the group had almost copyrighted their sound. 
wanna, die like JFK, I wanna die on a sunny day" with a sarcastic slur that makes it gorgeously perfect.

Bark Market Vegas Throat Def American

Vegas Throat, the third album by Brooklyn-based Barkmarket, is a complex and very satisfying piece of work. The music mixes groove heavy guitar rock, melodious alternative music, and occasional touches of chaos and feedback for flavoring. All this is held together by three musicians who work in synch and by a studio production which promotes the quirkiness of the music instead of homogenizing it.

The guitar is relatively low in the mix and the bass is high which works well because the guitar is more or less an accompanying, instead of primary, instrument. The bass lines are clear and

strong and they provide the melody lines for most of the songs while the guitar is sparsely played as an emotional highlighter of key moments. Also a tasteful use of studio effects, which never becomes gimmicky, adds to the whole atmosphere of the record.

A unique band like this would not be complete without lyrics that are unique as well. The songs contain free form lyrics which talk to a single person but don't seem to be about anything at all. Instead of narrating or describing, the singer spouts well-tuned phrases whose power lie not in meaning but in the sounds of the words matching the music.

Vegas Throat is not an album easily digestible after a first listen, but it is definitely recommended for anyone who has become bored with whatever type of music they listen to and is looking for something different and innovative.
