

### SENIOR CLASS HISTORY

We suffered hazing week, practice teaching at Henry Barnard School, a nd training in the schools througout the State, but so have our predecessors. We held the Soph Hop, the Junior Prom. the Junior Class Banquet, Cap and Gown Dance, Commencement Ball, Senior Banquet, and our breaths, but that was not unusual.

We were not wholly wrapped up in ourselves, for in April, we feted the Freshmen at an informal party. The happy-go-lucky Freshmen made us forget, for a day, our forthcoming separation.

Now every minute, every hour, every day pointed toward the big event. First came Cap and Gown Day. If we were not obviously Seniors after that day, it was our own fault. We spent too much time in the cafeteria and could not don the costumes in time for chapel.

Next came May Day which really belongs to the Seniors, for a Senior plans it, the queen is a Senior, and the members of the queen's court are Seniors. In true Senior fashion, we displayed our beauties for the world to see. A beautiful day, a beautiful affair, and beautiful girls what more could we ask for? The month of May came to a close with the Cap and Gown Dance which was highlighted by the Grand March traditionally carried out by capped and gowned Seniors. The Senior Tea for parents began Commencement Week activities. Our parents joined with us to celebrate the beginning of our dependence. Vesper Services followed which gave us the spiritual elevation we had lacked midst he elamor of graduation.

The only occasions connected with commencement that took place outside the portals of school were the Prom and the Banquet. 



#### CHARLES CARROLL CLUB

In 1934, a men's club movement was introduced through the efforts of Professor C. O. Ethier. The men of the college, seven in number at that time, made up the nucleus which starred the tradition that all male students at R. I. C. E. belong to this social body. The new organization was named the Horace Mann Club, at first, in honor of one of the pioneers in United States Education.

In 1936, the title was changed to the

Charles Carroll Club to honor a distinguished R. I. C. E. faculty member with an outstanding record in the field of education in Rhode Island. Since its inception, the objectives of the club have been to foster friendliness, good will, and to reflect an attitude worthy of the teaching profession.

Throughout World War II, the few men who attended R. I. C. E. carried on the tradition. Since the end of the war, the influx of



men has made the Charles Carroll Club the largest organization in the history of the college. For this reason, a second room, dedicated to the memory of Rhode Island College of Education war-dead, was opened this year for the use of the men as a study hall. A mural, depicting Progress, was painted by Adrien DuPont, a member of the class of 1950.

As in the past, the Club held the first dance of the school year in October, 1949. Later, club members held an open house and an allcollege supper, proceeds from which went toward furnishing the new room.

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
