When asked how he perceived his fellow co-workers, he smiled and offered a wide variety of compli-ments including, "Everyone is easygoing; they all focus on get-ting the job done, are willing to ac-commodate to help those around them." As the chair of this department Dr. Randall is responsible for set-ting policies within the depart-ment, financial responsibilities of the departmental budget, distrib-uting course assignments to pro-fessors, and much more Also has fessors, and much more. Also, he teaches courses regularly, and this semester he has been spending a great deal of time at OASIS (Office of Academic Support and Information Services)

My first assumption regarding his involvement with OASIS was that it was due either to his position as chair, or that staff at RIC must volunteer there at some point in their careers. However, I soon found that Dr. Randall teaches a certain amount of courses and receives "load credit" to devote time to OASIS. When Dr. Randall is at OASIS during the beginning of the semester, he spends most of the time televe the time taking care of emergency scheduling problems with students who need to rearrange their courses for various reasons. He also helps with advisement services, which means he helps students focus on what their interests are in order to declare a major and/or pursue possible career options. The most often asked question he encounters when students are changing their major is, "What courses from my previous major will count towards the new one." When I asked Dr. Randall if he found being at OASIS a nice change of pace, he stated "Yes, it is a chance to be out of the class-room and socialize with a new group of people. I also have the opportunity to learn about other majors and their requirements, general education requirements, and how students feel about their own experiences here at RIC

Having played valiantly, both teams shook hands as they proudly left the court.



continued on page 2 committee will meet sometime in March. The acceptance of this program could increase the enrollment of Psychology majors at RIC.

Dr. Randall feels some of the qualities of the student body with which he is most impressed is the energy of the students and their high motivational attitudes. On the downside, some complaints from students include not getting into the course they want, not enough sections available, not enough sections available, not enough night sections, and the lack of an adequate lounge area for the Psi Chi club meetings and study groups (such as the ones located in the History Department, Nursing Department, and Philosophy Department).

How can these problems be resolved? Dr. Randall feels these are all reasonable requests but that there are just no specific answers. The staff in the Psychology Department is currently faced with inadequate space issues of their own, as some of them are not even located in Horace Mann (the location of the Psychology Department). This has been a "long standing" problem that was first brought to his attention in September 1993 when he became the department chairman.

In an official review of the Psychology Department, it was noted that the need for additional space for research, a student lounge, offices, and class space was desperately needed. Although given an "efficient" rating, the department has dealt with "...a cruel discrepancy between what we need and what we have for space and facilities." Since 1994, committees had been looking for space. Approval for a move to the Henry Barnard School came from John Nazarian. There was no money available to fix the HVAC system, however, so the move never happened.

Now, in 1999, the proposal has been submitted once again, but it means the Communications Education Departments would have to move to Horace Mann or elsewhere. Another proposal is to move to the east campus, which is not very practical for faculty and students. None of these proposals are written in stone and, since it affects other departments, there needs to be more consideration of the possible options.

Dr. Jill Chafetz, assistant professor of Psychology, has been borrowing an office in Gaige Hall from a professor on sabbatical leave for the spring. Two weeks ago, she was asked to vacate that office in the middle of the semester. Where will she go? She's moved to Adams Library, room 102, which is an office that closely resembles the size and shape of a janitor's closet.



## **Incorrect Thoughts**

## What's the spark that lights the fire?

I thought I knew what I was going to write about this week, until something happened yesterday that I'm still sorting through and dealing with.

I'm student teaching at East Greenwich High School, and one of my classes deals with print and broadcast journalism. For their most recent articles, I gave my students leeway for their subjects. One of my brighter students, who is black, decided to ask students their feelings regarding the lack of diversity at the school. For the most part, their comments were good, though predictable ("we need more," that sort of thing). There was one, though, who offered something far different. This student, who was

This student, who was promised anonymity for the interview, offered nuggets of learned wisdom, including an announcement of the "superiority" of the white race and how "niggers" and others "like them" don't have any place in the school.

I believe the author of the article talked to this student and did not make anything up. Further, she is certain he was serious, and not just having "fun" with her. We talked about it after she first showed it to me, and she was not as much upset as disturbed, much like I was. I told her I thought it was brave of her to continue talking to the "superior" student and taking down his comments.

I have to confess to being somewhat shocked by the comments, mainly because they occurred in East Greenwich. Without a better way of saying this, I can "understand" how such thoughts arise in economically-depressed areas where individuals look for people to blame or feel some superiority over. I wouldn't think it likely to happen in East Greenwich, though, where economic deprivation isn't especially common. Clearly, economics are not always the root cause of the growth of such feelings. Where else could they have come from? To be sure, he must have been exposed to the rantings of a chucklehead at some point, and they made a strong impact on him.

However, the exposure wouldn't have affected him unless he was ready to believe these theories. How did *that* happen? What made him ready to accept these "teachings?" Little money? Not likely. Poor parenting? Perhaps. A lack of self-confidence? Perhaps that, too. A lack of exposure to other people and ideas? Quite likely. A combination of all or some of those causes? Probably. However, other students have had to deal with those problems and have turned out fine. What's

the spark that lights the fire? I have a theory, based on my (limited) classroom experience; it's a variation of the domino theory. Certain students are "borderline," meaning their behavior is contingent on others' behavior. One student can "tip" them toward inappropriate behavior, while that student's absence keeps them in check. Such is the same with some "Aryan disciples." They lack something in their lives and, because something positive hasn't filled that void, room is left for something negative to move in and give them the "direction" they have been lacking. Positive role models could make all the difference in the world for these children.

I think a good way to deal with the article will be to read some of it in class tomorrow and discuss it. The author does not want to reveal who the student in question is, and I'll respect that and make sure everyone else does, too. At the very least, without discussing the specific student, we can discuss his "enlightened ideas." This could be one of the most important classes I ever teach.

I usually try to avoid responding to theater reviews, but what theater production was Mr. Plante discussing, and what was his point of view? It is unfortunate that he has apparently acquired a bad habit from *The Providence Journal*, whose editors delight in giving a theater review – whether good, bad, or "mixed" – a "clever," but misleading headline.

For example, one third of Mr. Plante's review consists of plot summary, one third contains positive remarks about two actors, the set, the stage crew and technical staff, and then there is a long, final paragraph which praises the entire production. Why has the review been given a negative (albeit "clever") headline?

**Re: Review of Noises Off** 

My primary concern, however, is with four sentences (in the middle of the review), which make very derogatory and inaccurate comments about most of the actors in the cast of *Noises Off*. To call "the movements of the players ... artificial," to refer to the delivery of the dialogue as "fake," and to say that these elements "lessened the realism of the play" seems to indicate very clearly that the reviewer knows little or nothing about the style of acting needed to play farce. ## RIC wrestling 1998/99 season

The Rhode Island College wrestling team closed the books on the 1998/99 season with a 14th place finish (9.50 points) at the New England College Conference Wrestling Association Champi-onships February 20 to 21.

The event was held at RIC for the first time in the school's history. The Anchormen posted a fi-nal overall record of 0-13 and were 0-4 in the Pilgrim Wrestling League.

Coach Tim Clouse resigned his position immediately following the NECCWA Championships to pursue new interests. He's been involved with RIC wrestling as a student-athlete, assistant coach, and the Head Coach for over twenty years.

Prior to taking the Head Coach-ing reigns in 1992, Clouse served as the Assistant Coach for 11 seasons. He helped guide RIC to five consecutive New England Titles (from 1988 to 1992). As the Head Coach, he compiled a career record of 45-81-1 in seven seasons at the helm.

Sophomore captain A.J. Aulson was having a solid season before breaking his right hand against Trinity College on January 16. He missed the final four

meets of the season. Aulson posted a final record of 7-11 in 18 matches at 141 pounds. One of his victories was by fall. He finished the season with 16 takedowns, 12 reversals, and 20 escapes. He posted a season-high four takedowns in a match against his opponent from New York University (Bergin) at the Roger Williams Invitational on November 14.

Sophomore Troy Lambert placed fifth in New England at 157 pounds at the NECCWA Championships. Lambert won four of six matches over the weekend. He posted a final record of 11-11 in 22 matches on the year. He totaled a team-high 24 takedowns, 13 reversals, and 12 escapes on the year. Lambert also posted a season-high four takedowns in a match against his opponent from Bridgewater Bridgewater State College (Decker) on February 13. He reg-College istered three takedowns and three reversals in a 13-7 win over his opponent from Southern Maine (Labrie) at the NECCWA Championships.

Junior Jeff LaPlante was 2-6 in eight matches at 125 pounds. He finished the year with eight takedowns, three reversals, and six es-

capes. LaPlante registered a season-high three takedowns in a match twice this season against his opponent from Wesleyan (Mc-Dousa) on January 13 and against his opponent from Oneonta State (Zarrilli) on January 16.

Senior Keith Larzarski was 1-4 in five matches at 174/184 pounds. Larzarski had two takedowns, two escapes, and one win by fall in the year.

Freshman Joe Manzello was 8-17 in 25 matches at 165 pounds. Manzello had 20 takedowns, 12 reversals, and a team-high 27 escapes on the year. He registered a season-high three takedowns in a match on two different occasions. He posted a season-high six escapes in a match against his opponent from Plymouth State (Kain) on December 2. He was credited with a season-high three reversals against his opponent from Trinity College (Chew) at the Springfield Invitational on November 21.

Senior Dan Saccoccio was 1-6 in seven matches at 157/165/174 pounds. He had five takedowns, one reversal, and nine escapes in the year. Saccoccio had a seasonhigh four takedowns against his opponent from WPI (Cook) at the Roger Williams Invitational on

Currently, his record stands at 44-44-1, which is his all-time as RIC's skipper. Under his leadership, Coach Ernst's teams have captured two Little East Conference Championships, one in 1994 and the other in 1995.

As a competitor, Coach Ernst was a four-time RI Closed Tennis finalist, and a state champion in 1969. He won the RI Open in 1968, and was a three-time finalist. His credentials continue with six-time RI Tennis league singles finalist, and a three-time champion. Over a period of eight years,

## RIC gymnasts travel to 1999 NCGAs

RIC Head Women's Gymnastics Coach Kim Zeiner joined the two on the trip. Each of the gymnasts kept a personal journal of their experiences during the trip. The following article is from their journal entries.

#### • Friday, March 19, 1999

Amy: First day of the championships. Since the meet began at 5 p.m., I had a significant amount of time to collect my thoughts. Throughout the entire day, my mind was preoccupied with the upcoming competition. I was able to spend this final experience with teammate and friend, Elise. This was a new experience for her and will be the last for me. Looking at her, I reflected back on my past three experiences at the Nationals and how exciting and fun these times really are.

During the meet, I remained focused on every event. Beam was first. I reinforced this thought over and over: "This is it. This is the last time you'll be doing this. Give it your best, you've worked hard, let's prove it." I finished with my best beam routine ever From then on, the competition escalated. As a whole, I was extremely pleased with each performance. I could not have asked for a better meet. I did my best on each event and I was glad to finish up my career on a positive note.

At the awards ceremony, I didn't know I was going to place. In fact, it didn't matter. I was content with what I achieved so far. I could not have asked for anything else.

I finished ninth in the country all-around competition, making me an All-American. Kelley Garrison handed me the award and said. "I watched you throughout the meet and I noticed your confidence, determination and focus on each and every event. Great job, Amy.

Elise: We are done! Amy and I did well. Amy ended her gymnas-

tics career with a bang. I couldn't have asked for more.

I stuck (didn't fall off) beam at Nationals and that's all I wanted. I finished 22nd in the country with a score of 9.0.

The meet was long, but tons of fun. All of the teams were so supportive of their teammates and all the other gymnasts. I met a lot of new people and shared the anxiety with them. We were all in it together and knew what everyone else was feeling.

I said earlier that I usually do not get nervous, but I did right be-fore my event. I saw my name across the screen and I realized that I was at the Nationals. I tried to focus. All I kept repeating in my head was: "You can do this." I convinced myself that I would live whether I struck or fell.

At the end of the meet I felt as though a weight was lifted off my shoulders.

Elise: After checking out of the hotel, we headed for the Mall of America. It was a nice relaxing day until we tried to find another hotel. After an hour and what seemed like 25 hotels, we checked into a Super 8 Motel for the night. Tomorrow we are heading home.

#### • Sunday, March 21, 1999

Elise: Despite having run and catch the plane, we made it and had a safe flight back to Boston. We all managed to get home be-fore 11 p.m. During the long van ride from Boston to Providence,

## Star Wars: The Phantom Menace Trailer II keeps audience anticipating





## Analyzing Analyze This

Analyze This, a film directed by Harold Ramis (Ghostbusters, Groundhog Day), stars Billy Crystal as Ben Sobol, a single father and a psychiatrist who is over-shadowed by his successful shrink op, and Robert Deniro as Paul Vitti, a stressed-out mob boss of bosses who misses his pop. Although Crystal and Deniro

seem like an unlikely duo, they share excellent chemistry on screen. Ben Sobol is just the typical lousy family shrink, who cannot seem to get out from under his father's overshadowing success. He's trying to raise his overweight son by himself, and plans to marry Lori (Lisa Kudrow of Friends and Opposites of Sex) on a Miami vacation. Sobol's life is fairly ordi-nary until he meets Paul Vitti in person.

Vitti seems to be loosing his edge, which could be trouble when it comes to his profession. Vitti is to meet all of the bosses, from all the families across America, two weeks down the line at a secret location somewhere in up-state New York. It is the second at-tempt to have this special meeting of all the bosses, since the first one in 1957, was spoiled by the Feds. If Vitti is to show any sign of weakness he would be easily disposed of by other bosses (namely Chazz Palminteri), who wishes to take his place. At his request, Vitti suggests he sees a psychiatrist. As it turns out, a day earlier in a

chance meeting, Sobol rear-ends the car of one of Vitti's associates.

It is the beginning of a life altering adventure for both Sobol and Vitti. Vitti is able to beat his stress, as well as change Sobol's out-look toward his own problems. The first real meeting between

them takes place in Ben Sobol's office in which, after fifteen minutes of talking, Vitti thinks he is cured of his stress. When Vitti discovers that the session really did nothing for him, he follows Sobol to Miami, kidnaps him, and demands another session, and another session, and so on ... (Sounds a little like the plot line of a 1991 film starring Richard Dreyfuss and Bill Murray, doesn't it?) Throughout the course of the story, the FBI gets hold of infor-mation that Vitti is being counseled. The FBI try to force, and when that doesn't work, to trick

Sobol into helping them. They wire Sobol and send him off to dinner with Vitti and his as-sociates, but when Sobol learns something about Vitti's past, a se-cret that Vitti never mentioned, Sobol loses the wire, and is finally able to help Vitti make a life altering decision. Disclosing the secret Vitti's stress will give to much of the movie away; it's just something you'll have to see for yourself.

The film also co-stars several familiar Mafia movie faces, including a scene that features a Martin Scorsesse look-alike. This film is extremely well put to-

A statement such as this signifies that the battle-hardened veteran has lost his youthful ideals ... ideals that he sees in Danny



## The Wee Yello' Piper Cub: November Seven-eight-eight-zero-two...

#### by Mark McConnell

The earth behind the perspex canopy darts before my eyes, the desert landscape flowing beneath; tracking behind the Piper Cub's tiny tail wheel – fine dust lines amid bursts of exploding dust clods in scars on a dirt strip...

The painted white tyres blink at me in the closing rays of sunlight as I pass them on the taxi-way. I turn the corner at the end of runway Zero Eight and begin by lining up the Piper Cub: 'Whetstone traffic, November 7-8-8-0-2 lining up runway Zero Eight for immediate departure, Whetstone traffic...' I slowly edge the power lever forward and the fragile yellow fabric-covered '47 Piper Cub inches ahead: tail wheel now straight. The growing revolutions of the engine signals something is a-brewing. With the tail wheel straight I push the lever ever forward with patient expectancy... Our velocity gradually grows as the revolutions increase. The yellow speck on the horizon begins to slither across this red Arizona dustbrush heap. Mesquite trees, cows and cacti scattered prodigiously around; with the looming ridge of the Whetstone and Huachuca mountains leering at me.

With the engine at full power I begin: feathering the stick forward until the nose begins to gradually lower and the tail wheel starts to rise from the dirt strip. Then, the struggle to keep this bird pointing into prevailing gusts like a wind cock begins: my feet work the rudder pedals like I'm standing on hot coals: the tail wheel boogie. My right arm begins to ache from holding back the stick against the increasing wind resistance on the elevator... Then, quite expeditiously and with little more than a hint the yellow Cub lifts an inch or two, then one foot...two...three...and we're aloft... I feel unencumbered; lifted from the monotony of land-restricted existence with nothing between me and the growing altitude of air but plywood floorboards, steel frame, fabric fuselage, nuts and bolts, and a few control cables...

At night, I run through the pre-flight, the downwind checks, and contemplate the landings I've completed to date... I practice these repetitively, vividly on my mind's control panel: until you reach that point, like when you've consumed the same kind of food for two weeks straight – you no longer have an appetite...

Yet, somehow it's all different when you enter a cockpit. You browse the instrument panel, eying the oil pressure and noting engine temperature. You listen to the engine and acclimatize yourself to *engine speak*. In a tail wheel you begin to learn the fundamentals of flying by feeling the movements of the plane beneath you: 'flying by the seat of your pants...' You count the number of creases in your jeans after each flight and recall every tense moment afterward. You watch your airspeed with the eyes of a hawk. You gauge your height and elevation accordingly. You swoop in to the airstrip for landing and concentrate on coaxing the plane to the centre line of the runway. Surveying your surrounding predatory-like... Always abating, always vigilant, always weary.

The air flows beneath the contours of the fuselage and at times it even ebbs and flows like the waves at the beach; punishing you for all your endeavours to keep the aircraft on path, straight and level. Nature appears to battle with your wits. Some days you have control, others you fight with all the resilience you can assemble in those intense seconds of primitive conflict, while on the ground, dust devils – tiny elemental forces lash out on the surface and swirl below...

I decrease power; turn on carburettor heat. I sight runway Twofive and announce my approach manoeuvre. The Cub acts with fastidious agility. At times, when the pressure is beating upon your brow and beads of sweat pouring form your crown I'm unsure if the Cub is flying me or if I'm flying the Cub... I concentrate on my altitude, speed, and wrestle with the wind. My forearms growing tense pumped.

Today, the elements are your enemy, other days your ally. I fight to keep the wings straight and level, the altitude true. As I turn the imaginary corner drawn in my mind, I switch off carb heat and concentrate on the centre line of the runway. I watch for cross winds, constantly checking the airspeed. One eye remains permanently hooked on the airspeed indicator and the other upon the horizon and airstrip. Then, that dreaded moment arrives, those anxious seconds that grow heavier as you fall: the plane begins to sink, the air no longer wants to hold up the Cub. The stick comes back into my stomach and I feel ground energetically greet me once more. Relaxing only when the aircraft is safely and securely on the ground and in hangar, neatly packed away like a child's new untouched toy in its box. The three-point landing achieved successfully is as welcomed as a large splinter being removed from one's hand. Perhaps a little less painful, perhaps not ... Then I wonder, with instructor sitting half-dazed behind me: shall I return to that false cushion of security, with silent controls gleaming out at me? "Novemberseven-eight-eight-zero-two, out!"


