

RI Council for Economic Ed Active at RIC

Over 100 educators participated in a conference of the Rhode Island Council for Economic Education (RICEE)'s Developmental Economic Education Program (DEEP) which was held on October 24 at the Faculty Center. The conference had an 'Economics Fair' theme, utilizing the resources in the library. Four Rhode Island teachers were honored with awards from the Old Stone Bank which sponsored an Incentive Award Program for excellence in teaching economics.

The Rhode Island Council for Economic Education, (affiliated with the Joint Council on Economic Education based in New York), is in its eleventh year of working to eliminate "economic illiteracy" in Rhode Island. The council sponsors the Center for Economic Development

housed at RIC which offers an extensive library of resource materials for teachers throughout the state.

The main activity of the council, DEEP is a teacher-training and support system designed to assist schools in presenting economics. Currently there are seven contracted school districts covering over one-half of the state's schools. Each district has an appointed coordinator who has close contact with the center at RIC and who is trained to aid teachers in his district.

Other activities of the center include a free puppet show for elementary school children which is designed to teach the economic concept of the dilemma

of choice, and the Trade-Offs program, an educational series on Channel 36 directed towards 9-to-13-year-olds. For teachers the center offers various graduate courses and a summer internship program which places teachers in private industry to acquaint them with the business world. There is also an employee education program offering seminars to employees of various companies.

RIC faculty involved in implementing these programs are John Sapinsley, associate professor of economics and executive director of RICEE; and Catherine Tisinger, assistant professor of economics and director of the Center for Economic Education. Two of the founders of the council, Professors Kenneth Lundberg and Peter Moore of the Economics Department, continue to offer center-related courses including in-service programs to graduate students.

Mrs. Agnes Johnson serves as the center's coordinator and Miss Lola Gamba, secretary to the president, is assistant treasurer of the council.

Awards

Rhode Island College received the Innovative Programming Award from the North American Association of Summer Sessions (NAASS) for the course Historical Landscapes of New England. Stanford E. Demars, associate professor of anthropology/geography, taught the course in the 1979 Summer Session and is planning to teach it again in the summer of 1980. The award was presented to the college at the annual conference of the NAASS on November 6.

RIC Fights Energy Consumption.

This fiscal year, the Rhode Island College community has shown their concern by conserving energy. Our year to date figures show:

Although the College has seen a substantial decrease in the energy consumption this year as compared to the same period last year (9% less fuel; 10% less electricity), the total dollar expenditure has increased 11% for the same period because of an increase in the unit costs of fuel and utilities.

A study of the consumption figures for October only indicated a reversal in our savings trend. The month's figures indicate an increase of 9% in our fuel consumption when compared to October of last year. A continuation of this trend will eventually erase our savings effort. Perhaps we should all look more closely in our areas to see how we could best turn this trend around to return to our previous records of energy savings.

Periodically, we will be issuing updated reports indicating the results of our energy savings efforts.

* A degree day (D.D.) is a unit based on temperature and time used in estimating fuel consumption and specifying nominal heating load in the winter.

Guest Director at Trinity to Teach at RIC

Jonas Jurasas, a 43-year-old native of Soviet Lithuania who has studied, taught and directed theatre productions in the USSR, and who defected from the Soviet Union after being ostracized for his unwillingness to have his work as a director controlled by the state, will conduct a 15-week workshop at the college during the spring semester. Offered for college credit, the workshop will be entitled "The Director, the Audience, and the Art of the Theatre."

In addition to conducting the work—shop, Jurasas will offer a master class for those in the community who wish to learn about his approach to directing and acting. The master class which Jurasas will offer is supported by a grant from the Rhode Island State Council on the Arts.

At Trinity Square Theatre he will direct a production and teach at the Trinity Conservatory. He is also scheduled to participate in a series of public forums focusing on the social, political and philosophical implications of Shakespeare's Macbeth for the contemporary political scene. Each of the forums will feature a brief scene from the RIC production of Macbeth as directed by David Burr, associate professor of theatre. (Macbeth will run from January 14 – 17 in the Roberts Hall Theatre.)

Participation in the discussions with Jurasas will be President David Sweet; Sheri Smith, associate professor of philosophy and foundations of education; and Dr. James Schevill of Brown University. Project director for the forums which are funded through a grant from the Rhode Island Committee for the Humanities will be P. William Hutchinson, professor of theatre. The forums will be held in five different locations around Rhode Island.

Alex Cornell at Work on NATO Grant

Alexander H. Cornell, Captain, U.S. Navy (Retired) and professor of management at RIC, recently returned from Brussels, Belgium where he met with officials of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization in his capacity as NATO Research Fellow for 1979-1980. Dr. Cornell was awarded the grant to do research from among 300 nominees.

The NATO Research Fellowship is given only to those senior researchers whose work will concern economic and military cooperation among NATO allies, arms control and management, the pursuit of detente and the role of NATO after 30 years of peace in Europe. The place of SALT agreements is a subject being studied as well.

Under the terms of the fellowship, he will publish his research in a NATO-sponsored book and will meet with government officials in Washington including General Alexander Haig, Senator Sam Nunn and others concerned with weapons management. Cornell will also write a series of articles and take part in a international lecture tour speaking to legislatures, military colleges and at public forums. NSF Equipment Grants Available

The National Science Foundation is accepting proposals for the purchase of equipment under two separate programs. The Instructional Scientific Equipment Program attempts to facilitate the implementation of a well-planned new or improved undergraduate instructional program in one or more of the sciences by providing partial support for the purchase of necessary scientific equipment. Science as defined in this program includes mathematical, physical, biological, engineering, and social sciences, and the history and philosophy of science. The Research Equipment and Instrumentation for Two-Year and Four-Year Colleges and Universities solicitation indicates that NSF will provide up to \$25,000 for the purchase of science research equipment and instrumentation.
