RIC PLAY WINS ACCLAIM

The RIC Theatre production, THE ROBBER BRIDEGROOM, offered here in November, has been selected from among 430 plays nationwide to be performed at the tenth annual American College Theatre Festival in Washington, D.C. The musical folklore tale will be staged on April 14 and 15 at the Eisenhower Theatre of the Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts at 7:30 p.m. There will also be a matinee performance at 2 p.m. on the 15th.

Major recognition for the college, the selection has generated substantial interest on campus and in the community. On April 10 at 8 p.m. there will be a performance of the play in Roberts Auditorium which is being billed the KENNEDY CENTER PREVIEW CELEBRA-TION. Open to the public as well as the RIC community, the preview will carry no admission charge. Special invitations will be issued to educational and arts leaders in the state. Dr. Sweet will offer congratulations to the company. Those interested in attending should inform the Roberts Hall Box Office at 8144 between 8:30 a.m. and 4:30 p.m. during the week of April 3.

In Washington on the evening of April 14, the cast and those who travel to the capital to see the performance will be invited to a reception immediately following the show. To be held in the foyer of the balcony

at the Eisenhower Theatre, the affair will include in addition to the cast and director, the Rhode Island congressional delegation, Dr. Sweet, and other Rhode Island dignitaries. The Amoco Oil Company which sponsors the festival will present medallions to each cast member at the reception.

A bus trip to Washington, D.C. for those who wish to see the RIC Theatre Company perform THE ROBBER BRIDEGROOM has been organized through the auspices of the RIC Student Community Government. President's Column

The inaugural edition of "What's New(s) at RIC" begins a major new effort at enhancing internal communications at the college. Repeatedly, I have been told by members of all segments of the college that there are serious gaps in the various mechanisms by which we communicate. The problems range from the promulgation of academic policies and procedures to informing the community of the quality of artistic, cultural, and athletic events held on campus. I am also informed that in a 1970 self-study supported by the Danforth Foundation, internal communications were identified as an area of critical need and high priority. Pursuant to that self-study, President Kauffman appointed a Committee on Communications as a response to that observation. This committee recommended the establishment of a college news organ to provide a reliable means of communication among faculty, staff, students, administration, and other members of the community. No action was taken to implement the recommendation at that time.

Somewhat more recently, a consultant charged with providing an assessment of the college's internal and external relations again emphatically recommended the establishment of a college news letter.

"What's New(s) at RIC" will provide a forum for the promulgation of newly developed college policies and procedures, announcement of artistic, cultural, social and athletic events occuring on

the campus, and for serving the communication needs of the campus. To that end, I call particular attention to the calendar and urge that all who are planning an event make the News Bureau aware of it for inclusion in the calendar.

"What's New(s) at RIC" will be edited by part-time staffer Ms. Jan Mielke under the direction of Mr. Sasso, Director of the News Bureau. Ms. Mielke is a welcome addition to our staff as she performs this valuable and needed service.

I am pleased that this newsletter has begun. I would like to express my gratitude to Dr. McMahon, Mr. Sasso, and their colleagues in College Advancement and Support who have worked so hard on the planning and development of this newsletter.

A final note -- I am aware that the problems of communication are not solved by the establishment of this newsletter. At best, "What's New(s) at RIC" provides a vehicle that will assist all of us in the process of communication. I urge that we attempt to communicate our activities with our colleagues as clearly and effectively as possible.

Focus on the Faculty

Dr. Jon M. Rosenblatt of the English Department has been selected to receive a Residence Fellowship from the National Endowment for the Humanities. He is one of 145 teachers of undergraduates who were chosen to receive a fellowship on the basis of national competition.

As a recipient of this award, Dr. Rosenblatt will be given a \$14,500 grant for research and study during the 1978-79 academic year. He will be going to New York University where he will participate in a seminar on the poetry of surrealism while continuing his work on a book of modern poetry, focusing on the poems of D.H. Lawrence and Dylan Thomas.
