## 80 courses eliminated from fall schedule

Due to projected budget constraints for next year, a selected number of fall sections have been closed. We apologize for the inconvenience. If you are unable to complete your schedule, please consult your adviser.

As of last week, this was the recording on Rhode Island College's telephone registration system.

Due to a \$1.1 million budget shortage for the 1994-95 school year, the RIC administration is working on a series of efforts which include cutting 80 courses from the fall curriculum, in order to make up for the lack of funds that have been allocated to the college. According to Dr. Gary Penfield,

Vice President of Student Affairs, all of the courses that have been eliminated were to be taught by part-time faculty and a large majority of them fall under the general education curriculum.

Dr. Richard R. Weiner, Dean of Faculty of Arts and Sciences, said that he has done all he can to deal with the elimination of courses in what he considers to be the most responsible manner.

"I am trying to meet the deficit without closing down programs," said Weiner.

"What we have done," he said

"is asked the departments to consider which courses were less necessary" and then made decisions based on that.

Dr. David E. Nelson, School of Education and Human Development was unavailable for comment, so it is unclear whether that school pursued the same means to deal with their cuts.

Although no final decision has been made on the matter, there is a possibility that students entering after 1992 will only be asked to select 11 out of the 13 general education courses that have been required.

Another proposed means of dealing with the budget is a \$20

dollar increase to the Student Activities Fee which would go up from \$60 to \$80 a year and a \$15 dollar increase to the Performing Arts Fee which would be brought up from \$25 to \$40 a year.

These two resolutions are expected to be presented to the RIC student body in form of referendum on April 19 and 20, in the Student Union.

According to Penfield, only 10 percent of the college community needs to take part in the voting for the results to be considered legitimate, and if the increases are not approved, there will be serious cuts made to student organizations.

Also under consideration is a

new \$50 a year library fee and a \$50 a year computer fee.

President John Nazarian is expected to address the college on April 15 at 1 p.m. in Clarke Science 125, for more complete information on the present cuts and fee increases.

## RIC student to tell Congress of RI Hospital's ethics violations

Frank Palin, a RIC nursing student, will be going to Washington to testify before Congress later this month as a key witness of informed consent violations made at Rhode Island Hospital.

Palin, 43, of Coventry says that while on duty as a medical technician at R.I. Hospital, in November, he became aware that the hospital was violating an informed consent rule when it began a study on the amounts of glycemia found in the bodies of intoxicated patients.

Palin, a senior expecting to graduate in May, says that the study required that he withdraw blood from the patient, who he says, was too intoxicated too provide any type of legitimate consent due to the amounts of alcohol that the patient had in their system.

According to Palin's story, which has received a considerable amount of coverage in the local

media, the hospital began the study on November 1 and continued until November 12.

Palin says he immediately confronted the physicians, who in turn responded that the blood was being drawn as a method of "life saving care." Palin says that the doctors could not explain, however, why the withdrawing of the blood was life saving to the patient.


The organizers of the event, the Campus Center and RIC Programming, contend that not many

continued from front page He then immediately contacted several sources including the ACLU, the FDA and press outlets. He also wrote letters to Washington and immediately began to get feedback.

Shortly after, on November 7, Palin received a letter of suspension from the hospital which stated that he was not "providing an environment in which all employees can work and be productive without undue disruption from their mission."

Palin says that after that particular incident, there have been a couple of other studies pursued by the hospital which he has refused to take part in.

"It's a patriarchal system of 'physicians know best,'" said Palin.

Asked why he thought other medical technicians had not come forth and also refused to take part, he said, "a lot of people don't have the education on ethics that's provided here at RIC; we're taught to be patient advocates."

"They're not telling the patient or parents that they could go into respiratory arrest and die," said Palin.

Palin is expected to testify before a small business subcommittee on regulation at the end of April or first week of May. According to Palin, if R.I. Hospital is found to have a history of violations he's described, they are expected to lose federal funding for research.

## Students petition Pathways Board demanding a campus social worker

Last week, a group of RIC students signed a petition which they will present to the Pathways to Independence Advisory Board at their meeting on Tuesday.

The petition demands that a social worker be assigned to the campus in order to provide guidance for the 185 Pathways participants who are presently enrolled at the college. The action was generated from a discussion that was held earlier that afternoon (which was co-sponsored by RIC's Master of Social Work program and the statewide advocacy group Parents for Progress) in which approximately fifteen participants who discussed the program's changing policies.

The Pathways to Independence is a program run out of the RI Department of Human Services which helps Aid to Families with Children recipients pursue a college education.

Among the grievances that were addressed were the rigidity of the rules that require participants to spend twenty documented hours on campus per week. Those present also complained about the fact that they were not receiving their transportation checks on time, and that their day care providers were also not being paid on time.

One woman stated that she was displeased with the fact that she was recently assigned her third social worker in the three and one half years that she has spent in school.

"It's crazy because once you finally get to prove to one of these people that you're really trying hard to improve yourself, they assign you someone else," she stated. "You have to go through the whole process all over again-and you're afraid to complain because that person has the power to make or break you."

One of the greatest concerns of the group was the fact that the DHS has been continually trying to restrict participants to two yearstudy programs instead of four.

"The average hourly wage for persons leaving the Pathways program is \$6.25," said Marybeth Dwyer, organizer of Parents for Progress. "That's \$3 less than what one needs to earn per hour in order to be above the poverty level." She further stated that if people are not provided with the opportunity to earn a four year degree, they will not have the skills background necessary to compete in tomorrow's work force, and that in some ways, they will be financially worse off then they were before they entered the program.

One participant criticized Robert Fallon, the Director of the R.I. Department of Human Services, for his continual recommendation of cuts to public assistance programs

RI Governor Bruce Sundlun's welfare reform proposals were also harshly criticized at the meeting, and Dwyer described three bills that Parents for Progress have introduced this year which counteract some of the Governor's proposals.

As part of their legislative efforts, Parents for Progress in conjunction with the Campaign to Eliminate Childhood Poverty have been lobbying against Sundlun's sanction enforcement bill which would cut benefits for a three month period from those recipients who turn down a full-time job. (According to Dwyer, a "fulltime job" is defined as one that pays minimum wage and offers 30 or more hours of employment per week.)

They are also challenging the CWEP (Community Work Experience Program) that has been proposed. This measure would obligate AFDC recipients to work a designated number of hours for free as state employees. Some referred to this proposal as "slavefare".

Some of the other proposals which the group opposes include a measure that would eliminate benefits for a child born while the family is on AFDC, as well as an act that would deny AFDC to a minor parent and child unless they were living with the mother's parent(s) or legal guardian(s).

Dwyer stated that she feels confident about having students address the Advisory Board. Dwyer is also helping to organize another campus discussion for RIC students who are presently participating in the Pathways program. 





## URI/CCE to be moved to Shepard Building

Last Thursday, the Board of Governors for Higher Education approved the relocation of the University of Rhode Island's College of Continuing Education to the Shepard Building on Westminster Street in Downtown Providence. The decision was unanimous.

URI's Providence campus is presently located across from the State House in the area that has been zoned for the construction of the Mall of New England. According to the conditions of the board's approval, an appointed subcommittee will determine whether a safety plan had been established between the developers of the proposed mall and R.I.'s Port Authority (which owns the Shepard Building) in a hearing that will be scheduled within the next 30 days. The board's decision also required that the Port Authority must include the development of student and faculty parking as part of their renovation efforts.

One of the reasons that the Shepard building's location was chosen over the that of the Foundry Corp. (on Promenade Street) was the fact that it would place the campus in the heart of the new college district which Johnson & Wales is developing in the heart of downtown Providence, as well as in the middle of a section that the city is trying to rebuild.

#### Will URI's fraternities, sororities, be shut down?

An eight member committee appointed by University of Rhode Island's faculty Senate three years ago to study the social climate of sororities and fraternities on the campus reported the findings of their research at a meeting held last week. The report, which was endorsed by five members of the committee, concluded that URI's Greek atmosphere was a breeding ground for racism and sexism and that they were "founded on corrupt morals and codes." It also suggested that the existence of such societies has encouraged criminal activity on the Kingston campus, citing the fact that within the past three years, three fraternities were banned for either drug or alcoholrelated incidents. Using these precedents, the committee has recommended that URI's fifteen frats and eight sororities be phased out over the next four years. The faculty Senate is scheduled to debate this issue next Thursday.

In an open letter to URI's fraternities and sororities written last week, President Robert L. Carothers warned students that the new report meant that they now "would be placed under a microscope." He also wrote, "Now is the time to *demonstrate* that you can transform the Greek culture into one that embraces diversity and

rejects all brands of abusive behavior. . . the future of the Greek system at URI is in your hands."

There are presently 9,735 students attending classes at URI's Kingston campus. Out of the 4,700 resident students, it is estimated that about 1,000 live in fraternity and sorority houses.

## Layoffs hit a record high

According to a recent survey conducted by Challenger, Gray & Christmas Inc., a Chicago-based consulting firm, the number of layoffs resulting from corporate downsizing hit a record pace for the first two months of 1994. The study revealed that there were 143,564 layoffs during January and February.

The biggest cuts were made in the communications industry, in which there were a total of 59,314 layoffs, in comparison to 50,021 total cutbacks for all of 1993. In the week that followed the survey, an additional 9,900 job cuts were made when Fleet Financial Group and Raytheon announced major layoffs. However, economists say that this is only the beginning. Out of the employers that responded to the survey, one in five said that they planned to announce job cutbacks by June of this year, estimating that almost 109,000 jobs will be eliminated within the next few months

that these events will be held in the same location. They're not; they're just at the same time.)


Vice President for Administration and Finance, Dr. James Cornelison, said that he had originally recommended the area between Craig-Lee and the Clarke Science building as an alternative to the quad or the loop. It was decided by the event's organizers that that area was not a centralized campus location, and it would be difficult to transport the materials needed for setting up to that site because it was not located close enough to vehicle access. They also stated that they needed to be near an electrical power source in able to avoid the excessive utilization of extension cords.

Many students were upset when

the Student Union loop was closed earlier this year for a meeting of the state legislature on campus. This occured before classess were in session for the spring, yet many students questioned felt the need to question it.

What is the solution? To move the event to another area of the campus. The area in front ot Gaige Hall is far enough away from the Donovan work not to interfere and would actually be closer to the events being held outside the CoffeeGround. There are other places on campus where this event can be held. A parking lot should not even be considered.

## Multicultural programs a waste of time?

(CPS) Diversity training and multicultural programs, created in the early 1980s on American campuses to ease student relations, may be causing more harm than good, according to critics who say walls are not torn down by separating people into groups, but by unifying them.

The buzzword "diversity" cropped up when educators, aware of new demographic realities on America's campuses, became concerned that students were not prepared for the vast differences in race, language, religion, national origin, sexual orientation or gender they would face on a college campus, or, later in their lives in workplaces.

Despite continuing racial tensions on college campuses, some fear that these programs may have gone too far and have created further difficulties by focusing on differences between students rather than their commonality.

"My question is, how do you teach 'diversity?' It's such a nebulous term. The important thing for colleges to teach is intellectual diversity," said Oron Strauss, editor of the conservative Dartmouth Review newspaper in Hanover, Conn. "This stems from all sorts of differences - ideological differences - because this is what truly makes college exciting.

Strauss charges that today's colleges and universities measure multiculturalism in terms of numbers of minorities enrolled in their schools. The administrations, he said, are preoccupied with percentages and are neglecting to unify students. "How many of this kind of person can we get? How many of that kind? This is the wrong way of going about it," he said.

The term "diversity" bothers Strauss even more, he says, because educators are not being direct about what their goals are. "It seems to me the terms are skewed. If they want to teach acceptance of other races, don't put it under the guise of diversity, or as an intellectual pursuit. There are a lot more intellectually worthwhile things a person could be studying."

Dartmouth college offers a number of multicultural courses and a program known as Affinity Housing that offers minorities the opportunity to live in dorms with other minorities. While all Dartmouth students take part in a common convocation and commencement service, minorities are invited to participate separate ceremonies. To Strauss, such developments mean that too many students are finding comfort in closed, ethnocentric groups.

"While it is acceptable that students will have different interests and extracurricular activities, the administration should not make it so easy. They are abdicating their responsibility for community by promoting diversity," he said. "It's very important to focus on traditions and school spirit, our similarities, rather than concentrate on our differences. I just don't feel separation is the solution."

A former trustee for a Long Island, N.Y. community college agrees.

Robert M. Unger, an attorney who is publisher for The New York Guardian, which he terms the "most politically incorrect newspaper in America," says he believes that teaching multiculturalism on college campuses will not eliminate racial prejudice, but exacerbate the prob-

"Racial bigotry is a moral problem. The schools can't teach morality," he said. "Multiculturalism teaches that everyone be treated the same and equally, when everyone should be treated justly and fairly. For example, I would not treat you the same way I would treat a rapist," he said.

Unger decries what he calls a "victim mentality" which he says is pervasive in America's individual citizens, as well as racial groups.

Teaching multiculturalism, insists Unger, abdicates the personal responsibility necessary for students to learn to respect others.

Another conservative says that teaching multiculturalism on today's campuses is doing nothing but forcing people back into tribal camps.

"Young people should know their ethnic backgrounds, but to focus on them is not helpful. For example, I'm Scottish, but for me to focus on Scotland, I just think it's foolish and unproductive," said Robert Grant of the American Freedom Coalition, a conservative activism group in Washington, D.C.

The multicultural movement has gotten out of hand. It's trying to force us together, but it is divisive and is driving us into tribal camps," Grant said. The elite, educated class is forcing the multiculturalism trend into the masses, he observed. "They focus on differences rather than unique nature," he said.

Grant said he thinks that many liberal, affluent people in this country feel guilty about their lifestyles and promote multiculturalism under a cloud of personal shame.

"It's the affluent people who were raised by immigrants years ago. They are not the present working class. They have influence. They have converted to this radical thinking of 'saving America,'

or 'preserving roots.'"

"The problems in this country are character problems," said Grant, who has a degree in Theology. "Children are taught to hate. They reflect the family. They may be curious about other races, the way young boys and girls are curious about each other. But they have to be taught to hate."

Multicultural educators, however, say that many of the programs have excellent results in smoothing race relations, and like it or not, the programs are thriving on American campuses. Contrary to assertions by critics, supporters say the programs educate students about each other's lifestyles and cultural differences so that they will better understand each other.

"Diversity training teaches students and educators how to look at what others contribute, not at what is different about them," said Kit Taylor, a psychology professor and diversity specialist at the University of Arizona in Tucson, where for the first time in the school's history. administrators will undergo diversity training sessions this year.

What were once trendy buzzwords have materialized into workshops, seminars and courses that hope to prepare faculty and students for the demographic realities of the 1990's. Their success will remain to be seen.

## **Bales and Blue: The puck stops here**

atmosphere in the The Providence Bruins locker room hasn't been great lately since they've been in a slump. The P-Bruins have two top quality goaltenders in their system, John Blue and Mike Bales.

Blue was the draft choice of the Winnipeg Jets in 1986. He left the minor leagues to play for the 1988 United States Olympic team along with New York Ranger's goalie Mike Richter and the New Jersey Devil's goalie, and Rhode Island native, Chris Terreri. Blue says, "playing with the Olympic team was one of my greatest experiences in hockey ... playing for my country was a great thrill.'

Bales was the draft choice of the Boston Bruins and opted not to play his senior year in college at Ohio State University. During the season last year when

the Boston Bruins released Reggie Lemelin both Bales and Blue were promoted to the parent club. Bales saw limited action but did play against New Jersey in one game. Meanwhile, Blue caught fire and remained with the club for the rest of the season.

Bales was returned to Providence where he led the team to first place in the Northern Division in their inaugural season. The Boston Bruins front office still contend that Bales is their goalie for the future. It took Blue five minor league seasons before he played in his first NHL game on January 7, 1993. Blue's greatest role model in his life is his father, Blue says, "He taught me my hard worth ethic and the values that I have." Blue's devote beliefs in the church is what gives him the strength to persevere. "There are many lost people out there... a lot of people... I just put my faith in Him ... that's where I find my peace," adds Blue.

eeing has become increasingly bad, culminating in some horrible calls which have, in some cases, ended up deciding games.

This phenomenon seems to stem from two problems: first the


referee's unwillingness to change

calls that are obviously bad, and making calls favoring a player or team that is 'good' or 'known.' In professional basketball, it's called a "veteran call," where a player who has been around gets a call over a younger player.

These types of calls have been happening for as long as there have been referees after all, they are human. But lately they seem to be a lot more common and at times when the game is on the line. For instance, when Missouri won their conference, not taking anything away from Missouri's players or coaches, they shouldn't have. They were playing a lesser known school, and in the last few minutes received a bogus call that led to their victory.

The structure of the game takes into account understandable mistakes. Most fans who enjoy basketball will get upset with calls against 'their' team, however they will be more accepting if the referee is consistent. In other words, if he calls charging when it is an obvious block against one team, he should also call it the same way against the other team. The problem usually ends up going against the visiting team, or (in the case of the tournament) against the the team with fewer fans in the arena. The consequence of this is suffered by the fans and players, where the expectation is now that you almost never win an away game.

It seems that the referees need to be more receptive to the game and the players rather than the arena and the media. They also have to be willing to admit when they make a mistake, and reverse the call, whether the people like it or not. In the end, it seems that everyone will benefit, with the fans not having such a hatred for the referee and the players and coaches will be the ones who decide the game, the way it should be.



Major League 2 hits a grand slam at the box office



"I Call It Love," with its droning


