The students have an opportunity to be in daily contact with actual classroom teaching. They have a chance to observe, at first hand, the effects and values of various methods of procedure in all fields from the primary grades through the junior high school.

Students of the college become acquainted with the Henry Barnard School as Freshmen when they learn to be familiar with the classroom situation through observation. As Juniors all members of the class visit the Barnard School for an hour each day where they actually teach and discuss problems with the regular classroom teacher. Seniors are given the opportunity to take electives which will keep them in contact with actual classroom teaching.

The Faculty of the Henry Barnard School stand constantly ready to assist the students and help solve teaching problems that arise. The training program at the Henry Barnard School is one of the finest things that the Rhode Island College of Education offers its students.







The first of its kind in Rhode Island, the Future Teachers of America boasts 250 members in R. I. C. E. After a constitution was written and approved, officers and a board of directors were elected.

It was apparent from the very beginning that this club was extraordinary. They conducted a Thanksgiving Assembly, helped with the new college registration system at the beginning of the semester, were co-sponsors with the Senior Class of the Valentine Dance, and aided Student Council in sponsoring Song Contest.

Monthly meetings were held in the evening so that training students could attend. Prominent educators as well as civil defense authorities highlighted the list of speakers for the meetings. Projects were planned to further the interests of the teaching profession. The Henry Barnard Chapter sponsored an art exhibit for Junior High students. Hard work seldom goes unrewarded and the Future Teachers won many honors. Edward P. Travers, chapter president, was invited to speak on Future Teacher Organizations at the national convention of the American Association of School Administrators in Atlantic City. The National Education Association was proud of the Henry Barnard Chapter and awarded it the citation of Victory Honor Roll Chapter for outstanding membership. The state also recognized this group. A bill was introduced to the Rhode Island Institute of Instruction which would make members of Future Teachers Association junior members of the state educational association.

R. I. C. E. has many clubs which benefit the student body socially and culturally. The Henry Barnard Chapter of the Future Teachers of America is the only club designed primarily to contribute to the professional growth of its members. With this purpose in mind, the Henry Barnard Chapter of the Future Teachers of America finishes its first successful year and looks forward to even greater achievements in the future.



International Relations Club

As a group concerned with the affairs of the world. I. R. C. has been instrumental in bringing international news to the precincts of the college. By means of a cycle program revolving about one particular region of current prominence, a series of movies, coffee hours, and panel discussions were featured. Over coffee cups and the inevitable chicken sandwiches, foreign speakers from neighboring colleges told tales of life in their respective homelands. Heated debates on controversial issues were frequently carried on, and teas took their accustomed place in the roster of activities: all Riceans were welcomed at these sessions. Well known lecturers were heard at programs sponsored by the World Affairs Council of R. I., with which the club is affiliated. Speakers for college assemblies were also contracted through the Council.

The main event of the year was the trip to the regional I.R.C. meeting at McGill University in Montreal, Canada. It was attended by five lucky members who spent three days meeting foreign students, taking part in the round-table discussions on Western problems, enjoying the social gatherings of the conference, and sightseeing at interludes in their busy schedule. The delegates met with unfamiliar opinions from students outside of the United States, and returned with a different perspective. An honor to the delegation was the election of Ann Marie Walsh to the office of Secretary of the Conference in 1952 at Springfield College. She was elected, too, to attend the American Association of L.R.C.'s in Oklahoma.

Concerned with the needs of foreign students. the club worked in conjunction with the World Student Service Fund to launch a campaign for aid to the students of Lucknow University in India. A contact was set up between R. I. C. E. and Lucknow in an effort to exchange ideas. The drive was brought to a successful conclusion with the annual banquet at which four foreign students and one English coordinator served on a panel to air the problems of their countries. In looking retrospectively over the two semesters of club activity, the members agreed that a broader and more understanding outlook has been reached through the medium of new activities and projects.



W. A. A. will welcome more active members in the coming years to join in the wholesome opportunities it provides for good exercise and good companionship.




Men's Athletic Association






