#### Program offers ready-made resumes

In this world full of deadlines and pressures it makes sense to take advantage of the limited time we have by making the most of it. Instead of spending weeks or months preparing a resume, wouldn't it make more sense to spend more time sending it out? The Resume Expert System is designed to help people to do just

According to Ellen Weaver-Pacquette, acting director of the Career Development Center, "The Resume Expert provides access to the whole job pool, either in the undergraduate or alumni years."

The Resume Expert System is an interactive computer software package containing two disks for resume design and construction. One disk is a tutorial program on writing a resume and the other is a Program/Data disk.

Weaver-Pacquette explained that the system includes six styles of resume formats that are aimed at different kinds of employers.

"The formats are chronological, functional, accomplishment, skills, academic reference, and quick scan or all inclusive," Weaver-Pacquette said. The latter

format gives equal attention to many skills in different areas.

The system's step by step procedure and use of informative graphics make the program relatively quick and easy.

"It takes most people about two hours to do this, some take less, depending on different levels of computer expertise," Weaver-Pacquette said.

In order to become part of the electronic referral system, the Data Disk needs to be registered at the Career Development Center. This disk will be encoded with your social security number and will not change identity.

Weaver-Pacquette explained that for Resume Expert novices, there are scheduled times for help in computer labs in Gaige 168 and Craig Lee 131. Also, there are 'drop-in clinics' for individuals at the Career Development Center.

Resume Expert is available at the the Campus Center Bookstore for \$25.00.

"Cost was one of the major considerations in choosing this system, but, after investigation, we found some terrible programs out there. This system is used in many colleges with much success," Weaver-Pacquette said.

New England-Quebec exchange brings foreign students to RIC

Perhaps the most excited and impassioned student who walked through campus immediately after the Toronto Blue Jays took home the World Series was Adam Gibbons, an exchange student who is here through the New England Quebec Exchange pro-

Originally from Vancouver, Canada, Gibbons, 21, will be spending one semester at Rhode Island College. He says he chose RIC due to his great interest in Anthropology, the area of study which absorbed his attention during his first year at McGill University, the university from which he transferred, located in Montreal

(When Gibbons admitted that he would have more greatly preferred a school in Boston or New York, I thought how unthinkable to prefer a school in either Boston or New York than in this marvelous and exciting 'biggest little state' in the Union... How totally weird!!).

Actually, the reason Adam chose RIC is that the courses offered here are the ones most likely to best fulfill his educational interests. An example of this type of course is the Ethnographic Film course, which Adam reports is not offered in many of the other schools to which he had inquired (including his own McGill). While explaining the difference between McGill and RIC, Gibbons declared that the McGill student population is three times as large as our own quaint little student enrollment.

He tells of courses taken at McGill, where he finished the semester without ever talking to the professor.

When asked what he misses the most about McGill, Adam replies that "it's located in a very metropolitan area." As a result, he says that its location makes it easier to get around without the use of a car, as opposed to here. During his last weeks in the States, Adam will be visiting places like Philadelphia, New York, and Washington, D.C. His time at each of these locations will either be spent attending conferences or visiting those museums which deal with Anthro-

## Everyone needs a jump-start every now and then

Have you ever been in a situation where you've gotten into your car, put the key in the ignition and turned it, but the engine didn't turn over? All you hear is a deep murmur, followed by complete silence when you stop turning the key. In this case, your battery is probably dead. To find out for sure, turn on your headlights. If they look dim, of if they get dimmer when you use the horn, heater or radio, you probably have a dead battery.

To get your car going again, find someone with jumper cables and follow these steps:

1. Turn off the "good" car's en-

2. Find the positive and negative markings on your battery. These markings correspond to the colors of the clamps at the ends of the cables--red for positive, black for negative.

3. Attach the clamps to the good battery first--red first, then

4. Attach the clamps to the dead battery in the same order as with the good battery, but be sure to ground the black clamp to a part of the frame of your car. Don't be surprised to see a spark

when you make the connection.

5. Make sure you do not mix up the cables, and wind up attaching the same cable to one positive and one negative terminal. An explosion or electrical shock could result.

6. When all cables are securely fastened, start up the car, and let its engine run for about ten minutes to charge up your battery.

7. After five or ten minutes, try to start up your car with the jumper cables still attached. If it starts up, run the engine at normal idle for another few minutes.

Note: If, after several minutes your car won't start, it's better to give up before you cause any damage to other part of the car.

8. Turn off the good car. Remove the cables in reverse order as you put them on--negative from your car, then positive


from your car, and negative, positive from the other car.

9. You should still bring your car to a service station and have the battery checked.

If you have a question you want answered, and issue addressed, or you would like to offer someone a ride, or if you're looking for a ride, feel free to drop me a note at one of the Commuter Boxes, located at the SU Info Desk and the Campus Center.

As with any automotive repair, The Anchor recommends that extreme caution be used. Check with your mechanic before attempting any auto repair.

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
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

#### AMENDMENT TO PERSONNEL REVIEW COMMITTEE

#### As presently stated:

Section 12.2: The Committee will consist of five (5) members: The Advisor of S.C.G., Inc., two (2) Parliament members, one of whom has served on the body at least one academic year; someone from Council 94, Local 2879; and a representative chosen by the employees of S.C.G., Inc., all of whom shall be confirmed by the President of Parliament. Executive Board members or employees shall not be eligible to serve on this committee. The chair will be one of the Parliament members, to be chosen by the President of Parliament.

#### As proposed:

The Committee shall consist of eight (8) members: The Advisor of S.C.G., Inc.: four (4) Parliament members, one of whom has served on the body at least one academic year: someone from Council 94. Local 2879; a representative chosen from the employees of S.C.G., Inc., and one member from the student body, all of whom shall be confirmed by the President of Parliament. Executive Board members or employees shall not be eligible to serve on this committee. The chair will be a Parliament member, to be chosen by the President of Parliament.

#### **Rationale:**

1: The present Committee structure places the Parliament members of said committee in a minority position. With the present structure Parliament does not hold a secure p

2: A precedent exist for four (4) parliament members to sit on a committee of such nature. (i.e. Finance)

3: Adding a member from the student body will aid in relations with the student body Parliament represents. Thus allowing for active participation from said body.

4: A precedent exists for non-Parliament members sitting on similar committee. (i.e. Student Organizations Committee)

Voting will take place on: Wednesday, November 18, 1992 from 11:30 - 2:30 in the Student Union second floor landing.

# McIntyre leads rugby club with experience

"Rugby as a whole is a team sport," says Ryan McIntyre, 23, the President of the Rugby Club. "It's got to the most team-oriented sport, I think, in the world... To pinpoint on one person is kind of difficult."

McIntyre is hesitant to speak primarily about his own abilities, preferring to give credit to the rest of the team, like Tom O'Connor, the co-captain and veritable on-field general, and the new group of rookies who tried out for the team.

McIntyre learned to play rugby in England, and transferred here last fall. "I came over here, and I knew a lot more about the sport than [other students] did."

Since joining the team last year, McIntyre sees great improvement.

"We keep getting better, but the other teams keep getting better [too]," he says, citing last year's 8-1 record, 4-0 in division III play, and 4-1 in non-division games, and this year's 4-2 record, including a 12-0 tromping of URI. "We've played every team right to the nose," McIntyre asserts, "but a game can turn over in a minute."

McIntyre's role includes offfield "dirty work," like keeping score and sustaining morale ("keeping the guys' heads up," as McIntyre says), while O'Connor runs on-field operations.

"Fortunately, [Tom and I] are both pretty good players, and the other players listen to us," McIntyre explains.

In explaining the intricacies of the game, McIntyre tries to liken it to other sports. "It starts out just like a football game with a kickoff, and then what [players] are doing is trying to set up something called a 'maul,'" where players use backward passes and blocking to help the backs advance upfield toward the goal.

Basic scoring in rugby follows this pattern: carrying the ball between the posts and touching it to the ground, called a "try," is five points. Then, there's a free kick, for two points. Penalty kicks are three points, as are corner kicks. But, McIntyre insists, rugby "is nothing like soccer."

McIntyre describes rugby as "its own game," where "you can't really relate it to anything." He adds that it's a real "offense-defense" game, since "as soon as the ball hits the ground, it's anybody's ball." He also says that people really have to watch the game to truly understand and appreciate it.

McIntyre's leadership on the team includes not only supervising practices, but also trying to get everyone to practice. Part of practice includes scrimmaging, since scrimmaging "is the only way someone is going to get to learn the game," he says.

"We're going to the New Englands" thanks to McIntyre's stewardship, says Tom Spadoni, a rookie on the team.

McIntyre's experience in rugby started with an assignment to a "prop" position, where the player fights to get the ball out of the scrum, or scramble for the ball, and to the wing forwards or backs. "They told me, 'don't pick up the ball [and run].' I said, 'In England, you pick up the ball wherever you are on the field,'

#### Tennis team ends year on high note

The Rhode Island College women's tennis team ended the 1992 season with a spectacular 8-2 record. Two other shining achievements on the teams' record were a 2nd place ranking in the RIAIAW Tournament and a 1st place ranking in the U. Mass.-Dartmouth Invitational. Their success is attributed to teamwork, confidence, and overall strength.

Two team members, Pamela Prendergast (sophomore; first year with the team) and Michelle Cote (sophomore; second year on team), both cited the "winning attitude" and strength of the team. Also noted were the number of young, talented players, and the supportive coaching of Richard Ernst.

Coach Ernst (24 years as a coach for RIC) felt that this team was one of the best teams he's ever worked with. He supported his statement with the season record as well as the individual records, togetherness, and confidence of the team. He particularly appreciated the fact that the team members enjoyed every aspect of the sport and worked to improve themselves on a "literally day-to-



He added that, in a game against Springfield, he scored twice from the wing forward position, and was then promoted to the "eight man" position, between the scrum and the backs, "where you can get a little bit more recognized," he says.

Personally, McIntyre has scored eight or nine tries, and has contributed 40 points to the 120-30 edge the team has over all its opponents.

After next semester, McIntyre hopes to graduate, leaving a highly-talented team to carry on and better improve, and, hopefully, find their own area to play in.

At this time, the rugby club, not officially recognized as a sport, doesn't have its own field

The team (the majority of which is first-year players) did not attend the New England Championships, but opted to attend the U. Mass.-Dartmouth Invitational instead. When asked about this, Coach Ernst pointed out that, while the general youth of the team was an asset, the lack

of experience was the reason behind the decision.

Attending the Championships and losing early on to a more experienced team would not have been as helpful an experience as attending the Invitational and overcoming all obstacles to capture 1st place, Ernst explained. With this year's experience and basically the same team, Coach Ernst plans on making the New England Championships a major goal next year.

Dom DiVincenzo, a senior with three years seniority on the team, describes McIntyre as "a real good leader" who "always puts in the extra effort for the team." He also explained that McIntyre is always willing to learn a new position on the team to make room for new, inexperienced players. He agrees, too, that the new crowd of rookies should do "real well" when they reach their third and fourth years.

DiVincenzo also gives credit to

"There's a couple of guys that have been around, and, fortunately for the team, they're going to be around. It's actually good having a team at RIC, because it's a commuter school and not too many people are taking that many classes, so we can be around for a little bit longer."

Bad 4 Good Refugee Interscope Records

What happens if you take four teenage hard-rocking musical prodigies and throw them in a studio with Steve Vai? Do you need to know the answer?

Bad 4 Good is made up of twelve year-old guitarist Thomas McRocklin from Newcastle, England, fifteen year-old Brooks Wackerman, who is an awardwinning Rock and Jazz drummer, fourteen year-old Zack Young, youngest graduate ever from the Bass Institute of Technology, and sixteen year-old band chauffeur Danny Cooksey, from the cast of Diff'rent Strokes.

They've gotten together and recorded a good album of hardrocking tunes. Cooksey wails like a banshee in a form most reminiscent of James Hetfield and Bon Scott. Wackerman is always good for drum fills, placed where most needed. In the instrumental jam "Tyre Kickin' (Ya Makin' Me Nervous)," he has the drum solo

you're always looking to hear in concerts. He keeps it up for the duration of its time, instead of bottoming out midway through, leaving the listener with a question as to why it was on the

The only problem with Bad 4 Good is, at this point in their career, they're too Steve Vai. They are in the great situation where he was producer, arranger, AND engineer on the album, but why did he have to write most of the tracks and music, too? Many of the songs written by Cooksey are the best on the album. Maybe he should have been given more to do. "Rockin' My Body" contains adolescent lyrics, but given some seasoning and a couple of albums

under their belts, they could be a big contending band.

"Slow and Beautiful," also penned by Cooksey, contains some of the albums best lyrics: "We're together in a fond memory/ a shattered love, the ties broke free/ thought I could hold you until the day was done/ now I'm all alone inside, my heart is on the run." This is the extent of his topical writing.

"Tyre Kickin" is also where McRocklin gets to roar. The problem with him is you don't know what's his and what's Vai's. Don't get it wrong; he plays every lick on the album and plays them well, but if he's just following what was written for him, he might as well be doing cover

Refugee is an extremely good debut album, but the time to check out Bad 4 Good might not be now. In 1997 they could be up there, but let's see what happens when Vai lets them out of the recording booth/cage.

about Shakespeare's thoughts on his earthly visit. In the twilight years of Shakespeare's life, he wrote the song, which occurs towards the end of his romance play, Cymbeline. The play is set in ancient Britain when the Romans were invading the last remaining outpost of the old Celtic order.

The musical backup to the album is overwhelming. The music which escorts the poetry is

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
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# That was now... this is then

Black Sabbath Volume 1 1970-1978 Warner/Reprise Video

Last week we ran an article on the Black Sabbath of today with returning lead vocalist Ronnie James Dio. Although the disc is a move in the right direction for the band, many fans consider the original classic team up of Osbourne, Iommi, Butler and Ward the best sounding and most influential. This is the period covered on the new home video release, *The Black Sabbath Story*.

The 60-minute tape is made up of rare-to-find vintage recordings from the early years of the band through Ozzy's departure in 1979. There are also interview excerpts with Iommi and Butler, reminiscing about the old days. They discuss the forming of the band, touring, satanic influence and other topics. The pieces are both informative and sometimes humorous as Geez tells of the time Iommi forgot to get the flute for his flute solo. He just blew into the microphone for five minutes to a bewildered audience.

Some of the tracks are cheesy lip-sync jobs. "Paranoid" was recorded in Belgium in 1970. You can tell Ozzy isn't really into it, but he tries to make the best of the situation. His attitude is parodied in the 1973 concept video for "Sabbath Bloody Sabbath." This is one the best parts of the video. It's a home video with all the

technological special effects in the early 70s. There's also an interesting run through the woods with Sabbath and a dog. They also include "Never Say Die" from the BBC's Top of the Pops.

"NIB" was recorded live in Paris in 1970. Ozzy looks as ugly as ever, as he belts out the words. Afterwards, Geezer explains how the Evil/Satanic image was never wanted by the band, but actually by their label. The band never wanted occult references.

"Children of the Grave" was recorded at the 1974 California Jam. Ozzy seems so psyched and the crowd is so huge that he looks ready to simply implode. "Snowblind" and "Symptom of the Universe" appear courtesy of the the old "Never Say Die--Live" video from Hammersmith Odeon '78.

There are a couple of other surprises for Sabbath-heads here. There are parts from two unreleased demos, "Song for Jim" and "The Rebel." And then there's "War Pigs" with alternative lyrics. This version was put together very well. Iommi is up to par, but with Ozzy using different words and Ward totally jamming, you're taken away. The lyrical content of this run-through is more evil than the better-known version.

Sabbath is getting together for one final show this weekend in L.A. to honor Ozzy on his final gig.

About a week ago I received (to my surprise) the latest release from F&J. Boy, was I shocked! Not to the fact that it has been nearly two years since they released something, but because the album itself isn't entirely impressive.

Now, if you're a Flotsam fan you must surely know about the band's personnel problem. They have always had bad luck keeping a bass player in the band. When they began in the mid 80's, Jason Newstead (now bassist for Metallica) was the band's front man and principle songwriter for their debut release entitled Doomsday for the Deceiver. Their follow-up release No Place For Disgrace (another great album, even for a sophomore effort) was where their personnel made its first shifting. Newstead left the band to join Metallica during the making, and Troy Gregory came in and finished the album with them. The third release, When the Storm Comes Down, proved to be their best by far and drew lots of attention. With Gregory as the principle songwriter at this phase, there was no telling how good the fourth release would be. But what happened? Troy Gregory left the band, that's what happened. He is now in the New York hardcore sensation Prong, who, ironically, opened for Flotsam on the Storm tour.

At present, the band still consists of four of the original members, with the exception of Jason Ward (their third bassist). Michael Gilbert and Ed Carlson are still trading guitar solos, but are just not impressive anymore. Kelly David Smith, the band's drummer, is still exceptional as far as talent, but doesn't seem to be creating any new style. As far as Eric A.K., the vocalist, he still has his voice, but he doesn't appear to be really singing anymore (at least not like he did on previous albums, where he could be compared to Queensrÿche's



The latest release Cuatro is even more of a disappointment. I'd have to say that if I had five thumbs, one would be up and four would be down. The first song "Natural Enemies" seems to be the best overall. The guitar solos are decent and the beats are good, but the chorus lacks power and is weak. Tracks such as "The Message" (co-written with Chris Cornell, that possessed psycho from Soundgarden) and "Wading in the Darkness" also follow this pattern of starting of pretty well, but never quite leaving the runway. "Never to Reveal" is the first song to be released to radio, and what can I say, it is like the

## T-Ride debut fires on all eight

T-Ride T-Ride Hollywood Records

Picture this, if you dare. Faith No More meets Boston and Queen in a dark alley and they all get in a fistfight. The survivors get together and form a new band. Bingo. You now have T-Ride, a trio out of Palo Alto, California, who have cut a niche in the granite block of music and seem content to stay there.

Bassman Dan Arlie fronts the band, who, he says, simply did not expect to get a record made.

"Things just kinda snowballed," Arlie says. "One minute we were living in a crappy little warehouse where we rehearsed and recorded, next we've got a crappy big warehouse where we rehearse and record."

The debut effort follows a snowball path, starting with the kickoff track, "Zombies from Hell," which starts off sounding like "Learning to Fly" by Pink Floyd. Then, the tune gets its teeth kicked in by a violent, fiery hammer-on flurry by guitarist Jeff Tyson, a student of renowned guitar technician Joe Satriani.

As the disc rolls on, the hyperactive drum beats of Eric Valentine, luxurious harmonies, and quirky timing just get better. Tracks like "Hit Squad," "Fire It Up," and the finale, "Heroes & Villains" continually step up T-

Ride's adrenalized rush.

Extra high points of this one include Arlie's expansive range, from a raspy growl on the bottom end to a top-end shriek that would give a Stratavarius pause.

Valentine's steady play and Tyson's string-strangling expertise are also pluses.

"Each time we sit down to record something, our focus is to try to make the guitar sound like it's never sounded before," Valentine says. Unfortunately, it seems as if Valentine only borrowed a couple of Satriani's toys to produce, regrettably, stock effects.

The only other shortfall is that Valentine never breaks out of his hammer-on lick-and-trick playing to express himself. The tracks either drift into lush harmonies (effective, but overused) or simply romp through the rhythm part one more time. Valentine just isn't allowed to rip.

T-Ride sacrifice their true potential, which other trios like Triumph and the Police have found by letting their stringstranglers express themselves. At very least, Rik Emmet (Triumph) and Andy Summers (Police) ventured past slick licks and power chords to define themselves.

Overall, *T-Ride* makes for a great debut album, though the band's true test will be if their style can hold up for a sophomore offering.

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
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# A trio of comics down at the 'Ground

•Hiring 100,000 more police

·Passing the Brady Bill, and banning assault rifles which "have no legitimate hunting pur-

Proposals for education in-

·Creating national standards for education and a national examination system

·Achieving a 90 per cent graduation rate by the year 2000

·Developing public school

Promoting bilingual education

·Establishing a National Service Trust Fund, which would replace the current student loan pro-

As with all political platforms, these provisions are ideals meant to be strived for, but realistically speaking, there are obstacles which Clinton and Gore must overcome to achieve their goals.

For instance, a tough stance on In the area of energy and con- AIDS necessitates increased funding; where will the money come from? From down-sizing the mil-



itary, an action that would necessarily anger that community? And forcing medical research will only incense the medical commu-

As far as energy policy is concerned, it goes without saying that the Clinton administration will have to face up to the oil companies and automobile producers.

On crime and gun control, can America provide for 100,000 new police officers on the streets? Will a bigger anti-crime force necessarily mean a better one? And can a Clinton White House stand up to the powerful NRA, one of the leading proponents of gun possession?

On the question of education, will a larger role by the government truly raise the graduation rate, and can America afford to institute a free-money fund for college-bound students?

Other problems face Clinton and Gore, such as, can the federal deficit be reduced by half in four years with a "tax-and-spend" Democratic Congress, and will the conventional and nuclear stockpile amassed during the Reagan-Bush years diminish, considering the pressure such a move could face from the mili-

In effect, the question for the Clinton administration will be: How many toes can you avoid stepping on, and will you really achieve all you've set out to
