### Overview of the Lt. Governor's race the environment.

The following is an overview of the candidates for the office of Lieutenant Governor, compiled from three separate interviews with the candidates. Questions asked were intended to best show the qualifications and philosophies of the candidates, and to examine their intentions once in office.

### Michael Campbell

### •Experience

-First run for public office. -Endorsed by the National Organization of Women in Rhode Island, the NEA, and Women for Choice.

#### •Economy

Seeks to establish a "high-tech, high-wage manufacturing base in the state ... I'm not talking about the low-wage mill jobs we had 30, 40 years ago ... We're talking about the new manufacturing."

Embraces a plan of "investing in skills training, investing in both our high schools and a community college system," similar to North Carolina's.

Also proposes a reduction in the corporate tax rate and utility rates in order to make business more efficient and environmental ly friendly.

Draws a direct link between spending on higher education and the prosperity of the tourism industry in South County.

"Every dollar you spend on higher education comes out as four dollars in the economy ... because of its connection directly with the tourist industry, and because (tourism) is such a big industry.

### Environment

Sees development in South County as the biggest threat to "South County is where all the

dollars are coming from (as a result of tourism) ... (Preservation of that environment) is something that needs to be looked at." Education

Seeks to change the current situation, where "the basic problem... is that the state has not had a firm commitment to education. When you look at how schools are funded, you have a basic formula where the state supplies a certain percentage, and the town supplies the rest. In 1990, it was about 50-50 ... In the last two years (the state's allotment) has gone down to about 35 percent... (Cities and towns) are faced with the question of either raising property taxes, or nail the teachers and the educational system as a whole."

•Role of the Lieutenant Governor

"You don't hear a lot out of the Lieutenant. Governor's office. I'd like to change that."

Would like to be "an activist ambassador," taking an active role in education, while performing the role of ambassador to attract new businesses.

•On the influx of new people into the Assembly

"Hopefully, we can get together and form coalitions to affect these. changes... People are tired of the network."

·Convince people in general to stay in Rhode Island, in the face of the RISDIC debt, a poor economy, and a poor job atmosphere.

"Wait until after the election to see what kind of leadership we have... Take a stake in your own future, try to make a better place for yourself."

Points to the large turnover in General Assembly members to encourage people to "stay, and see

### Media converges on Anchor issue by Brian Sheehan

In response to last week's condom insert, media from as far away as Boston have been covering the Anchor issue in detail.

In addition to the three local television affiliates, 10, 12 and 6, stories were also run on Boston channels 5 and 7.

Radio stations also carried the story. Reports were heard on local stations CNN, KIX, WPRO AM and FM, and WBZ from Boston. Anchor Executive Editor Jeff Wallace did interviews with WHJJ, and with WHJY's morning drive show with Paul and Al, which was run several times during last Tuesday morning.

Various newspapers also picked up on the story. The Providence Visitor, published by the Catholic Diocese of Providence, ran two front page stories and an editorial on the Anchor issue. The banner headline on the front page of the Visitor read "Condom distribution

sparks controversy." In its editorial, The Visitor said "...it is an abridgement of good newspaper journalism, which normally tries to promote society into better behavior and a better future through information. What The Anchor has done is tell its readers: 'Barter the future for some cheap temporary thrill. AIDS strikes other people. We're young and with this condom, nothing can hurt us."

Providence Journal The Bulletin carried a blurb in the Lifebeat page on Wednesday, right above "The Far Side" cartoon.

Wallace was quick to stress the seriousness of the staff on the safe sex issue during various interviews throughout the week. "Safe sex is a matter of life and death, and the staff treated it that way. To make light of it would take away from the power of the issue," said Wallace.



if we can work together... Change won't happen overnight."

Sees the beginnings of change taking effect possibly within the first year of the next administration, since the new leadership will better be able to "move people."

### Robert Weygand

### •Experience

-State Representative for District 84, 4 terms.

-Endorsed by the Right to Life committee

•Economy

Sees the most important aspect to be jobs, and sees two ways to expand the job base.

A "short-term, shot-in-the-arm job stimulus," and "long-term investment."

"Most important are short-term jobs. We need to analyze the small business industry, (which makes up) 80 percent of all the people who are employed in this state ... We need to stimulate and enhance that area (through) providing tax incentives when (small businesses) hire presently unemployed people, or people right out of college," and turn the Department of Economic Development's focus toward improving existing businesses, before trying to attract new businesses.

### •Environment

The idea that business can not improve without adversely affecting the environment is "not true... For decades, that traditional and close-minded attitude has been prevalent."

Takes credit for "getting the developers and the DEM officials to agree on a massive piece of legislation that revised the entire way we develop in the state... It's been used as a model piece of legislation throughout the country."

Strongly believes that "big industry can survive in Rhode Island, and actually can be in the forefront" of environmental conservation.

•Education

On cooperative programs, Weygand embraces a plan such as the one used at Northeastern, where "not only are you getting a good education, (but) you're getting your foot in the door with businesses."

•Role of the Lieutenant Governor

"The Lieutenant Governor can begin to promote, and almost becomes the person that's becoming, a legislator as such, because you don't have any administrative authority."

The Lt. Governor "can submit legislation, but there's limited au-

thority... you become someone who's proactive."

•On the influx of new people into the General Assembly

"I think it will help to a certain degree, because you're going to have fresh thinkers... but the bad part about it is that this is a very confusing time, and people just coming in sometimes will react rather quickly, and not know... the system. In the beginning months, they kind of sit back to observe what's happening...

"Realistically, there will be a learning curve in the very beginning that will slow up any legislation."

•Convince people to stay "The job market is beginning to open up, and the quality of life is second to none... We're flattened out because of trickle-down economics, but locally, we are beginning to change" from the effects of "Reaganomics."

The main road to progress is a partnership between government and business, because "(small businesses) are the people who need help."

Foresees a "recurrence of a strong economy, but it's very slow, and it will be very slow for a couple of years."

### Ron Iacobbo

### •Experience

-First run for public office. -Currently holds a position as assistant to the director of administration for the City of Providence, serves as the delegate of the Republican State Central Committee from Providence, and the Republican chairman of the 14th Ward.

•Economy

"What I would do is work with my party and use the post of Lt. Governor to argue for scrapping workman's compensation laws, and for mandatory meetings between economic development and environmental management departments."

In order to attract new businesses, seeks to reform workman's compensation, corporate surtax laws, and utility rate laws, since right now, "the dynamics are wrong (for new business)."

•Environment

Seeks to preserve undeveloped ares, such as those in Harmony, Glocester, Knight's Farm, and the Blackstone Valley, which he praises as "beautiful parts of this state."

#### Education

In terms of the union-government relationship, would seek "binding arbitration that is truly binding." available; As far as legislation he would

introduce, high on the agenda is a voucher system, which would "take that estimated portion of (people's) taxes which go toward public school education, and make it a negotiable instrument," and a program of choice within the current system.

Sees cooperation between business and schools as tenuous, because "the only thing business does is use the free labor, give (the students) perhaps a certificate or a thank-you letter, and then not hire them, or what (businesses) do is change their standards."

### •Role of Lieutenant Governor

"I would like to see one role added (to the existing roles of presiding over the Senate and exercising executive power when the Governor is not available)... I would like to establish what I call the Lt. Governor's Round Table Forum," modeled after the Algonquin Round Table in New York City of the 1920's and 1930's.

"I would like the lt. Governor to take civil servants and go out in a symposium-like format, not only to the colleges and universities, but to the town meetings, to social and fraternal organizations, to civic groups, to get people to listen" to their politicians, since "we (politicians) work under constraints... If the public understands us, we will be in a better position to serve them,, because they will know exactly what they are doing when they pull that lever (in the polling booth)."

Also seeks to change the hours of the House and Senate to nights and weekends, "to allow more people to attend," to enforce a strengthened open meetings law, and to establish a strengthened and expanded ethics commission, "so that it can initiate an investigation of its own."

•On the influx of new people into the General Assembly

Also sees the primary hindrance to progress being the inexperience of new legislators, but sees progress possible after these new people get "in the loop."

•Convince people to stay "If things don't change, you shouldn't stay... (But) we have some great potential here. Number one is proximity to Narragansett Bay. Two, we are small enough so that new products can be quickly disseminated into the market. Three, we have a work force that is very readily available; we'll never be at a loss for labor."



# Fitness for the nineties What it means to sweat

Now offered at Manfredo's Gym, "Boxercise", is a course for women designed to build self esteem while exercising to keep trim. It is a new concept which has been a great success in New York and Chicago, but has just recently been introduced in Rhode Island. Carol Stupell teaches this combination kickboxing and aerobics course at the gym Monday through Saturday at 9:30 a.m. and Monday's and Wednesdays at 7:00 p.m.

The high impact class is a learning experience as well as a healthy way to stay fit. Stupell commented, "It's fitness for the nineties."

After stretching out, the beginning of the one hour class is devoted to instructional kickboxing. Stupell demonstrates for the class what kind of stance is best and how to punch and kick properly. There's much more to this form of self defense then meets the eye. There's so much to keep in mind that it takes a lot of concentration and discipline to do everything right. The students then imitate Stupell and are corrected and guided to the proper form. The last portion of the class is dedicated to a cardiovascular workout consisting of situps and jumping rope. After, a cool down period is best for the end of the session.

Stupell has taught self defense courses before and feels, "Women get scared sometimes, thinking they're going to be attacke." For this reason the course is positively oriented and not geared toward telling women about all the dangers lurking in the darkness of night. It is more an exercise class using self defensive techniques instead of the usual calisthenics.

This class is excellent for women who want to get fit and feel confident about their ability to hold their own. "With movies like 'Batman' and 'Lethal Weapon 3' out women are being seen as more aggressive" Stupell says.

The course helps builds confidence as well as physical fitness. "It's great for body coordination," commented Lauren Wilcox a senior at Brown who has attended the class for four months now.

Classes are still open for anyone who wants to be a part of this innovative new fitness program. Peter Manfredo of Manfredo's gym feels strongly about the program and commented, "It's an excellent way to get in condition."

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# The Sabbath strikes Black

Whatever happened to Black Sabbath? Earlier this year, you saw guitarist Tony Iommi as an uncredited player in the broadcasts of the Freddy Mercury concert for life, but before that you'd have to go back to Live Aid (remember that?) to see the band's last significant performance. Sabbath has done nothing worthwhile for the last decade, until earlier this year, when egos were thrown aside and Ronnie James Dio returned as vocalist and bassist Terry 'Geezer' Butler left Ozzy Osbourne's band The results? Classic

Dehumanizer is 70's Blackmetal with a 90's message. Iommi's grunge and drowned-out doom sound is imminent in what is Sabbath's only worthwhile recording since 1983's Born Again. Thirty seconds into the first track, "Computer God," the drum beat lets you know that Sabbath is back. Dio's voice is in full form and sounding better than it ever did during his solo career of the early to mid eighties. The lyrical content is also up to Sabbath's par, as in "Termination of Our Youth For We Do Not Compute.'

"After All (the Dead)" brings in the lyrical doom content, as the song is about talking to the dead.

"There's insufficient evidence of what might come after/but sometimes out of nowhere/ there's the demented sound of laughter" is again an example of the lyrical power still capable by the people who practically invented heavy metal in its most popular/copied form.


Atwater-Donnelly New Music Night October 27, 1992

### Gruntruck will Push you around Gruntruck

Way out in the Pacific Northwest is a state called Washington that features a city called Seattle (Home of the Mariners!). By now I'm sure you've heard how Seattle is a rather fertile field for music (Heart in the '70's, Queensrÿche in the '80's, Alice in Chains, Soundgarden, Pearl Jam, Nirvana, Temple of the Dog, etc. in the '90's). If I may, I would like to add the most glaring omission from this talented list--Gruntruck.

Gruntruck began about a year and a half ago, rising out of the ashes of Seattle cult favorites Skin Yard and the Accüsed. The molding and changing of the two bands' somewhat disparate styles first yielded a debut entitled Inside Yours. This record set fire to college alternative and metal charts all over the country with the exception of here. (Hmm?)

Even with all of that support, the record failed to establish Gruntruck as a major player on the music scene (as shown by the fact that no one I talk to has ever heard of them!). Just a few weeks ago this talented group released



their second album on Roadrunof those albums where you keep ner Records, Push.

A superficial listen will lead one to believe that this is just another Seattle band. But if you deign to pay attention to it for just a moment, during killer tunes such as "Tribe" or "Machine Action," you'll find yourself inescapably wrapped up in .he music. It grabs you where the sun don't shine and squeezes 'till you scream for more. The album is that good.

Everything seems to fit. Push does not seem like a string of songs, but a playlist carefully crafted so that all the songs seem to naturally follow each other. The result is a fluidity, an endless stream of grooves that won't let you shut the tape off. This is one dropouts on it. I hate that.

Basehead play hard with their Toys

flipping the tape over before you realize you've listened to it three or four times in a row.

Skin Yard fans will appreciate Ben's influence as lead guitarist and vocalist. Working within a band framework, he writes songs that aren't just Gruntruck songs, they're personal visions. Tracks like "Above Me", "Body Farm" and "Slow Scorch" can express emotion without getting bogged down in it. They still rock. Hard.

Next time you head down to your favorite record store, look for the album with the painted lady on the front--Push by Gruntruck. And I urge you to buy the CD. I've only had the tape a few weeks and it already has

If you've heard of Basehead at all, you've probably heard them described as a hip-hop outfit.

This representation isn't completely off-base (pun foreseen but not intended), but if you buy Play With Toys under that kind of expectation, you might be in for a surprise.

First of all, there's hardly any rapping in the sense of the word that we've come to know. Lead vocalist, and guitarist Michael Ivey prefers to use a sing-song

voice indicating low blood-sugar levels.Also, Basehead does weird, crazy, experimental stuff you wouldn't expect in any genre.

The album starts with a joke. On "Intro" a redneck bar band yee-hahs through a C&W version of James Brown's "Get Up, I Wanna Be a Sex Machine." The same crew shows up on "Outro," the final track, to serenade a comely patron with a Prince-like erotic ballad. The parody is affec tionate and maybe a little admiring. "Hair" begins with the sounds of a woman, ah, enjoying herself, and bounces around a troubled tale of infidelity. The band never loses its sense of humor. At the end of the topical and angry "Evening News," Ivey and anoth er band member start bickering and almost get into a fistfight.

Play With Toys is an album that draws you in so that you can hear all sorts of wild and wonderful things. If Basehead never make another album, they've done their part in keeping the music-loving world on its toes.

Moodfood is a composition of aural medication for tired minds.

"Throw Off The Shackles" is your entrance to a relaxing, journey. It's followed by "Moodswings Overture." These two songs act as the fuel to generate your overwhelming sense of smoothness. Nothing is patterned--there is no formula, no verses and choruses. These electric effects paralyze your body and seem to control the mood in whatever situation.

This performance continues through "Problem Solved" and "Skinthieves," on which Jeff Beck contributes a guitar solo.

Johnny Marr, ex-Smiths guitarist, also lends a helping hand on the album. With just those four songs, that's almost a half an hour of mood music.

Drum tracks, heavy piano, and soothing keyboards are the central themes to this piece of theatrical music. Every song ties in with the following number. There are two songs which feature female vocalists. A new artist, Linda Muriel, shows off talents in the track her

AC/DC AC/DC Live Atco Records

Isn't it funny how, after following a band for nearly a decade and finally giving up on them, they finally achieve commercial success? This is what happened to Australian rockers AC/DC who, in 1980, released Back In Black, which has sold in excess of 10 million copies in the U.S.

Since then, if you give them a general overview, they haven't released anything of truly great quality. Each album has had a couple of good tracks but never had anything that really stood out.

This all changed, in the eye of the public, with 1990's Razor Edge, which sold 8 million copies world wide and provided a sold out world tour. The songs everybody wanted to hear were "Money Talks" and "Thunderstruck," neither of which broke new ground as "Thunderstruck" was in fact an almost blatant ripoff of "Who Made Who."

With this in mind, maybe you'll realize how AC/DC Live

was released more for public interest, then, because the band had some great live versions of their classic songs. The album is available in a number of different configurations. The "single" edition has 15 songs, most of them the commercial hits, and the "Double" disc has almost twice as many tunes.

"Special Double Collectors Edition" is the same as the "Double" with a few extra songs and other collectors items, and there is a home video release.

The Single Edition is like a greatest hits live package, which wouldn't sell if it wasn't live. The first side is almost half new songs like "Money Talks," "Heart Seeker," and "Thunderstruck." Also from the Brian Johnson Era (1980-present) is "Who Made Who," "For Those About to Rock" and four songs from Back in Black (any guesses which ones? Bet you can get three of them). There are also several songs from the Bonn Scott years including "The Jack," "Dirty Deeds Done Dirt Cheap,' and "Highway to Hell."

The sound of the music on the Single release is true to form for AC/DC live. Lead guitarist Angus Young jams all over the

place as the unleashed devil spawn we know and love. Brian Johnson's talent is also on par with his usual performance-namely gruff, raspy and with a lot of that Axl Rose quality you get when you don't take care of your voice.


The "Double" disc release has the same stuff as the single with more of the classic AC/DC and (of course) some more songs. It makes up the entire set from the last tour. It contains a killer fifteen minute version of "Jail Break" which is the high point of the set. Despite its length you keep your interest up throughout the track with Young's Rifle Fire playing. Other long players include "High Voltage" with its ohtoo-long audience participation, and "Let There Be Rock" with Young's traditional guitar solo.

All in all, AC/DC Live is a good release if your looking for not-so-special live versions of songs you may already have.

The "Double" disc should be saved for the faithful although even they may wonder if they need six minutes of Johnson chanting.

Live is high in CD quality, but you may ask your self "Do I really want to hear his over used voice that clearly?"

There are ten women walking around the RIC campus who have learned a few new moves and how to use them efficiently, thanks to Kim Deacon and Peter Kazmier.

The Designed Defense Seminar, held on Sunday, October 25, was geared to very basic and highly effective techniques for eluding a would-be attacker. As Kim explained, the first step in self-defense is prevention. "Pay attention to your environment defensively." Be aware of your surroundings and situations that could lead to trouble. "If you have an uncomfortable feeling about a situation, your sixth sense tells you to be wary, listen to it!", said Kim.

Some of us were surprised at how easy it is to use your own resources as defensive weapons. Peter suggested several ways to avoid being accosted in/at your

Always approach your car carrying your keys with the largest key braced outward in your hand.

Observe the area underneath your car from a distance as you approach the car.

Walk around the car and look at the tires to be sure someone hasn't tampered with them (if you drove away and felt a flat tire, you would most likely pull over, jump out and check it. This would leave both you and your purse accessible and probably in a more secluded setting than when you first got into your car).

If someone bumps your car and

you are in a secluded area or about how vulnerable they felt. of your car. You can hold your license up to the window and let the other driver get the information. Open the window just enough to be heard. If you still feel unsafe or if the other driver is being uncooperative, drive away and go to the nearest police station.

Place your purse out of sight in your car. "A good place is behind your knees, in front of your seat", said Peter. This makes it less visible and still accessible if you need something in it.

Attitude plays an important part in avoiding being victimized. 'The assailant is looking for a person he can control", Kim explained. He's less likely to attack someone who looks and acts confident, self-assured and not easy to push around. Kim asked us to think of someone that we most love in the world: child, mother, husband, etc., and how we would react if we suddenly came upon them being physically assaulted. We all agreed we would attack the assailant with anything and everything we had available, without thinking twice about it.

"By nature, a good save does not harm", said Kim, yet in our defense of our loved ones, we would not be held back by those feelings. "You have to love yourself as much as you love those other special people in your life so that you can come to your own defense - you can cross over the social/moral boundary against violence to save yourself." Peter told of a class he was conducting for women, who were talking

alone, you do not have to get out He felt badly that he couldn't identify with their feelings because he did not feel that same vulnerability. Due to his size, strength and expertise, he was unlikely to be a vulnerable target. There are things we can all do to help ourselves -- "No woman should have to feel that vulnerable", he said.

> There was lots of "hands-on" practice of deceptively simple techniques. The effectiveness of those moves was amply demonstrated by Kim and Peter. "Efficiency of the style" and "ferociousness" were heard often. There is much more that could be written, but, you really should see it for yourself.

> Kim Deacon (who's studying philosophy at RIC) and her partner, Peter Kazmier, are both 2nd degree blackbelts. They've been studying American Kempo Karate, for eight years. They have recently opened a new studio in Manville, RI. A six-week course of self-defense for women begins at the studio on November 3rd, from 7:17 p.m. to 8:15 p.m. New courses will start every six weeks after that.

> In January, they will begin a "model-mugging" type of self-defense course for women that will be very aggressive, intense and realistic. The participants practice on an "attacker" (who is fully padded for his own protection) by using actual blows - no holding back. It's definitely not for everyone, but if you are interested give them a call, at 401-765-4300.

# An election day primer

I am totally opposed to any persecution of anyone because he/she is homosexual, but neither am I in favor of elevating homosexuality to some level of accomplishment. I am opposed to the "goodness" of homosexuals for religious reasons; I am not in

ness" of homosexuals as people. Without getting too far off the subject of this letter, I'll leave it at that.

Which brings me back to my original idea: why not have a "Take Back the Night" march that would be open and accepting of all women, women of all races, religions, and sexual persuasions banding together to take back the night for ourselves, our grandmothers, our children, and our future generations? No hidden agendas, no special interests or favorite causes -- all women made to feel a part of the larger sisterhood and welcome because of it!

In this election year, I find it interesting to note that while there are an estimated 25 million people between the ages of 18 and 25, that only a reported 6% voted in the last presidential elec tion. ## AMENDMENT TO PERSONNEL REVIEW COMMITTEE

### As presently stated:

Section 12.2: The Committee will consist of five (5) members: The Advisor of S.C.G., Inc., two (2) Parliament members, one of whom has served on the body at least one academic year; someone from Council 94, Local 2879; and a representative chosen by the employees of S.C.G., Inc., all of whom shall be confirmed by the President of Parliament. Executive Board members or employees shall not be eligible to serve on this committee. The chair will be one of the Parliament members, to be chosen by the President of Parliament.

# As proposed:

The Committee shall consist of eight (8) members: The Advisor of S.C.G., Inc.: four (4) Parliament members, one of whom has served on the body at least one academic year: someone from Council 94. Local 2879; a representative chosen from the employees of S.C.G., Inc., and one member from the student body, all of whom shall be confirmed by the President of Parliament. Executive Board members or employees shall not be eligible to serve on this committee. The chair will be a Parliament member, to be chosen by the President of Parliament.

# **Rationale:**

1: The present Committee structure places the Parliament members of said committee in a minority position. With the present structure Parliament does not hold a secure position over its own purse strings.

2: A precedent exist for four (4) parliament members to sit on a committee of such nature. (i.e. Finance) 3: Adding a member from the student body will aid in relations with the student body Parliament represents. Thus allowing for active participation from said body.

4: A precedent exists for non-Parliament members sitting on similar committee. (i.e. Student Organizations Committee)

Voting will take place on: Wednesday, November 11, 1992 from 11:30 - 2:30 in the Student Union second floor landing.




