Over the past couple of years, RIC has seen a rise in the number of sexual assault cases. The Rhode Island Coalition Against (RICADV) Domestic Violence, The Women's center on Campus, and Dr. Scott Kaine, associate dean of student life, all agree that with a recent rise in cases of sexual assaults on Campus, more work is needed to raise awareness and prevention at RIC.

One area of concern is teen dating violence, especially since it's closer to College students than other forms of

domestic violence. A new study released by the American Medical Association finds, "One in five female high school students reports being physically or sexually abused by a dating partner."

The fact is that men and women are more likely to be hurt by someone they know. This is why awareness is so important, especially for younger people and college students. Only recently has teen and dating violence been recognized as domestic violence. According to the RICADV, "In the past, many adults dismissed teen rela-

Dating Violence Myths and Facts

Dating Abuse is defined as "Any harmful or unwanted physical, sexual, verbal or emotional act inflicted by a casual or intimate dating partner." Approximately one in five female high school students reports being physically or sexually abused by a dating partner. More than five out of ten of all rape cases (54%) occurred before victim reached the age of eighteen.

One of the most common types of acquaintance rape is date rape. If you are a female between the ages of 16-24, you run the greatest risk of being raped by a date. More than three women out of every 100- or 1.8 million- have been severely assaulted by male partners or cohabitants during the past 12 months.

Sex Health on Campus

No place, especially Rhode Island College, is immune to the danger of Sexually Transmitted Diseases (STD's) or the risk of pregnancy. Every year, hundreds of students at Rhode Island College suffer from STD's- the most common cases being Gonorrhea, Genital Warts, Genital HPV, and even Herpes. And, of course, sexual intercourse-protected and unprotected- is far from rare on campus. At the forefront of these issues is the Rhode Island College's Health Services.

In its brochure, RIC Health services states that it, "Provides confidential, primary care services to all students attending Rhode Island College. Students are treated with a holistic approach, emphasizing prevention, risk reduction and education to assist in making life long healthy choices"

Its available services include: Physical exams (including Sports and Annual exams), management of acute illnesses and injuries;

Women's health Care including: GYN exams and pap smears, birth control Emergency Contraception, pregnancy testing; Lab services, including on-site blood tests, throat cultures, urine tests, and STI (sexually transmitted infection) screening for both males and females, mental health referral and collaboration with RIC counseling center, PPD skin test for student teachers and nursing students, referral and coordination with specialty medical resources, and Smoking Cessation resources.

Some of the health services have been proven controversial. The Emergency Contraception- or morning after pills- is not offered at many pharmacies. But, Ms.



Lynn Wachtel, the director and nurse at the center, feels that it is more important that these are made available to students.

She thinks that it is a misconception that the pill is a form of abortion, emphasizing that a fetus has not yet

Dealing with Domestic Violence

Sometimes, relationships take a turn for the worse—a wrong turn. Domestic violence affects hundreds of people in our state every year, and by going unreported, serious injury or even death can occur. In the state of Rhode Island, domestic violence can range from assault or vandalism to trespassing, stalking and even homicide.

In many cases, victims of domestic violence are embarrassed or afraid to report an incident, which can make way for more abuse. To report a domestic violence case, the victim would generally have to contact the local police department. If the incident has just happened, the police will come

to the scene and figure out exactly what happened. If there is probable cause that a crime was committed, they are mandated to make an arrest on the primary aggressor.

A restraining order is usually placed between the victim and the aggressor. This is done through the court, though the police department can set up a temporary restraining order. The city or town will soon after prosecute the case. The state presses charges, so the victim cannot drop charges. Instead of going to jail, most first time domestic violence offenders are sentenced to probation and counseling.

Domestic vio-

lence victims must not be afraid to get help. Holding out on getting help simply makes things worse. Expecting people to change just isn't always realistic.

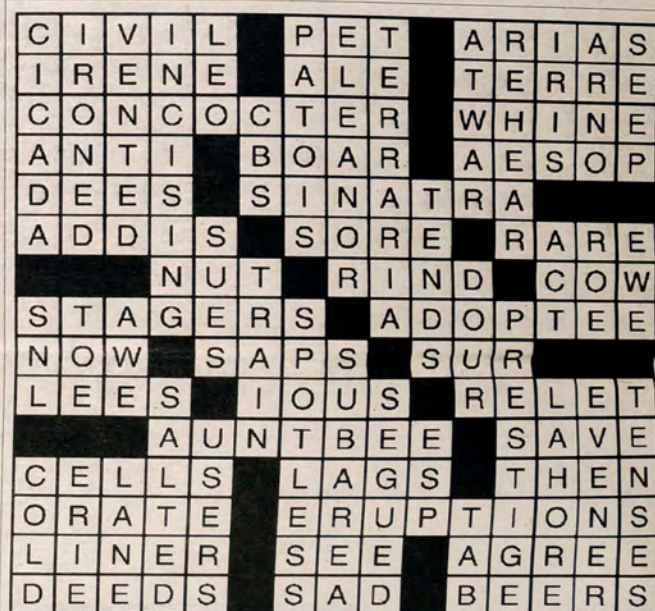

Discovering the Women's Center

When the Anchor went around campus asking people what they knew about the Women's Center, everyone pretty much gave the same answer: "The Women's Center? Where is that? What is that?"

Although most of the general RIC public knows nothing about the Women's Center (WC) and what it can provide for them, the WC is alive and well and trying hard to get their name out. The WC is a little frustrated that not many students know about them, but they are encouraged by the growing number of people attending their events. Victoria Tyan, one of the work-study students employed by the WC, said "Lately we've also been doing a lot of flyers. I think one of the reasons why we're getting better turnouts is because there are more places here at RIC that have similar goals as we do, such as the Unity Center, the Rainbow alliance, the counseling center. We can team up now." Tiffanie Barbosa, one of the WC's coordinators, agreed, "Lately

we've been getting much better turnouts. I've been here for three years, and in the past, only staff showed up for our programs. Besides the fliers, word of mouth has been really effective for us. Lately, I think people are getting more educated and are looking for places to go so they can learn more."

The Women's Center is all about promoting education and awareness. Founded in 1976, the Women's Center's mission statement clearly defines the WC as a place that "assist[s] women students in achieving maximum success during their college years" and "provide[s] a clearing house of information related to women's history, health and progress."

Located underneath the Donovan Dining Center, the WC shares space with Campus Ministry and the Unity Center. Inside the WC's room, which is currently decorated for the winter holidays, pamphlets of all shapes and sizes are available for free, covering a wide range of topics such as AIDS/HIV, genital warts and other STDs, safe sex, sexuality, domestic violence, cancer, depression, suicide, and alcohol use.

Condoms and tampons are also available for sale at ten cents each.

The WC is run by work-study students who are usually in the Women's Center from about 9 until 3, sometimes earlier and sometimes later. The girls who work there are very friendly and willing to help out with anything. "We help students a lot with papers they have to write and things like that, which is great, because we are primarily a resource center," said Diana Jimos, one of the WC's work-study students.

Occasionally, students do come into the WC seeking serious help about situations that require professional counseling. "We're a resource center. We're here to help," said Tiffanie Barbosa, "but our staff is not professionally trained to counsel in these kinds of situations. But, we have an exhaustive list of people who can. If somebody needs someone to talk to, we have numbers for them to call and places for them to go. We also often refer them to the Counseling Center here on RIC's campus. We encourage anyone who needs help to contact us, so we can help them."

tionships as 'not serious' or 'puppy love', and therefore dismissed the possibility that serious violence could occur.

To many teenagers, jealousy, possessiveness and abuse are "normal" in intimate relationships. These are often warning signs that are tragically ignored. Studies show that although women believe that violence has a negative impact on the relationship, men, either the abused or abusers see either a positive or no impact at all.

Young women respond to the trauma of dating violence with anger and fear and surprise. The major emotional response batters exhibit is sorrow. Women out number men by almost a three-to-one margin in cases in which severe trauma has been reported. Men suffer, as well. Men who witnessed abuse or were victims of abuse themselves are statistically more likely to become abusers.

The women's center and their faculty advisor, Scott Kaine, work as a resource center for women who are victims of abuse. They provide information, contacts, and a place for women to go to and find friends and comfort. The women's center also holds promotional campaigns like the "Silent Witness Campaign", where wooden or cardboard silhouettes are set up to represent domestic violence murder victims.

Dr. Kaine feels that RIC is doing a good job on promoting violence and sexual abuse awareness. He

points to campaigns and workshops held by the women's center, and the recent growth in activity and membership in the organization. He says that RIC has a strong policy against any kind of relationship based violence. Kaine pointed out that the administration would provide counseling, restraining orders, reschedule classes, and in extreme cases, remove individuals from RIC if need be.

Some other things Colleges can do to promote awareness include: Inviting guest speakers, setting up information tables, posters, and displays, holding fundraisers, vigils, rally's, and sit ins. Dorms can form discussion groups and awareness programs, and educators can incorporate materials into the classroom.

If a person knows a victim or an abuser, they should listen and try to help, emphasizing safety while not applying pressure to end the relationship or telling them what to do. They should ask the person what they want and be honest if they cannot help. They must understand that people can only make changes when they are ready to. If they are going to confront offenders, they should do so only if it does not endanger the safety of the victim. They can offer the victim a safe place to stay, help them gather resources, seek help, or call a hotline.

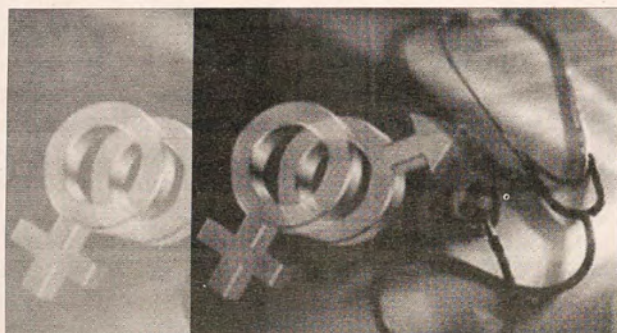

begun to form. She advises that women who think they may become pregnant should not hesitate. The pill's chances of success diminish with each passing day and after a few days the pill is useless. If it is taken 24 hours after unprotected sex, E.C. is safer than aspirin and 95% effective at preventing fertilization. It can be used up to 72 hours later. Because of its controversial nature, most states require a prescription, so students must pick it up at the Health Center.

All together, Ms.

Wachtel feels that RIC Health services are doing a good job by spreading awareness, providing protection, and testing. She would like to see health services provide more treatments and testing. Some tests must be performed off campus and a lot of the lab samples cannot be handled at RIC, incurring a cost and inconvenience to the student.

lence remains the most dramatically under-reported crime, with an estimated two-thirds of attacks unreported. The level of injury in response to domestic violence is severe. Of the 218 women treated for domestic violence injuries at a metropolitan emergency department, 28 percent required admission to hospitals, and 13 percent required major medical treatment. Almost as astounding, 40 percent had previously required medical care for abuse.

Over 80% of rape victims know their attackers. You are more likely to be assaulted by someone you know. More than 5,000 women each day are assaulted by partners. Boys also experience abuse, especially psychologically. They are rarely hurt physically, but when it happens, it is often severe.

In the United States, a woman is physically abused by her husband every nine seconds. Batters are found in all classes and types of people: rich, poor, professional, unemployed, black, white, urban and rural.

Students who report spousal violence between their parents had a statistically greater rate of violence in their dating relationships.

Myths from front

Approximately 60% of men who batter grew up in homes where they were beaten or witnessed battering. Among college sexual assault incidents, 20.2% of the male perpetrators were members of a sports team or club, although fewer than 2% of the men on campus belonged to an athletic organization.

The majority of dating violence occurs when the relationship is serious or steady. In several studies, young men were more violent as they began to see themselves as part of a couple.

Myths

Myth #1: It can't happen to me

Fact: Approximately one in five female high school students report being physically or sexually abused by a dating partner.

Myth #2: Teen dating violence isn't really serious

Fact: 30% of all Women who are murdered in this country are killed by their husband or boyfriend.

Myth #3: Men are battered by women just as often as women are battered by men.

Fact: The U.S. Bureau of

Justice Statistics reports that 95% of the reported incidents of assaults in relationships are committed by males.

Myth #4: Victims bring the abuse on themselves. They ask for it.

Fact: Perpetrators believe they have the right to use, abuse and control their partner, and they see the victim as less than equal to themselves. The victim has no control over the abuser.

Myth #5 The person I'm dating wouldn't get so jealous if they didn't really love me

Fact: If the person you're dating really loves you, they wouldn't control you through jealousy. What's left unsaid is that they are insecure about their own feelings, and are unsure of themselves and mistrustful.

Myth #8 He wouldn't hurt me if he didn't love me.

Fact: Perpetuated by films, music, and the media, women continue to be depicted as victims. Men also perpetuate this myth when they attempt to apologize or excuse their behavior with, "It's because I love you that I get so mad."

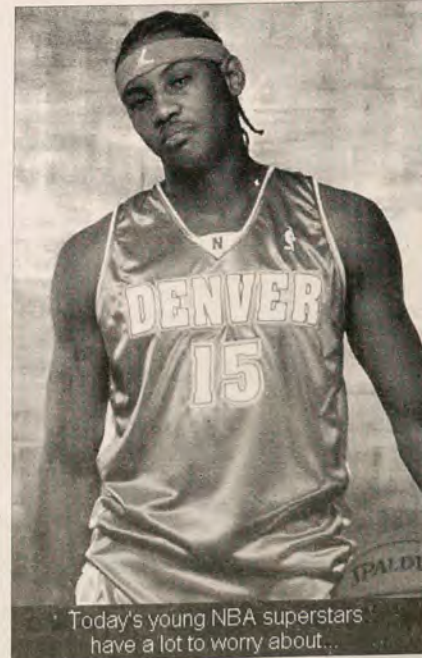
The thrill and excitement of being around someone that powerful is irreplaceable and keeps these women coming back for

that may attempt to redefine what Title IX stands for. Roderick Jackson led the Birmingham High School Girl's Basketball team under a wave of inequality. The team had to practice in the school's older gym, with poor equipment and wooden backboards. When the team played their games, they had difficulty adjusting to the equipment used by other

advocates of this law, why would they have to obey it in the first place?

Jackson is not wrong in this case. Since the time of his firing, he was rehired by the school. But, he shouldn't have been fired in the first place, and a simple "Oops, my bad" on the part of the school isn't going to change that. Hopefully, the Court will see this and rule in this

Sexual Violence: Be Aware

Sexual assault or rape is defined as oral, anal, or vaginal penetration or union with the sexual organ of another or the anal or vaginal penetration of another by any other. The crime of date rape and sexual violence is becoming more and more of a problem for college students these days. Sexual violence is one of the most frequently reported crimes among college women. The United States Department of Justice statistics state that: 1 out of 3 women will be raped in their lifetime 77% of rapes are committed by people the victim knows 16% of rapes are not reported to the police.

The National Center of Victims of Crimes reports that 1 in every 5 female college students report being

forced to have sexual intercourse. These are serious and scary statistics. There are steps that can be taken to help keep you safe and not become a statistic.

While walking through campus, or anywhere for that matter, plan and know your route. Walk confidently like you know exactly where you are going. Avoid alleys, isolated and badly lit areas. Anywhere where people are not present or within hearing distance (if you needed help) should be avoided whenever possible. If you feel or are scared that you may be being followed go into the nearest building or populated area. If you have a cell phone on you, call someone. If you are getting into your car always have your keys already in hand. Always try to park in well-lit areas and check the backseat and underneath of your car before getting into it. Always

keep the doors locked, even if you are in the car. When on dates or in social situations, never leave your drink unattended and if someone wants to buy you a drink go up to the bar with them. Never take your eyes off of the drink, even if you think you know the person you are with. There are various drugs that can be put into your drink and you will not know it until it is too late. For example: Rohypnol- also known as Roofies or the Forget Me Pill is odorless, tasteless and does not affect the look of the drink. They are approximately 10 times the strength of a Valium. Side effects include: drowsiness, impaired motor skills, impaired judgment, dizziness, confusion, amnesia, nausea, loss of inhibition and blackouts. Rohypnol remains in the blood stream for 2 to 4 hours and can be detected in one's urine for up to 72 hours.

Another drug is GHB (Gamma Hydroxybutyrate)- also known as Liquid Ecstasy or Liquid E- it comes in a clear liquid form that is also odorless, tasteless and does not affect the look of the drink. This is a central nervous system depressant that is abused for its intoxicating effects. Side effects include: nausea, dizziness, slow heart beat, decreased respiratory effort and blood pressure, lowered inhibitions, unconsciousness, amnesia, seizure-like activity and coma. GHB remains in the blood for 4 hours and the urine for 12 hours.

Even if you know the assailant, call the police if you suspect that you have been a victim of a drug related sexual assault. As stated before, 77% of victims know their attacker. Seek immediate medical attention since most of these drugs do stay in the system for up to 3

days. While it may be difficult for you to talk about the assault, it is usually better to get your emotions out in the open, rather than keeping them all bottled up. Call for support from agencies such as RAINN (Rape Abuse and Incest National Network) @ www.rainn.org or 1-800-656-HOPE. They will help you get through the situation and help you cope with the feelings that you are having. It is a myth that it is not rape if you do not fight back. If you have been inhibited by any of the aforementioned drugs, you may have been unable to fight back and therefore your rights have been violated and you have been raped. This article is meant to increase awareness and help to keep you safe in different situations. An unsuspecting person is the best candidate for a sexual assault or rape to happen to. ALWAYS BE AWARE!

The new book "He's Just Not That Into You: The No-Excuses Truth to Understanding Guys" has been shaking things up on the talk show and relationship circuits. In a Dr. Phil-like voice, the authors deconstruct the behavior of men and attempt to provide a road map women can follow when trying to figure out if Mr. Right Now is Mr. Right.

The indicators range from the broad to the anecdotal, but a quick discussion of the book with friends revealed to me that many of its commandments are as applicable to men as they are to women.

It is the opinion of this humble columnist that most love relationships are built around heart, body and time.

These factors determine whether there's anything more than just "hanging out" going on between two people. Since we don't have the luxury of seeing behind the eyes of the one we love, we're compelled to take her word for things. But words can be self-serving, and once she has it in her head that we're not for her, she'll generally not be too concerned with the consequences of her actions.
