On October eighth, students, faculty, staff and alumni gathered to watch the Alumni Association present the Fruit Hill Avenue Marker to President Guardo. It is located at the Fruit Hill Avenue entrance of Rhode Island College and was erected during the summer. The gray marker bears the college's name and emblem.

The onset of the project began in May of 1986. Paul DeParry, who was the president of his class, presented part of the money as a class gift. He conceived the idea because his high school alma mater had a similar marker. DeParry worked with the classes of 1961, 1984 and 1985.

Following the introduction, Joe Neary, President of the Alumni Association, presented a plaque and the marker to President Guardo.

President Guardo likened the granite landmark to the school's strength. She called it a "wonderful symbol of Rhode Island College," because it was "strong, stable [and] enduring." In addition, she

commented that it was a "symbol of the future." Dr. Guardo acknowledged the alumni by saying, "The alumni care about Rhode Island College, and are proud of it." She expressed her sincere gratitude.

Due to the combined effort of the four classes, the marker will be a permanent reflection of Rhode Island College.

GRIST is Thinking Socially

The Group Reviewing Innovative Social Thought (GRIST) held its once a semester meeting on September 30 in the Sociology Lounge. GRIST was established to give faculty members from a variety of disciplines the opportunity to examine and discuss social thinkers outside the mainstream. This meeting centered around a discussion of Women, Family, and Corporate Capitalism, an article by Dorothy E. Smith. Smith argues, through use of Marxist terminology, that women have a vital role in the "class struggle". She maintains that

the role that women held was more substantial in the pre-industrial age because they were providing workers for the working class. She says that women have become disillusioned with the corporate world and its offerings without any specific reasons as to why.

The meeting was attended by faculty from the Departments of History, Anthropology, and Sociology. Dr. Thomas Ramsbey of the Sociology Department led off the discussion by declaring his difficulty with Smith's use of Marxist language. He said that the article was guilty of "oversimplification" and that Smith does not use "substantial" enough

terminology. Other faculty agreed. Dr. Browning of the History Department stated that Smith seemed to be looking nostalgically for a "golden age" before not only corporate capitalism but industrialization as well. All present agreed that they were able to place the article as a product of the late sixties of early seventies when women were exploring their newly expanded role or the society. Roger Clark, leader of GRIST and a member of the Sociology Department, claimed that is was unclear from the article "...whether men or corporate capitalism was the enemy."

Anti-Nuke Rally to be Held at E.B.

North Kingstown - Rhode Island Mobilization for Survival, an organization affiliated with the National Mobilization for Suvival, has planned a non-violent rally at the Quonset Point Electric Boat facility of General Dynamics on Saturday, October 24 from 11am to 3pm.

RIMFS's statement of purpose is that "RIMFS is a creative, nonviolent organization whose goals are to resist war and worldwide militarism, to ban nuclear power and weapons, and to meet human rights and needs." The rally is one tool by which they hope to accomplish this. They already have a number of speakers, information booths and music for the occasion.

Among those expected on the 24th are Michio Kaku, a professor of physics at the City of New York University, Brigadier General Mackie, who was an officer in the British Air Force, and a "conscientious objector," an individual who was in the navy and has left because of his disapproval of their orientation and direction.

RIMFS also distributes a newsletter, which lets people across the country know what progress is being made in their efforts for peace. They also arrange for other lectures at various times during the year. Just recently, they had a speaker at Brown University lecture on some previously undisclosed information about the Iran-Contra Affair.

Advanced Tuition Payment Plan Subject Of State Study

A special commission has been established to investigate the possibility of setting up an advanced tuition payment plan in R.I. The commission is mainly interested in determining how realistic a plan to pay future college tuition is for a stateas small as R.I. State representative Laurence Ferguson of Bristol heads the eleven member panel which consists of educators, legislators, banking executive and a variety of experts.

Presently, the commission is studying a Michigan plan which guarentees tuition costs for a student at a state college or university. A tuition payment plan for R.I. would have to be modified somewhat since a greater percentage of R.I. residents attend out-of-state colleges.

The commission is looking into two major areas, a savings plan and a guaranteed trust plan. Charlie Fogarty, policy director and press secretary for the General Treasurer's office, stated that both of these options encompass "a whole range of issues."

One problem according to Fogarty, is that tuition costs might not be fully covered by the time the student enters college, resulting in additional payments. Another consideration is

Because of the number of freshmen, transfer and returning students this year, Rhode Island College has been facing some major housing problems. There do not seem to be enough dorm rooms for those who want them. For a while, the problem with the crowded housing situation was so bad, students were given the opportunity to be released from their one year contracts in order to make housing available for other students.

As R.I.C. students enter their eighth week of classes, here is an update on the housing situation. At the beginning of the year there were 50 single rooms that were doubled. At present, a spokesman for the housing office states that the 50 double rooms have now been reduced to 11 female doubles and 17 male doubles. The

"Down's Syndrome:" An Outdated Term

In 1866, John Langlin Down published a paper formulating a hypothesis as to the cause of what has become known today as "Down's Syndrome." The paper, entitled, "Observations of Ethnic Classes of Idiots," attempts to explain the "Mongolian" characteristics, and appearance of the mentally retarded.

Down, an Englishman, argued that these characteristics were an example of a lower race, it was an atavistic throwback to a more primitive age. Hence, this was the reason why "Mongolian" features were present in the mentally retarded of England.

Unfortunately, Down did not provide any scientific data to prove his hypothesis. Race, and not science, is the foundation of Down's work, and it is from the popularity of Down that the term "Down's Syndrome" is derived.

In 1979, a Rhode Island College Professor, Dr. Carolyn Fleuhr-Lobban, wrote a paper in which she challenged the use of the term "Down's Syndrome" due to the fact that it is grounded chiefly by the racial attitudes of the 19th century. In a lecture given last Wednesday, Dr. Fluehr-Lobban had an opportunity to present her ideas in the midst of her colleagues here at R.I. College.

Dr. Fluehr-Lobban suggested that the term "Down's Syndrome" is outdated, and due to racial bias from which it was derived, it should be abandoned because it lacks scientific foundation. Trisomy 21, the proper scientific term for the genetic disorder, is the replacement which many are trying to introduce into the mainstream. Fluehr-Lobban feels See "Down's", p.7

Plagues and People: **History-Social Science** Fall Lunchtime Colloquia

In the conclusion of his masterful work, Plagues and People, William McNeill states: "Ingenuity, knowledge and organization alter but cannot cancel humanity's vulnerability to invasion of parasitic forms of life. Infectious disease, which antedates emergence of humankind, will last as long as humanity itself, and will surely remain as it has been hitherto one of the fundamental parameters and determinants of human history.' Experts, at the time, believed McNeill's assertion to be somewhat overdrawn as far as technologically advanced societies were concerned, but now, in the sixth year of the AIDS epidemic, McNeill's observations seem prescient. The purpose of this Lunchtime series is to present a broader view of the world's challenges in dealing with disease so as to best deal with the situation and problems connected with the spread of AIDS. Presentations will focus on selected examples of disease and epidemics in specific societies; social and cultural perceptions of disease; and populations and difussion of disease. The series will take place on Wednesdays at 12:30 p.m. in Gaige 207 (the history lounge). Speakers and topics are as follows:

October 28-"Paleopathology: The Case of Syphilis" given by Dr. Marc Kelly, Dept. of Anthropology, University of Rhode Island.

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
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

The Hooters' October 7 show down at the Boston's Metro night club will be one that will go down in the record

Hooters Rob Hyman and Eric Bazilian led into every number with the intention of treating it like it was the band's swan song, while guitarist John Lilley, bass guitarist Andy King and drummer David Uosikkinen followed

books. The minute the systems let the opening mixes to "Satellite" stream over the crowd, preparing them for an energy-charged opening, the five musicians made their way to their posts readying the initial "hey" for the start of "Satellite".

Not once during the two hour set did the Hooters let up on their drive. Lead their bandmates in song and dance style.

All Hooter hits both past and present and even a few Beatles hits were sandwiched into the set. After the initial opener, the band took a few steps back with two from the Nervous Night LP, "Hanging on a Heartbeat" and "South Ferry Road" pulsating into frenzies from all guitars.

To the band's disadvantage, the guitar sounds sometimes overrode the vocals and hooter. The blare of Lilley's guitar leads in "Don't Take My Car Out Tonight" left Bazilian's wail of a sax solo lost in the shadows. Similar disadvantages came about during "Where Do the Children Go" as guitarist Lilley struggled with the hooter trying to get it to sound during the solo

But slight blunders never held them back for a moment. At times, Bazilian would go out of his way, almost winding up in the audience, to get his point across either instrumentally or message-wise. Not only did the guy take on vocals and guitar, but also managed to play just about every other instrument present on the stage (save the drum kit) including the sax, the hooter, mandolin and even recorder during "Johnny B", the band's recent single.

A chameleon in spirit, he played the part well during an encore favorite, "Who's That Girl", an old Hooter classic that started off in the mode of the Who's "My Generation." After about two versus of that, he pleaded

Georges and Albin Come out of their Cage at PPAC

"La Cage Aux Folles" is a delightful comedy about two very different homosexual men -"one transvestite and one plain". The "plain", Georges, is the owner of La Cage Aux Folles nightclub. Albin, "the transvestite", is the star singer of the nightclub.

Marvelously choreographed, the dance routines of "Les Cagelles" were spectacular throughout the musical. This added a big portion of the comic element in "La Cage Aux Folles".

Embedded in this humorous approach, however, is an avenue of exploration into the real lives and, therefore, dilemmas of these two monogamous men-Georges and Albin (who have been together for twenty years). The obvious problem of exposing their homosexuality in public comes when Jean-Michel (Georges' son) decides to marry the daughter of an extremely conservative politician.

Here is where the problems begin for this couple. Jean-Michel attempts to hide Albin, who has been a mother to him for twenty years, from his future in-laws. He does this by redecorating his room, removing his clothes, and bluntly admitting that he does not wish for him to meet his future in-laws. Likewise, Georges tries to masculize Albin by teaching him to "slouch", "sit with open legs" and "act like John Wayne". Albin, just like a mother, puts himself last and sincerely attempts to change but to no avail.

Sex-role stereotyping is taken to its most extreme limits in this musical, as shown in the above pragraph. Georges is the husband in the relationship while Albin is the wife and mother. Georges is always dressed in "masculine" attire while Albin is either dressed as a woman or very flamboyantly while dressed as a man. The audience, therefore, forgets Albin's biological sex and conciously or unconciously assigns a sex to him based on his stereotypical behavior.

Ironically, because of the extremity of the discrepancy of Albin's sex, it somehow becomes irrelevant to the plot. Albin proclaims, "I am what I am", whatever gender that may be. The viewer finds him- or herself sympathizing with the rejection felt by Albin even though he is "unusual" by society's standards. Likewise, the viewer is touched when Jean-Michel reveals Albin's true identity as his mother to his future in laws.

Another inherent theme is a comment on women's liberation. "La Cage Aux Folles" paradoxically displays "male liberation". Just as women are becoming more independent of men in contemporary society ,so too are men- at least in this musical. Yet it is handled in a satirical and humorous manner which is quite effective. When Georges tells Albin of his son's engagement to a woman, Albin shriecks," Where did we go wrong?...snakes live with females, we are human, we know better."

This element becomes more obvious in a more subtle way. Jean-Michel's biological mother has played virtually no role in his upbringing. She gave birth to him which Georges and Albin are relunctantly willing to admit. Yet their constant confusion with Jean-Michels' age (they say he's twenty, he says he's 24) shows that the men perceive themselves as raising Jean-Michel without the help of his biological mother. Jean-Michel refers to him as "maman". Clearly, Albin has exhibited emotions and behaviors to Jean-Michel with which any mother can identify.

The presentation of two very opposite types of homosexual stereotypes eventually shed light onto the ridiculousness of such stereotypes to begin with. Towards the end of the musical, Georges says to the audience of the night club," After tonight you will leave with more than a folded program and ticket stubs." We did.

that it is necessary in the scientific world for terms to 9be refined, and re-defined so as to discount social influences of a past generation.

Down himself admitted to re-thinking his racial hypothesis of "Down's Syndrome," yet he never publically admitted that it was faulty in any way. Many in the field of medicine and genetic research resist the change in terminology, for in many circles Down's ideas are revered. Furthermore, not many associate racism with his hypothesis because many have not read his hard to find paper.

Regardless of these arguments, Dr. Fluehr-Lobban purports that the newly introduced term, Trisomy 21, should rightly make the replacement. Even now, many publications are making the

that of taxing the savings. Should this money set aside for future college costs be tax exempt? Should the interest earned be taxed? There are also concerns about terminating the policy should a decision be made not to attend college.

The commission is studying possible advantages to the plan such as tax incentives and Senator Pell's proposal of an educational IRA. "There is a tremendous level of activity within the commission," stated Fogarty who stressed that it is still in the process of looking into all aspects of the plan. No definite findings have been set as of yet. The commission which meets every other week, will make its report to the General Treasurer in late November.

interested in the movement for the Rights of Men. For more than 20 years, Ginzburg devoted his life to helping the Soviet people.

During these 20 years Ginzburg accomplished many things. First, he wrote and published three issues of his magazine on poetry. His second accomplishment was the writing of his book. This book described the differences between an actual manuscript of a trial and the televised version of the same trial. The point Ginzburg was trying to put across was to inform people that the Soviet government only puts on television what it sees fit, whether or not it is true or false. Thirdly, Ginzburg started a fund for prisoners. The name given to this fund was "Fund for Prisoners and Their Families". This fund was started over ten years ago and is still around today. It has helped hundreds of people. Ginzgurg's last accomplishment was to begin the Hellinske Watch Movement.

Over the course of these 20 years, Ginzburg was arrested three times. He spent over eight years doing hard labor in the prison camps. While serving his final term in 1979, Ginzburg was taken out of the camps and brought to Moscow. There he was deprived of Soviet citizenship and sent to New York in exchange for two Soviet spies.

Mr. Ginzburg is now touring the college circuit in the United States, lecturing on his life in Russia.

improving security in parking lots where there has been an increase in auto and equipment thefts. Mr. Gardiner suggested that a 24 hour camera be installed on top of a building, like a dorm, with a screen that could be viewed by an officer, and whereby all events would be taped. Last year, he asked Housing Department for funds for a camera, but was told that there were no funds for a camera. Parliament members suggested a fundraiser to raise money for the camera. President Lanzi suggested a large scale fundraiser where all student organizations could participate because "security affects everyone on campus."

William Baird, Director of the Athletic and Intramural Department, said that the weight room should be operating as of the end of last week in Walsh Basement floor. A suggestion was made that complaint forms be put in the library, dorms, and other prominent places where students could fill them out with their complaints and concerns for the Conditions and Services Committee to respond to.

Location for Calendar of Events Set

The Public Relations Committee has come up with a location to put a campus-wide calendar for Student Organizations to post their events. It will be put near the Student Union between Donovan, announced Missy Moore, chairman of Public Relations Committee.

Moore also brought up the idea of a Student Government Newsletter being published and distributed throughout the campus to let every student know what

is going on with parliament. She also suggested that parliament members and officers submit articles for the first newsletter. The idea was well received.

Sport Club Funding

Finance Commission Chairman, John McLaughlin reported that in its last meeting, Mr. John Taylor and William Baird of Athletic/Intramural Department came to speak on the controversy of funding sport clubs. As it now stands, Sport Clubs like the Rugby Club are not funded the same way sports are. The Commission decided to table this issue and to contact other colleges to find out what their policy is on funding sport clubs in order that R.I. College should decide who would be responsible for funding.

Liability Concerns for Off-Campus Events

Beatrice Lanzi said that the open forum to discuss off-campus events where alchohol is served, in particular Living Room parties, had a "low turn-out" but that those present did voice their concerns. The next step is to have both executive boards of WXIN and Student Government meet with legal counsel to set up a contract with guidelines for how these events should be held. Lanzi said they will also be using information that was used at the Holy Cross Conference held to discuss issues of legal liability. In addition, Mary E. Kennard, legal advisor for R.I. State Colleges and Universities, will be looking at the liability contract to be drawn up.

Lanzi also spoke about the

President's Council meeting on Wednesday, October 7. The president of each organization was invited to attend. "It gave all the presidents a chance to meet with each other, exchange ideas, concerns, and work together," said Lanzi. It was attended by 14 organizations and "a lot was accomplished." Due to its success, another meeting will be held in November.

The Conflict of Interest Policy was brought up for discussion. committee was set up to rewrite the policy which only states that parliament members and officers have to abstain from voting on matters of budgets of other organizations they belong to. It was agreed that clearer policy stating what constitutes a conflict of interest should be written.


Griffin and San Juan Named as Wrestling Co-Captains

The Anchorwomen also had Nancy Gillooly, who placed 5th in 20:55 and Jennifer Ouimette, who placed 8th in 21:29.


Lisa D'Antuono took 11th place in 21:45, Elizabeth Wolf took 13th in 21:54 and Janine Landry placed 17th in 23:01


Volleyball Team Wins R.I.C. Invitational
