
If You Weren't With Us In Buffalo, You're Not Welcome In Houston

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

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Internet gives rise to a bold new era in college-student cheating

MILWAUKEE, Wis .- Sometimes, pure dumb luck saved him.

Take his freshman year at Marquette University, when he and a buddy turned in the same paper, which neither had written, to separate sec-tions of an introductory English course taught by different teachers

His friend got caught for cheating and earned an F He got an A, along with the teacher's writ-

ten comment, "Great paper!" Now, he is a senior in the business school,

and cheating remains a habit, though primarily in courses he doesn't care much about electives or general classes such as theology and ethics. Ripping off papers from Web sites is a favorite method.

"I don't feel guilty," said the student, who asked not to be identified. "I'm just trying to get by.

Thanks largely to the Internet; cheating has become much easier and easier to catch. New technology has spawned a multimillion-dollar industry of swindlers and those who police them, and forced professors to turn to creative methods of deterring and finding charlatans.

It's vexing for faculty because students often don't realize what they're doing is wrong, or

simply don't care. Donald McCabe, founding president of the Center for Academic Integrity at Duke University and a leading expert on academic dishonesty, has surveyed more than 50,000 students on cheating cinea 1000 Ha save it is a growing problem

since 1990. He says it is a growing problem. In 1999, he surveyed 2,100 students on 21 campuses, and found that 75 percent said they had cheated at some level in college during the past

cheated at some level in college during the past year. In 1999, 10 percent of students McCabe sur-veyed said they'd plagiarized off the Internet; in a 2001 survey, 41 percent said so. Part of the growth in cheating may have nothing to do with increased numbers of cheaters, he said, but may be because "students today are less reluctant to admit they've cheated." The case of conving off the Internet prob-

The ease of copying off the Internet prob-ably contributes to the lax attitude. Thanks to technology, cheating and count-er efforts largely revolving around plagiarism are a booming sector. Search engines such as Google can find over a million resources for students trying to how term papers come of which call for more them buy term papers, some of which sell for more than \$10 a page. The sites, such as FastPapers.com or EssayTown.com, offer thousands of papers on sub-

EssayTown.com, offer thousands of papers on sub-ject areas from oceanography to ethics. On the other end are companies such as iParadigms, which offers a special Internet-based program, called Turnitin to thousands of subscrib-ing academic institutions. The program-scans stu-dent papers and attempts to match them up to bil-lions of documents it has stored including obscure insural articles and whatever is available online. journal articles and whatever is available online

The company got started in the late 1990s and earns in the double-digit millions. Its client base representing more than 50 countries is expand-ing rapidly.

John Barrie, founder of iParadigms, said the company's goal is more to prevent cheating than to catch it. "One of the more counterintuitive obser-

vations I've had is that it's not primarily the lower-

achieving students that are doing this," he said. "It's the high-achieving students that have the most to gain. It's a pretty bleak picture regarding our future leaders.

Sean Currie, a junior at Marquette, has

seen his share of cheating. The main reason for it, he said, is pressure to do well. "If you don't get a 4.0 or a 3.5, you're going to die old and lonely in a gutter," Currie said. The 20-year-old added that the smartest cheaters

don't copy directly off the Web, but steal ideas. The Marquette business student who asked not to be named said that while time conaster hot be hand said that while this con-straints played a role in his cheating efforts, a lack of desire to do the work did, too. "Sometimes, you're lazy and it's late and you have to hand it in the next day, so you cut and paste." The deception upsets many. "I do all of my

work myself," said Jacqueline Lorenz, 23, a first-year law student at Marquette. "I'm under just as much pressure as they are, and I worked my way through college."

Universities have a variety of approaches to dealing with academic misconduct. Some require all cases to be reported to special committees, while others primarily let faculty deal with the matter. Some have strict honor codes, while others rely on student conduct guidelines. The severity of the punishments can vary dramatically, too, from expulsion to a lower grade. At Marquette, there's no central system of

tracking offenses, though administrators say they haven't seen a change in frequency, even though

they're unsure what the frequency, even though they're unsure what the frequency is. At the University of Wisconsin-Madison, a school of 41,552 students, only about 100 to 150 cases of academic misconduct are formally reported to the Student Advocacy & Judicial Affairs unit each year, while countless others are handled at the faculty or departmental level. Professors who choose to pursue cases beyond the classroom may find it difficult.

For many professors, deterring cheating is more attractive than trying to catch it. While the threat of using services such as

Turnitin- not to mention basic search engines helps, many professors use more creative methods, some

dating back to the pre-Web era. They use multiple versions of exams. They issue calculators during tests to prevent stu-dents from bringing in preprogrammed ones.

Some ban food and drink during tests (imagine: answers written on a coffee cup and hidden by a slipcover). Others let all the students use a notecard or have access to old exams.

Some insist students sign honor codes ahead of exams and on papers. Cathy Middlecamp, a distinguished faculty associate at UW-Madison, teaches a writing-intensive chemistry course, and has her students turn in papers in stages.

Above all, teachers watch for tell-tale signs, such as the student who has perfect prose

after a few paragraphs of run-on sentences. "You would be surprised how stupid some of the cheating is," said Virginia Sapiro, an associ-ate vice chancellor at UW-Madison. "I once had a student who plagiarized out of the textbook I wrote

carcinogen. It is a stimulant to the central nervous system. "In oway." "I definitely don't get a lot of sleep," indicated RIC senior and Resident Assistant, Michele Fannelli "When I go to bed after midnight. I feel like a zombie," she said. Fanelli often has to stay up after hours to make sure that quite hours are observed in her hall. She adds that she normally get between four and six hours of sleep a night. of sleep a night.

Amanda Ricard, a commuter freshman, gets about six hours of sleep. "I sometimes pull all-nighters, but I don't like doing that because then I fall asleep at school and work," she said. Ricard works an average of 25 hours a week. "I wish I could get more sleep, but I am usually at my boyfriend's or I am out." Ricard also noticed, having started college this semester that she used to get more sleep.

"I feel that he problem isn't sleep, but a scheduling prob-lem," stated senior, Jonathan Vincent. "Classes should not start at 8 a.m., but sometime after 9." Vincent works an average of 18

at 8 a.m., but sometime after 9." Vincent works an average of 18 hours a week, in addition to going to classes. A student, who wished to remain anonymous, regarded sleepy time as a waste of time. "I stay out late very night," this person began. "I go to class, and then I need my time to wind down. I get sleepy, but that is what caffeine is for. After all, this is supposed to be the best four years of your life!" Here are some tips to get more winks so you can think more clearly and cut down on stress related to lack of sleep:



More College Students Giving Textbooks A Pass

Ron Mozelewski teaches introductory economics pretty much by the textbook, one chapter after another. In his informal lectures, he refers often to specific pages where students can find information they'll need for tests

Yet more than a week into the new semester, only about half of his students have brought the assigned book to his class at St. assigned book to his class at St. Louis Community College at Florissant Valley. Some say they simply left it at home. Others plead good intentions, saying they plan to buy it. Mozelewski's experience they for they for the total of the say

tells him, though, that five to 10 students in this class of 25 or so will never get around to getting the book. He says that's the way it's been for several years in his classes and those of some of his colleagues. And they're worried about it.

So is the National Association of College Stores, which estimates that about 20 percent of undergraduates nationwide aren't buying, rent-ing or otherwise acquiring the books their professors expect them to have. In surveys, only about 42 percent of students have told the association they think textbooks are necessary.

The association is running a test campaign on 18 campuses to bring the situation to the atten-

tion of faculty members. "Faculty believes that hav-"Faculty believes that hav-ing textbooks correlates with stu-dent success," said Laura Nakoneczny, spokeswoman for the group, said they don't realize that more students "are just say-ing no to purchasing required books." No question that many stu-

No question that many stu-ts are put off by cost. The dents are put off by cost. The price has been rising rapidly as publishers have updated content, printed books on better paper, added color and graphics and, in some cases, packaged them with compact discs.

Gary Shapiro, a senior vice president of Follett Corp., which operates 680 stores on 550 col-

lege campuses around the country, puts the average price of a college textbook today at \$72.83.

And that's only the average. Joya Deutsch says she paid \$145 for an abnormal psychology book at Washington University this semester. The text for Mozelewski's

class less than an inch thick and with a paper cover goes for \$83. "If I don't have to buy the book, I'm not going to spend \$80," said Joe Finazzo, a student in the class. It's a course-by-course decision with him, depending on the professor and the subject. He says he would never, for instance, try to go text-free in a mathematics class. Steven Saville of Webster

Groves, Mo., is a student at the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign. He says some stu-dents there take the wait-and-see approach to textbook buying. "They don't get the textbooks at all, or they wait until they need them," he said.

And sometimes they don't. Saville recalls a physics course, for instance, in which all of the important material could be gleaned from lectures and class discussion. In a computer pro-gramming course, "it ended up being that the book that was recommended was just there for ref-erence," he said. "I bought it but I took it back."

Nobody is predicting that textbooks will go the way of slates and quill pens, but this is the digital age. Today's college students learn not just from the printed word but from the twistion printed word but from television and the Internet. Savvy profes-sors have learned to supplement books with new media.

"I have a sense that we are losing the attention of these younger people by being too book-oriented," said Van Reidhead, associate professor of anthropology at the University of Missouri at St. Louis. "I think we have to learn how to re-engage this shorter-attention-span group of people.

Reidhead, like many profes-sors now, requires less book and more online learning than he used to. He says he likes the Web

for the flexibility it gives him to create links to topics of special

interest that come up in class. Even so, Reidhead emphasizes to his students the very first day of class that he expects them to buy the text. Mozelewski expects the same, but he also accompanies his lectures with PowerPoint presentations summarizing the text's main points.


marizing the text's main points. Students even arrive at med-ical school, having gotten through college mainly by going to class, taking notes and using Web sites, says Dr. Randy Sprague, professor in the depart-ments of pharmacology and physiological science at St. Louis University's School of Louis University's School of Medicine. He describes their atti-tude as: "What do you need a textbook for? Half the textbook is on the Web anyway." Not all of the book nonbuy-

ers are doing without altogether. Florissant Valley student Justin Apenbrinck went in with a friend on an accounting book. "The book was, like, about \$90, so we just decided to split the cost," he said. The arrangement works, he says, because the two of them are taking the class on alternate days

Deutsch, who returned that \$145 psychology book for a full refund, says she'll get through by borrowing a copy from a room-mate who bought the book last year. She's guessing that only about half the students in her large lecture class will shell out for their own book.

Kate Miller, another Washington University student, uses the library to the extent possible, reading texts that profes-sors have put on reserve there or checking them out. She calcu-lates that by doing so, she spent only about \$100 buying books this semester. Shapiro, of Follett, said stu-

dents who don't buy books also may be getting the material in them illegally, either by making copies of important pages and chapters or by stealing. "We have chiphage in our stores so some shrinkage in our stores, so some of them are getting (books) in ways that aren't ethical," said Shapiro.





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

At 13-3 overall, and 4-1 in the Big East this season, PC is impressing analysts all over the country with their unselfish play and sense of teamwork. It seems as if a different player is stepping up in the key moments of the set of the stepping and the set of the s every game for the friars. It was obvious that Gomes would be a major player on PC's squad right from the get-go and he has not disappointed. This season, Gomes has almost averaged 20 points per game this season, and is leading the team in most major statisti-cal categories. While not the only reason that the Friars are having such a great season, it remains unquestioned that he is doing his part in trying to keep the team competitive come March.

PC is 2-1 this year when playing nationally ranked teams, quite impressive considering that there are teams in the top 25 who haven't played nearly as difficult a schedule. North Carolina, for example is a mere 2-2 against the elite teams in Men's Basketball, but nonetheless maintains the seventh spot in the country. Providence shut down Connecticut, limiting Emeka Okafor, one of the best players in the country, to a staggering 19 points. UConn was also held to a poor shooting percentage (40.7) in a game that they obviously weren't ready for. It wasn't the first time that the Friars came up big

It wasn't the first time that the Friars came up big in an important game. Opening the season on a three game winning streak, it was clear that this season would be a special one for PC basketball. While the games were all close (with the exception of an 84-60 blowout of South Florida), their opponents were all highly thought of as easier teams, and PC didn't get much respect for the games because they were games that they were suppose to win. Then came December 6th. The day that changed the way Providence College approached the 2003-2004 season. Playing at URI, in a game that sold out from the moment tickets went on sale; PC

failed to show up and got spanked around by the Rhody Rams 89-79. From then on in, questions hung over the nets of the Dunkin Donuts Center. If they could-n't defeat URI, how would they fare when the better teams came around? How could they expect to legitimately play for a Big East Title when they couldn't even hold on the surprisingly effec-tive Rams? Or, was it all a fluke, a snap back to reality for a team thinking about possibly cutting down some nets at the end of the year?

With the game tied 56-56 with 9.4 seconds remaining, Sheiku Kabba was fouled and sunk in one of two free throws to give PC the victory by that exact margin. "The Bens". What's better than a stand up performance by Ben Folds? What's better than a really in-depth experiment-ing of Ben Kweller's music? What can out do a five star break-through piece by the up-incoming Ben Lee? The answer is nothing, especially when these modern musi-cal indulgences are welded together in preliminary album accord. This EP is a triple layer cake of absolute melodic

album accord. This EP is a triple layer cake of absolute melodic excellence. While the disc is extremely limited in play-ing time (four songs), each one is done right. The first track, "Just Pretend", apiece written and performed by all three members is a fantastic display of sound great-ness and great complimenting between each voice. While all the members share fairly similar style, each dis-plays their own style and unique tone clearly, making it easy to differentiate between each vocalists' turn at bat in the song. in the song.

in the song. The second track, "Xfire", the Ben Lee spotlight song, gives this young talent the much-needed accredi-tation he has desired. The song is fun and plays the syn-thesizer in perfect harmony with the lyrics. The Ben Kweller original, "Stop!" is the black sheep among the small array of songs on this EP. The back-ground music, reminiscent from Atari video game beats, finds a mood and tone, oddly misplaced when the vocals sound much deeper and intense than they should be. The song sounds like a bunch of in cohesive sound checks, and makes this track the Kweller experiment tune.

The final track, and without a doubt, one of the best, is the Ben Folds class of expression, "Bruised" with trade-mark track flow and piano solo, making this song the best of the best on this album. To start off my new (hopefully) weekly column about any and all things cool, I've decided to write an informative piece rather than a critical one. So let's start with the growing under-ground culture of videogame emulation. For those of you who haven't got a clue as to what that is, I'll elaborate. Now we're all in college so I will assume that you know what it means to emulate something, and videogame emulation is exactly what it sounds like, playing videogames on your home PC that were originally released for either home consoles like NES or in the arcade as thou-sand dollar setups, and with NES or in the arcade as thou-sand dollar setups, and with today's new technology and hobby programmers working around the clock, just about every type of console can be emulated, from the Atari 2600 to the latest arcade games and home systems

games and home systems. So enough back story, let's talk about what you need to relive your childhood. First you're gonna need an emulator. These are the programs that run on your comp. There are many different emulators for each system, and one of the best places to get them is www.zophar.net, by for each fatt. But what it's free and fast. But what would a console be with out games right? And in the

world of emmu, games come in the form of computer files known as ROM's, now since ROM's are technically illegal, I will not condone or suggest the use of them, but if you want to be stubborn, and do it anyway, some great places to get them are off down-loading software like Kazaa, DC++, Direct Connect, and Newsbin Pro, all of which are available as shareware. Or maybe you could find some-one who already has a bunch and would be willing to give them to you.

Now, for some systems there are literally dozens of emulators, and since most of them are complete crap, I fig-ured I'd give you a little head start as to the ones I think are worth the download For NES worth the download. For NES and Famicom (the Japanese version of the NES) Nestopia is always a good pick. It has solid support for most games, great sound and graphics and great sound and graphics and a good running spend on most computers, plus is changes all of the icons of your ROM's to look like little NES cartridges, and it runs in Win XP. For Sega Geneis/Megadrive/CD/32X the best one by far and large is Gens. This one program will not only run genesis and 32X carts, but also supports Sega CD's, all you do is pop the CD into your drive and start up the emulator. And of course the emulator. And of course the sound, graphics, and speed are spot on. For arcade

junkies the only way to go is MAME (which stands for Multiple Arcade Machine Emulator), MAME is current-

Multiple Arcade Machine Emulator). MAME is current-ly up to version 0.78 and has support for roughly 4700 arcade games (but note you will need a powerhouse sys-tem to run a game like Tekken 3). Lastly we come to the Super NES, and the best emulator so far seems to be ZSNES. It has a nice look, great sound and support, and average graphics, but still a solid download nonetheless. Well that just about cov-ers the major systems out there, and like I said there are hundreds of other emula-tors for just about every sys-tem imaginable, and I could easily fill up ten pages yakking about them all, but this article is just meant to give you a start into the world of classic gaming on your computer. 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

Nelly Furtado has just come out with her second album by DreamWorks, Records, called 'Folklore.' At age twenty-four and a mother to her newborn daughter, Nevis, Nelly is no longer the funky girl she used to be at the release of her first album, 'Woah, Nelly!' in 2000. She has really mellowed out and has become more down-toearth since her pregnancy began in December of 2002. Seventeen magazine says that Nelly's once "shrill voice [now has a] warm grace." It labels many of her new songs as "exotic." Furtado has also begun to focus on her background and how her parents immigrated to Canada from the Azores, a Portuguese cluster of islands in the Atlantic. She calls this her own folklore, and it all shows through in her newest album, titled just that: 'Folklore.'

'Folklore.' After the completion of her first album, Furtado admits to falling in love with the pureness of stringed instruments, like the banjo, Portuguese ukulele, and the dulcimer. All of these instruments find themselves on the new album, and add to her 'folklore' theme. According to a history of the new album by DreamWorks, Records, Nelly defines 'folklore' as "something magical and mystical ... a belief in origin." She really set out to make modern folk music, and has achieved exactly that. While the string music gives her songs a traditional sound she uses much technol

While the string music gives her songs a traditional sound, she uses much technology on this album to keep it hip and upbeat. For several of the songs, particularly the first track, "One-Trick Pony,"



Furtado worked very closely with The Kronos String Quartet. The quartet actually arranged their own music for the song, which ended up a perfect fit for Nelly's lyrics. Many of Nelly's songs on this album, like "Powerless," sport a heavy, simple backbeat, which she has found herself enjoying on the "DJ scene." Her modern mixes bring an upbeat twist to the album. She spent years performing "trip-hop" music, which she describes as being very "melancholy" music in *Entertainment Weekly*, so now she always focuses on making her songs very upbeat. One of her favorite and inspiring music groups when she was younger was TLC, so she also strives to make popular tunes with similar sounds

make popular tunes with similar sounds. This new album, Folklore,' is definitely upbeat, especially in a couple of her rap-oriented songs, like "Fresh Off The Boat." In this tune, Nelly attempts taking the negative aspect out of being an immigrant to a new country, and focuses on the beauty and wonder of arriving at a

new world. In the past, Nelly has teamed up with rappers such as Miss Eliot and Timbaland for popular remixes of each other's songs. She really enjoyed performing this style, so was sure to include some like it on her newest album.

Nelly's second album, referred to as her sophomore one, was released in November of 2003. Nobody – not even Nelly herself – knew exactly how her fans and other listeners would react to her new sound and image, since it is so different from her original album. When questioned about her expectations for acceptance by interviewer Nathan Fox, Furtado commented that "as long as the work is good, people will stick with you even if you have a new image or sound." In this case, Nelly has done both. I think her new sound is a great way to please all of her fans: old and new alike.

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
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
