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

Computer lab usage at UF now costs \$20

(U-WIRE) Before sophomore Sarah West could print her paper for class at UF's computer lab, she had to pay a\$20 fee.

West, along with other UF undergraduate students, have been required to purchase elective access accounts before using the computers in UF's labs. "The fee is ridiculous," West said. "I can't believe the university is not allowing us to use the computers for free.'

The elective access accounts, implemented Oct. 1, charges all undergraduate students \$20 a

computers for their own use.

This fee includes three services- e-mail, web service and computer use. Regardless of whether students only want to use one of the services, they still would have to pay for all three.

'If a student wanted to write a paper but didn't care about email, that service would still be elective access," said Mark Hale, director of the Center for Instructional Research and Computing Activities.

The only students that would be exempt from the fee, other than graduate students, would be students whose instructor has specifically required them to use computers and has applied for semester to use the university classroom computer accounts.
