



According to Valerie Endress, assistant professor of communications at RIC, *Debate Watch* increases political participation at the grassroots level, encouraging Rhode Islanders to talk to each other about the electoral decisions they will make this fall.

The Debate Watch at RIC was sponsored by the College's Bureau of Government Research and Services (BGRS), an affiliate of RIC's Center for Public Policy, which is chaired by Dr. Motte. The Center for Public Policy is extremely pleased to support this event," Said Dr. Motte, "It's a very important benchmark for this college's role in politics."

Students also played a tremendous role in organizing and planning the event. According to Valerie Endress, "We had a group of students...who were absolutely essential to this. We could not have done this without student support." Jane Fusco was also instrumental in promoting the event.

The debates were broadcast in Donavan Dining Center, the Student Union ballroom, and Gaige Auditorium on large screens. Afterwards, students grouped together around tables and participated in a discussion concerning the debates. There was a great diversity amongst the participants. Students mixed with senior citizens, professors, and politicians, most notably Representative candidate Dave Rogers, Former Governor Bruce Sundlun, Representative Joe Scott, Senator Elizabeth Roberts, and the Mayor of East Providence Roland Grant.

Bill Rappleye, a political reporter for NBC 10 and Jim Hummel, a reporter for ABC 6, were also present. They, along with politicians, both current and past, Republican and Democrat, lead an entertaining and informative debate and media analysis.

Reactions to the discussions were overwhelmingly positive. John Bescherer, 47, a resident of RI who attended felt that, I think it was fascinating to watch a debate with this large a crowd, to hear what people reacted to, and to have people make up their own minds as to what they saw tonight rather than having to rely on the pundits.

Another student, Alison Lambert, a senior, said the *Debate Watch* made her feel more In tune and involved than I did before. Kenneth Bryant, a Freshman, felt that I think its healthy for people of all types and ideologies to get together and discuss things in this time, especially with the war on terror.

On the negative side, one student, Kaylee Carvalo, a sophomore, when asked if the *Debate Watch* helped her understand Democracy better responded, No, because there is a majority of democrats here. I think that the minority should be represented a little more. Former Governor Bruce Sundlun chided that, "You got a lot of people, but what the hell are you going to do with them now that you have got them here."

Students and faculty who volunteered as forum facilitators lead the discussions with questions provided by *Debate Watch*. They recorded reactions to the debate that were forwarded to the commission the next morning by 8 am. The facilitators data will be used to compile and will be released to voter education partners and the media within 48 hours after the debate.

Over all, the night was a undeniable success, not just for RIC but for the nation as a whole. "I felt a lot better about America in general, based on people actually having a intellectual opinion on what is happening in politics," Said Bret Broester, a Junior, who was a forum facilitator, "From what I gather, people were swayed by others' opinions. It was good, people were open to discussion."

Debate Focus

As President John Nazarian said in his Speech on the night of the Debate Watch. The right to vote for the nations leaders is the very foundation of our system of government. Debates between candidates for the presidency help voters to compare, to contrast, and ultimately to choose. In light of the Debate Watch that was held Thursday night, it has become evident just how important debates are.

There was some worry surrounding the debates, especially concerning whether they would have enough confrontation and freedom to them. Roland Grant, the Mayor of East Providence felt that "I'm rather upset by the many rules that the debates will have...it's got 40 pages of rules." Representative Joe Scott said, "I hope we get some defined direction from the candidates.

One factor that the Elected Officials at the Debate Watch felt were of great importance was timing. Former Lieutenant Governor Robert Weygand, himself a participant of debates felt that, "The debate strategy for a lot of people...gets muddled up in what happens prior to that debate."

During a debate, the candidate must be direct and to the point. You have to be very succinct with debates, said Weygand. During the debate, both John Kerry and George Bush were to the point. Each candidate struck with concise and direct shots at his opponent. Otherwise a Candidate will loose the people he is trying to get, said Weygand. The effects the Debates

The effects the Debates had were mixed. One Student, Aaron Bruno, said I found it somewhat informative I don t think it changed who I was going to vote for, but it helped me make a more educated decision, and it made me feel better about the choice that I m going to make. In General, those present for the *Debate Watch* felt that John Kerry came out on top during the debate.

An often overlooked aspect of the debate is what happens afterward. Many people fear that the media can have a negative influence with its analysis of debates. Bill Rappleye, himself a member of the media, felt that the media s focus on scandal turned off voters. He said, We ve seen a decline in voter turnout.

A person-to-person discussion often times teaches people more than the actual debate itself. This is what Diana Carlin, a professor of communications at the University of Kansas found out as she formed Debate Watch in 1992.

According to Valerie Endress People are more likely to vote because they went to a debate watch, and they are more likely to seek out information on the issues. She described *Debate Watch* as One of the few outlets citizens have to directly talk about their response to debate without the media spin.

Another thing emphasized heavily during the Debate were words like "steadfast", "resolute" and "strong". Although these words surely describe the way America must stand in the War on Terror, these words can just as well be applied to the way that everyone at the Debate Watch held themselves and to the message that was sent by a record attendance. The Debate Watch was

The Debate Watch was a resounding success because everyone involved worked hard, whether they were students, faculty, or members of the community. We, here at the Anchor, share the same feeling that the faculty and staff felt that night. The editors and staff present at the Debate Watch felt proud to see that this newspaper's call and drive for greater student involvement and political awareness resulted in a large turnout and an increased interest by the student body.

For too long in this nation's history the ability of college students to participate in politics and elections and to make an intelligent, powerful, and well informed impact on the political process has been doubted in the collective mind of the nation. At the same time, the service that public colleges like RIC can provide to the community and to students has been underestimated, at best, and belittled, at the worst. The debate over which candidate is better will not be over until November, but Thursday night the debate over whether RIC is a first class institution was decided.



While we begin to prepare for the Major League Baseball playoffs, I figure that this week would be the best time to cover some of the greatest postseason moments in history. Of course, there have been numerous eyepopping, hair-raising, momentum-changing sights and sounds over the years, so picking the top 10 was not an easy task. Two moments that didn t make the list receive honorable mention, including Dave Hendersons game-winning homerun off Donnie Moore (1986 ALCS, Game 5, Red Sox defeat Angels) and Don Larsen's perfect game against the Dodgers (1960 World Series, Game 5, Yankees blank Dodgers).

Without f u r t h e r delay, here are my TOP 10 GREAT-E S T MOMENTS IN POST-S E A S O N HISTORY.

1 0) Cant Hang On, October 5, 1941. The Boston Red Sox and the Brooklyn Dodgers are a lot alike.

Both are quite vulnerable to misfortunes against the New York Yankees, and both have a saying, Wait till next year. In this case, the Brooklyn Dodgers were the ones on the short end of the stick. In a crucial Game 4 of the 1941 World Series against the Yanks, Dodgers catcher Mickey Owen failed to grab the third strike that would have been the final out of a 4-3 Brooklyn victory. The Yankees would come from behind and steal the game, 7-4.

9) Chambliss Dethrones Royals, October 14, 1976. The Yankees were in a bit of a drought coming into this year. They hadn t won a pennant in twelve seasons, and they had to get past a worthy contender in the Kansas City Royals. Chris Chambliss brought the Yankees back to the top of the American League with a ninth-inning homerun off Mark Littell to win Game 5 of the 1976 American League Championship Series.

8) Royal Celebration, October 10, 1980. This conveniently took place when the Yankees/Royals rivalry was beginning to heat up. All it took was one big hit from the Royals George Brett: a homerun in Game 3 of the 1980 ALCS off Rich Goose Gossage. Kansas City shocked the world by sweeping the Bronx Bombers under the rug but would fall short to the Philadelphia Phillies in the Fall Classic. No pine tar needed.

7) Mays Gives Indians the

Red Sox catcher Carlton Fisk nailed a pitch down the left-field line at Fenway Park in the 12th inning of Game 6 of the 1975 World Series. Everyone in the wasn t supposed to play at all, but he somehow built up the strength to limp up to the Los Angeles Dodgers dugout, grabbed a bat and helmet, and demanded to get in the game as a pinch hitter. Fouling off pitch after pitch, Gibson worked As star closer Dennis Eckersley to a 3-2 count before ripping a pitch into the right field seats for a walk-off homerun. Ironically, the Dodgers won by Gibson s count: 3-2.

2) Through the Wickets, October 25, 1986. This was probably the worst day in history for Red Sox fans. After leading 5-3 with two outs in the bottom of the tenth inning in Game 6, Boston thought for sure that they would take the 1986 World Series from the New York Mets. Instead, three singles off Sox

Mookie Wilson grounded a 3-2 pitch down the first base line, and the charging Buckner could not get his glove down enough. Ray Knight scored to win Game 6 and force the seventh and deciding game, which the Mets

would win. 1) Shot Heard Round the World, October 3, 1951. Just like the hit itself, this was a nodoubter for #1. The New York Giants faced the Brooklyn Dodgers in the National League playoffs. With the Giants Bobby Thomson at the plate, Dodgers pitcher Ralph Branca delivered a pitch that wouldn t come back. Thomson's walk-off, three-run, series-winning home run carried the Giants to victory. A famous radio broadcaster can be remembered by saying, The Giants won the pennant! The Giants won the pennant!


lot of people cheering. They were cheering for the opposition. They had come to support the visiting team, and they outnumbered the number of fans in attendance that came to support RIC.





Advisor and Secretary of State respectively); both in these positions because a Republican, George W. Bush, knew they were the most qualified for the positions, regardless of color.

This story is important to understand because it demon-strates the effect that published materials can have on our socie-The point is not whether Uncle Tom's Cabin was the sole stimulus of the Civil War; rather it's that through her writing, Stowe was able to build support for the anti-slavery cause. It cannot be disputed that in a democratic society, the People need accurate information in order to make informed decisions. Therefore, the People must be able to trust that the information that they are receiving is correct and un-biased. (Granted, human error and bias cannot be totally avoided-we are only human). Yet, as the most recent attacks on President Bush demonstrate, our media can hardly be labeled as "honest." This summer's 8-week 10th Anniversary Vans Warped Tour featured Letter Kills performing in every one of the 44 cities. As their audience expands across the country, fans and critics have dubbed them "The One To Watch" on the tour. At the same time, rock radio formats have picked up on "Don't Believe", the first single (and video) from the album.

The hotly-promoted 2004 edition of the Nintendo Fusion tour features Letter Kills hitting the road with headliners Story of The Year and support acts Lostprophets, My Chemical Romance, Anberlin and Autopilot Off. (Bands are subject to change through the tour's wrap-up in November.) In each venue, the lobby will be transformed into an immersing entertainment space with music, custom lighting and specially designed gaming kiosks featuring the hottest upcoming Nintendo GameCube(tm) games. There will be giveaways at each show, and fans also will get a sneak preview of the new Nintendo DS(tm), an innovative dual-screen, wireless, hand-held video game system. The Nintendo Fusion tour is produced by Clear Channel Entertainment and booked by The Agency Group.

"THE BRIDGE" was produced by Jim Wirt (Incubus, Hoobastank) and mixed by Tom Lord-Alge (Blink-182, The Rolling Stones). Alternative Press characterized Letter Kills' sound as "big, swinging, Rage Against The Machine-style riffs mating with speedy '70s punk chord progressions." Punk Discovery called the debut "a serious contender for album of the year"; and The New York Post awarded the album a 3-star review.

For the five members of Letter Kills - Matt Shelton (vocals), Timothy Cordova (guitars), Dustin

Lovelis (guitars), Kyle Duckworth (bass), and Paul Remund (drums) - the July 27th release of "THE BRIDGE" capped two years of blood, sweat and tears. Grinding it out in their southern California backyard, since forming in 2002, they recorded their debut EP the following year; all three tracks (including "Don't Believe") appear on the album. After being singled out as the top new band on a handful of Vans Warped Tour dates last summer, they were asked back for the entire tour this year. Letter Kills' fans will be the first one to learn about upcoming tour dates and other gab at www.letterkills.com and other punk/news sites.



and contracted by the Famiglietti Brothers Company, whom was commissioned by the Toy Theatre Company. The project was overseen by C.C. Darling. It was and continues to be one of four theaters built by Walker & Son, and one of two that remain; *The Emery* and *The Modern* no longer exist, and the Trinity Repertory Company now takes residence in the former *Majestic*. The Toy was the first theater on the East Side and one of the first community theaters in the entire city of Providence. What remains to be unseen, however, is what happened to the *Toy Theatre* between its opening in 1915 and 1937, when it was renovated. Almost exactly one year from its opening opening, rumors had surfaced that it doubled as an amateur theater and gymnasium, and that it had housed an inclusion swim-ming pool. This was plausible, due to the lack of such facilities on the East Side at the time. Whether or not this occurred is uncertain, and the property was said to have become a garage, prior to its renovation in 1937.

The 1937 renovation in 1957. began when the Louis Gordon Theatres, Inc. leased the property from the Dulgarian Brothers to turn the space back into a theater for moving pictures, which included but was not limited to: reel films. These moving pic-tures were laden with famed

silent film legends such Charlie Chaplin, Mary Pickford, Laurel & Hardy, Harold Lloyd, Buster Keaton, the Keystone Buster Keaton, the Keystone Cops, and Rudolph Valentino. The renovation had not only included a remodeling of the theatre s purpose, but also of its interior. The heating system was updated. New seating (which had increased the seating capacity to 630 people) was added, and a lobby leading from Thayer Street to the rear of the auditorium was constructed. Most importantly, however, the name of the theater was retired, and changed to its present title, *The Avon*. Since this time, the only other changes that have occurred

have been minor: i.e.; adjustment of doors between the lobby and the auditorium, raised and low-ered ceiling heights, new layout of the restrooms, and expanded space for management, thus eliminating the lounge area on the second floor.

The Avon Cinema remains in the Dulgarian family to this day. Its history reflects the chifting uses of theaters in shifting uses of theaters in Providence, a city which has housed different types of theatrical performances and different extensions of artistic vision at various points in history. The *Majestic*, for example, was first used only for moving pictures, but over time that changed and it now accommodates Trinitys

eclectic variety of plays and musicals. The *Toy Theatre*, which is now known as *The Avon*, was also part of the large repertoire of Walker & Son, both on the East Side and elsewhere in Rhode Island.

The style of The Avon, The style of *The Avon*, which is generally classified as Art Deco, mainly reflected in the fa ade, marquee and the neon embellishments in the auditori-um, provides for such a contrast to the predominantly modern to the predominantly modern appearance of the architecture of the city of Providence. Perhaps it is this that lends to the allure and the appeal of such old-style movie houses such as The Avon. The same allure and appeal that allow you to envision movie ush-ers with pill-box shaped hats and a sultry woman selling cigarettes for a two dollar bill and a fifty cent piece house the same the for a two dollar bill and a fifty cent piece, however, now the screens are not laden with the images of film greats, but rather the images of more obscure actors starring in indie/artsy flicke. flicks. Whatever the image being projected, the classic appeal is never lost, allowing for the Avon to exist as a timeless symbol of the historic cinema. Although the style of such theaters may be thought of as out-dated when compared to the massive Cineplex style structures of today, the images of the clas-sic cinema should not fade so quickly.

I pause, and scan the cinemas horizon for the girl with the candy and the cigarettes before Marilyn, Sinatra and Audrey appear on the silver screen. Ticket, Please And there he is, the walking Gap ad, clad in generic blue jeans. There is no pill box-shaped hat resting atop his neatly combed hair. The Muir String Quartet **Returns to Rhode Island College**

Rhode Island College had the honor of welcoming back the Muir String Quartet for its twelfth consecutive year performing here. They played three pieces for a packed Sapinsley Hall last Monday, including Franz Joseph Hayden's String Quartet in G minor, Opus 20, No. 2; Leos Janaceck's String Quartet No. 2 Intimate Letters; and Johannes Brahms String Quartet in B-flat Major Opus 67 Major, Opus 67

Hayden s Quartet in G minor shows the theatrics and opera it is inspired by with its back-and-forth mood changes. Janaceck s. Intimate Letters is interest-ingly inspired by letters exchanged during his relationship with a married woman forty years younger than he. The piece s constant change in mood and rhythm reflect the feelings in their relationship. Brahms Quartet in B-flat Major was published in Berlin in 1876 and was his last quartet of only three

Currently in residence at Boston University since 1983, and existing since 1980, the Muir String Quartet consists of Peter Zazofsky (violin), Lucia Lin (violin), Steven Ansell (viola), and Michael Reynolds (cello). Their achievements include various awards such as the Naumburg Chamber Music Award (1981) and the Evian International String Quartet Competition (1980). They have also appeared on PBS, performed for President and Mrs. Reagan in the White House, and received a Grammy nomination for their recording of Beethoven Quartets (Op. 132 and the Grosse Fugue) in 1995. Their current tour includes many major U.S. cities including New York, Philadelphia, Detroit, Los Angeles, and others. Also included is a European venue of Germany, France, Austria, Switzerland, Belgium, and the Netherlands. They will return to Rhode Island College in May of 2005 to perform Hayden s Quartet in C Major, Op. 20, No. 2; Schulhof s *Five Pieces*; and Ravel s Quartet in F Major. Sapinsley Hall will also feature the Boston Symphony Chamber Players, Quartetto di Venezia, and pianist Jeffrey Siegel in the near future.
