## The Krukowski Report: A View of Our School

On July 7, 1987 an article appeared in the Providence Journal Bulletin which highlighted a controversial report about Rhode Island College. The article entitled, "Harsh Study of RIC Says College Needs New Standards, Image" reflected findings and recommendations of the highly critical Krukowski Report.

Reaction to the article stimulated much school pride, and students, faculty and administration defended Rhode Island College faithfully. Numerous letters were sent to the editor expressing displeasure with both the Journal article and the study itself.

J.D. Walker, Speaker of Student Parliament accused the Bulletin of "emphasizing the negative aspects of the study," jumping on the "Let's attack Rhode Island College" bandwagon, and portraying the study"...in a favorable

Others attacked the study itself. One of the major criticisms of the report was that the college was judged on criteria applicable only to private institutions. Jan Krukowski Associates had never studied a public institution of

higher learning before.
On July 11, 1987 the Bulletin responded by printing an editorial entitled, "Reality Shines Beyond Image in Evaluation of Rhode Island College.' This article was highly positive in tone and stated that the Krukowski Report "...may or may not be an accurate assessment of how R.I.C. is viewed. We don't think it is.'

The Krukowski Report was an evaluative study of the college conducted by Jan Krukowski Associates, an independent public relations firm. Krukowski Associates was originally contracted by the school in August of 1985 and produced the final draft of their report on June 9, 1986. Prior to the Bulletin article, the Krukowski Report had been discussed and analyzed by Rhode Island College faculty and administrators for over a

In the past, Rhode Island College has initiated many studies, including The Report of Institutional Self-Study conducted through the New England Association of Schools and Colleges, Inc. (August, 1980) and the Proposed

# New Library Policies in Effect

The library here on campus has expressed a concern for the problem of students eating, drinking, smoking, and socializing inside the building. This behavior creates a mess, is disruptive, and will no longer be tolerated

Mr. Richard Olsen, Director, says he believes one of the reasons, in part, for this behavior, is the fact that there is not a great deal of space on campus for students to meet, relax, and socialize. Another reason, Mr. Olsen believes, is that the student lounges, such as the Donovan Dining Center and the Student Union do not offer amplespace for students to meet for socializing and group projects. The Donovan Dining Center, however, is open late and is an appropriate place to meet for such things as group projects.

The Library staff is trying to have students recognize that this behavior cannot be allowed to continue. In doing so, the library has issued a new policy statement which states clearly

The purpose of the library is to provide the materials, services, and environment necessary for research and scholarship.

In order to provide and maintain a

library which is quiet, comfortable, clean, and conducive to study, all library users are asked to abide by the following policies:

-Food and beverages may not be consumed in the library.

-Smoking is to be confined to the area on level 3 which has been designated as the "smoking area."

-Loud or inappropriate behavior is not permissable

-Anyone who does not abide by these policies will be asked to leave.

In addition to these policies, the staff is in the process of hiring student help who will be making rounds throughout all areas of the library and stationed at the front and rear entrances, to be sure that these rules are not proken. As stated in the policy, if one does not comply, he or she will be asked to

As a continuation on the issue, the College will host a SOAR conference (Society Organized Against Racism) in

Strategic Plan for Rhode Island College 1983-84 through 1986-87 (September, 1983).

Jan Krukowski Associates did have positive comments about the school's overall academic atmosphere. report stated that Rhode Island College ... far better than the marketplace is willing to acknowledge... and the college is far, far better than its prime competitors which prospective students believe to be academically stronger."

Many of its other findings were highly critical and were severely attacked by school supporters. Among these findings were the theories that Rhode Island College is predominantly a "default" choice which mainly attracts' students from low socio-economic backgrounds. Furthermore, the report concluded that Rhode Island College does not foster independence among its students and is relatively unknown to high school seniors and their parents.

By the time of its release many of the solutions proposed had already been implemented or were in the process. Other recommendations such as playing down Liberal Arts" and adopting the Marketing slogan "We Teach What The World Demands" were excused as "inappropriate." The Rhode Island College Mission Statement reflects the tenet that Rhode Island College is dedicated to attracting "...a more diverse and cosmopolitan student body, racial and ethnic minorities, the economically disadvantaged, and the handicapped." Such an official statement certainly does not condone an atmosphere of "exclusivity" which the Krukowski Report highlights.

Among the improvements made on the campus since the printing of the study are improvement of its admissions publications, improved landscaping, renovations of many buildings including the Donovan

Dinning Center, installation of new carpeting, the improvement of the Perspectives Alumni magazine, implementation of a new registration system, approval of a new recreation complex, and the abolition of the acronym "RIC."

Applicants must not have completed, by the beginning of the Fall 1987 term, more than 20 semester hours, or equivalent, of study in the science or engineering fields listed above following completion of the first baccalaureate degree in science of engineering or its equivalent. This guideline is applied to all course work earned after October 1, 1977 regardless of purpose or whether credit for those hours is available for study toward another degree. No individual will be eligible who, at the time of application has earned after October 1, an advanced degree having a significant science or engineering content. Advanced degrees presumed for eligibility purposes to have significant science and engineering content include any advanced degree in science or engineering and any medical degree, such as the MD, DDS, or DVM.

Stipend and Allowances: The stipend is \$12,300 for a twelve-month tenure. In addition, NSF will provide fellowship institutions, on behalf of each Fellow, with a cost-of-education allowance (\$6,000) in lieu of all tuition costs and assessed fees. # Trinity Repertory Plans Future

During the first Board of Trustees retreat in Trinity Repertory Company's 24-year history, Adrian Hall, founding Artistic Director of the Company; E. Timothy Langan, Managing Director; Bruce G. Sundlun, Chairman; and other members of the Board confronted the major issue in the theatre's long life in this community: the eventual departure of Adrian Hall and the need for preparing a smooth and effective period of transition in artistic leadership.

The Baord of Trustees of Trinity Repertory Company, in a two-day retreat last week, made extensive plans for the future of the Company, including the establishment of the Adrian Hall Research Center to document the history, and the establishment of a committee to study changes in the artistic direction of other theatre companies around the country, in anticipation of the day when Adrian Hall no longer serves as Artistic Director of Trinity Rep.

Mr. Sundlun said, "The retreat was the best I have ever participated in, largely due to Adrian Hall's frankness and leadership. Mr. Hall gave us a fascinating history of American theatre, and pointed out that Trinity Rep, with its 24-year history, was one of the longest surviving theatre organizations in the history of the United States. He said that many theatre groups fail when the founding Artistic Director moves on, and that Trinity Rep must now prepare for his eventual retirement. He offered to help find a successor, and he set no time limits for the change."

Mr. Sundlun continued: "It was a great discussion, because the biggest problem involving succession of leadership in organizations is generally that no one feels free to even discuss the subject in the presence of the existing head of the organization. Adrian Hall debunked that theory by being the leader of the discussion."

At the age of 59, after a life-long commitment to the development of Trinity Rep as a major force in the international theatre, and to the strengthening of the national repertory-theatre movement as a means to forge a vital relation between artist and audience, Adrian Hall has recognized his personal need to explore new areas of his artistic talents and to lead Trinity Rep into a new period of

The cast consists of five "Little Sisters of Hoboken". The plot centered around these nuns' dilemma. They must raise enough money to bury the four sisters who are being chilled in the freezer. You see, Sister Julia "Child of God" poisoned fifty-two of the convent's sisters with

her soup. However, because of financial limitations, they could only afford to bury 48 of them and get their new Betamax. Hence, four of the decreased nuns remain to be buried and money must be raised.

This plot was cleverly put aside occasionally to offer the audience a bit of convent humour. In "So You Want to be a Nun", Sr. Amnesia and her puppet Sr. Mary-Onnette quips "You can have everything, you just can't own it." "Baking With the BVM" (Blessed Virgin Mary) the sisters discuss recipes such as Roast Lamb of God and Mary Magdelene Tarts.

These Little Sisters of Hoboken offered an image of nuns quite different from what is often perceived. Each of the thirty-one scenes provoked uncontrollable laughter. Yes, these nuns were hysterical. And just in case you were wondering, the sisters do eventually get the money to bury the four sisters. But this is not the main point. The audience almost forgets the purpose of the play because of the humourous skits that tickle the funny hone.

Nunsense, which played at Trinity over the summer was the perfect musical-comedy mix. Nunsense revealed the humor the habit. These nuns were everything we wished they were when we went to Catholic school. Maybe they really were behind the convent doors. Hmmm....

Replacements: Please to Meet Me (Sire/Warner Bros.)

Now that the Replacements have given Sire/Warner Bros, their second album since joining the "major leagues", the once post punk foursome have slipped their feet into the adventurous and monotonous world of Album oriented rock 'n' roll. 

resource center at Trinity Rep--a living archive of great significance to the American theatre--which will preserve the oral histories of the Company members, collect in a central location all of the theatre's print archives, and eventually become a repository for artists, scholars, and the community. As a new generation prepares for leadership, the achievements of this theatre must not be forgotten--indeed, must be maintained.

Mr. Sundlun said that the establishment of the research center, which was also Mr. Hall's idea, will be funded commencing with next year's

# Special Assistant To President For Development Named At R.I. College

A director of development at Ohio State University has been named to the newly created position of special assistant to the president for development at Rhode Island College.

Richard E. Payne of Delaware, Ohio, the director of development in the College of the Arts at Ohio State since 1982, was appointed this week by President Carol J. Guardo. He assumed his new position in late August.

Payne's primary duties will include those of planning, coordinating and administering a comprehensive fund-raising program, the goal of which will be to raise financial support for the college from private, alumni, and corporate sources, said Guardo.

As the special assistant, he will also oversee the operations and activities of the Office of Alumni Affairs and serve as principal liaison to the Rhode Island College Foundation Board. The new position further expands upon the responsibilities of the position of the director of development which had been held by James E. Gilcreast, Jr., who resigned in February to assume the position of vice president for development at Kennedy Memorial Hospital in Brighton, Mass.

Prior to his development position, Payne served as assistant to the vice president for public affairs at Ohio State from 1977 to 1982. Previously, he had been an associate director of admissions and an assistant director of the Upward Bound program, both at Ohio Wesleyan University.

Payne received a bachelor's degree from Ohio State and a master of education degree from Xavier University in Cincinnati.

# Grellner To Lecture In Poland Under Fulbright Exchange

Dr. Alice Grellner, professor of English and education at Rhode Island College, has been awarded a Fulbright grant to lecture in Poland, the Board of Foreign Scholarships and the United States Information Agency (USIA) announced recently.

Grellner, who moved to Providence when she joined the college faculty in 1970, will be teaching language theory and methods of teaching at Jagellonia University in Krakow. She leaves Sept. 8 for a 10- month period.

Professor Grellner has been teaching teachers as director of the Masters of Education/English as a Second Language Program here for the past

nine years. She is a native of Okarche, Okla.

She is one of about 2,500 U.S. grant winners being sent abroad for the 1987-88 academic year under the Fulbright exchange program which was established in 1946 "to increase mutual understanding between the people of the United States and the people of other countries."

Grant recipients are selected on the basis of academic and professional qualifications plus their ability and willingness to share ideas and experiences with people of diverse cultures, according to program information.

the scene a few times before going for a take. The camera began to roll, and the director yelled, "Action". This portion of the scene was filmed many times. When the crew was ready to do different angles and close-ups, everyone had to wait for them to move the camera and reset the lights. 


Trinity Rep budget. It is anticipated that Mr. Hall will be the Director of the center, and Trinity Rep's staff will be consulting with local colleges and universities as to the best way to proceed.

At the retreat, the Board of Trustees also discussed completion of the National Endowment for the Arts Challenge Campaign, which requires Trinity Rep to raise \$1.6 million by May 30, 1988, in order to receive a grant of \$355,000 from the NEA. TRinity Rep has raised \$1.3 million to date, and the Trustees felt confident that the balance would be raised within the time limit allowed.

The retreat also thoroughly reviewed the history of Trinity Repertory Company since its founding in 1964, through financial difficulties and a serious schism between the prior Board of Trustees and Adrian Hall in 1975-76, and the subsequent elimination of a sizeable deficit leading to a profitable operation, to the point today where the Company is financially secure and has been able to complete construction of a new Upstairs Theatre and other major capital improvements.

We try not to think that as Congress grills Robert Bork about his beliefs and past statements, our personal freedoms may be hanging in the balance. Perhaps we are too busy considering the effects of the Krukowski Report, or the narrowly averted teacher's strike, or the last WXIN party.

But as the generation of today, we need to seriously consider the future that lies before us, and the very real possibility that Robert Bork as the next Supreme Court Justice could jeapordize those rights that we hold so

So what's all the fuss? Surely it is not due to the fact that Bork looks like a goat. In fact, it's nothing if you don't care what kind of precedents will be set in the Supreme Court for civil rights issues, or how drastically they will affect our lives. But it means something to us all if we desire to have the freedom to choose an abortion, or to be able to speak and write freely and/or privately.

The question that seems to be at hand, then, is who is being more truthful? Is it those who oppose Bork's nomination, and say that he has consistently proven himself to be anti-civil rights, or Bork and his supporters who assert that he is a moderate and has an excellent civil rights record? And how can we know at this stage how Bork would intend to make decisions in the future? We can only watch now as history is being made.

## RIC Report Ridiculous

Professor Rhett C. Jones Acting Director Afro-American Studies Brown University

If media accounts are correct, the recent report on Rhode Island College by Jan Krukowski Associates is ridiculous only where it is not silly or stupid. The report, commissioned by the RIC administration, criticized the College for lacking academic departments of distinction, being the college of last resort for students, and for having a rude staff. It also found fault with the admissions office telephone system and called the campus dirty. These are the ridiculous parts of

Now for the silly. Krukowski Associates recommends RIC downplay the liberal arts at a time when even proprietory technical schools are incorporating the teaching of the arts, humanities, and social sciences into their curricula. These job oriented institutions realize they ill-serve their students if they do not expose them to ideas outside the laboratory and computer center. Krukowski also recommends RIC adopt a slogan to

match this silliness. The motto of the College, it suggests, should be, "We Teach What The World Demands." The administration at Rhode Island College has sensibly rejected downplaying the liberal arts and the silly slogan.

Beyond silliness lies stupidity. Krukowski Associates recommend denying admission to top applicants who would then attend colleges elsewhere thereby giving the impression that RIC is an exclusive College. Willard Enteman, Provost of the College, has rightly turned down this dumb idea. Krukowski also dislikes the nickname "RIC," though what a name has to do with excellence in teaching, research, and community service is not clear.

On the other side of silliness and stupidity lies a flawed report. Krukowski Associates does not understand RIC nor does it know much about Rhode Island and Rhode Islanders. Rhode Island College has educated hundreds of Rhode Islanders who have gone on to serve the state. Not only are its departments of History and English highly regarded, but members of its faculty in Art, Anthropology,

Sociology, Urban Studies, and Geography are respected by their peers. Rhode Island College continues to be a leader in the graduate training of teachers with its many workshops, institutes, and courses insuring that teachers remain on the cutting edge of their disciplines. RIC's Adams Library-- unmentioned in most media accounts-- has the best collection of education journals in the state and a fine, knowledgeable, and helpful staff. Rhode Island faculty members are often involved in research of central importance to the state, and many of them are able to make their findings intelligible to the public. For example, Chester Smolski, Director of Urban Studies at RIC, writes regularly and clearly on urban affairs for the Providence Journal Bullitin.

While most undergraduates at RIC are the first in their families to attend College they are sensible enough to know there is more to a college education than preparing for a job. They turn out for lectures on such esoteric liberal arts subjects as "Comparitive American Race Relations," and "The Eighteenth Century Caribbean." Moreover, they push the lecturer a bit by asking intelligent, relevent, and penetrating

RIC is not perfect. For years it turned its back on the development of black studies in Rhode Island and failed to acknowledge its responsibility for commiting resources to educating its students on the peoples of Africa, Asia, and Latin America. Under the leadership of the College's new president, Carol J. Guardo, and with the work of such faculty as William Aho (Sociology), Carolyn Fluehr-Lobban (Anthropology and Geography), Richard Lobban (Anthropology and Geography), Amritjit Singh (English), Lawrence Sykes (Art), and Vernon Williams (History), RIC seems likely to finally discover the non-western world. And yes, the College needs to improve the central dining hall. The food, especially breakfast, is good, and the staff--both student and professional---are friendly, but the environment is depressing.

The College ought to immediately release all 133 pages of the Krukowski Associates report so that Rhode Islanders can see for themselves how ridiculous, silly, and stupid it is. It can then be used to line kitty litter boxes, though finicky cats will probably refuse to treat the Krukowski report as it deserves
