

tank on top of Adams Library. The fuel flowed from the roof into the campus storm drain system. Though the fuel itself followed the flow of gravity into the stream, fumes could be smelt all over campus due to the interconnectedness of the storm drain system. This possibly explains the reported diesel smell in the Student Union.

The Department of Environmental Management and North Providence Fire Department responded to the scene. The cleanup crews used absorbent materials to stem the flow of fuel which had turned the stream a bright pink color. Officials on the scene reported that they felt much of the fuel was contained and that the environmental damage was negligible.

Cleanup efforts continued into the early hours of Sunday as trucks pumped contaminated water into onboard tanks for proper disposal.



to Know More About Counseling, But Afraid to Ask?

Have you ever thought of going to talk to a counselor, but stopped yourself because of the stigma attached to ask-ing for help? For a lot of peo-ple, the thought of seeing a counselor stirs up a lot of neg-ative thoughts and feelings. ative thoughts and feelings. People often make comments like "Isn't getting therapy just admitting that I am crazy?" or "Don't counselors read too much into your problems, and make you feel like you're nuts when you're not?" Sometimes movies and the media feed this stigma. They make it seem as though counselors are out to stigma. They make it seem as though counselors are out to label everyone as "sick", mental hospitals are like the Hotel California ("you can check in but you can never check out"), and psychiatrists are drughappy doctors who are only interested in keeping people in a medicated fog at all times. Movies like Jack Nicholson's classic One Flew Over The Movies like Jack Nicholson's classic One Flew Over The Cuckoo's Nest, for example, show mental health professionals talking to the patients like they are children, overmedicating people, and hampering people's attempts towards creativity and self-suf-

ficiency.

The most important mes The most important message about mental health counseling college students need to know is this: whatever past stereotypes there have been about psychotherapy; going to counseling is no longer about being labeled as crazy or weak. It's not about being humiliated just because you asked for help. Psychotherapy, particularly as it is practiced at Rhode Island College, is about developing as a person. about developing as a person. It's about intelligent, compe-It's about intelligent, competent people seeking help for their problems in a confidential, respectful way. It's about being mature and taking care of yourself and your problems; not letting problems fester and hold you back from

A recent study of college counseling centers found that contrary to popular belief, the people who tend to seek therapy on campus are NOT stereotypically weak people who are destined to fail. Rather, they are more often campus leaders, students with high GPA's, and highly creative and open-minded students who have enough matudents who have enough maturity and insight to know when they need help. They are "do-ers" and "thinkers"; people

Then Read This. who seek to actively resolve the pain in their lives, rather

than be controlled by it.

This study indicates a possible change in the negative stereotypes of psychotherapy.

Some recent portrayals of counseling in movies and television seem to echo this change in attitude. In the movie "Good Will Hunting", for example, counseling is the lynchpin of positive change for Matt Damon's character. Damon's relationship with his therapist is integral to his healing after an abusive child-hood. Shows like "The Sopranos" are also breaking stereo-types. Instead of showing a therapy patient as the hysteri-cal, incompetent, and highly traditional female; the show has a very macho, non-tradi-

tional character admitting he needs psychotherapy. But even if the negative stereotypes are changed, the question remains for many people: "How would I know when to refer myself or a

Some people have no major trauma in their lives, but want to use counseling as a way of en-hancing their self-esteem, and hancing their self-esteem, and of promoting their own development to become the best version of themselves that they can be. In counseling they gain insight and self-awareness, and enhance their skills for dealing with life.

For other people, seeking counseling is a response to some major stressor. There are some specific signs that you should be aware of that indicate that someone is under severe emotional distress.

vere emotional distress.

Dramatic Changes in Behavior

Change is key in identify-ing if someone is in distress If you witness a dramatic change in appetite, weight, mood, energy level, sleep, or ability to function, you may be witnessing someone who is in severe emotional distress.

Signs of Trauma or De-

pression
Some signs of trauma or depression are excessive sad-ness or tearfulness (the person ness or tearfulness (the person is literally unable to stop crying and cannot function in their daily lives for over two weeks, or they are haunted by thoughts of meaningless or death); flashbacks (actually reliving some past trauma); self-harm (cutting, hair pulling, burning); loss of time

(the person "spaces out" and is unaware of their surroundings for a significant period of time); and loss of energy and motivation (the person is not interested in the things they normally are interested in, and there is a dramatic dron in enthere is a dramatic drop in en-

Signs of Substance

To identify if someone's substance use has crossed the line, keep your eye out for things like showing up to class or work under the influence, black outs, excessive ab-sences due to hangovers, and excessive risk taking. Addi-tional warning flags are finan-cial problems that don't make sense. This is a possible sign

sense. This is a possible sign that rent or tuition money is going for drugs.

There are obviously many other signs of distress, all of which cannot be listed here. Luckily, the Counseling Center on Rhode Island College's campus is free, so if you have questions or concerns. questions or concerns, you can come to the center and ask a psychologist free of charge. If you are not interested in getting therapy, you are also welcome to stop to the center at any time to peruse our books and self-help materials that address a variety of issues. Whether you need to see a therapist or just need to get information about a specific issue, don't let an outdated stereotype about psychology stop you from getting the help you need. The Counseling Center is located in 130 Craig Lee Hall, one door down from the Student Life Office.

'Pimps and Ho's' Party at FSU Law School Causes Outrage

TALLAHASSEE. Jean-Simon, a black Florida State University law student, is stunned that white students don't understand why dressing up as black prostitutes and pimps offends her.

"Pimps and whores come in all colors," said Jean-Simon. "But when you put on afro wigs and gold chains, you offend a major-ity of us. And you don't seem to care if you offended us."

Jean-Simon spoke at Tuesday's "town meet-"town meet-ing" at FSU's College of Law after a group of law students organized 'Pimps and Ho's Party" Ho's Friday Painted Lady, a local bar near campus.

S o m e whites at the party report-edly wore costumes, in-cluding Afro wigs and fake gold chains, to look like pros titutes and

pimps in 1970s-era "blaxploitation" films. Those films, such as "Superfly" and "The Mack," often had criminal characters that reinforced negative stereotypes

One major theme emerged from Tuesday's meeting: Some white students didn't understand how Friday's party was offensive, which further upset already-irate black students.

At noon, hundreds of teachers, students and alumni packed the auditorium, including Circuit Judge Nikki Clark and Senior As-sistant Attorney General John D.C. Newton, both of whom graduated from the law school.

After a lively back-and-forth,

law school Dean Don Weidner said the dialogue would continue

said the dialogue would continue in small group sessions in the coming weeks. No student or school money was used to support or promote the party, he said.

"It's clear there's some misunderstanding about how people feel," Weidner said. "We need to be more understanding of the points of view of others." points of view of others.

The controversy started last week when the party was advertised in e-mails and on fliers as the 3rd Annual P&H Party, "proudly" sponsored by the Student Bar Association. The association was going to help promote the party and ing to help promote the party and collect donations at the door for charity, said Kelly Moss, SBA president.

But the fliers and theme of the party created a storm of opposi-tion from some students and fac-ulty members. As a result, said Moss, the SBA decided to withwhites, Asians and Hispanics to-gether, having a good time. It was very, very tame

Pedro Malaret, a third-year student who is Puerto Rican, agreed. Malaret also said he man-ages his own hip-hop production company and works with many

company and works "It's been around for three years and nobody complained before," he said. "It's never been a racial thing. The Afro was a common hair style in the Seventies."

Cydnee Williams, a black first-year student, said that

"Did I hear anything that would make me want to open a file? No," Newton said. "Do I have complete information? No. "I left as one alumnus who

felt that the school faced the issue quickly, publicly and correctly," he added. "As a child of the South, I was reminded of how far we

have come from overt racism, and also how far we have to go."



The New Add-Drop Policy

A recent amendment to the Student Handbook now allows students to drop a class until the last week of classes, with the permission of the instructor. President John Nagarian appropried the dent John Nazarian approved this amendment on Friday, January 25th, to be effective immediately. This adjustment to the Student Handbook Section 3.5.7 makes it Handbook Section 3.3.7 makes at less difficult to drop a course after the mid-semester. Previously, it was required that the student ob tain a Special Drop form from the Records Office. This form was to be filled out and then approved by the course instructor and the appropriate academic dean. If a student wished to drop a class dur-ing the last two weeks of classes, he/she would have needed to ap-peal before a panel to review the circumstances

According to the new amend-ment, however, the student only needs the permission of the in-structor. The student must, of course, exhibit extenuating cir-cumstances to warrant the drop. Academic difficulty in a cour alone is not a justified reason for dropping it in the last week. And as outlined in the Student Handbook, tuition refunds are only available at one-hundred percent during the two-week Add period. After the Add period, students will be unable to be reimbursed for dropped classes



An Outline of a R.I.C. Policy

Academic Probation:

As a service to you, the R.I.C. community, the Anchor will be publishing some college policies (as stated in the Student Handbook), which you may or may not have been aware of. The first of such policies addresses academic probation:

Academic Probation

A student who attains the minimum cumulative grade point average index to remain in college (see Academic Dismissal), but who fails to reach the minimum for the next higher level, will be placed on probation.

A student placed on academic probation shall be restricted to registering for a maximum of 12 credits of course work, until such time as the student's cumulative index is raised to one step above the minimum required.

At the end of each fall semester, spring semester, and summer session II, students will be placed on academic probation based on the above

1. Students on academic

probation will receive written notification from the Records Office with an explanation of the consequences and policies relating to probationary sta-tus. A copy of the probation notification letter will be sent to the student's academic ad-

visor.

2. Students on academic probation will be held to a seprobation will be held to a se-mester course load limit of 12 credit hours (or 13 credits with one four- credit course). If a student placed on proba-tion fails to adjust a course load exceeding this limit for which he or she has previously registered. the appropriate registered, the appropriate dean will adjust the schedule and notify the student of the action taken.

3. Students on academic

probation will be monitored as follows:

a. Approval of the stu-dent's faculty academic advi-sor or major department will be required for access to the next registration(s). There-fore, students placed on pro-bation at the end of the fall se-mester will need advisor ap-proval to register for the next summer session and/or fall semester and students placed on probation at the end of the

spring semester and/or Sum-mer Session II will need adviner session if will need advi-sor approval to register for the next spring semester.

b. Midterm grade reports
will be sent to students on aca-

demic probation and their advisors.

4. Students on academic probation may receive fo-cused academic assistance and support from the College in

the form of: a. A self-assessment instrument administered through the Academic Development Center designed to help students identify factors contributing to their poor academic performance and to suggest appropriate ways to address those factors.

b. Conferences with their faculty academic advisor or another member of the stu-dent's major department designated by the department

Six months ago Rhode Island College freshman Jason Har-ris didn't think he would be play-ing college basketball, let alone becoming an impact player. Despite his thoughts, Harris has been a bright spot for the Anchormen in a

bright spot for the Anchormen in a season with little light.

Harris, who was an all-star football and basketball player in high school, had his hopes set on playing college football. "I applied to all football schools but it fell through for me. Then I got recruited by Coach Johnston [last season's interim Head Coach]," says Harris. "During try-outs I was saying to myself 'I don't think I can play at this level.' The other guys at try-outs were really talented and I just didn't think I could compete with didn't think I could compete with

Harris ended up making the team and becoming the starting power forward for the Anchormen. This season has been a tough one for the team, posting only a 1-19 overall record and a 0-9 record in

the Little East Conference.

However, Harris's season has been solid. He is leading the

team in scoring with 9.4 points per game. He is second in rebounding game. He is second in rebounding with 6.7 rebounds and third in steals. He scored a career-high 22 points and grabbed ten rebounds in the team's lone win of the season against Bridgewater State on Jan.

The team is looking forward to next season and plans on working hard during the off-season. "I can guarantee I will be ready for next season," Harris says adamantly. He plans on getting into
















Remo's art takes time to complete itself


who feel exactly the same, it's nice

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The Royal Tenenbaums

Directed by Wes Anderson, this atypical film centers on an eccentric absentee father Royal Tenenbaum (Gene Hackman), who fakes a terminal illness to try and get his family to love him again. Barring him from entering is his estranged wife Ethe-line (Angelica Houston) and his children, who happen to be famous Tenenbaum child-geniuses: now three jaded adults struggling with their former sta-tus. Chas the business expert (Ben Stiller) is now a neurotic widower overprotecting his two sons. Margot (Gwyneth Pal-trow) won a Pulitzer Prize as a child playwright, and now spends six hours a day in the bath, appearing in public under black kohl eyeliner and fur coats. Ritchie the tennis pro (Luke Wilson) retired after a disastrous televised match: now traveling around the world on a ship, pining over his secret love for his adopted sister Margot. As all the Tenenbaums find themselves gathered under the same Manhattan roof for the first time in seventeen years, humor, sar-casm, hatred and pure dysfunc-

tion incur. The soundtrack consists of mostly unknown artists and symphony movements. The choices, although sometimes odd, are unexpectedly moving. During moments with Margot, the theme from Peanuts "Christman Time is Here" plays softly the theme from Peanuts "Christmas Time is Here" plays softly in the background. Instead of seeming silly, it washes a poignant feel over the whole scene. The attention to detail is excellent as well. Each character has a specific style, which transcends from the clothes they wear to the posters and trinkets in their rooms. These fine points in their rooms. These fine points create a little world around each character, helping us as an audi-ence to uncover their secret per-sonalities visually, instead of re-lying solely on dialogue and ac-

Their next release "The Light at the End of the World" appeased the wolves, however. Not only did it incorporate their older, deathmetal sound with their newer, droningly gothic ambiance, but they did it tastefully, seamlessly, and with more passion than most had heard in years. The phenomenon that was My Dying Bride had returned, darker, heavier, and more beautifully tragic than ever.

Their latest release, "Dreadful Hour", is no exception to this ominous sound and, in my opinion, is, musically, one of their best ever. Their newest keyboardist, Yasmin Ahmid seams together an atmospheric backdrop to the obsidian melodies and harmonies

Much has been spoken of Gene Hackmans's performance, which is well-deserved. Hack-man's Royal Tenenbaum is animated, unruly, full of quirks and wry observations about life, intelligence, and forgiveness. Despite the unkind things he did in spite the unkind things he did in the past, it is impossible to want anything but redemption in the eyes of his family. He's just too entertaining to hate. One of the more surprising performances comes from Ben Stiller. Instead comes from Ben Stiller. Instead of relying on physical comedy (such as 2001's Zoolander) he's compelling as the hyper-paranoid father still grieving the death of his wife. His delivery of a simple line, "It's been a rough year", is a shot to the gut, and so full of meaning it explains his full of meaning it explains his entire role in the film. Luke Wilson blew away all expectations with his portrayal of Ritchie Tenenbaum. Seemingly the most together of all the Tenenbaum children, his truth is understated, but deeply wrenching.

Intriguing performances form in the subplots of the film.

Owen Wilson plays the child-hood friend next door, now a drug-addicted author who "allower wanted to be a Tenenarug-addicted author who "al-ways wanted to be a Tenen-baum". Danny Glover and Bill Murray make the most of their limited screen time, and their quiet devotion to Etheline and Margot is a welcome release from the stifled family relation-ships

ships.

With the obvious "star power" of this film, one might expect to see glimmers of stereo-typical behavior emerging from these well-known actors. In-stead, everyone immerses themselves in their quirky, sometimes unflattering roles. In turn, this movie becomes a complex state-ment of how strange family, love, and fate can be. The Royal Tenenbaums is an odd little film with truly original characters and a poignant, moving story.



that can be viewed in his RIC exhibit, entitled "Video Studio For Insects," features a colony of ants.
This is no ordinary and colony how. This is no ordinary ant colony, how-ever. The large mound of sand in which these 3000 red ants make their home is placed in the center of a large disk, eight feet in diameter, not unlike a tremendous petrie dish. On the perimeter of the disk are af-fixed two camcorders that are con-Guests who visit the web site can actually control one of these two cameras. In this way, viewers from all over the world can watch as the ants expand their colony to cover more and more of the disk. Like the waterspiders, this project creates for the viewers a way to experience a new form of social interaction.

Remo's art takes time to com-plete itself, so to encourage the ants to expand faster, he periodically wa-ters down the mound, collapsing some of their tunnels and forcing them to rebuild. Each time the ants rebuild, the colony expands. Between the waterspiders and

the ants, I began to wonder if Remo had a special interest in bugs. When

I asked him, though, he told me that his fascination is not so much for bugs as for animal life in general. As an example of this interest, Remo gave me a few details of his next project. Imagine an enormous maze, he told me, covered with Plexiglas. Within this maze lives a family of rats, as well as a couple of rat-sized robots. These robots are equipped with cameras and remote controls; and, like the cameras in "Video Studio For Insects," are able to receive orders from the Internet. Viewers will therefore be able to explore the maze from the rat's point of view. They will also be able to interact with the rats – spy on them, chase them, and be chased by them. The interactive possibilities of a project like this are endless.


Other projects of Remo's are not all interactive, but are all equally innovative. For instance, travelers flying into T.F. Green airport may someday be able to witness his "Providence Star," a series of blue lights, blinking simultaneously, that are placed on proftons and other elare placed on rooftops and other el-evated locations throughout down-town Providence so that they form town Providence so that they form the shape of a star. This project would also be virtually mainte-nance free, as the lights would be powered by solar cells that charge themselves during the day. Remo hopes that this project will be ac-cepted by Rhode-Islanders in the same way that Waterfire is.

Another of Remo's eventual projects consists of a series of "artistic robots," small steamroller-like

machines that will create sand art

machines that will create sand art based on random motion. This is another project in which he hopes to include his "robot-club."

These are only a few of the projects that Remo Campopiano has brought and will bring to our community. His combination of art and technology is fascinating, as are his creation of artificial social interaction and his unique perspectives on natural social interaction. His concern with allowing viewers to interact with his art is innovative as well. act with his art is innovative as well. Anyone interested would do well to watch his website, www.remo.net, for information on further projects, as well as details on current projects, and when his Waterspiders will be in Providence (sometime next summer, although he doesn't know exactly when they will be back in Waterplace Park). Also, be sure to check out his exhibit, which is set up in Roberts Hall and will remain so until this coming Friday. Fans of both art and cutting edge technol-ogy will find it well worth the look.

My primary function in this newspaper is photo editor. Therefore, when I heard that Remo Campopiano was bringing his techno-artistic Waterspider exhibit to Rhode Island College, my first thought was to take some pictures for our center spread. When I saw exactly what Remo's art was, however, I knew that The Anchor had to feature an article on this fascinating exhibit.

The idea for the Waterspiders actually came from Remo's friend, who had already done some artistic work with this theme. Remo added a unique flavor, however, when he combined his art with robotics to create the Wa-

with this theme. Remo added a unique flavor, however, when he combined his art with robotics to create the Waterspiders. This project, which is about two years old, is concerned primarily with creating a social component in the "lives" of Remo's creations. They were originally conceptualized as a "family" of floating robots, which would eventually be able to live on their own, with little intervention from the outside world. The robots are not quite maintenance free at this time—they still require but quite maintenance free at this time - they still require hu-

mans to guide them, via remote control, to the center of a body of water before they can begin their random motion. Eventually, Remo hopes to include in the spiders a component that will allow them to move about the water without fear of colliding with each other. He originally hoped to use infrared to serve this need, but found it not noped to use infrared to serve this need, but found it not powerful enough. He next thought of sonar, but that was too easily confused by the waves and plumes of water created by the robots. Currently, Remo hopes to use something called a radio ID tag, which will enable each spider to "know" where it is in relation to the other spiders. According to Remo, this addition to the robots will even make them capable of synchronized movements such as dances. such as dances

such as dances.

The project is proceeding at its own pace. Hopefully a new generation of spiders will be ready within a couple of years. With each generation of "smarter" Waterspiders that the project produces, however, members must be concerned with funding. According to Remo, certain corporate sponsors, such as Volkswagen and RoJacks, have been generous towards his work, and he has also depended on equipment donations.

Remo, whose education has been primarily in sculpture (and partly obtained here at RIC), depends on people with technical expertise to provide him with schematics, technological info, etc. His experience with people trained in these fields, however, has proven educational. In addition, Remo extends the educational value of these projects to kids who enjoy working with robotics. Orig-
