Governor Sundlun's proposed budget includes a \$19 million dollar cut to the Higher Education budget and a widening of the sales tax to include textbooks.

The size of the cut was unexpected by many in the colegge community, including Higher **Education Commisioner Americo** Petrocelli. "We recognize that things are very difficult in the state. We were prepared to handle \$13 million (cut) rather than the \$19 million (cut) so that we wouldn't have to increase tuition above where we were in our plan. At this point I am very surprised," Petrocelli said. RIC President John Nazarian said that "at this point it

is not very optimistic outlook. I am somewhat surprised that Higher

maintain the current service level."

"The situation at this point in time not very rosy ... we have a sizable gap to meet.I think I have explained to the students, the faculty and staff that we have made so many cuts, there's nothing left to cut," Nazarian said.

According to Nazarian, how much tuition is going to increase is

Cut To Higher Education "difficult to project." He stated that at this point the college does not know how the Higher Education budget will be divided between three schools. "It could be some-

where as high as 15 or 16 percent...we hope that that does not become the case. If it does become the case, even then we would barely be able to accommodate the number of students (and) programs that we have," Nazarian said.

According to Nazarian, the three schools "together will have some influence on the General Assembly, to make them realize, and I'm sure they do realize, that we really do need more funds. The amount of those funds is something that will be determined once we get a more detailed printout. I mean there

was not very much given to us, except the bottom line figure for



all of Higher Education. How it separates out to the institutions is not clear yet. But it is not a very upbeat kind of mes-

PETROCELLI sage that we got the other day. We're still looking for the positive message. I think and I hope that we will be successful through the help of the students and faculty, the staff, and the General Assembly that we may be able to increase the funding for Higher Education."

Rhode Island College has two escort services on campus provided by both Security and WXIN, the campus radio station. The escort services became available to students a long time ago when a risk to students on a college campuses at night became more prevalent.

Rhode Island College Security provides the service from any-

WXIN has an escort service from Monday through Friday, from 6:00 p.m. to midnight. Disk Jockeys who work the night shifts escort students to their cars or to the dormitories in the evening.

Steve Botelho, the Public Service Director for WXIN is very enthusiastic about their program and encourages students to use the service, "even if one person a month uses (the service) then it's worth it."

Both Security and WXIN have experienced an increase in the amount of people who use the service. Most of the people who are using the escort services are dorm students. Commuters with late-night classes do sometimes use the service.

The escort services of both groups have experienced a slight,

but still significant increase in its usage. Michael Glynn, Assistant Director of Security, says that this happened for two reasons: firstly, students are more aware of the availability and secondly there is more publicity of students at risk on college campus-

Glynn did said that RIC is a relatively safe campus. Like all college campuses, RIC does have

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
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With the state and regional unemployment rates at record high levels, many May graduates are looking to move out of the state to find employment. This was the focus of the "Out of State Job Search" workshop given by Sharon Mazyck, Coordinator of the Career Development Center. About six people attended the workshop, which focused on the planning and resources available to

students considering looking for a job out of state. Mazyck prefaced the workshop,

saying "you guys are coming out



in the worst job situation I think we've seen in a long time in this state."

"An out of state job search ... is lot of work."

Mazyck said students should make contacts in the state where they plan to move. Relatives in an area can help someone looking

for a job because of their knowledge of the area and also because they may be able to let the job seeker stay with them while he or she is looking for a job.

Students should also begin keeping a record of who they've been in contact with at different

Students should also decide whether they will look for a job while they are still in Rhode Island or whether they will move to an area and then look for a job. According to Mazyck, the Career Development office can help students in planning a move to another state.

One of the most important areas students should research before beginning an out of state job search is their financial readiness. According to Mazyck, students "need to know what (their) money situation is."

ing for it to swing upwards. Try to keep upbeat, and hopeful that the decision makers in the state will hear our message and respond accordingly," Nazarian said.

Among several of the new items that will be subject to the state's 7% sales tax is textbooks. Petrocelli stressed that the textbook tax is not part of the higher education budget or something done by the Board of Governors for Higher Education, but part of a plan to widen the number of items that the state sales tax covers.

"The state budget office has selected a number of new sales activity to apply the tax to and among them is textbooks. That was a surprise... of course we're concerned about that application to textbooks because I think all of us know, students particularly, that textbooks are no longer \$5.95 or \$9.95 events but there is often \$70 and \$80 dollar events, and that is a sizable amount of cash."

Petrocelli described the tax as "not one that pleases me at all, mainly because textbooks are so expensive now and another 7% on top of that and it becomes a real burden."

Also cut under the proposed budget was the Rhode Island Higher Education Assistance Authority. The budget calls for a 15.2 percent cut, which amounts to about \$7.9 million dollars. Nazarian said that this will mean more problems for students "The grants will be smaller. That's sort of compounding affect on the people that ... have financial needs," Nazarian said.

The state budget now goes to the General Assembly, where changes can be made. Both increases and cuts can be made to the different departments included in the state budget. Both Nazarian and Petrocelli are hopeful that the General Assembly will allocate more funds to the Higher Education budget. Petrocelli said that students should be "getting the facts straight, knowing exactly what it is that's happening and then being able to make our case that it is not good for the State of Rhode Island, not only is it not good for the students, but not good for the State of Rhode Island. I'm confident as always that (our) case will be heard."

Nazarian said that members of the

but it isn't as prevalent as on other area campuses, according to Glynn.

Several women students on campus agreed that an escort service is a necessity, but many said they would use it.

Mary Russell, a senior dormitory student said, "I don't feel comfortable using the service. I would rather in any event ask people in my class for a ride." Jennifer Hartman, a freshman dormitory student, also said she would rather ask a fellow classmate rather than security for a ride back to the dorm, but would feel more comfortable using the WXIN escort service. Several other women mentioned the same thing citing that knowing that WXIN is student run made them feel better.

Other women stated just the opposite. Christy Altinian, a freshman dormitory student, used Security as an escort from her dorm to the library. Altinian liked the service she received and would use it again if necessary.

Another reaction that was very evident among women students was a sense of unease by themselves at using the service, especially if it was earlier in the evening. Botelho, mentioned experiencing the same type of reaction, "safety in numbers is more important than people's unease with using an escort."

Both Security and WXIN emphasized repeatedly that most importantly the service is available and students should not hesi-

Higher Education community statewide would be lobbying the General Assembly to "try to get some additional dollars that we know will be very well spent. Dollars that are necessary to maintain the programs that we have."

Petrocelli also stressed his commitment to providing quality programs. "What we don't want to slip in is quality, we have a lot of problems that are threatening the quality throughout all of our institutions, physical assets, the conditions of buildings so on. We understand too that we've got to get through these terrible. terrible economic times in which a lot of people-taxpayers-and students are hurting. With the \$19 million cut we would definitely have to look, in my estimation, raising tuition. We're not giving up,' Petrocelli said.

"We're in difficult times, and we are waiting for the difficult times to pass by. So that we can pay attention to other kinds of things that are very important and critical to this college community and it's programs. So we have to be somewhat optimistic. We also have to be realistic. In the final analysis we have to deal with the issues as they do come up," Nazarian said.

Nazarian noted that some of the same sized schools in the region have experienced tuition hikes, and had tuition rates greater than RIC's to begin with that were much more. "From that point of view we are a little bit better than the other states. But for our students that can't afford it, that doesn't make any difference to them. Even if it was \$2,000 difference between us and our neighboring states if our people can't afford it then it doesn't make any difference," he said.

Debaters In **Finals** At Georgetown

Rhode Island College debaters Phil Murtha, sophomore, and David Pridham, sophomore, defeated two top-ranked Johns Hopkins University teams to earn the final round competition at the Georgetown University debate tournament, held February 21 and 22 in Washington, D.C.


Murtha and Pridham then debated a University of Maryland team before all the other competitors and were defeated by their opponents, earning second place in the tournament.

Phil Murtha also won a first place award in public speaking, as well as a fourth place in debaters individual rankings. Other RIC debaters who placed in the top ten individual speaker rankings were Matthew Flynn for seventh place, and David Pridham for ninth place.

This final round showing guarantees Rhode Island College a second team at the National Parliamentary Debate tournament to be held on April 24-26 at Harvard/MIT.

Debaters Pridham and Flynn were among the two teams which represented RIC at the world Debating Cup which was held in Dublin, Ireland in early January. Robin Nadeau and Jeffrey Fielder, two senior communications majors, also competed successfully at this tourney.

The RIC Debate Council is off to a great start this semester since Mark O'Reilly, a senior, also won fourth place in public speaking at the Smith College Tournament, the weekend of February 14.

Springtime Air: How Healthy Is It?

One of the best things about springtime is the feeling you get when you go outside (without a jacket) and take a deep breath of the clean, fresh, healthly air. What you are actually doing is absorbing a gas (oxygen) that you need to live on and exchanging it for a metabolic waste product (CO2). Plants also live by gas exchange. They absorb carbon-dioxide (CO2), and exchange it for their own metabolic byproduct: oxygen

(O2). So when you go out into the fresh springtime air and find out that it really isn't so healthy, try and understand; the plants are affected ,too.

Most air pollution is in the form of microscopic particles that float within the air. Any type of smoke such as that from burning cigarettes, burning fossil fuels or burning garbage, is actually organic (carbon containing) particles that are released into the air. Air pollutant particles can also be inorganic such as the dust from a factory cement kiln. These dust particles combine in the air to produce what is known as smog.

The most publicized effect of smog in recent years has been the effect smog has on blocking the amount of sunlight that reaches the earth's surface, yet allowing the absorption and retention of the sun's heat around the earth's atmosphere (the green house effect). The so-called "greenhouse effect" is probably minor, however, and therefore something of a political albatross, compared to the effect air pollutant particles have directly on plants. Just as people breathe through their lungs, plants absorb their life giving gases through a small hole on their leaf tissues called a stomata. Particle air pollution can clog plant stomata, and prevent plants from going through gas exchange.

Particle air pollution (especially metallic inorganic) will act as a plant toxins. Large scale manufacturing processes such as that for steel, aluminum and other industrial products produce fluoride waste products which can enter the plant through its



stomata and cause leaf collapse by acting as an inhibitor to the leaf enzymes that synthesize the plant cell wall. Sulfur dioxide, among the main chemical byproducts of burning fossil fuels, reacts with water in the atmosphere to produce sulfuric acid, a strong corrosive acid which can have deadly effects when absorbed by plant tissue. Sunlight itself can be an unwitting plant enemy, when it chemically reacts with automobile exhaust to form what is called "photochemical smog."

Any combustion process product in air has a byproduct of nitrogen dioxide (air is over 70% nitrogen). When sunlight reacts with nitrogen dioxide (NO2), the chemical product is nitrogen monoxides (NO) and an atomic oxygen radical (o*). Oxygen radicals are very reactive and readily form ozone (O3) by reacting with the normal molecular oxygen (O2). Ozone, in the upper atmosphere screens out harmful ultraviolet light.

Unfortunately, ozone in the lower atmosphere can be very poisonous to breathe for humans and plants. Ozone, when absorbed by plants, damages the cell walls of the "palisade cells" of the leaf tissue, the area where most of the plant's photosynthetic process is happening. Another photochemical product in peroxyacel nitrate (PAN). PAN is several times more toxic than ozone but is found in smaller concentrations.

Areas like Southern California are partially affected by photochemical smog because the mountains form basins which do not allow car exhaust to escape the area. A little over twenty years ago, a copper smelting plant in the farming area of Sacramento Valley killed vegetation in an area over 280 miles away. Damage and death has been recorded as far away as 200 miles, to pine forests and agricultural crops, as a direct result of Los Angeles air pollutants from cars and industry. This is how plants protest against air pollution. No environmental rallies. No picket signs. They just die, taking the human need with them. Air pollution control laws instituted in 1905 in Tennessee, did not stop the killing of a once rich forest area, which remains today an environmental junkyard for people and wildlife to live in, because one copper-smelting plant over 150 years ago, killed a forest. The Florida citrus industry was its own worst enemy, when thousands of acres of citrus groves were badly damaged or killed due to the release of fluorides by plants. They don't vote; they die. That's how they protest bad air.

A major element of the U.S. Pavilion at SEVILLE EXPO '92 will be a presentation of how sports are an essential ingredient of American life. As part of this presentation, the U.S. Pavilion Sports Program needs people -- not necessarily outstanding athletes but rather people (who may or may not be members of a school team) -- to give a short demonstration of something involving sports. the third period. The final score was 3-1 in favor of the Unified Team. As a result, Team Canada won the Silver Medal. Czechoslovakia won the Bronze Medal by defeating Team USA.

Team USA finished in fourth place, but has nothing to be ashamed of. Their final record was 5-2-1, the only losses being to the Unified Team and Czechoslovakia. Both these teams were simply too powerful for the young Team USA. Most people did not even expect this team to qualify for the medal round, much less finish in the top four. Team USA should be proud of its accomplishments.

There are many other athletes who should be proud as well. For example, Kristi Yamaguchi, who won the Gold Medal in the Ladies Figure Skating competition on Saturday. She was leading after the original program, but still had to battle for her medal. Her toughest competitor was Midori Ito of Japan, who was in fourth place after the first programs. All of the six final skaters to compete on Saturday had a few slight problems in their final programs. Kristi nearly fell; she ended up just balancing herself by putting her hand down on the ice. Midori and Nancy Kerrigan, who won the Bronze Medal, were not so lucky, as each fell in final competition.

On the final day of competition he was awarded the U.S. Olympic Spirit Award.

Italy's Alberto Tomba should also be happy with what he accomplished. On Saturday he won the Silver Medal in the men's Slalom competition, after a magnificent second run; he was in sixth place after the first run.

However, there was one tragic note during these Olympics. Swiss speed skater Nicholas Bochatay was killed when he crashed into a ski trail -grooming machine on Saturday. A memorial service was held in the church at the athletes village on Sunday.

As for the final Medal Standings, Germany finished with a total of 26 medals, including 10 Gold and 10 Silver. The Unified Team was next, with 23 medals; 9 Gold, 6 Silver, and 8 Bronze. Austria followed with 21 medals, and Norway ended with 20 medals. The United States finished with a total of 11 medals, 5 of which were Gold Medals, all won by women.

Overall, the Olympics were entertaining nd fun to watch The names of people we did not know 16 days ago are now household names. There are images from these Olympics that will not be soon forgotten. Here are just a few: the beauty of the French countryside and mountains, the grace of 16 year old Toni Neiminen flying high above the crowds, the flashy style of Alberto Tomba, the faces of Team USA, especially Ray LeBlanc, Nancy Kerrigan's mother peering at the large television in front of her that she could not see, and the grace and beauty of Kristi Yamaguchi, Midori Ito and Nancy Kerrigan. The close of these Olympics have just made me all the more eager for the start of the Summer Olympics, to be held in Barcelona.



On Saturday, February 22, 1992, Siouxie and the Banshees rocked Rocky Point's Palladium. The band had been scheduled to play last summer at the Lalapalooza concert, but was forced to cancel, due to illness. The Rocky Point Palladium made a reasonable concert hall, but it was obvious that Siouxie and the Banshees weren't thrilled to play there. "Thank you for coming out to see us next to this...uh...fairground!" Siouxie Sioux commented.

However, an enthusiastic crowd provided extra energy for the band. "Our last show (the crowd) was a bunch of zombies," joked Siouxie.



Based in New York City, the company performs throughout the United States, Canada and Europe, and is often in-residence as teachers and choreographers nationally.


Creach and Koester have received numerous commissions and fellowships, including those from the New York Foundation for the Arts and the National Endowment for the Arts.

"Banshee" card from Games Workshop's Talisman game.


Banshees play the Beatles' tunes, and found them to be fairly good. (Being a Beatles fan, I often cringe at covers of Beatles' classics.)

If one wanted to be picky, one would mention how Darren Paquin seemed to be forcing some of his drum fills, and that D.J. Paquin occasionally misfretted a chord. But it really doesn't matter. No



Students Get Reamed...Again

Here we go again. Now we're being told that next semester we can expect a tuition increase of as much as 15%. And if the proposal goes through, there'll be a 7% tax on all textbooks. The budget of the Rhode Island Higher Education Assistance Authority has been cut 15%, leaving their budget at the same level it was at four years ago. Which means, as you may have guessed, students will be awarded either fewer scholarships at the same amounts being awarded now, or the same amount of scholarships will be awarded, but in lesser amounts.

The only forseeable benefit to the students in this set up is that the ones who will be able to remain in school won't have quite as much trouble finding a parking spot or getting into classes that they need to graduate. Rather Machiavellian, admittedly.

It seems that education has borne the brunt of the state's financial crises for far too long. Every year there has been a significant increase in tuition, including the imposition of an additional \$70 surcharge to students last year. They've bled us too much too often and it's time for this to stop. Is higher education so low on the list of politician's priorities that they feel that they can make it an unattainable goal for the average Rhode Island resident? URI, CCRI and RIC have all suffered long enough. We voted DiPrete out for blatantly sticking it to us -- is Sundlun going to be "the Education Governor" or simply the lesser of two evils?



Equipment At A Premium In Television Studio

Communication majors are finding it increasingly more difficult to access the television equipment they need to accomplish required assignments.

Last August the Audio Visual Department handed RIC's television studio, along with some portable production equipment, to the Communications Department. This action was very much applauded by the students who felt they would have a little bit more control over the equipment and also more access to it. Unfortunately not everything was left in place when the studio was transferred.

An important agent of the studio, Jim Kinnie, was laid off last semester and his

absence has been deeply felt by many of the students who frequent the television center. Kinnie basically ran the studio. Since his departure, the television studio has come under the control of faculty member, Philip Palombo, and three other students, Jim Bannon, Barry Albright and Jim Kosinski. All four have been trying hard to keep the studio operating at its best.

Although the direction of Palombo has brought some good perspectives and more consideration to the studio, the budget limitations have affected the center. Much of the equipment suffered from damages during the final stages of last semester's productions have yet to be repaired. Also during last semester's classes, production became very difficult due to the lack of necessary audio equipment and the conditions of the cameras.

This semester the Time Base Corrector died, which is an indispensable piece of equipment in video production.

Scheduling time for production and postproduction activities has become an adventure that not even Indiana Jones would desire to go through. Scheduling procedures have been handled by the three students who run the studio most of the time.

Faculty have been understanding and patient. They have been helping students to function with what equipment is available and with what they can provide. Also to ease the situation, new equipment has been provided (some arriving during the last week) thanks to Palombo's efforts. Palombo is extremely busy trying to do as much as he can to improve the situation in the studio. He noted that the administration is very supportive of what the Communications Department and the students want to do.

"Fortunately, we do have a lot of support from the Dean, the Vice President and the President," says Palombo. "They very clearly see that we are trying to make some things happen; that's why they gave us the TV studio this year."

Larry Budner, Communications Department Chair, reinforced Palombo's statement, "We are slowly trying to improve the studio." Budner realizes the fact that video equipment needs to be constantly repaired, and says the department is doing everything they can to modernize the studio equipment.

The process, however, will be slow. The Communications Department does not have a separate budget for the studio according to Budner. This is the first time that the department has to make evaluations and estimates of what is in the studio.

Meanwhile, students continue to complain. Jim Bannon, who has work study in the studio and is enrolled in a television production class says his feelings about the situation are very strong, "Equipment is a big problem here," he says, "we can't do real color correction because we don't have a vectorscope in the studio. Our vectorscope died and we can't seem to get (a) replacement for that." Doug Olny is another communication student currently enrolled in a television production class. He is also an executive member of RIC TV. RIC TV uses the studio facilities to produce almost all of its programs. Olny feels that the equipment available in the studio is very limited. "Something Different," which is one of the most popular shows produced at the center needs at least four fully functional cameras to work with. Right know the studio is running with two decent IKAGAMIs which, as described by Bannon, have "tons of hours logged on them."

Robert Perrotti, "Something Different" producer, and executive producer of RIC TV, says he has been forced to create new ways of producing his show other than using school facilities. He feels limited. "We can't do shows without editing equipment. We are trying to get equipment (on) our own; we can't depend on the studio for our shows."

With the amount of communication students enrolled in television production classes and the number of students who make use of the equipment to produce shows for the Statewide Interconnect and for RIC TV, it is obvious that the equipment needs to be updated. Students' time and money is being invested here, and neither are easy to recover.

Armand Porthier, Audiovisual TV Engineer, who is in charge of repairing the studio equipment, believes that the chief problem is the lack of back-up equipment. He suggests that what is needed in the studio is back-up equipment so that while he is repairing a piece of equipment during a class, that class can operate with its backup. "In order to have a better flow of classroom activities we need back up equipment; we need repair parts desperately."

Armand is also concerned about the fact that there are too many people using the equipment at the same time. This constant use makes the equipment wear out faster.

The studio needs more staff and engineers that can quickly respond to the damages that can occur during process. These shouldn't be options that can be left out because of budget problems. They constitute part of the education that the college offers.

I understand that the everybody is collaborating and willing to solve the problems, that this is a new experience for the communications department and that unfortunately, a very delicate situation because of budget limitations. However, many of us worry about the education to which we have a right to. Think about the many different ways in which having this facility can boost the other areas of the college life by working out projects with people who could contribute with development of the college. Having the television equipment in the school has many advantages. All departments should support its existence since it can serve the education purposes of their areas.
