Dr. Eugene S. Lubot, currently Vice president of Academic Affairs and Academic Dean at Albright College: May 12.


Robert M. Dixon, is currently a Professor and Chairman of Physics Department at Morehouse College: May 14.

Editor, composer, judge to receive honorary degrees at spring commencement

Rhode Island native, John C. Quinn, 66, who served as the lead planning editor for USA TODAY when it was launched in 1982 and as its editor-in-chief until he retired in 1990, will deliver the Rhode Island College 1992 Spring Commencement address and receive an Honorary Doctorate of Public Service Saturday, May 23, beginning at 9;30 a.m. on the lawn areas to the west of Whipple Hall.

Also receiving an honorary degree before the 1,100 or more undergraduate and graduate students will be retired United States District Court Judge of the Northern District of Illinois, George N. Leighton (Doctorate of Laws) and Ned Rorem, renowned musician, composer, and author (Doctorate of Fine Arts).

Quinn, who spent almost a half-century in the news business, started as a copy boy at the

hree classes unite to create advertising project

Thursday, April 30, 8:00 a.m. Students in Dr. Laurie Pamental's advertising class wait for the moment that their group will be called to show their TV commercial presentations. The students, dressed in proper business attire appear both excited and nervous.

The commercial is the final part of a project that involved three classes of students from three different departments. Four student groups were to develop advertising campaigns for three different clients. Two groups worked with the ALS Association (Amyotrophic Lateral Sclerosis, a disease often called "Lou Gehrig's disease"), while the third worked with the Montreal Expos baseball team and the fourth group created a campaign for Champion sweatshirts.

The advertising students were to plan the campaign, pick a target market, come up with slogans, headlines, body copy for print ads and story boards for the video commercial.

Professor John DeMelim's graphic design students were to create the visuals for the print media (magazine ads) and Professor Phil Palombo's TV production students were to create the TV commercials.

The project came from an idea Pamental had. He wanted his advertising students (Marketing 338) to get a more realistic understanding of the advertising envi-

ronment. Pamental had spent time in advertising and had success with this project a few years ago at Susquehanna University in Pennsylvania. Pamental stated that the idea was received with much enthusiasm by DeMelim of the Art Department and by Palombo of the Communications Department.

DeMelim felt this group project with the advertising students created a realistic look at the in-

dustry. "Graphic designers are part of a chain of events, of sequences," DeMelim said. Most of the time, graphic design students work on their projects alone, but that is not the case in the advertising industry. In this project the design students prepared visuals for the advertising students. The advertising students would use the images they felt best suited their target markets and campaigns. DeMelim applauded the research done by the advertising students and added "you can't design for an audience you don't know."

Each group approached their campaigns differently. One group working with the ALS association targeted their ads at men and women aged 20-40, married with children. They chose a sympathetic approach. Their goal was to educate people about this disease and showed a women in her thirties, who can only move the muscle above her eye and must rely on her tenyear-old son and family for care. Both the TV commercial and the print ads featured these images of the woman with the caption, "ALS, the difference is knowing."

The second ALS group wanted to create awareness and target individuals who contribute to charities. They stressed education, the importance of proper diagnosis and that this disease can affect anyone.

This group used pictures of Lou Gehrig in both their print and television campaigns.

The Montreal Expos campaign involved a "Fantasy Camp" in Florida in which baseball fans can put on an Expos uniform and run the bases with their favorite Expos stars. This group targeted men 30-yearsold and over, who always dreamed of playing in the "Big League." The video featured humorous scenes of playground baseball mixed in with scenes from Expos' games.

The group creating a campaign for Champion sweatshirts targeted active 18-30 year olds. They presented a humorous, upbeat TV commercial with fast paced scenes and music. The commercial begins and ends showing the Chamion logo. It is intended to be used during sports broadcasts and the print ads were geared toward sports magazines. The group chose the slogan "Champion: when second best isn't good enough." Print ad ideas included the Champion logo as a trophy and Atlas carrying the logo on his back.

The two ALS print campaigns were taken to Washington, D.C. and could possibly be used in a national campaign. Similarly, the Montreal Expos may use the project as their major campaign.







RIC and Bryant Dominate Men's Tri-State Track and Field Events

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In the Rhode Island College Tri-State Track Championships held here at the college on Saturday, April 25, the RIC Men's Track team finished 2nd out of eight teams. The top team was Bryant, a Division II school. Bryant finished with a total of 160 points, while RIC finished with 126 points. The entire game was a close matchup between RIC and Bryant. RIC won four out of the nineteen events, while Bryant won five events. Except for the 4x400 meter relay, many of the RIC athletes finished in the top eight.

RIC placed first in the Hammer Throw, the Shot Put, the 1500 meters, and the 800 meters track and field events.

Peter Conley came in first in the hammer throw at 152'.56". Jeff Shuttleworth came in fifth at 81'3".

Jeff and Peter then went first and second in the shot put. Jeff threw for 47' 7.25", and Peter threw for 43' 4.75".

Keven O'Neil came in first in the 1500 meters with a time of 4:9.90, and first in the 800 meters with a time of 2:3.30. Tom Gaspar, Steve Rogers, and Ray

Moncrieffe of Bryant finished third, fourth, and fifth.

In the 110 hurdles, Scott McCoy, Brian Wheelock, and Chris Scott finished third, fourth, and seventh, respectively. Jeff Shuttleworth came in third in the discus throw with a distance of 116' 10".

In the 4x100 meter relay, the team of Jeremy Fleury, Scott McCoy, Jose Gonsalves, and Hiliary Johnson came in second with a time of 46.20 seconds.

Jose Gonsalves came in third in the long jump with a distance of 19' 3", and third in the triple jump with a distance of 39' .25". Vernon Wyatt of Bryant won the triple jump with a distance of 41' 2.25".

Glenn Boisvert came in third in the pole vault with a height of 10'.

Scott McCoy, Jose Gonsalves, Hiliary Johnson, and Jeremy Fleury dominated the 100 meters by finishing second, third, fifth, and eighth. respectively. They dominated the 200 meters coming in third, fourth, fifth, and eighth, along with Bryant which came in second, sixth, and seventh. Bryant's Jamie Noble won the 100 meters in 11.80 seconds.

Programming's Fund Run Is A Success




The very first runner to cross the finish

1991-1992 Year in Review Sports Wrap Up

The 1991-192 sports season here at Rhode Island College was an exceptional one. All-Americans were named, records were broken, and championships were won. There were many athletes who distinguished themselves throughout the past year. Here is a list of these athletes and their accomplishments for the 1991-1992 season.

Women's Track Members Qualify for New Englands

On the New England Level, in the Spring of 1992, junior Lynn DiTusa qualified to the New England Division III and ECAC with hammer throw of 115'9" and registers her best discus hurl of 103 feet which also qualifies for the New Englands. Junior Robin Gobeille also qualified for the New England meet in the javelin with a distance of 114'2". Gobeille qualified to the ECAC Championships in the javelin as well.

From the Spring of 1991, three members of the Women's Track and Field team made All-ECAC. Julie Young made All-ECAC, placed 4th in the 100m relay, and placed 5th in the 200m relay. Lynn DiTusa made All-ECAC, and placed 5th in the hammer competition. Robin Gobeille made All-ECAC, and placed 2nd in the Javelin.

Men's Track Team Sets Records

Three members of the Men's Track and Field team have qualified for the New Englands. Freshman Peter Conley and junior Jeff Berard qualify for the New England Division III meet in the hammer throw with throws of 156' and 154' respectively.

Sophomore Jeff Shuttleworth sets new Shot Put distance record at 44'33/4" on Saturday March 28th at Fitchburg Invitational. The old record held by Jeff Berard at 43'7 3/4" set last season...(was beat at the) very next meet at Wesleyan Invitational. Shuttleworth beat his own record by a toss of 45'1 1/2" on April 1st, qualifying him for the New England Division III meet May 5th and 6th. In the U.Mass-Dartmouth Invitational on Saturday, April 11th Shuttleworth again broke his own record, this time with a mammoth shot put throw of 45'11".

The 4x100 meter relay team of Hiliary Johnson, Jeremy Fleury, and sophomores Jose Gonsalves and Scott McCoy qualify ror the New Englands, as does Keven O'Neil in the 5,000 meters race. Also, Ken Kirejczyk qualifies to the new Englands in the 10,000 meters race. On the National Level, from the Spring of 1991, in the NCAA Championships, Andy Lemoi was named All-American, and placed first in the Hammer competition. In the Spring of 1992, Peter Conley qualified to the NCAA Championships in the Hammer competiion. experienced an outstanding season in which his average time was calculated at 26.71. He captured 2nd place in the Tri-State Relays and 1st place in the Connecticut College Invitational. His time of 26:46 allowed him his third 1st place title in the Little East Conference Championships. O'Neil finished 20th in the New England Championship Tournament with a run of 27:11.

Wrestling Team wins 5th Straight NE Division III Championships

Head Coach Russell Carlsten goes out in fine fashion, winning his fifth straight New England Championship!!! He was awarded both "Coach of the Year" and "Man of the Year" honors for his efforts, marking the fifth time in his career to attain the "Coach of the Year" status in New England Wrestling Association...Scott Carlsten ends his fine career with a total record of 163-17-1 which included an undefeated dual match mark of 70-0-1. A 2time All American and a 4-time New England champion, Scott qualified to the nationals all four seasons and finished as RIC's all-time wins and pins leader...Christopher Reddy also ended his career in fine style as his 21 pins locates him 4th on the All-Time Top Career Pinners List. In the New England Championships William Cotter and Scott Carlsten finished first in the 134 lb. weight class and the 158 lb. class, respectively. Kenny Plouffe finished second in the 118 lb. class, and Chris Reddy finished second in the 167 lb. class.

Third place winners were Kevin Timme, at 150 lbs., and Lonnie Morris at the unlimited weight class. Wally DiGeese finished in fourth place at the 167 lb. class, and Damon Popella finished fifth in the championships.

Women's Basketball Team Posts Best Record in Six Years

Team launches 1991-1992 campaign with a very young line-up and posts best record since 1986-1987 (17-10) season ... mid semester acquisition, junior transfer from CCRI, Jerilynn Johnson goes on to lead team in field goal percentage, total points, rebounds, and blocked shots. She was selected to the 1st team All-Conference in the Little East Conference and honors of "Player of the Week" on two occasions as well..junior Robin Gobeille sidelined 10 games due to a mid-season injury, lead team in scoring average and just 68 points shy of 1,000 point club...senior Kristen Manzi lead the team in free throw percentage (76.3) and assists (68) ... squad drops semi-final Little East Conference match to Eastern Conn. Waking up with the DJ's from hell

There are many people who wake up every morning to their voices; some drive with them; some even eat breakfast with them. Who are they? Why Paul and Al of course. They are the newest edition to 94 HJY's airstaff. While it may not seem like they are new, it is important to remember that they have only been in Rhode Island for a few years.

It was quite interesting to learn that neither Paul or Al began their college career with broadcasting in mind. Paul went to Springhill College, a small school in Alabama. He received a degree in History. Paul will tell you quite sarcastically, " that a degree in history is very important for a DJ to have." Al went to school at the New York Institute of Technology. He started out majoring in Geology, but could not pass the chemistry or math courses. It was because of this that he turned to journalism and ended up majoring in communications.

Paul and Al have varying music tastes. Al likes the heavy classic rock and roll from the early 70s. This includes groups such as Thin Lizzy, The Who, and Jethro Tull. He also enjoys jazz while relaxing at home. Paul likes the more mellow sounds

of Van Morrison, Don Henley, and Paul Simon. He also enjoys classical music like Bach, Beethoven, and Tchaikovsky. He can also be found playing the classical guitar.

Knowing their personal preference in music, I asked if they had ever worked at a top 40 station, and if so what their feelings were about this. They said that yes they had, and that turning down the monitor is very helpful in this situation. They stated that while top 40 is not their favorite music to play that, "what we have to say is more important than what we had to play." Al also pointed out that with unemployment on the rise that a job is still a job.

Now that I knew a little bit about them, I wanted to know how they found a job in Providence. They both smiled and laughed, a small laugh shared like a private joke. "This is quite an interesting story, really." Al began to explain. It so happens that the morning DJ for WHJY, who had been there for eight years was leaving. To those that don't remember her, Caroline Fox was shock radio. She had quite a following

Finding a replacement for her was not an easy job. However, the head man at WHJY, Bill Weston, had a friend who was flying to San Francisco. While on the plane he was listening to a radio. As the plane crossed the signal of the Alabama station Paul and Al were at, he heard them. He liked them so much that he told his friend Bill about them. Bill listened to the show and decided to recruit them.

The problem with this was that when you are under contract with one company and they like you, getting out of the contract is not easy. There were lawyers and meetings that took five months to complete. 94 WHJY came out triumphant and the rest is radio history. I asked them how it felt to be wanted so much, they said, "It's always nice to know you're wanted that much."

I mentioned before how busy they were. I never would have guessed myself until they told me. Their day begins at 5 a.m. when they meet at the station. They use the time between 5 and 6 to finish up any



skits that need polishing. This is also a good time to write new skits about news events that happened after they left work the previous day. Their shift goes from 6 a.m.-10 a.m. Monday through Friday. After the show gets over they meet with their boss to discuss the show and brainstorm new ideas.

It is interesting to note that even though the show sounds spontaneous, it is not. Paul is the creative writer of the team and writes most of the show. He says he spends at least a couple of hours a day writing. Al states that you are never 'not' thinking of ideas. Any event, song, or word can trigger an idea for a skit in their minds. This is not to say that there are no ad-libs, but having an outline helps keep things on track.

Al is the impersonator of the team. He does 99.9% of the "voices" for the show. He ranges from Senator Claiborne Pell to Ronald Reagan, Perry Mason, and George Bush. With Paul's creative talents and Al's vocal talents they have created a very funny morning show.

Five am. seemed pretty early to start one's day and I thought that it must be one heck of a lifestyle to lead. Paul says that he likes the hours; they work for him. He is married and has kids, with his schedule this means he's home when they are. They even go to bed at the same time. This job also allows him to be home on weekends.

Al views things differently. Being single, the only nights he can go out are Friday and Saturday. He does not mind though. The way he sees things is that in the summer he leaves the station by noon, which means he can be on the beach by one. Al explained that the hours were a big adjustment, but it all depends on just how badly you want the job.

Paul and Al both love what they do. They are both modest and do not take as much credit for what they do as they probably should. Paul and Al are two of the funniest and the most down to earth people I have had the pleasure of meeting.



This new venture by Ice-T and Bodycount is nothing to ignore. It is well performed, well produced and very entertaining.



Def Leppard rocks with Adrenalize

Def Leppard is a band that can't seem to avoid bad luck. Their last album *Hysteria* was delayed by drummer Rick Allen's accident, which resulted in the loss of his arm. *Adrenalize* was barely completed after the death of guitarist Steve Clark, early last year. Some predicted that the band would split up. This album affirms the band's will to survive, and cope with whatever problems nature may throw at them.

The 10-song album starts off with the now familiar "Let's Get Rocked," which typifies the band's now familiar sound. You just know when you hear the first note that this is **Def Leppard** and this band is here to play! This moves into "Heaven Is," another blistering rocker.

Most of the album consists of songs reminiscent of *Hysteria* and *Pyromania*. Three exceptions are "White Lightning," "Tonight" and "Have You Ever Needed Someone So Bad." "White Lightning" is a tribute to Clark, and his guitar playing skills. The band seems to have come to terms with the tragedy surrounding Clark's drug and alcohol-induced death, and instead of using it as a platform to preach from, have instead made a point of stating that they lost a close friend, and they watched him disintegrate as he was trying to help himself.

"Tonight" and "Have You..." are both rock ballads in the truest form of **Def Leppard**. Both show off lead singer Joe Elliot's voice. "Have You..." is a particular favorite, and should be one of the best live songs when the band goes on tour later this year, with guitarist Viv Campbell, who permanently joined the band, leaving **Shadow King**, another band starting to crest on the rock circuit, with lead singer Lou Gramm, formerly of **Foreigner**.

The album could have been called "Hysteria II," but it has more energy than the last album, and shows more of the band's talent. One of the must have albums of 1992, and a definite show on tour later on this year, **Def Leppard's** *Adrenalize* gets four Anchors.

Brent: Dan did this scat thing through a mega phone.

How did "Country Boy" come about?

Brent: Have you ever been to Oregon? It's just something to laugh at. We're all hicks.

What's your definition of a hick? I'm from Foster, R.I., and our definition is work boots, chain saws, and dirt bikes.

The second song, "Don't You Lie To Me (I get Evil)," is also a Memphis blues rocker. This is followed up by "Story of

the Blues," a totally pleasing slow blues ballad. If you like BB King, you'll like this song. BB King is featured on the song "Since I Met You Baby," a song about a musician who attributes his turnaround to "his baby." BB King shows why he has been a mainstay in the music industry for the better part of the past 30 years, with his truly phenomenal and distinctive guitar playing. Also featured is Albert Collins, on the song "The Blues Is Alright."

The album seems to drag a bit with all the references to "the blues." That is the price that one must pay to hear some truly great guitar playing and music. Gary Moore's After Hours get three and a half Anchors. If you're a music major or a guitar player, get this album, sit back in a dark room with a Marlboro and a glass of Old Grandad, and feel the blues.

Curve Doppelganger Charisma Records

There's a difference between Curve, a brand new rising group on the alternative scene and other guitar-filled noise artists like Ride and My Bloody Valentine. Curve can turn the noise into music.

Although all three of those groups have the same producer, Toni Halliday, lead singer, and Dean Garcia, bassist, push the music far ahead of the other two. Both band members, being longtime fans and in Dean's case, a part of, the Eurythmics, formed the group Christmas of 1989. The band first released Blindfold in early 1990 and the Frozen EP in May 1991 which sold out immediately.

After releasing another EP, Cherry, and selling that out, Curve decided to release a full album. That album turned out to be Doppelganger and it fully lives up to the expectations of the ep collection.

The album starts off with a seductive hard-hitting electronic back-beat ballad called "Already Yours." Moving on, the song "Wish You Dead" slams the senses into overdrive as Toni sings "I know you won't, you never do and that's the ugliest thing about you."

On Doppelganger, their signature bass boom comes to the forefront and the phrase "the devil is in me" becomes a great melody to jam with distorted guitar. "Ice that melts the tips" makes Halliday take the format of frozen water and force



the band to transform along with her. The rhythm bangs like a jackhammer and the guitars pave a sidewalk for it to smash.

Finally, tracks like "Fait Accompli," the first single and "Clipped" make Toni a spirit-like voice in a world of noise.

I think the main reason why this band stands above the others is because of its singer, Toni Halliday. Her soothing vocals give order to the anarchy of noise occurring around her and that in the end, throws a curve into the normal.

At first glance, Course of Empire's women walk behind/ just as culture taught self titled debut could easily be overlooked. The album cover looks like a blurry scene from 'The Unforgiven" video, but don't let an awkward package discourage you.

"Peace Child" slows the Course down for a tune about a child who lost his father to war. It's a good song, but fits awkwardly with the rest of the tracks on the album. The change of pace is just too much after the rest of the albums set up.

After this, they can't seem to regain the fervor contained on the first half of the disc. It's too bad they couldn't have stuck to one musical style or the other because it would have given them a greater sense of direction.

Although the first half of the album has great drive and direction, the second leaves you feeling flat. For this reason, Course of Empire receives only 2 1/2 Anchors.

Guns 'N Roses is not the only




It is a shame that the people on this campus are incapable of properly
