Library repairs made in preparation for NCATE accreditation visit

Last Wednesday, the James P. Adams Library became the site of much activity.

Physical Plant workers arrived on the fourth floor to clean the Fortes Conference Room, shampoo the rugs, and disassemble the remains of an exterior deck on the roof, which was clearly visible through the large windows in the corridor that leads to that conference room. Also, a painter had arrived to cut the wallpaper that had peeled off the wall above the Circulation Desk, and had been hanging there for several months. Then he proceeded to paint the area with a paint mixed to match the color of the wallpaper. All of this work was finished by Friday, in preparation of the National Council for Accreditation of Teacher Education (NCATE) visit which began on Saturday, November 6, and runs until the 9th

The NCATE team will evaluate the teacher education program on campus and their accreditation means that the school has met their professional standards.

In an inter-office memorandum, dated October 29, 1993, Kathryn M. Sasso, wrote to Dr. James Cornelison, Assistant Vice President for Administration and Richard Brinegar, Director of Physical Plant explaining the upcoming accreditation visit and the need to clean the area in the library for this visit.

Sasso, the Director of Conferences and Special Events, wrote that "the Fortes Room at Adams Library has been secured as 'central headquarters' for all of

Thieves hit parking lot behind dorms twice this semester

Executive Editor Parking Lot L, the large lot located behind the residence halls, has been the target of thieves during September and October.

One car was stolen in each month and two larcenies from cars were reported in October, all from that lot.

Despite these numbers, Director of Security and Safety, Richard Comerford said "we're not having a rash," and quickly added "but one is too many."

"There has been no increase in crime, in October, in the residence hall areas," Comerford said.

He noted that this marked the

only thefts from that lot since last May. He said that approximately six cars had been stolen from the opposite end of campus, in Lots A, B, C and D during the first months of the semester. Comerford said that after the Providence Police Department apprehended one person attempting to break into a car in one of those lots, the thefts stopped.

"Une Semaine Française" to be held on campus

Throughout this whole week on campus will be celebrating "Une Semaine Française" (a French week)

Students will have the chance to enjoy French films, the latest updates on "nouvelles Françaises" (French news), and a visit from the recently appointed Consul General of France in Boston.

Under the joint sponsorship of Dr. Richard R. Weiner, Dean of Faculty of Arts and Sciences, and Dr. Dix S. Coons, Chairman of the Department of Modern Languages, the French week will begin at 9:00 a.m. at the language lab of the Department of Modern Languages with a live broadcast of news directly from France.

Immediately following, the French film festival will begin in Craig-Lee 102, featuring Yves Robert's 1991 motion picture La Gloire de mon père (My Father's Glory) which will run from 10 a.m.-12 p.m. and then again from 12-2 p.m.

The rest of the films to be shown will include Le Chateau de ma mère (My Mother's Castle), the original French version of Three Men and a Baby, and Le Retour de Martin Guerre (The Return of Martin Guerre), a medieval mystery about false identity. All of the films will be shown on Tuesday, Wednesday, and Friday respectively and at the same times.

According to the main organizer of the week-long celebration, Dr.

Harambee strives for unity for African–American students

Harambee, the largest minority organization on campus, is currently enjoying an increase in membership of about 20 students.

According to the RIC Institution of Research and Planning, the number of African-American students enrolled as undergraduates has increased by 21 percent this semester. This is probably part of the reason for the increase of the total number of students who participate in Harambee.

Enrollment this semester was increased from about 40 to 60 students, of which about 30 take part in the weekly meetings. This type of student participation is what has made Harambee one of the strongest student organizations on campus.

Harambee is a Swahili word meaning "unity," and this is exactly the way that Michelle Nuey, 21, sophomore and vice president of the organization, feels Harambee offers students. "It provides support and unity for the minority community and gives us a sense of security," said Nuey.

One of the secretaries of Harambee, Tina Woods, an 18 year-old sophomore, also feels that Harambee serves the black students on campus with an identity and a statement of action and responsibility. "It lets people know that we're here," she said.

Monica Paige, a junior and treasurer of the organization, said that to help Harambee meet the goal of bringing together the community, the organization holds several social and cultural events throughout the year and also offers academic support to students.

Events that Harambee has held in the past includes plays and movies concerning the black community, the group also hosts guest speakers and helps organize Black History Month events.

Harambee is currently planning the celebration of Kwanza for the first week of December. Kwanza is a Swahili word meaning "first" and is a symbol of the first fruits of the harvest. Kwanza is a time when one enjoys the fruits of labor and also commits to collective achievement of a better life for the family and community.

The celebration of Kwanza, according to Dr. Richard Lobban Jr., Prof. of Anthropology and Geography, was created by an African-American living in the U.S. in 1966, consists of the seven principles of harvest in Africa. These seven principles that apply to the seven days of Kwanza are drawn from the basic value system of the African people. They are: Umoja (unity), Kujichagulia (self-determination), Ujima (collective work and responsibility), Ujamaa (cooperative economics), Nia (purpose), Kuumba (creativity), and Imani (faith). Each day one of the seven principles is observed.

Harambee will be celebrating Kwanza by holding a dinner and a ceremony.

Another goal of Harambee is to involve its members in campus life by joining organizations such as Student Government, which will allow them to have more input on the decisions that are being made that concern all students.

Although the members of Harambee are mostly of African-American descent, and the organization's focus is mostly on issues that may interest the black community, they also welcome members of other ethnic backgrounds, or whoever else is interested in their objectives.

In addition to all of the mentioned commemorations, the French flag will be flown in front of the administration building in Roberts Hall during the entire week



continued from front page the work that will be done while the team is on campus."

"We will need to do some specific things to get the room ready, and I have some related concerns as well." Her concerns were best expressed when she mentioned debris from the old deck that littered the roof. She wrote, "can we get it out of there before the team arrives? To be honest, it looks like hell, (and I never use that language!)"

She also made a list of preparations which included, "the Room should be cleaned (i.e. there are cobwebs in the area behind the folding wall), and if at all possible, please vacuum and shampoo the rug." She enclosed a diagram which shows how the room should be set up for the visit.

The peeling wallpaper on the third floor above the Circulation Desk had been a problem for months. The Maintenance Request Form (work order) was dated August 3, 1993. It read, "Please re-hang, repair, or paint the wallpapered area above the Circulation Desk of Adams Library, Old Side Level 3. Due to the humidity level of the library,

the wallpaper is falling down." Some members of the library staff were pleased to have the repair done, but many questioned the timing of the work.

David Maine of the Circulation Department filed the work order. When asked about the situation, Maine said, "[the painters] have come over and looked at that two or three times since the summer. July or August, there was a work order filed on that, but I guess there were other priorities." Maine pointed out, "they don't rewallpaper. Each time the wallpaper has fallen down there, this is like the third or fourth time, they just razor it off, cut it, and then they repaint the wall. You can see where they've done that before."

Maine also expressed frustration in getting lights replaced. "I put a work order in on changing the light bulbs in the library, knowing that it takes a month, month and a half, to get things done. My thought was if I put it in in July, then it will be done by the beginning of school. We, it hadn't been done." That work order was dated June 17. James Bucci, Assistant Director of the Physical Plant sent a memo to the library which read in part "Your request has been assigned

to the Electrical Shop."

"Around the first week of school," Maine continued, "I happened to notice one of the electricians. I said, 'You guys get my work order?' and he said 'Yeah.' I said, 'What gives?' He said 'Well we've been short staffed and the supervisor said we have to re-lamp all the classrooms.' I said 'What about the library? We get hundreds of people in here every day."


Maine said that several aisles in the library are in darkness. He said the electrician told him that they would try to get to it in two to three weeks, probably into October.

"Now it's November," Maine said. "I can't replace them myself. I could have a box here and replace them myself, but that would be violating their work contract. God forbid. They'd file a grievance against me."

The light bulbs in the library still need to be replaced.

When asked about the work done this week due to the accreditation visit, Maine responded, "It's amazing that things can be done so quickly when something important is about to happen on campus, but at other times it just doesn't happen."





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

Providence Bruins let down home crowd

Skating in front of 9,147 spectators, 3 AHL scouts and Boston Bruins General Manager Bob Milbury, the Providence Bruins picked the wrong night to drop a home game. Facing the Rochester Americans, the junior B's started off strong but let a 1-0 first period lead slip away quickly. Darren "Bodycheck" Banks met fan expectations and found himself in a familiar place...the penalty box. The American's Finnish netminder Markus Ketterer registered his first North American victory as Rochester cruised to a 4-2 victory.

Providence came out, guns drawn, with left wing Mark Bavis scoring at 2:37 in the first period. Their lead would be short-lived. Rochester came back when defenseman Vince Guidotti hit a lazy slapshot through the legs of inattentive B's net minder David Littman. Unfortunately for Littman, it would be the first of two slapshots that would slither between his legs.

The Americans kept on the assault scoring two more times in the first when center Doug McDonald scored at 16:46, and later, when defenseman David Cooper scored on a power play at 19:59, bringing the score to 3-1. Providence came within one, however, when B's left wing Fred Knipscheer hit a slow slapshot through the legs of an embarrassed Ketterer.

Midway through the second, the junior B's thought they had tied the score on a wild series of plays that left Ketterer kissing the ice. The goal was nullified as the net had come out of its lorings.

Council for Rhode Island College, waiting for questions and suggestions

The Council for Rhode Island College, the chief legislative and regulatory agency of the faculty which includes two student representatives, has authority to act on all matters of policy not covered by collective bargaining agreements.

Finance member responds to RIC-TV editorial

Dear Editor:

As a member of the finance commission I was appalled by the erroneous information reported regarding RIC TV in the October 25 editorial.

Perhaps I should begin by enlightening all on the duties of the Finance Commission. The Finance Commission consists of 8 student members who allocate student activity fee funds to student run organizations. When doing this we always have the students [sic] best interest in mind.

When RIC TV came in and requested \$7000.00 in funding we had to look at their past performance. It was for those reasons that we denied the request.

Let me begin with the funds that Finance gave RIC TV for the 92-93 academic year. The Finance commission allocated \$9026.00 to RIC TV, and for some unknown reason they only used \$369.07 last year.

Furthermore, Finance gave RIC TV \$5000. for capital improvements and they only used \$328.82

On October 21, 1993 Finance

gave RIC TV \$2536.00 to attend a conference. RIC TV never attended this conference. RIC TV showed its

irresponsibility once again when they left equipment in their office all summer. Their response to this was that "no one knew they had to remove this equipment during summer vacation". We find this hard to believe since the Campus Center sent three notices, one to the president, one to the treasurer and one to the advisor.

What does all this mean? In the past RIC TV has demonstrated nothing but irresponsibility. They tied up student funds which denied other organizations these funds. They left equipment in an office all summer and didn't bother to come and get it until mid-September. As you can see the Finance Commission was rational in denying their \$7000.00 request. We are delighted that RIC TV

has produced programming for the Statewide Interconnect. If they did this with \$369.07 last year why can't they do this with the \$2500. allocated to them this year?

SCG president defends Finance Committee decision on RIC-TV

Editor,

I would like to respond to the editorial in the October 25th issue entitled, "Student Government shortsighted in not funding RIC TV"

Having been at the meeting in 1991 when RIC TV first came to Student Parliament to be recognized as an organization, I have had the opportunity to witness the progress of this organization over the past few years. Let me begin by giving a little background information.

When RIC TV was first established, their purpose was to offer TV programming that would benefit the campus, targeting the residence halls as their main audience, The article stated that it has been the "mentality" of SCG to assume that RIC TV can get by on a shoestring budget and that we expect them to flourish without Student Parliament was told that there would be minimal expenses because they would be using equipment that already existed and the expenses they would be dealing with were those associated with hook-ups in the residence halls. Student Parliament recognized them and The Finance Commission funded them based on the above information and gave them an Anticipate Revenue (money that they had to bring in). Our expectation of them was no different than any other organization. RIC TV was going to rent out some of their camcorders as a way to make their revenue.

As of last year, the organization had not even used 15% of their Capital Improvement line item and had not made any money for Anticipated Revenue. Also, their programming has changed to programming for the Statewide Interconnect channel. I commend them on their accomplishments, however, if they attended the annual budget hearings held in the spring, they would have had the chance to explain how they see their organization evolving.

I am not trying to condemn RIC TV, I am trying to explain the different reasons that the Finance Commission had in deciding not to give them the extra money they asked for. The most important reason that they did not get the allocation is simply that we don not have the money to give out. Last year, money was distributed liberally and that contributed to the financial predicament the Student Parliament is in right now. Unfortunately, we are constantly cutting or denying requests for funds. SP would like to be able to fund every organization entire request but it is just not possible this year. Our records are available for any student who has a question about our financial situation.

Lastly, I would like to address the statement "the Finance Commission has quickly forgotten that they funded a group... in a very similar situation". The primary issue with Exodus was that students demanded that yearbook be produced for them, but in the past the staff had not done so well. There was however, a new group of students who were interested in putting their hard work in to produce one. On the other side, there was the Anchor who wanted to take over the job of publishing the yearbook (Do I detect a bit of sour grapes?). It was decided that the money being saved would not be substantial enough to rule our decision, so it came

down to: Who should produce the yearbook-The Anchor of Exodus?. [sic] Student Parliament decided that Exodus, considering they were interested, should do it. The reason the yearbook has come out so late is due to the fact in [sic] took us until late into fall semester to make the decision. They have met all of their deadlines and the book is now out. Let me also add that we have given them a trial period to see what they are producing.

I hope that I have cleared up the misinformation from the first article. Anyone who has any questions can feel free to come to the SU 200 where our door is always open to discuss your concerns



The Breeders produce good music

The Breeders Last Splash 4 AD/Electra

The Breeder's second album, oddly titled Last Splash, is topping the alternative music charts and getting quite a bit of feedback from radio listeners.

Really liking their hit song "Cannon Ball," I was curious to see what the rest of the album had to offer. Basically, the band sounds like a '60s girl group gone bad, so it sounds quite good. In other words, there is a playful quality to them which works well in contrast to their driving, loud rockin', full sound.

The album opens with "New Year," a short piece that is under two minutes long. It starts off slowly, with a single guitar and vocal and then builds to a frenzy in which all instruments jam in unison. It nicely slides into the second tune, the alternative radio hit, "Canonball." In fact, the first three songs work well as one piece of music (the third song is "Invisible Man"). Part of the success of "Cannonball" lies in

the bass line. A single bass accompanied by a "bluesy" slide guitar which, in turn, are accompanied by the drum and another guitar as the song builds into a wonderful, powerfulsounding jam session. Even though it sounds like the band is jamming in wild abandon, everything is carefully orchestrated. This is not an easy effect to accomplish, and it works very well here. Also, the technique of stopping in the middle of the song (a pause after the line "The bong in this Reggae song") and coming back with a punch is another factor in this tune's musical success. However, I'm very curious about the term "Reggae song" in this piece. Irony, I guess. The fourth piece shifts the listener down a couple of gears, so to speak. We are virtually confronted by Kim Deal's voice as she sings "No bye, no aloha." The song, titled "No Aloha," opens with the vocal, a slide-guitar, which creates a creepy feeling, and a rhythm guitar which strums a few chords in between the vocal parts. It kicks in midway through to create another good, rocking piece. The could not have worked at all. The song also offers a very bizarre line which reads, "[I] saw it on the wall/ another mood means mental freeze.'

The album also offers four instrumentals: "Roi," "Flipside," "S.O.S." and "Roi (reprise)." "Roi" and the reprise (which is used to close the album) has one line in it. Kim Deal sings "Raw: where the shot leaves me gagging for the arrow," amidst a sea of driving guitars and feedback. This reminds me of Pink Floyd's "One of These Days," in which a voice says "One of these days I'm gonna cut you into little pieces!" Both lyrics are disturbing. "Flipside" is a fun jam that starts with a neo-sixties keyboard melody (almost Fisher-Price in style), yet still packs a wallop. It is a great tune to wake up to.

Only two songs left a bad taste in my mouth ... or my ears, I should say. "Drivin' On" is a country song that really doesn't fit on this album, and "Mad Lucas" is very slow, making the listener dive for the fast-forward button. "Mad Lucas" opens like "No Aloha" but never picks up. If they played this song





Two years later, in 1990, Tony Toni Toné released their million plus selling follow-up disc, The Revival. It kicks off with "The Blues" and is further highlighted by "Let's Have A Good Time" and "It Never Rains In Southern California."

Obedient, but more than willing to push their creativity to its limits, the three members of Tony Toni Toné, all in their mid-20s, have

paid attention and learned their musical lessons well. From the opening bars of "If I Had No Loot" (Sons of Soul's hook-laden lead single) to the closing orchestral string arrangement of "Anniversary (Suite)," Sons of Soul takes listeners on an historical tour-deforce of past R&B musical influences. What makes The Tonys so uniquely special, however, is not their ability to deftly draw from history; it is the way they have skillfully interwoven the R&B past into the hip-hop present, creating a distinct sound that clearly hears the future.
