Political lines being drawn on questions of AIDS and gay rights

In political years such as this, issues which would usually be swept under the rug of day-to-day life suddenly take on new prominence under the microscope of public focus.

This year as never before, AIDS and AIDS-related issues have come into the political spotlight as one of the top three issues, behind the economy and the environment. Nowhere else was the focus on the disease more apparent than at the Democratic National Convention, where Bob Hattoy, an HIV-positive gay man, addressed the delegates, the first such address in history. The Democrats also heard from Elizabeth Glasser, an HIV-posi-

tive mother of two who contracted the virus through a blood transfusion.

These two presentations not only exemplified the Democrats' willingness to embrace the gay community, but also presented a full argument for both gay and lesbian rights and AIDS research.

If only Hattoy had spoken, the Democrats would have come across as bleeding-heart liberals protecting another sector of the counter-culture in America. But the inclusion of Glasser, infected by careless medical practice instead of "deviant" behavior, focused the Democratic platform on medical reform, as well as gay and lesbian rights. This stand is still vigorously liberal, but the Democrats' lack of one-sidedness

College physician questions validity of condom effectiveness

Dr. Scanlan predicts rise in sexually transmitted diseases

The reliability of condoms is decreasing while the number of students contracting sexually transmitted diseases (STD's) are expected to increase in the next year, according to Dr. James Scanlan, Director of Health Services.

Scanlan attests to the increase from medical reports from Health Services.

According to Scanlan, from July 1, 1991 through June 30, 1992, there have been 10 cases of gonorrhea, 40 cases of chlamydia, and two cases of Hepatitis B. Scanlan foresees the possibility that these numbers will rise steadily from the fall through the spring semester. Fortunately, Dr. Scanlan has not diagnosed any students with Syphilis or AIDS.

For those people who use con-

doms as a means for practicing "safe sex," Scanlan asserts that "safe sex is an oxymoron. When anyone engages in sexual activity, with or without the use of a condom, they run the risk of contracting any one of a host of

Scanlan added that "the value of condoms is not fully approved," says Scanlan, whose opinion has been reinforced by the findings of a recent medical study.

Scanlan made reference to a television program which focused on a doctor's findings concerning the effectiveness of condoms as a form of birth control.

According to Scanlan, approximately 500 people participated in the study over a 10 year period. Each participant had condoms prescribed to them, along with a high degree of education on condom use. The 25 percent pregnan-



cy rate the study found definitely questioned the reliability of condom use as an effective form of birth control, Scanlan concluded.

Scanlan correlated the results to the concern of condom effective ness with the spread of disease. If 25 percent of the people were impregnated despite the use of a condom, Scanlan proposed, then

Convenient, discreet access is Condom Hut's aim

Does buying condoms at your local drugstore intimidate or embarrass you? Maybe the Condom Hut drive-thru on Park Avenue will put your fears to rest.

The Condom Hut, which was once a Fotomat building, was opened three months ago by its owner, Emanuella DelVecchio, at the corner of Park Avenue and Cranston St. in Cranston.

For the most part, the community's reaction has been a positive one, according to Tony Grimm, a worker at the store. However, its opening was met with two unfortunate incidents. The hut's window was broken and it was vandalized with black paint.

Nonetheless, Grimm remarked, "I've only gotten two negative reactions and about 100 positive ones."

Business has been doing very well at the Condom Hut.

Interestingly, the majority of the customers are women.

"Women are more at risk now for AIDS. Women seem to be a little more concerned then the men when it comes to protection," Grimm said. Another reason for the store's attraction anonymity.

"The novelties are not effective like other condoms. The reason for that is because they're not tested by the FDA, as the regular condoms are," said Grimm.

Not only is the store convenient and discreet, but it's economical, since its prices are 20 to 25 per cent lower than other stores. In addition, an informative pamphlet about AIDS is handed out with every purchase.

The concept of a drive-thru condom store has been well received and the store has been approached for more franchises, so you may see a new Condom Hut near you soon.



The Gay, Lesbian or Bisexual Equity Alliance, or GLOBE, is off to a new start this year. GLOBE is an organization that is focused on supporting and understanding the needs of the gay, lesbian or bisexual students, staff and faculty of Rhode Island College.

Doug Cureton, the Associate Director of the Campus Center, is the advisor for GLOBE. "I am encouraged by the support of the college for the organization. The new constitution has finally been approved which will afford the members the opportunity to meet and work with others at our college. This support is absolutely vital to the development and well-being of our students, faculty and administration."

There are many great programs across the country to help the individuals understand the issues and challenge the myths about gays. Rhode Island has several already in place RIGLY (RI Gay and Lesbian Youth) and RINGS (RI Network of Gay Students) are just two such programs that are available.

plex issues and help each other."

Cureton said that he has seen a level of acceptance by new students.

"This past summer I spoke to the new students at orientation about attending RIC and being responsible for creating a caring and purposeful community. I am affirmed by the number of students who spoke positively to me about their understanding and support and hope that others who still are confused, angry or fearful will come forward to ask us about their issues, and not listen to others who don't even know a gay person."

Who do you think of when you think about AIDS?

Perhaps you think about gay men- one of the first groups to be hit by the AIDS epidemic and certainly one of the hardest-hit. Maybe you also think about I.V. drug users, who by sharing needles spread the virus like wildfire throughout the drug-user's community. Chances are, you don't think about teenagers, twentysomethings, young men, young women, members of the middle class. Chances are, you don't think about yourself.

Start thinking about it. Start thinking about yourself. Every time you think about AIDS. Every time you think about having sex. Every time you are tempted to do it-just once!- without a condom.

Today there is no group or class of people who can consider themselves immune to AIDS or to the HIV virus. Even if you are heterosexual, have never had a homosexual experience, and have never shot up, you may still be at risk. If you have ever had sex without a condom, even once, you could have been infected and you owe it to yourself to get tested. This holds especially true if you are a woman. It is much easier for an HIV-infected male to pass the virus on to an uninfected woman during heterosexual sex than it is for a woman to pass it to a man. There has been a tendency on the part of the medical community to overlook or deny the fact that women are as susceptible to AIDS as men, and this has meant that infected women have not been diagnosed until they begin to suffer from the full-blown symptoms of AIDS, in many cases, after they

had had years to unintentionally pass the virus on to even more people. If you are a woman reading this article, please be honest with yourself and get tested if there is the slightest doubt in your mind. One of the advantages to being tested is peace of mind, knowing for certain that you are not infected, and that if you are responsible and use condoms every time, you probably won't ever have to worry about contracting HIV again. Keep in mind, however, that condoms are not 100% effective, so use your


There has been a growing recognition in the medical community of the existence of AIDS in American women. Studies done so far suggest that heterosexual women represent the fastest-growing group of AIDS victims and HIV carriers. There are more studies that are still in progress. One example is Miriam Hospital, on the East Side of Providence, which is now conducting a long-term study on the incidence of HIV and AIDS in women.

One aim of this and other studies is to understand more clearly whether women with HIV are more susceptible to infections by the human papilloma virus (better known as genital warts) and cervical cancer. Already a link has been established between HIV infection and recurring yeast infections which is frequently overlooked by gynecologists. This does not mean that if you are a woman who has recurring yeast infections, you should panic or automatically assume that you are infected. What it does mean is

that if you do experience this, you need to insist that your gynecologist get to the root of the problem, and also that you get tested, no matter how much the doctor swears you don't need to.

In a society which teaches women nonassertive behavior and expects her to put other's desires before her own needs, it is difficult for women to become assertive enough to make healthy behavior choices like insisting on the use of condoms, and on being tested with any potential partners. But in this day and age, when not only AIDS, but other sexually-transmitted diseases are on the rise, nobody, man or woman, can afford to pretend the problem doesn't exist or that they are immune to it.

The RIC Women's Center is a division of Student Services. We maintain a file of up-to-date information on sexually transmitted diseases and AIDS as well as on other issues of concern to women. We sell condoms at cost of 8 for \$1 and Watchcat keychains for \$3. We offer peer counseling and free use of our lending library, not to mention free coffee. Our normal hours are Monday through Friday, 9am to 3pm, and often there is somebody in the office on Saturday from 12pm to 3pm as well. You can find us in the lower level of Donovan Dining Center, around the corner from S.O.S. Don't hesitate to drop by if you need information, supplies, or someone to talk to.

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lends credibility to their argument for reform of the current system.

The Republicans, on the other hand, disaffected themselves from the gay and lesbian community, and seemed content to continue their policies of token support and discrimination. The true sentiment of the Republican Party was typified in Pat Buchanan's call for a cultural war and his indictment of gays in "God's country."

George Bush has even gone so far as to attack the "cultural elite" in Hollywood, who are among the most conspicuous supporters of gay and lesbian rights and AIDS research.

Every political year, arguments fly that the President will decide to grant special favors to key constituencies to gain votes. Usually, rumors such as these are baseless. This year is no different.

This time around, there is a theory afoot that George Bush will use his Presidential power, just as he did with the fighter deal with Taiwan four months ago. This time, says the theory, Bush will at last release the millions of dollars set aside for AIDS re-

search as a last-ditch effort to gain the pivotal gay vote.

The truth of this unconfirmed idea is debatable, especially when Bush seems more content firing ad hominum salvos at Clinton and begging voters to trust their President. If Bush had had a plan to release AIDS research money, he would have done it by now.

Another aspect of the political argument this year over gay rights is the question of lifestyle versus predisposition to homosexuality. Certain conservative-minded Republicans stop barely short of rehashing the argument that AIDS victims "deserve it" for being homosexual, but still peg AIDS as a "gay" disease.

Further, homosexuality is labeled as a "lifestyle" by conservatives in order to doubt the validity of further testing for AIDS.

Logically speaking, say the Republicans, if people choose to be gay, they are subjecting themselves to AIDS, and the government should not pick up the tab for their mistakes.

The liberal-minded Democrats hammer at the Republican stand, countering with a firm commitment to AIDS research. The money is there, they contend, and now we must use it.

Democrats also cling to the theory of predetermination in order to justify the call for gay rights. Just as African-Americans should not be the object of discrimination, the Democrats say, so should gays and lesbians be granted their rights as people.

Perhaps the most telling aspects of this argument are in the responses by both sides to condom distribution and needle exchange programs. Republicans point to such programs and criticize them for promoting sex and drug use, while Democrats call such efforts innovative AIDS-prevention programs.

In effect, while Republicans seek "education and counseling," seemingly based on fear ("this is what will happen to you if you're gay"), the Democrats seek pragmatic solutions and concrete efforts to help stem the increasing tide of AIDS and other sexually-transmitted diseases.

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the same rate of people run the risk of contracting and spreading sexually transmitted diseases. Therefore, Scanlan promotes abstinence as the only effective method for birth control and protection against STD's.

In light of the medical study and the fact that condoms do not provide 100 percent protection, abstinence appears to be the safest route in guarding against disease, Scanlan insists. He said that a sexually active condom user is still at a high risk of becoming infected.

If you think you may have a sexually transmitted disease, treatment is available at the Health Center in Browne Hall. There is also a state health clinic at St. Joseph's Hospital, which offers a free walk-in service weekdays from 8 a.m - 2:30 p.m.

With the rise in teenage pregnancies, do you think virginity is a dying concept?





Campus newspaper discloses rape victim's name

(CPS) - A campus newspaper's decision to report the name and address of a rape victim has created a stormy controversy at Marshall University in Huntington, W.Va., and the paper's editor said he will not back down from printing names in the future.

The story, which included the woman's address and details of the attack, was published in September. Several campus groups condemned the newspaper for violating the woman's right to privacy.

It is not illegal in West Virginia to publish a rape victim's name, but several officials questioned the ethics and reasons for publishing the woman's name. She does not attend Marshall University, and the alleged attack took place off-campus.

The dilemma is multi-faceted, but boils down to the question of rights--those of the newspaper vs. those of the victim. While many involved in such cases present the issue in either-or terms, there are many levels of debate, journalists and communications faculty say.

Kevin Melrose, editor of *The Parthenon*, said the seven-member student editorial board voted 4-3 to publish the rape victim's name. The board consists of six men and one woman; the woman voted to publish the name, he

said. The article appeared in the September 22 issue.

The reasons for publishing the name were two-fold, Melrose said. He said that the newspaper had a "journalistic dedication to fairness" to present facts and "do what is fair and just." Additionally, he said, by printing the woman's name, he hoped to change the stigma attached to rape.

"We felt that in part we are a vehicle for social change and that one of our responsibilities was to move forward to stop treating victims of sexual assault (so) that they should be ashamed," he said. "They have nothing to be ashamed of. They are victims of a violent attack and we wanted to treat them like other cases of violent attack."

That line of reasoning, however, fell short for some people on campus, including Dee Cockrille, who is director of the school's women's center. Cockrille worked with the woman after the alleged attack, and again after her name and address appeared in the paper.

"My response is that we're not talking facts, we're talking about people's lives. When a person decides to tell, that should be his or her choice," Cockrille said.

Assistant journalism professor Debra Belluomini, the paper's adviser, was against disclosing the woman's name, but there was nothing she could do to stop it from being printed.

"From my own experience, I thought it wasn't the best thing to do," she said. "I expected some reaction, but not the amount that came about."

Newspapers have grappled with the issue for years. Generally, the name of rape victims are not published unless the woman gives her permission. The dilemma surfaced during William Kennedy Smith's rape trial in West Palm Beach, Florida. Smith was acquitted of sexual battery charges.

The media, at the beginning of his trial, didn't use the accuser's name or photograph. However, the Palm Beach Community College *Beachcomber* ran photos of Smith and the woman who accused him of rape, and identified her in its November 4, 1991 edition. An accompanying editorial said that Smith's career had been "irreparably damaged" by the rape allegation, and that defendants have the right to be presumed innocent of wrongdoing until proved otherwise.

David Rupp, the editorial page editor, said last year that publishing a rape victim's photo and name may discourage victims from pressing charges, but that the legal system shouldn't protect the rights of the alleged victim at the expense of the defendant.

However, some journalism faculty members from across the nation are hesitant to draw such conclusions. Most favor discretion in such cases.

Ralph Izard, director of the journalism department at Ohio University (Athens), said sometimes a victim's name should be used, as in the case where there is a serial rapist.

"It must be absolutely bona fide that you are warning the community, and can make a case that it is valuable in a public sense to identify the people and provide the information to potential victims," he said.

He said the at by having a "hard-core" decision to publish all rape victim's names, newspapers are practicing lazy journalism: The decision has already been made, so there is no newsroom debate.

"My general disposition is to say no, I would not identify a rape victim," he said. "There are many reasons that it can compound the trauma, and I buy it. Nothing is absolute in journalism." David Nelson, who teaches journalism at Southwest Texas State University in an Marcos, Texas, said questions of privacy are involved in disclosing a rape victim's name. "My conclusion is to never run a rape victim's name without her permission," he said.

Harold Shaver, director of Marshall's journalism department, said he was taking a middle-of-the-road approach. However, if he had been making the decision, he would not have run the woman's name.

"Some see it as a black and white issue. It has gotten emotional, and the more that happens, the more people get entrenched," he said. It's been a little hot around here."

The Parthenon's staff will change editors in January, said Belluomini, the paper's adviser, so the policy on publishing alleged rape victims' names could change. But that won't end the impasse.

"People need time to think about the ramifications on both sides of the argument," she said. "A lot of people don't seem to realize there are two sides to this issue."

As I was waiting I had a chance to wonder why the alcohol made me so impatient. I had a condom with me. Why didn't I use it? Why didn't she care if I did? Why was I there with this specter of a woman?

All these whys and more crowded my head. They splintered into a host of dark shards when the nurse called my name. I followed her into the icy antiseptic of the examination room. As I sat and waited I wondered if I one day would return here gaunt and exhausted, desperate for a cure, for relief.

I was numb and silent as my deep red blood filled the vial.

It's been a week since that visit. A week filled with somber wonderings and dark questions of finality. I am halfway to finding if my fears are to be confirmed or if I will have a second chance. Pros seek new game plan to fight HIV, AIDS

With athletes like former tennis great Arthur Ashe and basketball star Magic Johnson stepping forward to confront their condition, it's the fear of many pro athletes that they might be next.

Most people are finally beginning to realize that HIV and AIDS are not restricted to homosexuals and IV drug users. Ashe contracted the virus through no fault of his own when he received a blood transfusion during an operation. Magic had stated that he is not homosexual and had acquired the virus through heterosexual activity.

According to the Center for Disease Control 4,300 men, 2.5% of the total number of cases, are believed to have acquired the virus through sex with a woman. A woman is 20 times more likely to become infected with the virus after having intercourse with an HIV-positive male than a man has of becoming infected after sex with an HIV-positive woman.

Because of the exposure many pro athletes receive during the season, they are susceptible to propositions by copious numbers of people. There are fans willing to do anything for money, an autograph, or a night on the town with a famous athlete. Being on the road away from home, the temptation can become a deadly one. In an article by E.M. Swift (Sports Illustrated, November 8, 1991), the writer addresses the issue of promiscuity among pro

"Promiscuity is common enough among pro athletes,' Swift noted. "It is possible that there are other athletes who have already acquired HIV from the same source as Magic did. Or, more chillingly, will contract the disease from someone who was infected by Magic."

When Magic revealed his condition, it made many pro athletes get scared and get tested. It's unfortunate that it took a famous

athlete who had acquired the virus to make people realize the true danger of AIDS.

"You would think this would open everybody's eyes," said Indiana Pacers guard Vem Fleming, "but I don't know... What about three months from now... Is everybody still going to be talking about Magic?"

Swift's article also revealed some of the fears of pro athletes.

Atlanta Hawks forward Dominique Wilkins was quoted saying, "This has to scare everybody. The more I think about it, the more scared I am. In fact I'm scared to death."

Athletes agree that being scared don't exactly think."

is fine, but being safe is a step further. Buffalo Bills nosetackle Mike Lodish was quoted in Swift's article as saying that the danger of AIDS in sports is "to the point of my considering becoming celibate until I choose to get married."

Other athletes see Magic's situation as further support for practicing safe sex. Phoenix Cardinals' nosetackle Jim Whaler hopes that guys will think "Well, Magic got it, so if I'm going to sleep with this girl, I'm going to use a condom', but in the heat of the moment, guys

TPC's lack of talent is terminal

There's certainly something to be said for a group that creates their own sound in music and are true pioneers in the field. Unfortunately, Terminal Power Company don't fit that bill.

TPC's "sound" is a potpourri of several scents, which the British duo of Paul Aspel and John Roome call "Hard-Edged Psychogenic Dance-Influenced Film Music." But the combination of the elements TPC uses gets old very quickly. The beats are repetative, and the guitar, bass, vocal, and sound effects tracks are stale and redundant.

Run Silent, Run Deep is just too flashy to be more than a curiosity. By the time you cut through all the glitz, there's nothing left. There's no musicality, no real groove.

There's also something to be said about bands that can tour. If you can picture a band playing on stage as you listen to an album, they're a meritable band. TPC fails here, too; a TPC "show" would be nothing more than a couple of guys screwing around with turntables and belting out hyper-angst-ridden, incoherent and useless lyrics. Even a live band, a la LL Cool J on MTV's Un-plugged a few months back, couldn't save a live performance; Aspel and Roome would be too busy playing with their technoplaying music.

Sorry, but there's just not a single saving grace on RSRD. Aspel's guitar lines are too sparse and dischordant, the "drum" tracks (there's no way Roome is playing real drums, unless a Casio keyboard counts) are too predictable, and the effects have no thematic use. The lyrics are just overkill, and the production is anemic.

TPC are just a couple of guys with too much studio time on their hands, too many new toys in their toyboxes, and way, way too much ego.

Just skip this blithering, blathering, atonal, assonant, over-bearing, over-hyped pap. 'Kay?

Damn Yankees Don't Tread on Nugent's feet

When I first sat down and thought about writing this Damn Yankees article, I had it set in my head that it was going to be a bad review. I had listened to the disc several times but it was always while doing something else. I never had a chance to listen for what I was searching for in the Yankees, Ted Nugent's guitar. It is there (it's everywhere) and yes, the disc is good.

Everyone has their opinion of whose band Damn Yankees is. Styx fans notice Tommy Shaw's vocals and guitar work. If you liked Night Ranger in the early '80's you'll appreciate Jack Blade's bass and vocals. If you're like me you believe the band is headed by the Motor City Madman, Ted Nugent. Even

though he only sings one track, his guitar stands out in every song, where Blade and Shaw trade off singing every other track and don't get as much of a chance to shine.

The Renegade from the '70's, Tommy Shaw, takes the mike on such songs as "Silence is Broken," "Fifteen Minutes of Fame," and "Dirty Dog." Most of his songs are rockers. "Someone to Believe" starts as a ballad but picks up with a hint of wah-wah from Nugent. The song is about someone searching for love and its pace picks up with the plot line towards the end.

Shaw's "Throw Away" song is actually pretty cool. "Double Coyote" is one of those life-onthe-road songs where singer sees girl, singer wants girl but singer has to move on to the next town. Later on he finds her with "the opening band, the technical crew and the manager, too." The playing style is very scattered with a riff here, a note there, but the

styled sound picks up until its almost kind of bluesy. This is one of the most un-Damn Yankees things the Damn Yankees did on the album.

For the most part, I enjoyed Jack Blade's songs more than Shaw's. He has the distinction of singing the album's first two singles, the MTV favorite "Don't Tread" and the just released "Where You Going Now" which is the album's only full ballad. "Mr. Please" starts out as a ballad, almost like an Allman Brothers' tune in the way Blade mixes his voice with Shaw's backing. The song is about someone who is thinking about good times and relaxing but is in a rut and needs help. "Firefly" is described as a "sexual mosh pit," and once again contains some cool vocal mixing. "This Side of Hell" is a bad love song about not being able to let go. Blade has this killer Gene Simmonstype bass line in it.

With all this on Shaw's and

Blade's contributions, you must be wondering how it's still Ted Nugent's album. The answer is that his wango tango damn-or-bedamned style is everywhere on the album. The solo from "Don't Tread on Me" is a take back to his solo days in the '70's and "Stranglehold" and "Dirty Dog" rips, tears, and filets the ears with its choppy solos. The same is true in "Firefly."

Nugent's best work on the album is in "Double Coyote" and "Uprising," which he also sings. "Double Coyote" starts with easy picking and a laid-back blues style, and he just keep the rhythm going. Then he lets it rip a while during the second verse followed by a fast picking solo. This pace keeps up with the rest of the album.

"Uprising" is Nuge's headbanging to-the-wall anthem for the album. Heavy guitar and a fast drum beat starts it off. From the outset it is a Nugent song. The premise is common, "rise from below and be set free," but the vigilante topic fits its style. At the end Nuge pays homage to Jimi Hendrix by doing some of "Third Stone from the Sun."

The only part of Damn Yankees not yet mentioned is drummer Michael Cartellone. Even though Damn Yankees is his first major band, Cartellone acts like no amateur. Heavy touring schedules and the demand to play in top form has created a drummer who can stand up with these veterans like no other. Musicians like these demand the best and receive no less in the rhythm department. Although the style is not that much different from their first self-titled release, Don't Tread offers a heaping serving of good rock and roll. Most tracks aren't overbearingly heavy and there's only one ballad which has already been released. Even though there's nothing new here, it's definitely worth check-



A couple of years back, I was listening to the radio, and I heard this really cool tune called "Man in the Box" from a group called Alice in... in something, I didn't even know, not many did I suppose. I grew to find out that the band's name was Alice in Chains from a friend of mine. Within a day or so, I bought the debut release Facelift. I listened to it and I was in love. In fact, I love it so much that I still listen to it daily.

I had the privilege of seeing Alice preform a couple summers ago, where they opened the Clash of the Titans tour (Megadeath, Slayer, and Anthrax). Believe me, they were great, but the crowd still didn't know who these four guys from Seattle were.

Eventually they got a little more popular, considering the help from this overblown Seattle music scene (what a fiasco!) turning out bands such as Nirvana and Pearl Jam into household names. *Dirt*, the latest release from Alice in Chains, doesn't look likely to go top 40 (Thank God).

Last spring, I got word of a new release called Sap. It wasn't anything big, just 4 really cool acoustic tunes, which were released to give their loyal fans something new to listen to. One of these 4 tracks, "Brother", was played a few times on radio stations in the area. It was a very interesting change of pace, but was this the direction Alice was

going to take? I'm afraid not. A couple of months later "Would?" was released for the Singles soundtrack (which most everyone has heard by now) and that gave birth to another large handful of listeners. This would lay the grounds for the release of another great album.

Now for *Dirt*. When I first listened to it, I'll admit, I thought it sucked. But then I put *Facelift* in the closet an gave *Dirt* a fair chance, and fell in love all over again. It is a very different from *Facelift* in many aspects.

The singing style of Layne Stanley is of a greater variety. Jerry's riffs and lyrics are far stranger, darker, and intricate.

Michael Stan (on bass) and Sean Kinney (on drums) also come through with all the backing fills and provide a great deal of death to the music. The songs are just plain awesome and deal with beautifully unpleasant topics.

The overall themes of the album are also very dark and funeral-like. Death is a strong feeling felt throughout many of the songs. It seems to be starting its effectiveness, but it's difficult as a form of escaping.

The first song, "Them Bones," is very straight out and heavy. It deals with the fact death is certain and that their are many fears associated with it.

Next is "Dam that River," a grungy song about relationship in which both sides just don't give a s**t. "Rain When I Die," obviously another tune about dying with the really cool use of guitar wah-wah. "Sickman" is a really catchy song, incorporating

strange sound shifting through out it.

The fifth song, "Rooster," is incredible. It starts off rather slowly and works up to a very strong climax. "Junkhead" is a different song about being turned on to the oh so glamourous world of drugs.

The title track "Dirt" is next on the list, and when you listen to it you'll know why it's the album's centerpiece. The beginning has a unique guitar riff (consisting of what sounds like a distorted electric guitar with the use of the wah-wah effects pedal) and works its way into what appears to be the most powerful song on the whole album. "God Smack," another tune dealing with drug abuse, specifically heroin.

Vocally, Stanley sings with a hoarse-like voice to add to effects of the heroin topic in discussion. "Hate to Feel," is self-explanitory and very dark. It has a "Dazed and Confused" Led Zepplin-esque rhythm about it. "Anger Chain" is also quite ominous and full of loneliness. "Down in a Hole" could be considered a ballad musically, but don't let the pretty acoustic guitar fool you. It is a very serious song in which I'd rather not explain. Listen to it yourself, you'll see. I will tell you it is a very deep song and is one of the finest songs on the album.

Finally (yes, it is on the record) "Would?", which should help it sell a little bit better.

Please, go out and purchase this work of art if you already haven't. You'll like it. But buy it for yourself, not 'cause someone told you to. You'll find you'll like it a lot more, maybe even love it.

Red House Painters uphold proud tradition

Red House Painters Down Colorful Hill 4AD Records

The mention of London's 4AD label usually brings to mind lush, atmospheric ambience and blurred, dreamy vocals. For ten years, 4AD has put out bands like the Cocteau Twins, This Mortal Coil, and the Boo Radleys, bands that conjure up rainy afternoons in the countryside. The latest addition this ethereal pantheon is San Francisco's Red House Painters, whose debut effort Down Colorful Hill upholds 4AD's sonic tradition.

Described by a Rolling Stone critic as "Joy Division on Demerol", the Red House Painters sound more like a Galaxie 500 and Kitchens of Distinction hybrid. Guitarist Gorden Mack and bassist Jerry Vessel provide a psychedelic swirl of strings over drummer Anthony Koutsos' soft rhythms, while Mark Kozelek's voice floats

above the sound and sings about failed dreams of success ("24"), romantic disillusionment ("Medicine Bottle"), and a desire to escape to the mystique of the Orient ("Japanese to English", "Lord Kill the Pain").

The band's nucleus, Mark Kozelek and Anthony Koutsos, formed five years ago in Atlanta when Kozelek placed an ad in the newspaper for musicians to replace his old band, Gold Forbid. The two eventually moved to the West Coast, where more ads brought them Jerry Vessel and Gorden Mack.

Taking their name as a pseudoparody of a real life painting group (The International League of Revolutionary House Painters), the band spent two years playing at San Francisco clubs for handfuls of people. Their big break came when Mark Eitzel, a member of another San Francisco band--the American Music Clubwent to one of their shows, and was impressed enough to play a tape of their demos to British

Coupland can't speak for Generation X

Shampoo Planet by Douglas Coupland Pocket Books, 1992. \$20.00

A few months ago I wrote in the First-Person section of the *Providence Journal's* often corny "Our Page" featured in their Sunday Brunch section. My point was that our generation had to define ourselves, establish representatives, not spokespersons, in the respective artistic fields. If not, I fear that in a few decades we'll be left with the task of explaining to our grandchildren why Douglas Coupland is the only writer our age still in print.

Not to denigrate the guy, in fact he is extremely talented as a pure writer (analogous to describing a one-dimensional basketball player as a "pure shooter"). I am envious of several of his phrases, which often hit the mark directly, leaving the reader with a feeling of being emotionally plagiarized.

My major problem with Shampoo Planet, as with Coupland's first novel, Generation X, is his post-apocalyptic world view, to use an English major-type term. The imagery often recalls the ABC movie "The Day After," which depicted

the world after nuclear war. His world is so mechanized, as if the computers created the humans.

How can a writer with this attitude have the gall to speak for his age group, as if he's the last sensitive human on earth?

A *Time* magazine review of the book states that Coupland "very badly" wants to be the voice of his generation, but, to loosely paraphrase the article, in order to do that his true interests must lie not in the time period, but in the people.

Oh, yeah. The plot? Twenty year-old Tyler Johnson, our narrator, comes home from Europe to find that his mother, a not-quite ex-hippie, is yet again divorced. This does not deter him, however, from appeasing his boiling ambition, an affliction left over from the eighties. He loves all things modern; his bedroom is termed the "Modernarium" (It's these kind of cutesy phrases, along with "McJob," that Coupland is known for. Love him or hate him accordingly).

He dreams of employment at Bechtol in Seattle, a mega-corporation. Women enter and exit his life, complications follow. You get the idea. Tyler is excited about the future, and Coupland presents him positively. But the connection between those two facts is lost because it seems Coupland likes him in spite of his optimism, not because of it.

But, to me, Johnson's optimism is something Coupland himself seems to lack, astonishing since he has attained so much success (notice that "optimism" is not found in his table of elements in the inside cover of the book.)

But he does see optimism in Tyler, and as opposed to Coupland's viewpoint as I am, I admire him for recognizing this crucial and, I believe, vital difference between people my age (or at least me) and the slightly older "twentysomething" generation being paraded around like so many lost sheep on Barbara Walters specials and chronicled in Coupland's *Generation X*.

So what it boils down to is this: Coupland is not a true representative, as evident in his condescending attitude towards his characters in *Shampoo Planet*.

Enjoy his writing, as I did, just don't buy into it.

On the average, the second side is worth listening to much more than the first. It starts off with their best track "Blackstripe," then to "Alive" which ties for second best with "Fantastique."



Those Yanks who keep an eye and/or ear on the British music scene should know that guitar rock has made an impressive comeback in Merry Olde England over the past couple of years. No longer is it a must to sound like Depeche Mode. Bands like Blur, Curve, and Ride have captured the attention of rock fans on both sides of the Atlantic, sometimes being identified as "shoegazers" or exponents of the "Oxford sound." Hopefully, some of these acts will be able to outlive the trends and keep on truckin'.

Those who dig this kind of sound and want to scrutinize the live sound of some new British bands are encouraged to check out the Spin/Fontana tour, which will be making a stop at Boston's Paradise Club on Monday, October, 26. The tour is sponsored by Spin magazine, Bob Guccione Jr.'s monthly challenger to Rolling Stone, and Fontana, a British record label which has signed American artists like the Tom Tom Club and Was (Not Was).

And who else does Fontana have on its roster? Well, among their talent pool you can find House of Love, the veterans of this tour. They got considerable play on college radio stations a few years back with their catchy singly, "I Don't Know Why I Love You," and are currently doing the same with "You Don't Understand." Their trademark is a mixture of deadpan vocal harmonics and free-flowing, 60's-ish instrumental backup.

Also riding the S/F tour bus is Ocean Colour Scene, from the seaside hamlet of Solihul. The OCS pride themselves on a sound that resembles the Rolling Stones in their psychedelic phase (e.g. "Paint It Black", "2000 Light Years From Home"). They sound a little more refined, which could be a plus or a minus, depending on your point of view.

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
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



The facts on sexually transmitted diseases

There are five main diseases to consider: urinary tract infections, Gonorrhea, Chlamydia, Syphilis, and Human Immunodeficiency Virus (HIV) and related Acquired Immune Deficiency Syndrome (AIDS).

Each of these diseases is extremely serious. Urinary tract infections can lead to death if untreated, Gonorrhea ean lead to sterility in females, Syphilis could lead to paralysis, and of course HIV and AIDS for which there is no cure as of yet.

Most people do not know that there is a difference between HIV and AIDS. AIDS is the disease caused by the virus HIV. A person could have the HIVvirus and not show signs of AIDS for many years, that is why it is important to not only have protected sex, but also to be

tested done if you are in the risk

group.

You should be tested if: You have had unprotected sex since 1977, you have had sex with a male or female prostitute, you have shared drug needles, you are a hemophiliac, you have had a blood transfusion or received donated blood products or organs since 1977, or if you think that your sex partner is one of these people described. Most importantly remember that you do not have to feel sick to have the HIV virus, and testing is free and confidential at the Department of Health's Counseling and Testing sites. If you go to one of these places, your results are kept in a record with no name on it. You will be the only person who knows the results.
