She also tries to teach her students that as young people they have so much possibility in their lives, but to find it they must be will-

in their lives, but to find it they must be will-ing to "go deeper than the surface." Just as every artist does, Melody has developed her own teaching and dancing philosophies over the years. Her "essence of teaching is really about spirit," she says. Her secret to reaching out to all her students is to adapt the class to different personalities and individuals. She tries to make dance a "com-mon language" and masks the difficulty of the course by making dance so inviting and com-fortable. "I learn from myself [and] I learn from my weaknesses," says Melody. One side of Bannister Gallery's walls has been thoroughly covered with Afghan war rugs, and somehow depicts Afghanistan's chaos and unrest during the eighties. On the other side, dozens of photographs taken in the mid to late seventies, before the Soviet Union invasion, illustrate calmness with landscapes of Afghanistan. In the center of it all, John Kelly, one of the co-founders of the Afghan Media Center in the Northwest Frontier Province of Pakistan, relives his experience of just a few months ago when he had filmed the emergency loya jirga, an elective grand council private meeting where a new leader was to be elective grand council private meeting where a new leader was to be chosen in Afghanistan.

"It's a historic get-together where everyone, strictly democrats meet in a very old-fashioned way" says Kelly of the loya jirga. The United Nations would have to run the elections in every district of the country,

Nations would have to run the elections in every district of the country, where at least two observers were required for the meetings. The film professor of Boston University, John Kelly, was to be one of them. A major drawback however, was that the number of districts had not yet been collected when Kelly entered Afghanistan at the end of last spring. The purpose of his visit and filming of the loya jirga was to help Afghans share their stories. "They needed a way to get their story out to the outside world," says Kelly. But whenever reporters tried to reveal what was happening in Afghanistan, "they were immediately killed." "It's impossible for them (Afghans to tell their story) because no one can go into the country." And when someone does get in (the country) he says, "If you can't get around by helicopter, it's almost impossible to get around by car."

to says, if you can't get around by hencopies, it's unlost impossible to get around by car." "There are millions of landmines," says Kelly, "and they look like toys." Children often step on them accidentally blowing off the land-mines. "I had never seen so many legless people in my entire life...everywhere you walk you have to be careful," says Kelly. After a while, he says, "you just learn a way to walk," and acquire local knowl-

Campus Safety Measures Take A Front Seat

the walk-ways between Craig Lee and Clarke Science. "The wiring that had supported the lights for the walk-ways failed," explained Jim Bucci, the Assistant Director of Facilities and Operations. The black lamp posts surrounding the area were out and provided no comforting security for students who would be walking between the buildings after getting out of late classes. Craig Lee, in par-ticular, is one of the buildings where late classes are

late classes are held. Some of these late classes run as late as 9 p.m., and by that time it is too dark outside to feel safe while w a l k i n g around campus to find your car.

Physical Plant employ-ees took stu-dents' safety into account into account and proceeded to fix the problem immediately. Beginning this past Tuesday, Oct. 15, they dug trenches and put a conduit in the ground through which the wires could run the bares the could run through which the writes could thin through hence the caution tape. "The old wiring system was direct burial," explained Bucci. "Since the new one is buried in conduits, the wires will last maybe 20 to 30 years." ears.

This project, which was completed on Friday, Oct. 18th, exemplifies the fact that campus security is a pri-mary concern for the college administration. Bucci state that by the end of next week, the lights will be rein-stated and the grass will be there. "Everything will be nice again," he concluded

edge about the land. Weeks prior to the loya jirga, observers were losing enthusiasm for the event when they began to the event when they began to experience harsh realities of the country. "There are so many things we consider necessary in life that they don't have there", says Kelly mention-ing the lack of banks and mail cystems. In the meantime, Kelly systems. In the meantime, Kelly decided not to work with the United Nations.

United Nations. About four thousand troops assisted the problematic loya jirga where Kelly says elections were being fixed. He explains that although candidates were required to sign an agreement testifying that they had never been involved with terrorists, orms of them were actual crimisome of them were actual crimi-nals who tried to sabotage the elections. It was really never about terrorism, he says, it was always about money and the always about money and the cash capital was getting ruined in the process. "And as a press representative," he adds, "I was trying to connect the western media with the realities of Afghanistan." Most candidates were being

Most candidates were being forced out of the elections, imprisoned or killed. "Our job was to somehow communicate this to the western press," says

Kelly. In a country where firewalls against corruption is not exis-tent, and where Kelly says "the inflation is killing the economy," the government has gotten away with spending at least six million dollars in six years, money that is yet to be seen. The artis-tic heritage is another issue that instead of helping Afghan's economy, it's being smuggled out of the country to westerners. "The traditional way of life in Afghanistan has been corrupt-ed" he says ed,' he says

Meanwhile, the loya jirga was not going as planned as the underground efforts to fix the elections persisted. "Afghans elections persisted. "Afghans are so loyal and self-rightcous that they thought they could win these elections," he says. Some these elections, he says. Some thought they (elections) should be canceled while the United States decided to distance itself from the situation.

Eight hundred people were committed to the loya jirga and they could elect virtually any-one. However, about sixty per-cent of the elections had been fixed and only 160 women were allowed to participate in the process. "Afghans are underrep-resented and they fear that their vocal expressions will bring economic problems," says

What we have are gang-sters and thugs running the country," says Kelly referring to the figureheads of Afghanistan who consist of foreigners. They were useless and that's why they were chosen, he adds.

"They (Afghans) need a new political system, they need democracy," says Kelly. But democracy," says Kelly. But instead "we're giving them money whenever they com-

"They just don't want you going to Afghanistan and when you're there, they don't want you rocking the boat", he con-cluded.

Sexual Violence: Be Aware

Sexual assault or rape is defined as "oral, anal, or vaginal penetration or union with the sex-ual organ of another or the anal or vaginal penetration of another by any other object". The crime of date rape and sexual violence is becoming more and more of a problem for college students these days. Sexual violence is one of the most frequently reported crimes among college women. The United States Department of Justice statistics state that: I out of 3 women will be raped in their lifetime 77% of rapes are committed by people the victim knows 16% of rapes are not reported to the police The National Center of Sexual assault or rape is

16% of rapes are not reported to the police The National Center of Victims of Crimes reports that 1 in every 5 female college students report being forced to have sexual intercourse. These are serious and scary statistics. There are steps that can be taken to help keep you safe and not become a statistic. statistic

While walking through cam-pus, or anywhere for that matter, plan and know your route. Walk confidently like you know exactly where you are going. Avoid where you are going. Avoid alleys, isolated and badly lit areas. Anywhere where people are not Anywhere where people are here people are the present or within hearing distance (if you needed help) should be avoided whenever possible. If you feel or are scared that you may be being followed go into the

nearest building or populated area. If you have a cell phone on you, call someone

If you are getting into your car always have your keys already in hand. Always try to park in well fit areas and check the back-seat and underneath of your car before getting into it. Always keep the doors locked, even if you are in the car.

When on dates or in social situations, never leave your drink unattended and if someone wants unattended and if someone wants to buy you a drink go up to the bar with them. Never take your eyes off of the drink, even if you *think* you know the person you are with. There are various drugs that can be "slipped" into your drink and you will not know it until it is too late. For example: *Rohypnol*-alea known as *Roofles* or the also known as *Roofies* or the *Forget Me Pill-* it is odorless, tasteless and does not affect the look of the drink. They are approximately 10 times the strength of a Valium. Side effects include: drowsiness, impaired motor skills, impaired judgment, dizziness, confusion, amnesia, nausea, loss of inhibition and blackouts. *Rohypnol* remains in the blood stream for 2 to 4 hours and can be detected in ones urine for up to 72 hours. Another drug is GHB (Gamma Hydroxybutyrate)-also known as Liquid Ecstasy or Liquid E- it comes in a clear liquid form that

is also odorless, tasteless and does not affect the look of the drink. This is a central nervous system depressant that is abused for its intoxicating effects. Side effects include: nausea, dizziness, slow heart beat, decreased respiratory effort and blood pressure, lowered inhibitions, unconsciousness, amnesia, seizure-like activity and coma. GHB remains in the blood for 4 hours and the urine for 12 hours.

hours. Even if you know the assailant, call the police if you suspect that you have been a vic-tim of a drug related sexual assault. As stated before, 77% of victims know their attacker. Seek immediate medical attention since immediate medical attention since most of these drugs do stay in the system for up to 3 days. While it may be difficult for you to talk about the assault, it is usually better to get your emotions out in the open, rather than keeping them all bottled up. Call for support from agencies such as *RAINN* (Rape Abuse and Incest National Network) @ www.rainn.org or 1-800-656-HOPE. They will help you get through the situation and help you cope with the feelings that you are having. It is a myth that it is not rape if you do not fight back. If you have been inhibited by any of the aforemen-tioned drugs. you may have been unable to fight back, and therefore your rights have been raped. This article is meant to increase awareness and help to keep you safe in different situa-tions. An unsuspecting person is the best candidate for a sexual assault or rape to happen to. *ALWAYS BE AWARE!*

Hitman 2 Review

"Hitman 2" is Eidos' latest offering for the Xbox, Playstation2, and the PC. It follows the life of the series' main character, codename 47. The original "Hitman" was extremely difficult, almost to the point of frustration and the shoddy point of frustration, and the shoddy play mechanics left some people with a bad taste in their mouths. Fortunately, Eidos took note of this and has made adjustments in all the right places.

The game is still pretty tough, even on the easiest difficulty level. Most missions demand stealth gameplay for at least part of the level, if not the entire mission. But unlike the last installment, the game

controls very well. Cycling through your inventory, changing clothes, dragging bodies, and shooting are all done easily, so at least the game always seems tough but fair. There's an excellent balance between realism and enjoyability, in that 47 can take a multitude of bul-lets before dying, but he encounters so many enemies during the game that this is a necessity. 47 can wear any male clothes he happens to come across, which may seem a lit-tle odd, but I think that the designers made a wise choice by not having the player search around for an the player search around for an enemy with the same pant size in every level. Perhaps the biggest selling point of the game is the fact that "Hitman 2" affords the player different options in completing each mission. It's a game that relies part-ly on your shooting ability, and part-ly on your ability to come up with ly on your shooting ability to come up with solutions to problems. For exam-ple, in the first level, I happened to spot the mailman making his rounds. So, I quickly and quietly rounds. strangled him with fiber wire and put his clothes on. Now I could walk right up to the house I had to infiltrate with very little hassling from the guards. Once I got inside, I pulled out my piece and started spraying lead. In the graphics department, "Hitman 2" does not disappoint. The character models, for the most part, are pretty believable. Sometimes you might see some polygon clipping, but the visual are clean. There is a fair amount of background draw-in, but some of part, background draw-in, but some of the levels are so expansive that it's easily forgivable. Muzzle flashes are satisfying, and blood splatters realistically. Bullet wounds don't show up on people, but that's not something that most people are going to lose sleep over. The soundtrack for the game is awe-some, with many of the tracks actu-ally being done by a full orchestra. The voice acting is done well, which is a big improvement over the original game's canned diathe original game's canned dia-logue. The only gripe is that some of the gunshots sound a little thin. I would expect better effects out of a game that is otherwise pretty pol-ished. The game gets a few points added in the replay value category, simply because of all the weapons hidden in the levels, and all the dif-ferent approaches to each level. On the whole, "Hitman 2" was a very enjoyable and somewhat challeng-ing game. I'd recommend it to fans of the original, fans of "GTAIII," and fans of "Metal Gear Solid." However, in a complete-ly unforeseen maneuver, the ver-sion of the movie released is the much lauded Uncut Version. which had only previously been released in New Zealand. This uncut version is only ten minutes longer than the international version, but oh, what a different those ten minutes make! Before further extolling the

virtues of the Uncut Version, a short summary of the movie is required for those who have never seen it. *Heavenly Creatures* is set in Christchurch, New Zealand, in the 1950s, and it is about two teenaged girls who form an intense friendship. Juliet (Kate Winslet, in her very first movie role) and Pauline first movie role) and Pauline (Melanie Lynskey) are highly imaginative and romantic girls, and they quickly construct elab-orate fantasy worlds where pop idols like Mario Lanza ("the world's greatest tenor!") and James Mason are saints (and Orson Welles, "the most hideous man alive" is reduced to "It"). man alive", is reduced to "It"). The girls spend their time writ-ing novels about a mythical kingdom called Borovnia, which kingdom called Borovna, which they expect will be snapped up eagerly by successful New York publishing houses. They also make plasticine models of the characters and act out scenes from their stories. Alienated and shunned by their peers, they imagine that it is because they are far superior to them and they decide "how sad it is for every-one that they cannot appreciate our genius." But when their parents become worried over the effects this consuming relationship is having on their daughters, trouble arises. As things become more and more tense, the girls' immersion in their fantasies increase to terrifying proportions until finally, in a futile attempt to keep themselves from being sep-arated, the girls are pushed to an unthinkable extreme of murder. The most startling, horrify-

is that it ing part of this story is that it actually happened. The Parker-Hulme murder case is infamous in New Zealand; and many people had attempted to bring the ple had attempted to bring the story to the screen before. Perhaps it is a good thing that none of them succeeded, because I suspect that no one except Peter Jackson could have done it justice. His cinematic vision, devotion to detail, and love of New Zealand made him uniquely qualified for the job. As a matter of fact, it's a testa-As a matter of fact, it's a testa-ment to the extent of his careful researching of the film that he actually discovered the current

identities of girls, who were released from prison in the 60s, long before any reporters did, though he did not reveal this in order to keep their privacy intact

What the extended footage accomplishes mostly is to high-light the extreme gracefulness and genius of Jackson and his partner Fran Walsh's original script. While this is evident in the edited version of the film, there were certain points which in hindsight suffered; dialogue that come out halted and odd, actions and shots that left you slightly confused. This is almost completely eliminated in the

completely eliminated in the uncut version, and the viewing experience is consequently increased intensely. Some things which were cut were obviously done due to the gore factor. Missing or edited were some of the girl's more vio-lent fantasies, like when Pauline lent fantasies, like when Pauline imagines her parents dying at the dinner table, and Juliet's vision of a vicar being beheaded by the King of Borovnia is slightly bloodier than in the international release. Also eliminated was a shot of a tuberculosis victim

shot of a tuberculosis Victum coughing up blood in the sanato-rium Juliet convalesces at. Other scenes' deletions – like bits of dialogue, shots from montages, and a scene at a tennis match which, through flash-backs, contains development of some minor characters – are a some minor characters – are a mystery to me, as even at uncut length, the movie only clocks in at 109 minutes. All that I know is that the movie is much improved with them added!

If the exceptional quality of this longer version of *Heavenly Creatures* is anything to go by, we are definitely in for an extraordinary treat on November 12th when the Special Extended 12th when the Special Extended Version of Jackson's *The Lord of the Rings: The Fellowship of the Ring* is released on DVD and VHS. The thirty minutes added to that movie will more than likely make what is already epic and mesmerizing absolutely

awe-inspiring. Heavenly Creatures: The Uncut Version came out on DVD September 24th. Look at the Photographs at Bannister and See What Develops

Rather than bore you with some introductory details I'm going to jump with some introductory details, I'm going to jump

right in. The first photograph I'm

Ine first photograph I m going to go into detail about was "The City Gates." This picture, from April of 1975, showcased two riders passing through two large stone structures that were more than twice their height Now according to the card height. Now according to the card accompanying the picture, these structures served as guard post to the structures served as guard post to the city, a checking point if you will. This is good to know, but it's not important while viewing the picture. What's important is to look at the dramatic contrast in the sizes and colors of the "gates" and the people. The structures loom large and imposing, but have a dead, dull shade to them. The people, on the



other hand, are small and non-threat-

other hand, are small and non-threat-ening, but have vivid colors that seem lively. It might not seem like this at first, but if you look for a while, then the photo begins to tell you it's untold story. From here, I moved on to "The Lone Rider," photographed in April 1975. Now, at first, I completely missed the significance of the title, as I was lost in the rolling hills. It took a few minutes for me to realize that there was a tiny person, riding a horse. The rider is almost totally eclipsed by the mountains, but that is the theme. These lush, vibrant green

hills have a rhythm that flows like waves in the nke waves in the ocean. They climb higher and higher, towards the sky. The rider is small, riding forward on a dirt road, almost like he is about to be engulfed by the waves of the hill. It is like the land is living and has a motion that is constant. The photo is simply magnificent

cent. The previous two pictures dealt with landscape, but this next one is about the subject. The photograph, " The Slingshot," from April 24, 1978, is a boy with a slingshot around his neck. First, I must applaud the fram-ing technique, as the boy is perfectly in frame with the picture. As I stared at the photo, the boy is staring back, almost into you. His clothes, a dirty white full body piece, contrast with the dull landscape. As you look, you
