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Cap and Gown Ceremony

President David E. Sweet saluted the 1983 Graduating Class at the Cap and Gown Convocation and Departmental Awards, last Tuesday, at 12:30 in Roberts Auditorium.

Sweet opened the ceremony by capping Linda Moran (president), Mary K. Miller (vice-president), Katherine M. Salome (treasurer), Donna A. M. Moise (secretary), and Joan Greenwell (social committee chairperson), the senior class officers. He then asked the senior audience to turn and cap each other.

"Go for whatever it is that you want," Veronica Lee Perkins said as she addressed the graduating class. She also said that "only the strong will survive. The weak will fall."

Class President Linda Moran thanked John Taylor, their class advisor and other "special people."

Moran presented President Sweet with a "letter of intent" of

their class gift. The class of 1983 is giving a student information bulletin board for the mall. She said the gift is part of their class goal, "to increase student awareness."

Dr. Gary Penfield, Vice President for Student Affairs, also congratulated the senior class. He announced the 30 seniors elected to "Who's Who in American Universities and Colleges."

Penfield also said the ceremony is the beginning of their separation from the college. He said to "push away from the past and look to the future . . . it will be exciting, challenging."

Dr. Willard Enteman, Provost and Vice President for Academic Affairs, announced the Special Departmental Awards. He said he admired their (the recipient's) outstanding scholarship. Enteman announced each recipient as the Department chairpersons presented the awards.

Immediately after the ceremony, President Sweet and his wife gave a reception on the Southeast Lawn of Robert Auditorium.

Administration plans "business as usual" in light of Union action

The Administration said Thursday RIC will remain open for classes and business if Council 94 of the American Federation of State, County and Municipal Employees on campus walk off in a job action.

John Foley, executive director of College Advancement and Support, said President Sweet and the Administration met Thursday afternoon to decide what should be done if the union workers chose to picket Monday morning. He said a decision was made to keep the college open with all activities scheduled as usual.

The job action strike was called for by Richard DeOrsey, executive director of Council 94, because the 11,000 state workers in the union have been working without new salary contracts since June. He said Thursday contract talks were broken off because "the state would not bargain on salaries."

The two sides met Thursday morning for 15 minutes in an attempt to end the impasse, but DeOrsey said the state refused to negotiate on wages until the General Assembly approves a 1984 budget. This action should occur some time this week.

In the meantime, Foley said since

the job action involves only maintenance, custodial, clerical and dining service employees on campus, the college would remain open and classes would be held. This depends, however, on whether the faculty honors the strike by not crossing picket lines to hold classes and perform their various jobs.

Foley said the faculty and administration of the college belong to other unions, namely, the Rhode Island College Staff Association (an affiliate of the American Federation of Teachers). He said although faculty may honor the strike, which would affect classes, final exams, graduation and other events if serious, there is no financial reason for doing so because these employees are working under contracts and have no salary disputes.

The job action called for by DeOrsey could pose problems for dormitory students because dining workers and custodial workers are involved. However, he said he did not believe it would cause the dorms or the college itself to shut down.

"We have a calendar year for state employees and an academic calendar for others," DeOrsey said, "so we expect graduation as scheduled and the offices to be

open. No position (on RIC's part) has been taken."

Foley said although the job action will affect the campus, it should not pose a serious problem unless the faculty honors it and refuses to cross picket lines.

"A strike (by state employees) is illegal. We have a professional, moral and ethical responsibility to students," Foley said, "We have other personnel not in that union to operate the campus and it's not a job action against RIC, it's a statewide thing."

Foley said he expects many faculty members to continue business as usual because their "commitment runs pretty deep."

"(Union workers) have been without contract for a long time and have still delivered their services," Foley said. "There is no reason right now to believe we'd have a massive shutdown."

Norman E. Harrod, Sr., president of Local 2878 of the union at RIC which represents the custodial, dining and maintenance workers, was in conference Thursday and could not be reached for comment on the job action. The president of Local 2879, which represents the clerical employees, Valia Delvicario, was also unavailable for comment at press time.

Student fee allocations

Parliament allocated \$352,085. to 36 student organizations in their budget hearings of April 5 and 6. Most of these organizations make money which they return to Student Community Government.

The largest allocation will go to RIC Programming which will receive a total of \$101,089. However, Programming will bring in the most money. They anticipate a revenue of \$27,000.

Almost half their budget goes to pay for speakers, films, artists and performers. Over \$24,000. will go to personnel including an administrative assistant, graphics personnel, police and security.

Student Community Government will receive \$51,874. \$38,000 of this will go toward paying office personnel and stipends. They plan to make \$10,425.

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The Anchor will receive the next highest allocation of \$37,560. \$21,000 of that will go for printing costs and \$10,000. are paid to the staff as stipends.

WRIC will receive \$22,910. next year. Out of this, \$8,000 will pay for the telephone line through which they transmit. \$8,300. will go toward stipends and an engineering consultant. Another \$4,500. will go toward capital improvement such as records, tapes, and equipment needed to attain FM status.

Harambee, an organization that promotes minority causes, will receive an allocation of \$20,405. Of this, \$16,000. will go toward paying for speakers, films, artists and performers. Harambee anticipates making a revenue of \$4,000.

As the person in charge of "Operations," Hanley does "office work" like "coordinating" various events, shows, and lectures. He also helps to choose a "variety of bands to suit every different type of person" and he "oversees if anything went down" like fights or technical difficulties at the activities.

Hanley said that he does not organize the activities alone. He stressed that the forty member paid and volunteer Programming staff "work together as a team effort." For instance, during the recent RIC End, Hanley said the staff members each worked an average

of "50 hours." He explained that he "just helped out as a leadership style" role. Then, together, the staff "like a computer, put it in (the work), and spit it out (the results)."

Hanley credits a lot of people in helping him become so involved in RIC's extra-curricular activities. Rotondo, his Programming "protégé" who taught Hanley how to "coordinate."

To further develop these abilities, Hanley joined Parliament last fall. In his role as an "at-large" representative, he can work with people which he enjoys doing. He estimates that he has helped at least ten people during the part year. Furthermore, his position is also very beneficial to him. Since he is a Managerial Economics major and a Psychology minor, this position complements his interests in business and people. He said that his desire to learn how to formulate a budget motivated him to join Parliament. As a member of the budget committee for the Board of Directors for the Student Union, this knowledge is invaluable to him.

Hanley's life is not all work and

no fun, however. As an active four year participant in Intramural Sports, Hanley has played floor hockey and has been a member of three championship co-ed softball teams.

This senior has also been a member of the RIC Epsilon chapter of Kappa Delta Phi. He said that it is a "really good time" and it has enabled him to meet many different people. Editorial:

Due to gross negligence on the part of the state in negotiating new contracts for employees in Council 94 of the American Federation of State, County and Municipal Employees Union last year, both students and faculty at RIC may suffer from the union's decision to take a job action statewide.

The state employees have been working under an expired contract since June. This is the state's fault for not working on new ones and resolving questions of salary increases. Up until now, these employees have remained committed to their jobs; those at RIC have continued to serve the students without contracts.

The job action, an illegal move but an unquestionable last-resort move to resolve the problem, poses threats to the continuity of services at the college. If teachers choose to honor the action, classes will not be held and graduation may be delayed. If they choose not to honor it, they may risk their safety crossing picket lines.

Because of the state's irresponsibility in negotiating new contracts, we all may suffer. Depending on how seriously the action affects the school, final exams among other events may be put off. Although the action does not involve the faculty, the faculty may support it and thus interfere with our education for some time.

Dear Editor:

We, the RIC students for RIPIRG, feel it necessary to lay to rest some misconceptions that came to light at last week's parliament meeting.

We believe in Democracy. RIPIRG is a micro-cosm of the concept of "Participatory Democracy." We believe that for our political, economic and environmental systems to work properly,

citizens must actively represent their own interests or watch passively as the society at large is dominated by the powerful few. RIPIRG offers students the chance to grow, to become aware, to do research on various subjects vital to our future survival and livelihood. There are a hundred LOVE CANALS waiting to happen. More WATERGATES in the wings. But when they do happen, the students at RIC will be the ones to suffer the consequences. RIPIRG is here to prepare them for such an eventuality.

The basic concept behind our campaign is that students have the right to tax themselves. The small minority of students who disagree with our issues are entitled to a full refund of the money they have paid to us. PIRG refund levels usually hover at 5%. The refund also serves as a good barometer of student opinion on the issues we pursue. The key here is that the students control our issues. They

do have just as much input as other students on the campus but no more. We expected Parliament to react as they did. Fortunately, the campus itself still has the opportunity to decide whether we are to exist or not.

According to institutional research, there are 4919 matriculating undergraduates on this campus. We have compiled 2520 signatures or 51.2% of the campus. We have clear majority support.

One of Parliament's objections was what they termed "harassment". We apologize to any student who was asked to sign our petition more than once. There were over 25 petitioners working on our drive so it was impossible for us to determine which students signed already and which hadn't. We also were accused of harassing individual parliament members by

Privileged students

Many students are being paid for jobs that they do in student organizations. Other colleges have students volunteering for these positions. Instead of money, students should be able to earn college credit for the work that they do.

The highest paid students are the executive editors of the *Anchor* and *Exodus* and the general manager of WRIC. These students will be paid \$3000 each next year. Their jobs are meant to be part of their education.

The *Anchor* spends nearly one third of its budget on stipends. The executive editor will receive \$3000 next year. The stipends for the other staff members are nominal compared to the editor but they are still being paid. With this, the *An-*

chor cannot possibly make a profit.

Bryant College's *Archway* makes a profit on many of their issues in part because the writers and editors are not paid. Only those soliciting advertising get any money. They receive a ten percent commission on the new ads that they solicit.

The executive editor of the *Exodus* will make \$3000 next year. Certainly that editor does a lot of work (especially the present one) and will perhaps earn the \$3000, but this reduces the experience to a job and not an education. The same applies to Student Community Government and WRIC.

Some say that the stipends promote professionalism, but the people would probably do the same jobs even if there was no money in it. Therefore, the \$23,000 going toward stipends approved by Parliament is really a waste of the

students' money.

Certainly, a much better way of educating the students would be to offer college credit. Members of the faculty could grade the students and thus provide the professionalism.

Although it is too late in the semester to effectively do anything now, next year's Parliament will be meeting every other Wednesday night. There are representatives from every major and students should let their representative know how they feel.

Helpline

GSCA is the Graduate Student Counseling Association comprised of students in the Counselor Education Curriculum. "Helpline" is run as a public service to the college community. Responses to "Helpline" questions are provided by graduate students in conjunction with Counselor Education faculty and other professionals.

While not a replacement for the counseling process, "Helpline" offers readers a platform to air issues and concerns.

This week's Helpline will respond to a student's questions about hypnosis. Basically the student wanted to know what hypnosis is and does a person relinquish control of their mind to the hypnotist. For our answer we approached member of our student organization who has concentrated a great deal on the subject and is presently using hypnosis with some of her clients.

"Hypnosis is a mind expanding experience. It frees a person to fully appreciate and assess a particular experience.

The thought of the unconscious mind often scares people. It sounds like some devious mysterious place. I like to think of the unconscious mind as a file cabinet. From birth, each of us is bombarded with so many stimuli that we cannot possibly handle them all at the same time. The conscious mind attends to a few at a time and files the rest away. 
There is so much information stored in this file and it is packed so tightly that it is often difficult to sort out the needed past learnings. Hypnosis makes this task easier.

Genital Herpes: Q & A

Genital herpes is a "new" disease in epidemic proportions. An estimated 5,000,000 Americans have genital herpes. Approximately 300,000 cases are reported each year.

Fear and ignorance concerning genital herpes has caused mass panic throughout the country. Knowledge of genital herpes will help alleviate some of the fear and panic.

Q. What is Genital herpes?

A. Genital herpes is a sexually transmitted disease caused by a virus. The strain of virus usually associated with genital herpes is the Type 2, whereas cold sores are usually associated with Type 1. However, there have been instances where it has been reversed.

Q. How can I contract genital herpes?

A. Herpes is transmitted through direct contact with an infected person with active lesions, although herpes can be transmitted while in the inactive phase, though it is unlikely. Active herpes is when sores are present until the sores are completely healed and the scabs have fallen off. It is passed through intimate physical contact. It is highly unlikely that genital herpes can be spread in other ways besides human-to-human contact.

Q. What are the symptoms of genital herpes?

A. Symptoms begin to appear 2-10 days after exposure. They usually disappear within 3 weeks. A person may notice tingling, itching, or pain in the genital area, burning on urination, or a vaginal discharge. Usually within a week, small painful blisters appear on the vagina, cervix, or around the anus in women and on the penis or around the anus in men. The sores may be accompanied by groin swelling and flu-like symptoms, fever, sore throat and headache.

Q. Can a person have genital herpes and not know it?

A. Yes. Some infections can occur without symptoms, or the symptoms may be so mild that they go undetected.

Q. Can genital herpes recur?

A. Yes, it can. Once the primary infection has occurred, the virus travels along a nerve to the spinal column, where it hibernates. When reactivated, it travels back, probably by the same nerve, and settles near the site of the original infection, where new symptoms will occur.

Q. What causes recurrence?

A. It is not clear what causes recurrences. Some people never experience recurrence, others only infrequently, while still others have recurrences regularly. Physicians suggest that general health and resistance, physical trauma or even emotional stress may be factors. In general, recurrences tend to be less severe than initial infections.

Q. How can an infected person prevent transmission of herpes?

A. The only sure way to prevent transmission is complete abstinence from the first sensation that the blisters are erupting to the complete healing of the sores, not just scabbed over.

Q. What do I do if I suspect I have genital herpes?

A. See a physician as soon as possible. Herpes can only be diagnosed while the sores are present.

Q. Can herpes be cured?

A. Not at the present time. Treatment and care are directed at relieving the discomfort of the sores. Good personal hygiene is essential.


praised RIC professors who he said are "always there for extra help."

Q. Can genital herpes cause complications?

A. Yes. There are three areas of concern. The first results from transfer of the virus to the eye after touching the infected area. If not promptly treated, eye damage can result. The second is the possible link between women with genital herpes and a higher incidence of cervical cancer. Women with genital herpes should have yearly Pap Smears. The third complication arises in pregnant women. Women with genital herpes have as much as a three times higher rate of miscarriage and an increased risk of premature birth. Women who contract active herpes in the



later stage of pregnancy, over seven months, risk having an infant born with herpes, due to the presence of active lesions in the birth canal. The risk is from 40-50 percent. If the infant is born with herpes infection in the blood, the mortality rate can go as high as 50%. Pregnant women with a history of genital herpes should be under supervision of her physician at all times.

It is hoped that some misconceptions and questions about genital herpes have been cleared up. To answer further questions, contact the Office of Health Promotion, 456-8061.



ACTIVITY FEE ALLOCATIONS AT A GLANCE

Exodus, the campus yearbook, will receive an allocation of \$20,519. \$15,000 of that will go toward printing costs and \$3,000 for the executive editor's stipend. **Exodus** plans to make a revenue of \$6,000.

The Debate Council will receive \$16,520 next year. Of that, \$11,775 will go to pay the expenses of sending members of the Debate Council to tournaments at other colleges. For their tournament at RIC, the Debate Council plans to spend \$3,000. They plan to make \$2,500 in revenue.

The rest of the student organizations will use up the remaining \$81,208. These organizations are: ABLE, A.I.E.S.E.C., Anthropol, Biology-Modern Technology, Chess Club, Class of '84, Coffeehouse, Cooperative Playgroup, C.R.A.M. (Career Roots in Advanced Medicine), Economics and Management, English Club, Gerontology, Industrial Arts, International/Lusophile Society, L.A.S.O. (Latin American Student Organization), Math and Computer Science, Nursing Club, Philosophy Club, Physical Education, Physical Science, Political Science, R.S.A. (Resident Students Association), Ski Club, Social Welfare, Sociology, S.C.E.C. (Student Council for Exceptional Children), Track Club, Washington Congressional Internship Program, and the Weekend Club.

Within some of these organizations, there are students who receive stipends. A stipend is comparable to a salary. The highest paid students will be the executive editors of the *Anchor* and *Exodus* and the General Manager of WRIC. Each of these students will receive \$3,000.

Student Community Government will spend \$7,300 for stipends next year. The president of S.C.G. will receive \$1,500, the vice president will receive \$800, the treasurer will receive \$1,250, and the secretary will receive \$700. The speaker of Parliament will receive \$400, and other members of Parliament receive stipends.

The *Anchor* will spend a total of \$10,000 for stipends including the executive editor's stipend of \$3,000. WRIC will spend \$6,800 on stipends including the general manager's stipend of \$3,000. WRIC will also spend \$1,500 for an engineering consultant.

In the Coffeehouse's request of \$18,055, \$5,630 goes to managers' salaries and officers' stipends.

Non-students paid by the Student Activity include an administrative assistant for Programming. Student Community Government will spend \$32,553 for office personnel.

"Film critic shares her views"

Julia Lesage, a noted film critic, author, and filmmaker (to name a few) lectured to an appreciative audience at 12:15 p.m. Thursday in Craig Lee 255. Her hour long lecture focused on the "Politics of Fantasy in Hollywood Film."

A noted feminist film critic, Lesage discussed the effects of film fantasy on women. In a well-organized presentation, she outlined her ideas on the functions of fantasy.

Lesage said the most common type is the "shopping list" function in which a person imagines his day's activities. She added that "sexual" fantasies and "mom" fantasies also prevail in today's society. She said that in the current media culture, the fantasy of sexuality is used for everything from "liquor to cigarette" commercials.

Lesage said that the treatment of the human body within the media also differs in regard to whether it

is male or female. Women, for instance, are viewed as a "jigsaw puzzle of perfect parts" like long fingernails and silky hair. Men, however, are viewed in the media as whole bodies.

This talented woman, who founded and edited the film journal "Jump Cut", also shared her views on various films. She said that she particularly enjoyed "Flashdance" because while watching the film, she could imagine herself as a physically beautiful female. (Lesage is a slightly plump, grayish-blond haired, bespectacled woman.)

Lesage also mentioned such films as *ET*, *Diner*, *Tootsie*, and *Personal Best* as examples to illustrate her various comments on fantasy and the woman's role in such fantasy.

Moreover, at the beginning of her lecture, Lesage said that "film is closely related to daydreaming." Throughout the course of her informal talk, she verbally painted a picture of how the viewer injects

traits of characters, setting and plot action to form his own ideas of what a film is about.

This film critic said that "people respond to parts of a whole work differently" and their response to different works "depends on their mood."

Lesage hopes that she can provoke some audience response through a work of her own. She is presently making a video tape of Nicaraguan women, which she hopes to have completed by fall. Lesage said that she hopes the tape will have some effect on the women who see it.

This informative lecture was appealing in her bluntness about her ideas and her life. Lesage stated, opening for instance, that she had problems with her employment at three universities in the past four years because of her leftist political affiliation. This openness was refreshing in a lecturer because it made her presentation unique and honest.

"The King of Comedy" loses reign

If any of my readers is a devoted fan of Jerry Lewis, that madcap, slapstick, flat-on-his face comedian, be prepared for a surprising change of pace. In "The King of Comedy" the incredible funny star of numerous farcical features (alone and with Dean Martin), becomes a serious down-to-earth, seclusive individual. As the star of a TV Talk Show (an obvious take-off of Johnny Carson's), Jerry Langford loves privacy when he's off screen. He enjoys a quiet evening at home in his Manhattan Apartment after a difficult day taping at the studio. As Langford, Lewis portrays a private person effectively. We see his character as a celebrity who prefers to avoid the limelight and flashcubes. His throngs of security guards help assure this.

Into Jerry's life enters Rupert Pupkin, and off-the-wall, demented would-be comedian, who will stop at nothing for a shot at appearing on Jerry's successful show. He plagues Jerry by telephone and shows up continuously at the studio, despite severe treatment by security. Nothing will stop this mad individual in his flight to stardom. As Rupert, Robert DeNiro shines. The star of such intense dramatic films as "The Deerhunter" and "Taxi Driver", DeNiro, like Lewis, changes his image. He is very con-

vincing as a disturbed psychotic who can very obviously be classified as a sociopath.

Despite the good performances delivered by these two versatile actors, the movie lacks credibility. It is difficult to believe that a wimpy nothing character like Rupert could get away with kidnapping, when the idea strikes him to abduct Jerry. Also, there is a serious lack

of truly funny scenes in the film and this makes it ponderous at times. One of the film's major assets is the appearance of actress Sarah Bernhard, who portrays the nutty girlfriend and partner-in-crime of Rupert. In the scene where she entices a bound-and-gagged Lewis, she is truly hilarious. There are other funny scenes in the film also, such as one in which Rupert

breaks into Jerry's country home with a rather promiscuous female friend. Apart from these few interludes, the film takes itself too seriously, resulting in a heavy-handed quality. Director Martin Scorsese would have done better to keep the action a bit more fast-paced and the scenes much shorter.

"The King of Comedy" is playing at Warwick Mall. It's rated PG.

At least I got one thing right. I did put up with a lot of agony. Everyone noticed me. I felt like a





Baseball squad knocked out, of R.I. State Tournament; Wilkens sets new pitching mark

The men's baseball team is now 13-13 on the season with recent victories over Brandeis and Bryant, but Bryant then came back and knocked the Anchormen out of the R.I. State collegiate tournament.

In the Brandeis game, Anchormen senior pitcher John Wilkens etched his name in the record books as he recorded his ninth victory of the season and 22nd of his career. The 22nd victory makes him the all-time career victory leader at RIC. The Anchormen defeated Brandeis 12-8 in the game, Brandeis was the No. 3 ranked team in N.E. Division III at the time.

Against Bryant on Friday, April 29 the Anchormen crushed the Indians 33-13 behind a 35 hit

attack that buried four Bryant pitchers. Leading the attack were Jim Buchanan and Jeff Silveira who each homered in the game. Four Anchormen, Ken Medeiros, Dom Coro, Mike Manzo and Buchanan each drove in four runs as RIC set five N.E. collegiate records. The records were for most runs in a game (33), most hits (35), most doubles (11) most RIB's and most total bases.

The next day, however, the Indians came back and knocked the Anchormen out of the R.I. State Tournament with a convincing 5-0 victory. The Anchormen couldn't get anything going against the Indians pitcher.

The Anchormen have several games remaining and still have an outside shot at making the NCAA or ECAC playoffs when their season is finished.

Here's a quick re-cap of the entire 1982-83 sports season beginning with the fall sports.


The soccer squad finished the season with a 9-2-5 record and was knocked out of the ECAC playoffs in the first round. Leading scorers for the squad were Arthur Cabral, David Robinson and Louie Cabral, while at the other end, goalie Tony DeMello did a superb job recording a goals against average around 1.5. The defense was led by the play of Eddie Cabral and Carl Gibbs.

The women's cross-country team placed seventh at the ECAC-EAIAW Championships. Mary-Beth Crawley had finishes of 1,3,5,6,12 and 19 during the season to lead the squad. Junior AnnMarie Gower was also superb with two second place finishes and 4,7 and 11 places also. Completing a fine threesome was Helen B. Murphy Award winner Mary Miller. Miller registered 7,16,30 and 39 place finishes.

The men's cross-country team had three fine performers as well. Filinto Martins, Mike Pesare and Ron Petrie all turned in stellar performances during the season. The Anchormen highlighted their season by capturing the Tri-State Championship on October 16.

The women's tennis team had a fine season finishing at 8-4 on the year. Freshman Susan Landry had an excellent season finishing at 8-3 in singles competition. Other notable players included Beth Cosentino who was 5-6 in singles, Marisa Petrarca who was 9-1 in both singles and doubles play and Sue Calkins who was 7-3 in both singles and doubles play. The Anchorwomen recorded victories over Westfield State, Salve Regina, WPI, SMU, Clark University, Bryant College, Fairfield and University of New Haven.

The women's volleyball team had another stellar season under coaches Tom Wikiera and Leo Gartsu. They finished with a 39-16 record and placed third in the EAIAW Championships. Kris Norberg was named to the EAIAW all-championship team. Other top performers on the squad included Sue Donatelli, Ruth Harnois and Karen Foss. Their season was highlighted with a thrilling victory over the then No. 1 ranked team in the



country and in New England, Eastern Conn.

The winter sports were the most successful, however, of all the sports seasons.

Leading that success was the women's gymnastics team that captured first place at the first annual New England Gymnastic League Division III Championship. Coach Gail Davis' squad was led by Joanna D'Abrosca and Tracey Garforth. Garforth was the all-around individual champion in New England. Other outstanding members of the squad were Sheila Brady, Debbie Bradley, Nancy Bergstrom and Ann Oppenheimer.

The men's basketball team also had a terrific season culminated in an ECAC Championship with a 70-66 victory over nationally ranked Trinity College. Coach Jimmy Adams' squad was led by Michael Chapman, who led the team in scoring and was second in rebounding. Other leading players were Larry House who led the team in rebounding, Leon Harris, Dwight Williams, Richard Ethier and Eric Britto all also played key roles on the team. The Anchormen finished the season with an 18-8 record, their best record since 1978-79.



The women's fencing team placed sixth out of 12 teams in the N.E. Fencing championships. Coach Athena Karacas' squad was led by several fine individuals. The Varsity I squad was led by Celeste Desaulniers, Susan Federico, Denise Jackson and Michelle Archambault and the Varsity II team was led by Kathy King.

The wrestling squad suffered through another trying season, suffering through various injuries and a very young squad. Coach Rusty Carlsten was forced to use several freshmen in every match and the Anchormen paid for it. The squad placed sixth in N.E. and was led by Popeye DaRosa who placed second and Chris Bouchard, the Hetherman Award winner who placed third. Other top performers on the squad included George Macary, Dave Young and Tom Clancy. The squad finished at 6-9 on the season, an improvement over the 4-11 record of two seasons ago.

Men's track takes strong second at tri-states

Led by first place finishes from Peter McCutcheon, Mark Marino and Mike Pesare, the men's track team captured second place at the Tri-State Championships held Saturday, April 30, at Bryant College.

The Anchormen racked up 132 points, way ahead of third place Assumption who had 109 points, and Bryant with 174 points was the team champion.

McCutcheon took first in the discus with a throw of 125'6" and also took first in the hammer with a toss of 160'11". Marino was first in the 3,000 meter steeplechase and Pesare was first in the 10,000 meter run. Marino's time was 2:01.36 and Pesare's was 33:15.30.

Coach Charlie Sweeney was pleased with these three, but was also very delighted with the rest of the Squad as well.

"The kids performed well, we didn't get help from the other schools as I had hoped, but second is just fine," said

Sweeney.

The Anchormen also turned in a host of second, third and fourth places as well. Tracy Fontes was second to McCutcheon in the hammer, John Sherlock was second in the long jump, Robert Oliveira was second in the 400 meters, John Ricci was second in the 800 meters and Rob Perrin was second in the 10,000 meters.

Sweeney had these additional comments: "Fontes had a really good day, Sherlock had a busy day and did well, Oliveira came within 1-10 of a second in qualifying for Nationals, Ricci was really up against the good competition and Marino had good times all the way through."

As for third place finishes, Tom Gower scored his personal best in the pole vault and was third, Robert Oliveira was third in the 200 meters, Marino took third in the 800 meters, the 1600 meter relay team consisting of Sherlock, Gower, Ricci and Todd Sevey placed third and the 400

In doubles competition Costabile-Shroeder won 6-2, 6-4 and Bacon-Primiano lost 6-1, 6-3. That set the stage for the tie-breaking doubles match for Azar-Habershaw and their Salve counterparts. Azar-Habershaw won 6-1, 7-5 to wrap up the first victory of the season for the netmen.

The netmen also competed at the New England Intercollegiate Tennis Tournament at Springfield College on Saturday, April 30.

In Class A singles, Costabile lost in the first round 6-2, 6-0 and Azar lost in the second round 6-4, 6-3.

In Class B singles Shroeder lost 6-1, 6-3 and Habershaw lost 6-3, 6-1 in first round action.

In Class C singles Desjarniers lost 6-1, 6-0 and Bacon lost 6-1, 6-2.

In Class A doubles Costabile-Shroeder lost 6-0, 6-1. In Class B doubles Azar-Habershaw lost 6-0, 6-2 and in Class C doubles Desjarniers-Bacon lost 6-1, 6-3.

The Anchormen are now 1-6 on the season and finish up their campaign this week.

Women's softball finish season with winning streak

RIC's women's softball team played some of its best games of the season last week as they strung together a four game winning streak to complete the season with an 11-10 record.

The Anchorwomen started their stretch drive (after a week of rain-outs) by going down in defeat to Bryant College by a score of 3-2 on April 28. The loss eliminated RIC from the R.I. State Championships and propelled Bryant to take on Providence College in the semi-final round.

The loss didn't put the Anchorwomen into too much of a stupor. They immediately came back to win four straight games beginning with a 6-3 victory over Roger Williams College on Friday, April 29.

Roger Williams opened the game by getting 2 runs off Paula Pistacchio to take the lead, but didn't touch home plate again until the 7th inning when they scored their final run.

RIC essentially put the game away in their half of the 1st when they scored 4 runs of their own. All four runs were unearned, culminating with catcher Kris Norberg scoring on a 4 base error. Norberg was trying to move along Lori Palagi and Pistacchio to 2nd and 3rd with a bunt down the 3rd base line. However, RWC's catcher pounced on the ball and tried to nail Pistacchio at 3rd, but instead overthrew the left fielder, who was covering 3rd, allowing all 3 runs to score. The other run was driven in by right fielder Karen Foss; she grounded out allowing Tris Arego to score from third.

The remainder of the game was a pitcher's duel in which Pistacchio allowed only two hits, both to Nancy Hall. RIC added 2 additional runs in the 5th inning to seal the victory. RWC did manage to get another run in the bottom of the 7th, but it was too little too late.

The victory, at the time, increased RIC's record to 8-9 and dropped Roger Williams to 12-10-1.

On Monday, May 2nd, RIC traveled to Western Connecticut

State College and swept a double header by scores of 4-0 and 13-2, respectively. Pistacchio pitched both games to earn the victories. Coach Neal was particularly impressed with the defensive play of the squad noting that they didn't commit an error in either game.

RIC concluded its season the following day with another double header against cross-city rival, Brown University.

The Anchorwomen completely outshone the Bruins in every facet of the game on route to a 8-2 victory in the first game. RIC amassed 12 hits compared to Brown's 3, and the Anchorwomen only committed 1 error to the Bruins' 3.

RIC took control of the game in the 2nd inning when they scored 4 runs. Second baseman Kim Smith drove in two runs with a shot up the middle to break the scoreless tie. Smith was the hero of the game going 4 for 4 and driving in 4 runs.

Brown scored its first run in the 4th inning. Pistacchio, walked a batter, threw a wild pitch and then allowed a single by the Bruins' Rachel Bloomfield to drive in the run.

RIC put the game away in the 5th inning when they scored an additional 3 runs. This time Smith doubled in 2 runs and scored from third on a ground-out to Palagi. The Anchorwomen added a meaningless run in the 6th inning. Brown rounded out its scoring with a run in the 7th inning.

Pistacchio helped her own cause by getting 3 hits, and Norberg and Cennamo chipped in with 2 hits apiece.

Besides showing its fire power with the wood, RIC also threw out some leather. Smith played flawlessly at short and Palagi threw out two runners at second from left field.

RIC concluded the season by losing the nightcap by a score of 4-1. The game was deadlocked at 1 going into the top of the 7th. Pistacchio then lost her control walking 3 consecutive batters and hitting a 4th to break the tie. The 2 other runs scored on an error by shortstop Smith.

The split left Brown's record at

16-10 for the season, finishing second in the Ivy League. RIC finished at 11-10 but 8-4 in Division III.

Overall, Coach Neal feels that this was a successful season for the Anchorwomen saying: "All things considered, we did o.k., and I feel optimistic for next year. We finished real strong."

RIC still has an outside chance of advancing to the NCAA Division III playoffs but didn't find out until May 9.

Statistics available up until the Brown game showed the following: Karen Foss was the leading hitter with a batting average of .372, Pistacchio was second at .369 followed by Palagi at .362 and Norberg at .303. Pistacchio led the team with 17 r.b.i., Norberg accumulated 13 and Palagi had so far amassed 10. Palagi led the team with an on-base percentage of .522 and Smith was second at .540. Smith also led the team with 15 walks. Foss led the team with a .465 slugging percentage, Pistacchio was second at .462 and Palagi was third with a percentage of .461.

Coach Neal is optimistic for next year, noting that the team is only losing two players by graduation (Santo and Chris Swich). She said the team will be very strong next season and is hopeful that she will be able to corral some talented players who will attend RIC next year. "We were in every game we played, and I'm really excited for next season to start," she said.


third in the nation in the hammer throw.

The women's cross-country team racked up 105 points, 1/2 point out of second place and finished third at the Tri-State Championships held Saturday, April 30 at Bryant College.

"We had a good show and the kids did well," explained Coach Charlie Sweeney.

Ann Marie Gower was the only first place finisher for RIC, she accomplished that in the 5,000 meters. The Anchorwomen also had two second place finishes by Mary St. Laurent in the javelin with a throw of 124'10" that is also a new school record and Tammy Taft in the 400 meters with a time of 62.9 that is also a new school record.

The Anchorwomen also turned in several third place finishes, including Elsie Herchen who tied for third in the high jump, Janna Cole third in the 5,000 meters and Ann Marie Gower and Anna Contreras who tied for third in the 3,000 meters. The 400 meter relay team consisting of Debra Campo, Liz Ferri, Kris Nichols and Jean Berthasavage also took third with a time of 53.5 and also set a new school record. Janet Smiley didn't place in the shotput, but set a school record.

The Anchorwomen placed so close to second because Eastern Conn. used an ineligible player and lost some team points because of it. The official tally is not complete yet either, according to Sweeney and assistant Matt Hird, and it is

possible that the Anchorwomen may end up in second place when the dust settles.

Smiley and Taft both qualified for the EAIAW meet with their performances at the Tri-States, and this brings the total to 14.

"We should do well, this is the biggest group we've ever taken out of this place," said Sweeney.

Those 14 are Jean Berthasavage who will be competing in the 100 and 200 meters; Liz Birney in the 1500 meters; Anna Contreras in the 3,000 meters, Ann Marie Gower in both the 5,000 and 10,000 meters, Elsie Herchen in the high jump; Debbie Jamieson in the 800 meters; Kris Nicholas in the high jump; St. Laurent in the javelin; Smiley in the shotput; Taft in the 400 meters; Janna Cole in the 3,000 meters and the 400 meter relay team consisting of Ferri, Campo, Berthasavage and Nicholas, and the relay team consisting of Bimey, Miller, Taft and Jamieson.

"The Tri-States were much more competitive this year, we would have won easily with this performance last season, we improved all areas over last season, it was a good, all-around performance," said Coach Matt Hird.

Ann Marie Gower will be going to the NCAA Division III National Championships soon and Hird had some comments about that.

"She has the greatest chance of succeeding in the 10,000 meter (she's also qualified in the 5,000), there's an even chance she could score (top 12) she's a lot stronger this year than last, she'll do well," said Hird.

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Accomplishments

Parliament covered a wide variety of issues in their biweekly meetings this semester. The major issues facing Parliament were the raising of the drinking age, looking into a problem with Debate Council receipts, RIPIRG endorsement and the stipend of the *Exodus*' executive editor.

During the meeting of Wednesday, February 7, members discussed the possible raising of the drinking age. From that meeting there was a letter writing campaign with the premise that the Rathskellar and social events would be harmed. However, the bill to raise the drinking age was passed.

In the meeting of March 8, Parliament took punitive action against the Debate Council because the Debate Council could not account for the spending of \$168.

In the meeting of May 3, Parliament voted to not endorse the Rhode Island Public Information Research Group (RIPIRG). Also, in that meeting continuing to the next, the stipend of the executive editor of the *Exodus* was discussed. Editor Su Montuori asked for

a retroactive stipend for the 1981-82 and 1982-83 years. This was defeated on the grounds that Parliament could not ethically go into last year's books. However, Parliament is issuing a "strong recommendation" to the Finance Committee to give Montuori a \$2400 bonus.

Also debated was whether to help send members of ABLE to the "Prudence Island Experience." James Monahan, Treasurer of Student Community Government, said that because the students would be earning credit for the experience, that it "was not the place of Student Community Government" to pay for the "Experience." However, the body voted to approve the \$933 request for the "Experience."

Other things Parliament worked on were:

- Trying to maintain or lengthen the Free Period.
- Sharon Lopes, Vice president of the S.C.G. was the Regional Director of the National Black Caucus. In that role she tried to make students and others more aware of minority problems.
- The Finance Commission, a committee of S.C.G., approved \$5,475 for new furniture for the Parliament Chamber.




