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



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

Dear Editor:

Truth is such an ephemeral thing. Sometimes it smacks you right in the face and cannot be denied. Usually, it remains hidden and gets lost in empty verbiage and confusion.

Truth is something that is obfuscated in your recent article by Johanna Bennett, "Does Anyone Know What is Happening At the Studio"?? (April 21, 1987). The article is filled with misquotes and mistatements and does not reflect the reality of the studio situation. At no time did Professor Marshall or members of the Communications Organization state that the studio was going to be closed. We merely stated that it was a possibility, not a probability. Indeed, we have gone out of our way to counter such rumors in a positive fashion by encouraging use of the studio and making people aware of its potential for the Rhode Island College community.

As members of the Communications area, we are all too aware of how fictions can rapidly become reality. In the case of your story, a new reality has been created. Indeed, the story follows the traditional propagandists approach of bifurcation, or "us vs. them". Yet in truth, the administration and particularly the Communications Department have been consistently linked with ours. There are no two sides, simply one working toward a common goal, the goal of providing the best possible educational background to meet the needs of the student body and faculty.

When approached about this story,

we made it clear that the situation was vague and misinformation abounded. Indeed we urged that the Chairman of the Department of Communications, Dr. Raymond Picozzi, be contacted for confirmation and clarification. At no time was any autonomous action taken which was not in line with departmental considerations. Instead, your piece denigrates our integrity and mistakes our position. Indeed, several quotes refer to our Statewide Interconnect Program, "Between Takes", and how its development is an asset to the Department, the Administration, and College, not to the status of the Studio. Our belief is that a positive approach is more beneficial

On the evenings of April 14th and 15th, Student Community Government, Inc. (SCGI) held its annual budget hearings. These hearings are held in order to allocate money to

the student organizations for next year's operations. The budget hearings proceeded with the same level of excitement and politics as they have in past years:

President of SCGI, Rich Farley, started the proceedings with a message to all parliament members to avoid "pork-barreling." This sent a clear message to all members of this body not to allow personal affiliations with individual organizations affect their voting on budgets. These were

Most people express concern and sympathy for the hungry and homeless. Most people also agree that "something should be done about it." Half of the time, however, not much gets done beyond that point. Al Gomes is not among "most people." Gomes is a 27

The inspiration to start this endeavor (which was to become R.I. Bandwagon) came during the 1985 Live Aid project. Gomes originally thought that he too would like to help the situation in Africa. year-old Rhode Island College graduate who single-handedly decided to do something about it. Thus, the development of a project that would make more of an impact than Gomes ever imagined. This project called Rhode Island Bandwagon, for which Gomes received a Jefferson Award, has raised close to \$10,000. to help the hungry and homeless in Rhode Island.

probably two or three R.I. agencies, 30 % seems adequate. However, when Gomes dug deeper, he discovered to his surprise, 250 such agencies in Rhode Island. It was then decided that 100% of the profits would be distributed among the local agencies.

The next step involved getting musicians together to record a song for

an album. When "they all laughed", Gomes "let it die" for about four months. But, he never forgot about it. On his graduation day in 1986, Gomes realized that this chance may never come again and the result was the lyrics of "A Piece of Our Hearts" - the first of three songs on the Three Sides of Hunger album. Shortly after that, a close friend of his tried to commit suicide which resulted in a collaboration with that friend - "Surrender to Serenity."

But something was still missing. After all, how can anyone really stand for a cause without knowing much about it? To remedy this, Gomes spent an entire day with a homeless person from the Amos House. He rode with him on the buses and visited his friends who lived near the train station. What Gomes learned about the homeless amazed him. Common misconceptions include that the homeless consists mainly of "bums". In fact, "bums" constitute a mere 2% of the homeless in Rhode Island. He also learned that the homeless consist mainly of "decent, clean families" who faced tremendous rent hikes and sought the shelters "to get back on their feet." See "Bandwagon" p. 13

#### Khudiakov Speaks At Lunchtime Colloquium

On Wednesday, April 22, RI College was the scene of a "Lunchtime History Colloquium" entitled "Information and The Arms Race." The special guest speaker was Anatoly Khudiakov, First Press Secretary to the Soviet Delegation to the United Nations. Khudiakov's speech concerned his overview of the principles of foreign policy and international journalism in the Soviet Union.

"The world condition is a proportional result of the condition of relations between the United States and the Soviet Union," stated Khudiakov. "The Soviet Union is not satisfied with the present status of U.S.- USSR relations."

The Soviet Union, according to Khudiakov, stresses a belief in the spirit of "new thinking," especially pertaining to the nuclear age. However, Khudiakov claims his country does not see the same attitude in America. Events such as the Iceland Summit (1986) and the Soviet's attempt to include the United States in a moratorium on nuclear testing strengthened the Soviet's attitude on the matter.

"It is impossible for mankind to proceed to live under the nuclear threat. They will either perish in the 'fire' or survive for generations. The Soviet Union hopes for survival".

Khudiakov then moved the disucssion to journalism and its affects on the world condition. Khadiakov pointed out what he termed to be "serious changes in the Soviet Union in the direction of democratization and the

increasing role of the Soviet journalist in trying to match the changes.

"Three to five years ago, Soviet newspapers often distorted the truth", admits Khudiakov. "But then, so does the United States and its media." Khudiakov pointed out the ABC Miniseries "Amerka" as a prime example of such distortions. Khudiakov claimed the show was not

created by an anti-Soviet media, but by the incorrect perception of the Soviet Union by the American people. "Such a show is possible only in the USA." But Khudiakov was quick to point out the existence of some anti-American feeling, within the USSR, due to past unrealistic Soviet perceptions of the

"Solutions to our problems are possible", claimed Khudiakov. "We must create perception of equal partners in the super-power balance."

With the end to his speech, Khudiakov opened the floor to questions from the audience. Questions were of a wide range and covered many of the pressing issues and events of the last 3-5 years. When asked to comment on the completeness of Soviet media coverage of Afghanistan, Khadiakov replied that Soviet reporting was efficient long before Gorbachev's new policies.

"The Soviet people are well aware of the terrible situation in Afghanistan." Further quesions included the revival of Soviet nuclear testing and how Chernoble affected the thinking of the Soviet people.

#### Campus Crimes: The Facts

Many students at Rhode Island College have fallen victim to crime. Crime unfortunately is a part of society and is therefore inextricably woven into the thread of college life. "College crime" takes many forms ranging from the commonplace "purse snatchings" to physical abuse and rape.



Luckily, Rhode Island College, unlike its larger counterparts, is seldom the scene of violent crimes but unfortunately is the setting for theft.

Over the years Rhode Island College has seen many forms of theft ranging from the theft of telephones and office equipment to the theft of carpeting. As a matter of fact, 1986-87 has seen a 13.86% increase in overall crime after nearly a decade of decreasing criminal acts. Although automobile theft has

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### For the Health of It

AIDS information is from the Office of Health Promotion, by Mary Olenn, R.N., Health Consultant, and Health Promotion Staff: Judy Goff, Linda Todd, Charlie Patti, Nancy Bariel, and Rose Catarina.

Q. What do the results of the AIDS antibody test mean?

A. The AIDS antibody test tells, simply and accurately, whether the body fluid is infected with the AIDS virus. The test does <u>not</u> determine whether or not you actually have AIDS. If the antibody is <u>absent</u>, and the test is <u>negative</u>, it means one of the following is true:

1. The person has not been infected with the AIDS virus OR

 The person has had contact with th AIDS virus but has not become infected and therefore has not produced antibodies OR

3. The person has been infected by the virus but has not <u>yet</u> developed antibodies. Research indicates most people will produce antibodies 2-8 weeks after infection. However, some people do not produce antibodies for 3-6 months after infection. Therefore, if you feel that you may have been exposed to the AIDS virus last noight, to get a blood test tomorrow would do no good because you would not have developed antibodies anyway.

If the test shows that the antibody is present, and the test is positive, it means all of the following are true:

1. The person's blood had been tested and antibodies to the virus are present

2. The person has been infected with the AIDS virus and antibodies have been produced

3. Researchers have shown that most people with AIDS antibodies have active virus in their bodies. Therefore, a person with positive test must assume he or she is capable of passing the virus on to others under the correct circumstances for transmission, even if he or she hasn't come down with AIDS.

Many of the people infected with AIDS virus do not develop symptoms of AIDS, yet are infectious to others.

Q. Are some types of sexual intercourse more dangerous in the transmission of the AIDS virus?

A. Many experts believe that the virus spreads more readily in anal intercourse than in vaginal intercourse because anal sex often involves breaks in rectal tissues, thus allowing easier entry of the virus into the bloodstream. Studies suggest that the receptive partner in anal sex is at greater risk.

Q. How is the virus transmitted in vagingal intercourse?

A. Scientists are not certain. One theory is that the virus passes through invisible breaks in the surface inside the vagina or on the penis. Some experts believe the virus may also enter through the numerous membranes or other soft tissues in the genital area.

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

encouraging words, and it is a shame that Mr. Farley did not live up to his own edict.

The budget process begins in February when student organizations who are funded by Student Community Government present their proposed budgets to the Finance Commission of SCGI. These budgets, with their associated justifications, are reviewed by the finance commission and appropriate cuts in the budgets are suggested. This information is compiled and organized into a document containing the previous year's budget, the new budget request, and the commission's recommendations. This document is distributed to each member of parliament who is charged with reviewing the budgets and voting on

During the evenings of the budget hearings, each organization comes before the entire body of Parliament and presents its comments on the revised budget. Parliament then either makes changes (usually in the form of further cuts) and then votes to accept the budget. This process continues until all of the budgets have been reviewed. The Treasurer then reports on the total amount allocated and the parliament votes to ratify the budgets as a package. There were deviations from this process this year.

During the meeting before budget hearings, Beatrice Lanzi, the treasurer, informed Parliament that finance commission had failed to reduce the budgets by enough, and that additional cuts would be required. She suggested an across the board cut of 10% from all budgets. This issue was debated, and it was resolved that this issue would be taken up after the budget hearings, if necessary.

For the most part, the hearing proceeded without a hitch, but their were some budgets with problems. WXIN's original request was to increase their budget by about \$14,000 to a total of \$32,320. The finance commission recommended a deposit (the amount of money given to an organization) of \$20,547, which was more than \$2,000 higher than their previous year's budget. WXIN requested \$8,000 for telephones. up from \$5,000 last year. This was justified with the explanation that they are returning to their old broadcast method of AM carrier current because of problems with obtaining an FCC license (WXIN began their FM broadcasts illegally, and had problems with the FCC this year). This was justified because they have to get the signal from the Student Union to the dorms via telephone wires. They claimed that New England Telephone had quoted them a figure of \$3,000 to perform this. They had no proof or documentation to back up this claim, but it was accepted nonetheless.

There were also questions raised as to whether or not it was the function of the radio station to provide social events for the students. representative from WXIN claimed that the parties sponsored by the radio station were intended to increase campus awareness of the radio station in hopes of generating more listeners. It was pointed out by a parliament member that the station's signal couldn't be received in some of the dorms anyway, so there was little point in promoting the station. There were a few cuts (totaling \$500) to the budget before it was ratified by parliament. There were a number of eloquent speeches from Rich Farley reminding the body that the budget cuts "should be constructive and not based on personal vendettas against the station." course, Mr. Farley is on the WXIN advisory board, and thus it is to his benefit to have the station receive as large a budget as possible.

The next budget of note came from the *Anchor*. This organization, upon hearing that the finance commission recommendations were over budgeted, found additional places to make cuts. At the meeting Sarah Frechette, executive co-editor, cut an additional \$675 from the deposit of the *Anchor*'s budget which had already been cut by \$1,200 from last year. Parliament applauded this effort and after some discussion passed the budget.

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Another organization with a budget of note is the Debate Council. Rich Farley is the president of this club. Debate asked for an additional \$1,225 to send more students to debates. This is a good idea, but the amount of money that they are requesting for this is excessive. The total of \$6,000 that was asked for would send about 100 teams to debates next year. This is would average more than 5 teams to each debate. This is more than the debate council can recruit! This is an average far higher than they have ever sent in the past, but Mr. Farley said that they needed the money, so Rich got richer.

Student Community Government asked for about \$4,000 more than their 1986-87 deposit of \$18,000. The finance commission recommended that they receive \$19,000. This figure was justified by Ms. Lanzi that they spent lots of money this year (the amounts were listed) and they intend to spend more next year. This rational was laughed at when Harambee used it, but Ms. Lanzi felt that SCGI really needs the money, therefore they should get it. The budget was passed.

Let us examine the total monies allocated by SCGI. There was about \$230,000 to be allocated based on the estimated amount of revenue from the student activities fee. Of this, \$78,000 is being spent on the payroll line item. This payroll pays for the office personnel in the SCGI office and two other people that SCGI has been burdened with over the years (a graphics coordinator, who should be be paid by the Campus Center, and a teacher at the on-campus day-care center). In addition, SCGI will receive about \$19,000 for their operations. This totals \$97,000 that is being spent to administer a budget of \$230,000. This is ridiculous! 42% of the budget is being spent to properly distribute the monies; to distribute the monies to organizations which are headed by Rich Farley. This stinks, plain and simple.

Rich Farley has also told the *Anchor* both publicly and privately that he would back increases in the *Anchor*'s budget if we ran his picture in the paper. This is a conflict of interest, yet it is in line with Rich's political ideals.

Finally, after all the budgets had been ratified, Parliament was informed that the monies allocated were too high for the budget, and additional cuts were necessary. This was the wrong time to say this. The budgets should have been cut with the consent of the organizations, but instead, the budgets were slashed when there was nobody to defend them. This is very low. It was nice of Parliament to exempt budgets of small organizations (under \$1,100), but at the same time they exempted the Payroll account.

I fought the fact that the Anchor was being cut by an additional 10% after voluntarily cutting their budget by 5% to help SCGI. Nobody cared, and Rich even felt that the Anchor was stupid to make helpful cuts in the first place. This attitude is a slap in the face to organizations that are helpful.

All in all, this year's budget hearings were no different from those in years past. Budgets of organizations that are close to the executives of Parliament, got nice budgets, all other organizations had to help with Parliament's on-going budget problems. The only twist was that this year Parliament and the Finance Commission did not have the guts to face the organizations when they were making the additional 10% cuts.

### Martee LeBow Debuts at the Living Room

Atlantic solo artist Martee LeBow turned in a riveting debut performance at the Living Room on Friday, April 7. LeBow, a young "on-the-rise" vocalist just beginning to break onto the national music scene, is currently touring clubs throughout the country with Little America trying to build a positive reputation for herself (and sound, which falls into that "Made the American Way" style of rock and roll).

LeBow and friends took no pains at delivering some hard energetic songs at the start of the set. "Maybe You'll Remember" and the title cut, "Love's A Liar" showed an optimistic, yet passionate side of LeBow vocally. She and guitarist Bobby Messano blended the vocals together with Scott Kreitzer's

wailing sax outbursts and Messano's even solos for those songs and a pop rock ballad which allowed everybody in the band room to jam, "Where Do I Stand."

LeBow even brought an old Elvis classic, "Burning Love", and a Springsteen hit which she said she wished she had written, "Heart's a Stone" into the set, expanding on both with vibrant improvisations on both sax and vocals. She then endrd the show with some optimistic advice before swinging into "Hang On", a kind of rock-philosophy-oriented song that showed that Martee and her band are determined to commit 100 % to any song until all eyes are fixed on the stage! The energy and light-hearted presence LeBow showed during the entire sixty minutes on April 7 will hold sturdily in America.

### Fetchin' Bones - Bad Pumpkin

Fetchin' Bones, who clearly represent the late 80's musical movement of the south, have built up a wide following throughout the entire country, but their vinyl success, in terms of sales, remains an enigma among the industry. Despite this, Fetchin' Bones, along with some other North Carolina bands, (The Connells) are adding some fresh air into the college music scene which sometimes hits periods of staleness and lost identity.

These critic's darlings have molded their wide influential spectrum into a sound that generates an image of uncontrolled musical fury. These North Carolina native's musical content posesses some clear-cut electric mold definitions, while on the other side of the river Fetchin' Bones also can just as easy create a "punkish" musical force with the intensity equal to an elephant stampede.

But it seems that Fetchin' Bones is going to be one of those bands who are going to be a "band's band"; meaning that they will gain the respect and admiration of their peers, which is far more important than selling enough albums so you can get your picture in some yuppy musical mag. Michael Stipe of R.E.M. listed Fetchin' Bones first album, <u>Cabin Flounder</u> as one of his personal favorites of 1985.

Well, it's 1987 and Fetchin Bones' fall release of <u>Bad Pumpkin</u> gives them some crucial and potent college exposure. Not only dothey make a dent in the CMJ (College Music Journal), but Fetchin' Bones tour extensively throughout the United States. This band has toured with such notable bands (and as notorious) as the Replacements and Guadalcanal Diary, and have created a great interest in their "doings".

On their second album, Bad Pumpkin, the band stayed with the expertise of Producer Don Dixon (R.E.M., Marti Jones, Guadalcanal Diary), who helped capture the raw and razor-sharp output of these N.C. natives. Although their first and second albums are essentially the same in content and lyrical message, Bad Pumpkin's material is still fresh and exciting in every manner. Vocalist Hope Nichols offers her listeners a sense of uncontrollable beauty through her distinguished style, while the rest of the band plays with continuity and honesty. Throughout all this, Fetchin' offers an entertaining and enjoyable piece of record.

I played it often hoping that, like many LP's that I dislike upon first impression, Midnight to Midnight would grow on me. But after two months of being brainwashed by the Psychedelic Furs, I think it's pretty safe to say that I don't like this alubm and never will.

Reason #1: All the songs sound the same. This alone wouldn't be so bad, I mean, all of Bon Jovi's songs sound alike and they're great.

Reason #2: I no longer have any respect for the music. The Furs were once a pretty cool band, but I began to question their judgement when they re-mixed "Pretty in Pink" to sound light and fluffy. I bought the Mirror Moves LP and I liked the first side. But that's as far as it went. Then I saw "Pretty in Pink" and I had a problem with the re-mix. But now I've gone over the edge, that great chasm of fan discontent, never to return again.

Reason # 3: The music is watered down, wishy-washy, namby-bamby, over produced, over-synthesized and generally, doesn't sound anything like the earlier material. ### Hoodoo Guru Blows-some-Cool about New Gurus LP

The new Hoodoo Gurus LP entitled (are you ready for this?), Blow Your Cool is finally on record store shelves! The title may sound a bit brash, but Hoodoo Gurus guitarist Brad Shepherd assured me in a recent interview that the title really has a down-to-earth message about it . "Blow your cool, yes indeed; that's the truth," he laughs. "We implore everybody to blow their cool and stop being so 'closed-faced'." On a whole, the title is the statement best characterizing the theme and approach they took while recording. It is also an album, Shepherd says that has captured thelatest Hoodoo Gurus style. You may wonder how that collaboration ever got together? Back in 1986, the Hoodoo Gurus were added to the Bangle bill (thus becoming a

co-bill') where they opened up shows in the U.S. for several months. The two bands, Shepherd related, became rather close as a result of the tour. Surprisingly though, the critics didn't understand that at all. We got along great with the girls."

and said, 'you'd be out of your mind to sign the Hoodoo Gurus'."

Yet Bigtime Records (and now Elektra Records) took their chances on the band, and three inventive albums have come forth so far.

But back to the Bangles. "They were going to reciprocate the favor of us opening for them by coming to Australia and opening for us," Shepherd explained. "But, we had trouble. We figured our album would have been finished by October of last year, but that didn't happen. The album took longer than expected, and their album had done unexpectedly well (in December), so they had more touring to do. We had intended to work on that song anyway when they got to Australia, so we just recorded the bulk of the tracks over there and came down here with a 'slave tape.'

Shepherd and the rest of the Hoodoo Gurus recently came for a quick tour of the U.S. about a month before Blow Your Cool was released. He says the response they've received so far is "fantastic". "But, we've got no product out at the moment," he relates. "The single comes out today, but the tour is almost over. We haven't played (prior to the beginning of the tour), we haven't played for eight months. So, we're just getting back up to match fitness again."

Perhaps now that the Hoodoo Gurus are ready to swing with this new album, a return visit will be in sight soon. Watch for them!

the Soviet Union, he was assigned to the permanent mission in New York as Press Secretary.

As Press Secretary, Mr. Khudiakov reads reports and issues statements on different actions of the United Nations. He is a member of the Soviet Delegation of the Special Political Committee to the General Assembly. He frequently participates in press conferences and has appeared on Good Morning America and Nightline.

When asked about his dealing with American journalists, he said he found them generally "highly professional" but that once in a while they were apt to exploit facts or have a different interpretation of statements.

Mr. Khudiakov believed there were bad perceptions of the Soviet Union by Americans. He said the ABC mini-series Amerika was "slanderous anti-Soviet, anti-UN propaganda" that was used to disrupt U.S.-Soviet relations at a time they were improving. Mr. Khudiakov stated, "The Soviet Union has never tried or wanted to invade the United States."

Mr. Khudiakov said that there are drug and alchohol problems in the Soviet Union also, not unlike ours in the U.S. He said that there are some anti-American sentiments in the U.S.S.R. Some of these were evident after the Soviet showing of a series of *Phil Donahue* shows filmed in Moscow. Some Soviets decried the shows as "American Propaganda."

Mr. Khudiakov believes these problems can be solved by an improvement in mutual perceptions. He believes this can be begun by "creating a climate of mutual trust and understanding by journalists" and the media.



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
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
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




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


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for little pay. Not me. My job takes just one weekend a month and two weeks a year. Yet, I'm earning \$18,000 for college.

Another misconception is that the homeless are predominantly black whereas the truth lies in the fact that a sizeable percentage are white, lower-middle class people who could have lived in "your neighborhood or mine" at one point. The homeless, in essence, can be found "in your own backyard." "Where Home Is" was the outcome of the unforgettable experience of interacting on a personal level with the homeless and the decision to begin charity "at home."

Gomes at this point identified the problem, decided to do something about it, and wrote the three songs which were to become Three Sides of Hunger. what he really needed now were two things: money and publicity. On April 27, 1986, Gomes organized a twelve hour concert to raise money to produce the album. Fleet National Bank and Sleepy Hollow each contributed \$3000 toward the effort. People started noticing R.I. Bandwagon and the ball was started to roll.

The next step involved organizing a chorus for "A Piece of our Hearts." Gomes sent tapes and an invitation to 144 people and to his surprise, all responded favorably. On May 11, 1986, Three Sides of Hunger became a reality. Some of the people in the chorus included Providence Mayor Joseph Paolino, Big John Bina (WPRO-FM), Hank Bouchard (WPRI-TV), Joyce Cambell (Massai), Ty Davis (The Newpaper), Bob Guisti (Rash), John Martin (Critical Few), Carl Sugarman (The Living Room). Jim Tull (The Amos House), Patrice

Wood (WJAR-TV) and the list goes on.

If that wasn't enough, John Cafferty fans delighted in the fact that this nationally famous musician was ready to help. Cafferty and Mark Cutler (the Schemers) added some lyrics and sung the duet "Where Home Is." Cafferty also allowed a flyer to be sent in his fan club albums in countries as far away as Japan.

Five thousand copies of Three Sides of Hunger were distributed to 110 record stores throughout the state. To celebrate, an all-day concert at the Living Room was held on December 7, 1986 which over 1000 people attended.

On December 10, 1986, many Rhode Island radio stations agreed to play "A Piece of our Hearts" at precisely 10:15 a.m.. During the simulcast, Gomes was interviewed by WLKW. The word was officially out.

To date, R.I. Bandwagon has sold about 1500 copies of the album and has helped to raise about \$10,000 for the R.I. homeless and hungry. Gomes is determined to see this project though to the end.

To do this the month of May has been declared "Hunger and Homelessness Month." From today until May 31, anyone who donates \$5.00 or more to any of the 250 agencies for the hungry and homeless will receive a complimentary copy of Three Sides of Hunger. The Fund for Community Progress has taken 500 albums to sell. Channel 36 has taken 100 albums to auction to raise money to maintain programs dealing with the hungry and homeless. Finally, Gomes is offering a free concert (by Tom

Keegan and the Language) and 100 records for the high school that sells 150 copies of Three Sides of Hunger

150 copies of Three Sides of Hunger.

The success of the album, however, is only part of the solution. People must also be aware of the situation. For this reason, Gomes has arranged for segments of the December 7 concerts to be aired on the R.I. Interconnect. During "Hunger and Awareness Month", segments of the concert will be shown one night a week to raise awareness.

And it won't stop there. Since April 27 is the birthdate of R.I. Bandwagon, Gomes plans to organize a yearly Bandwagon event consisting of about thirty acts at the Living Room to help raise and maintain awareness.

As Rhode Islanders, all of us should do our part to assist Gomes in achieving his goal and helping to feed the hungry. This can be done with as little as \$5.00.

Not only will you help feed the hungry and shelter the homeless, but you will get an album that contains the talents of many local musicians and great music. In addition to the local "celebrities" who make up the chorus, "A Piece of our Hearts" allows each artist to contribute his/her own vocal style. "Surrender to Serenity" is also an upbeat tune which Jim Beaupre of the Probers enthusiastically sings. "Where Home Is" is the Cutler-Cafferty duet. The beat to this should be no stranger to Cafferty fans.

Each of these three songs deals with three types of hunger-hence, the title Three Sides of Hunger. These are the physical, emotional, and social hungers.

How does Gomes feel about all of this attention? Modestly he answers, "It's great for the record. . but there's more work to do after the glory." For now, this is Gomes' ambition. On the long term scale, Gomes would like to do promotion and production in the record industry.

The moral of the story? "Any goal is reachable. . .and anyone can do something about whatever bothers you." If hunger in R.I. "bothers you", pick up a copy of Three Sides of Hunger at any record store or donate at least \$5.00 to any R.I. agency (and get the album free) to do your part for this worthwhile cause.

Help end hunger in Rhode Island.

Such confrontational journalism distorts reality and creates sides where none ever existed.

decreased substantially, larceny from vehicles has been on the increase. In addition, theft from buildings is currently the major crime committed on campus.

Richard M. Comerford, Director of Rhode Island College Security and Safety attributes this increase in crime to " a false sense of security."

The decrease in crime has falsely assured the college community that there is a corresponding decrease in the amount of criminals. Unfortunately, this is not true. Since the majority of crimes at Rhode Island College are committed by outsiders, there is always a constant threat.

Many people no longer secure their cars as adequately as they did in the Students leave personal belongings unattended and often leave dormitory rooms unlocked inviting criminals.

Although Comerford admits, "A campus without crime is probably not possible," he cannot stress too heavily the importance of taking preventitive measures.

Many times people who find themselves victims of crime fail to report these crimes. They feel the property is not recoverable and therefore reporting the crime is of no use to anyone. Such an assumption is false. Security and Safety retains detailed records of such reports. These records are used to formulate statistics which show the officers where crimes are most frequently comitted. Such information can help prevent similar occurences in

Of the twenty-two Security officers, eleven are valid police officers trained through police academies therefore when alleged criminals are apprehended, standard police procedures are followed. If students are convicted of a crime, they are subject not only to penalties under the law, but also to review by the College Disciplinary Board.

Comments made by student victims often suggest that Security and Safety do little more than hand out tickets. Not true.

Comerford explains, "Students don't see the things that our officers are doing at night such as preventitive patrols.'

Students tend to take such duties for granted. Because we seldom see such serious crimes as rape, assault, and arson, we tend to overlook the part Security and Safe'y play in preventing such crimes.

As for tickets, Comerford explains that the ticketing of automobiles is an important part of their responsibilities. The majority of tickets given is for parking in fire zones or reserved handicapped spaces. In the event of a fire, space is needed to get the necessary equipment in the area. As for people who park in handicapped zones, these spaces are specifically reserved for the handicapped, who need them.

Security and Safety therefore plays an important role in deterring crime on campus, but they cannot do it all. Preventitive measures are essential. If you are interested in how you can safeguard yourself against crime, stop by the Security and Safety Office for your Crime Prevention and Personal Safety Handbook. To keep our campus safe, everyone must take part.
