The legacy of the Sesquicentennial Class of 2004 will begin with a notable Class Gift donation, on behalf of both the seniors and Student Community Government (SCG).

The Class of 2004 is the only class that has the distinct recognition as the Sesquicentennial Class, to be graduating on the 150th anniversary of the founding of the College.

To tie into Sesquicentennial theme, donation of this Class Gift, will consist of a \$150,000 pledge on behalf of the seniors. Since there are 1,300 graduates of the Class of 2004, each individual senior's pledge breaks down to \$23.08 per year for the next 5 years.

Oqalaluit (An Inuit word for "showman")

If they told me that this was a suit and tie only campus, I d tell them I don't know what to do. That, in a nutshell, describes Lawrence Millman, who is an arctic traveler, linguist, writer, and amateur cultural anthropologist. He is man who knows the ins and outs of arctic culture, can survive the harshest climates, and knows several languages, but he couldn't tell you where to find a nice suit,

though he isn t shy about telling a funny story or two, or ten.

Mr. Millman would certainly agree that a person has to have a good sense of humor. It would seem almost assential considering seem almost essential considering the places he has focused his travels on, which include Greenland and Northern Canada, some of the coldest and most inhospitable regions of the world and the people that live there.

In fact, if it weren t for a terrible accident, he would not have become interested in the Inuit. While taking pictures with a friend in Greenland, he fell off a small precipice, through ice, and into freezing cold water. It was also his plunge into the ways of the Inuit. It was the Inuit healed his body (with Crisco) and his soul (with

merciless taunting).

Thus he became introduced to the two things that fascinate him to this day: That the Inuit are not igloo dwelling savages, and that they have a culture and history that goes well beyond what has been depictwell beyond what has been depict-ed (including an intense love for

misfortune!). He learned their language to overcome, as the Inuit put it Unreasonable fear, that is inspired by whites. He was able to learn things few people know first hand; like that the Inuit give their children terrible nicknames, even naming them after excrement, just to toughen them up.

Mr. Millman is above all a

man of interesting, if not sound advice such as, If you have the opportunity, make friends with a bush pilot instead of an ordinary pilot. They take you to more interesting places. But above all else, he has a wealth of anecdotes that he has built up from traveling and studying with the Inuit.

One interesting story he recounted was how he was able to meet the last traditionally trained Inuit Shaman in Greenland as he lay on his deathbed. Apparently, to become a Shaman, the candidate must walk miles from any inhabitfor a day and a night. If he or she is successful, then a primordial polar bear will rise from the earth and eat them. The shamen shows and eat them. The shaman's bones are spit out and as they strike the ground, the person is regenerated as his or herself, except that they are a shaman.

Some of his stories were humorous. He told one myth about a man who loved food so much that he needed a second stomach. He went out and searched for a stomwent out and searched for a storrach and finally decided on a mountain. All seemed well until the
mountain fell on top of him.

Not all the anecdotes were on
such a light note. Mr. Millman is

greatly concerned with the difficulties facing the native peoples of Greenland and Northern Canada. He spoke at great length describing the challenges faced by the Inuit.

As he put it, They [Inuit] are not good as being white people.

According to Mr. Millman and English professor here at RIC, Dr.

Potter, who was also present, years of ignorance by whites as well as blatant attempts by various governments to rob the Inuit of their native tongue and culture has left the natives with a lack of identity and social problems such as drug and social problems such as drug abuse and alcoholism.

He feels that the Inuit had more to loose from white culture, even with the new medicine and technology that they now have access to. He said, A culture with ties to the land and society is far better than a culture with medi-cine drug abuse and alcoholism is worse than starvation and cannibalism. The starvation and canni-balism is in reference to the harsh life Natives of Greenland led before they came in contact with

Those interested in further exploring the Inuit and Lawrence Millman should look into the books written by Mr. Millman, eleven in all including Our Like Will Not Be There Again, Northern Latitudes, Last Places, Lost in the Arctic, and his recently republished A Kayak Full of Ghosts, his 1987 book on Inuit myths. His writing has also appeared in Smithsonian, National Geographic Adventure, The Atlantic Monthly, and Sports Illustrated.

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Microsoft Campus Agreement

The students of Rhode Island College may think I am joking if I say that students can buy Microsoft Software for only ten dollars at the bookstore. Those who think I am joking are probably not aware of

Software for only ten dollars at the bookstore. Those who think I am joking are probably not aware of Rhode Island College's Microsoft Campus Agreement.

The Microsoft Campus Agreement is "an annual, subscription licensing program" that acknowledges the needs of college students. This means, students are eligible to either purchase or loan Microsoft operating systems for a discounted price of only \$10.

This contract started on July 1, 2001, which made Rhode Island College the first college in Rhode Island to provide its students with the latest and most popular Microsoft operating systems.

Dennis Sousa, who is the computer manager in the student union said, "the benefits of this are clear—it's a great software package, and we are all entitled to it. Ten dollars is really a great deal."

In 1999, this service was offered only to the college's faculty and staff. Because the program was successful and representatives of Student Community Government pushed to see it extended to include students, Vice President of Student Affairs, Dr. Gary Penfield, worked with Information Services and Campus Card to purchase the student component of the agreement. "Bringing the Agreement to the campus was a great example of what can be accomplished when a group of committed students works with the administration to benefit the entire campus community," said Director of User Support Services, Pat Hayes.

The Northeast Regional Computing Program (NERCOMP) facilitates the licensing agreements between Microsoft and Rhode Island College. NERCOMP negotiates licensing agreements for approximately 184 colleges although only a fraction of the member schools have purchased the student component of the Microsoft Campus Agreement. Rhode Island College remains the only college in the state of Rhode Island where students are covered by the Microsoft Campus Agreement.

The Microsoft Campus Agreement requires the college to pay a subscription fee annually based on the college's FTE, a reporting statistic based on the number of full and part-time students. The college purchases the licenses annually to distribute the software.

As Sousa mentioned, all registered students are eligible to either purchase or loan software. The

As Sousa mentioned, all registered students are eligible to either purchase or loan software. The bookstore carries only the most recent versions of the operating systems while older versions of each are available to be borrowed at Campus Card. If a student decides to receive software, whether from the bookstore or from Campus Card, then the student will need his or her Rhode Island College ID Card and be willing to sign a licensing agreement. The software may be installed on the students' dorm computer or home computer. Campus Card can install the software on students' computers for ten dollars provided that students drop off their computer to Campus Card. vided that students drop off their computer to Campus Card.

Microsoft kicks off 80college tour to demo mobile products

(U-WIRE) PRINCETON, N.J. - Showcasing N.J. - Showcasing some of its newest mobile devices from Tablet PCs to Smartphones, Microsoft started an eight-week Student Mobility Tour at the Friend Center at Princeton University Saturday.

Tara Hadley, Microsoft's education productivity advisor, discussed the latest accessories that will enable students to

that will enable students to access the information they need -- from any location and at any

"We [Microsoft] want to students informed about mobility devices since they always need to connect, communicate and collaborate, on or off cam-pus," Hadley said.

Princeton was Microsoft's

Princeton was Microsoft's first stop for a tour that will include almost 80 schools over the spring and fall, including Bentley College, Dartmouth College and Columbia University in the coming weeks.

"We pick large universities where advanced technology is embraced and harnessed," Hadley said. "The Tablet PC is the latest Notebook PC in processing power, speed and memo-

cessing power, speed and memo-

Through the latest technology, a user can input handwritten text and save it digitally or convert it to typed text. The Tablet PC also features voice recognition and wireless Internet capa-

"A stylus pen is used as the computer's mouse and one can write, draw, doodle and erase with it," she said.

Hadley presented a video of a "classroom of the future," in which students took notes on their Tablet PCs. They also interacted with the teaching assistant and professor via an instant mes-

Students could send questions directly to the teaching assistant, who would then

inform the professor.

Impressed by the Tablet

PC's various capabilities, fresh-man Jessica Chong said,

PC's various capabilities, freshman Jessica Chong said, "Although the graphics for games on a Tablet seem inferior to a desktop computer's, I wish I had a Tablet PC."

Hadley also showed off a Smartphone, which combines the familiarity of Windows software with the ease of a mobile phone. A Smartphone user can send and receive email, instant messages, browse the web, run PowerPoint presentations and PowerPoint presentations and even synchronize information with a desktop PC. Smartphones also include a

secure digital card slot to store music, games and other files on removable memory. Music can play in the background while one reads email or works in other applications like the calen-

dar or address book.
"The tour of mobile devices

was very informative and definitely increased my interest in gadgets like the Smartphone," freshman Kay Ashaolu.

According to Hadley, Microsoft OneNote can help students be more efficient and organized with their notes, from class to lab to the dorm class to lab to the dorm. OneNote is a new addition to Microsoft Office and works like a notebook, but with extra fea-tures such as searching, drag-

and-drop and voice recording.

In the program, students can take notes anywhere on the page and move the cursor to any place on the screen and start typing. In addition were appropriately and the screen and start typing. addition, users can record audio notes that are synchronized to written notes and customize as many notebooks, folders and

many notebooks, folders and pages as they need.

Since many of the latest mobile devices are accompanied by high prices, Hadley noted that schools are instituting special educational prices and even integrating Tablet PCs as part of university computer initiatives.

Despite the high prices, senior Amy Seng, Microsoft's student representative on campus, said, "It's important for students to be aware of and know how to use mobile technology that can enhance research and classroom learning.






Champs Fired up for the Draft!

semester, Dexter selected about 30 classes she wanted to take, plotted them on a spreadsheet and then winnowed down her list, she said.

She exuded the same dedica-tion in all her activities, which included being a Writing Fellow, a Meiklejohn advisor and a leader of the Queer Alliance, Shultz said. Dexter had a mature intelligence that allowed her to forge friendships with people much older than herself, she said. Shultz described times the two spent together on excursions to junk shops, lunch outings and a trip to find firewood.

Shultz said that when she was with Dexter, she felt "not unpleasantly like an old-timer."

Dexter's friend recalled her as a person who loved to discuss topics ranging from friends and relationships to politics and issues facing Billinkoff, who lived with Dexter during the fall of 2003, before Dexter left Brown, said she was an engaging person who refused to let

her sickness bring her down.

"She made chemotherapy an extracurricular activity," Billinkoff said. "Being at Brown brought her

great joy, and nothing was going to hold her back from that."

Even as Dexter's condition took a turn for the worse, she maintained an upbeat attitude, said senior Andy Jalil, a friend of Dexter's.

He described an instance when he went to visit Dexter in the hospital and, despite his efforts not to, began to tear up. Dexter was too weak to speak, but when she saw his tears, she rolled her eyes as if to say, "I'm fine, get over it," Jalil said.

Dexter always questioned things that others took for granted,

he said.

Gail Cohee, director of the Sarah Doyle Women's Center, said Dexter challenged people to think in different ways and consider sides of an issue they had not considered

"I am amazed at how much she managed to do in such a short life,"

Comic fans punished with 'The Punisher'

(U-WIRE) COLUMBUS, Ohio - "The Punisher," the big screen adaptation of a comic book anti-hero, is disappointing and remarkably bad in nearly every

The film is a mishmash of the character's story of origin, a dozen generic action movies, a liberal cribbing from the far superior comic book miniseries "The Punisher: Welcome Back Frank" by Garth Ennis and Steve Dillon, and a dull plot. Frank Castle (Thomas Jane) is a recently retired FBI agent whose last case has come back to haunt him. In revenge for killing a mob boss' (a hammy John Travolta) son, hammy John Travolta) son, Castle's entire family is massacred while conveniently attending a family reunion on a tropical island.

Surviving the attack, Castle returns to New York, moves into an apartment building with some unusual neighbors and launches a one-man war on the mob responsible for his family's deaths.

"The Punisher" feels like the

inbred offspring of any number of 1980s action/revenge movies. A Reagan-era extremist-vigilante sthetic permeates every aspect of the film, from the plotting to the

of the film, from the plotting to the way the violence is presented.

The dialog is frequently laughable. For example, after Castle's family is murdered, the man who saved his life during the attack says, "Go with God," to which Castle grimly intones, "God's gonna sit this one out." Dreadful. The music staggers from ominous puesdo-opera at dramatic moments, to nu-metal tracks that moments, to nu-metal tracks that play over the credits. More importantly, the pacing is horrendous as scenes end abruptly.

To some extent, the flaws lie the character himself. The Punisher is an emotionally dead man who has lost all humanity and has become, for all intents and purposes, a serial killer. Whether the film works depends on

whether a viewer can sympathize with his psychosis, as well their capacity to appreciate copious amount of explosions.



The action sequences are occasionally interesting but more often sloppy and unoriginal. The movie uses a pre-"Matrix"/John Woo style of violence that generally lacks any impact because the Punisher is apparently invincible. There's no risk for the character, which inspires no interest.

The film is not entirely without its positives, most of which are taken from the Ennis miniseries. The supporting cast of Spacker Dave (Ben Fostor) and Bumpo (John Pinette) provide great comedy relief and a human dimension to the film, and while Rebbeca Romijn-Stamos is far too glamorous and entirely miscast to play Joan, she too brings a human ele-

The filmmaker's attempts at Ennis-esque dark comedy are well done, if infrequent, which demonstrates how dour the rest of the

By the end of the film, "The Punisher" reveals itself to be a bloated, mixed-up and bizarrely retro film that will appeal only to action junkies and the most diehard fans of the comic.

Tarantino Triumphs with 'Kill Bill: Vol. 2'

Kill Bill: Vol. 2" starts out with a semi-recap for the first film with The Bride getting shot in the head, followed by the black and white image of her in the convertible that graces the teaser of this film. The Bride is on her way to her last stop? to kill Bill (David Carradine, "Kung Fu").

Then, in standard Tarantino style, we jump back in time to the third assassin on her list, Budd (Michael Madsen, Reservoir Dogs"), and she con-

tinues her rampage of revenge.

The first fact to notice about the second volume is that it contains far less action that the previous one. This is not a bad thing however, as it makes up for "Vol. 1"'s lack of character development.

The Bride is fully fleshed out and the audience begins to understand why she is so bent on revenge. Audiences also come to understand and eventu-ally like Bill. There are more scenes of long talking and monologues, a Tarantino trade-

It is clear that this was writ-

ten as one movie, but its timejumping and episodic structure lent itself well to the split. So while the tone changes, it flows great job playing a run-down alcoholic that looks like he'd loose a sword fight in a heart-beat, but is too crafty to get



well from the end of the first. Recently Tarantino mentioned a limited release combined ver-sion of the films, which should be an incredible event.

So, the plot comes full cir-cle and most of the characters are fleshed out appropriately. But what about the style? Well, Tarantino nailed everything on the head here.

The sequences with Budd are built from the elements of classic Westerns. The flashback to the Bride's training with Pai Mei (Gordon Lui, "The 36th Chamber of Shaolin") is almost a perfect replica of a Shaw Bros. film right down to the extreme zoom in, out of focus, then quick refocus. It is a Hong Kong fan's dream come true!

Most amazingly, the acting is superb given the kitsch style and B-movie nature of Tarantino's most indulgent epic. Uma's performance rocks --that's an already established fact. But, the supporting cast (even those who haven't been around recently) proves it can handle the inherent challenges of "Kill Bill."

Daryl Hannah redefines the term "bitch" as Elle. She is ruthless and her fight with the Bride couldn't be any dirtier than it is. Michael Madsen also does a caught in one in the first place.

The true gem of this group is Bill, himself. David Carradine is just amazing. He gets the best lines and presents them with such dignity that it is impossible to hate this character, no matter how bad he is. You leave pon-dering the question of why no one else has found in him what Quentin has. It is nice to know that he will now be remembered for at least one more role other than Kane in "Kung Fu."
Hopefully, other directors will start giving him more roles now.
Quentin Tarantino has succeeded in making the ultimate tribute to grind house cinema. It

tribute to grind house cinema. It convert audiences couldn't see past the blood of "Vol. 1," but if your biggest complaint was too much style and not enough character and dialogue, then "Vol. 2" should really be given a chance. It's classic Tarantino.

Having seen the saga to its completion, "Vol. 2" only works to make the previous "Kill Bill" more enjoyable.

Quentin's shooting of fights still isn't perfect, which was a major critique of the first half. But Tarantino understands Hong Kong style far better than any Kong style far better than any other American directors and he must get credit for it.

Xbox's 'Carve' Extreme wave racing on

(U-WIRE) AUSTIN, Texas Over the last few years, games have increasingly been presented as cinematic features com-plete with flashy special effects, A-list actors and huge marketing budgets. Unfortunately, high production value doesn't always make for good gaming, and those prime time advertising costs are sure to pass straight to the gamer.

And thankfully, that's where independently published titles such as "Carve" can make a welcome (and cost-effective) alternative to the gaming main-stream. Following in the wake of "Splashdown," the Xbox's most popular water-racer, "Carve" is infinitely more enjoyable when racing head-to-head than when

playing the single-player circuit.

The gameplay is standard racing fare, though having to watch a checkpoint timer as well as your numerous opponents can be a bit annoying. The raceway is dotted with a series of colored designator buoys akin to a slalom skiing course, and the game features a "lock-on" system to help identify gate and ramp positions. Racers can miss to four directional gates before being dis-

qualified, though there is a slight time penalty for each.

single-The single-player opponents will often try to ram or block your craft, but the AI is typically less than remarkable, with bot racers often attempting out-of-the-way shortcuts or disregarding randomly strewn power-ups entirely. And as with most extreme racing titles, performing



tricks award points and brief boosts of speed, though it is still possible to win races without utilizing them.

But the most attractive aspect of "Carve" is its Xbox Live capabilities. The game does an impressive job of supporting headset communication, team racing and eight-player, head-to-head matches, even if the lack of unique raceways does affect replayability. The game graphics are firm-

ly rooted in anime, though parly rooted in anime, though par-ticularly close attention was paid to the realism of the water ele-ments and the "splash-back" fea-ture that simulates tiny droplets running across the camera lens. The racers themselves don't look quite as good as the environ-ments, and the trick sequences

are often unnaturally animated.

The bottom line is that
"Carve," though short, is a wellbalanced racer that fans of the
genre are sure to find intriguing.

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
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

The youth is tried as an adult and found guilty; He is then sentenced to fifty years in prison, thus the title of the book. But the story doesn't end there, it seems that Ethan has a very strange ability; it seems he can create and channel fire. This ability is what killed Brandon, and caused Hell in the courtroom after He was sentenced, like the Hulk though, Ethan doesn't seem to be able to control this power, and it only happens during time of extreme emotional unrest.

Hurtt's artwork, while very good, are nothing that spectacular, it pretty traditional as far as comic book penciling goes, and the colors are very much in tune with DC's other focus book, Kinetic. The comic is very monochromatic, where the only really strong colors are warm ones like red, orange, and yellow. I'm going to go ahead and guess that the Focus books are trying to convey a sense of unity by using pretty much the same color palette for their books. It's not bad though; it's just not HOLY CRAP LOOK AT THIS FREAKIN' BAD ASS ART MAN!

Kinda stuff. Gerber's story and writing, while interesting also don't seem to be anything really great yet, and I say yet because the book in Gerber's hands has the potential to really good, I mean this is after all the man who created Howard the Duck.

So as far as first issues go, this one really is a corker, but because I'm a fan of Gerber's stuff, and I know how weird and cool his work can get, I will keep coming back to Hard Time month after month, because chances are, it will develop into something more than just a run of the mill kid-with-strange-and-powerful-ass-powers thing, and become a deep and interesting story. Pick it up if you are familiar with Gerber's stuff and see what develops.
