Shinn Fund offers money for travel abroad

A great number of students in college never stop to consider studying abroad because they see it as something too extravagant and therefore incapable of fitting into their budget. The Ridgeway F. Shinn, Jr. Study Abroad Fund is making sure that a student's financial uneasiness about spending a year in a foreign land is considerably alleviated.

"I have always believed that when students live out of the United States, they not only gain self-understanding but also understanding of where the U.S. is in the rest of the world" was Ridgeway Shinn's reply to what had been his motivation for creating the fund. Shinn, a retired history professor since 1987 who spent 29 years here told (with a gratifying smile) of how he received the first funds for his idea from some of his students during his retirement dinner.

Shinn also commented that he wished he was a millionaire so that he could send all students to study abroad and gain significant education.

Danielle Thibeault, a senior who was one of the two winners of the fund last year spent a year in France and declares a desire to re-visit Paris.

Majoring in the exciting field of Political Science with a concentration on international affairs, Thibeault chose France because it is a place where one can

experience international news first hand.

Thibeault attended The American University of Paris, which is at the heart of Western Europe. She also points out that a very important aspect of the University is that it is made up of 75% foreigners and 25% Americans, and thus it is extremely diversified and continuously takes part in "events which interaction among students of all races."

Another vital reason why Thibeault chose France (aside from the fact that she is fond of "Frenchmen") is because of its closeness to many countries like Belgium and Germany, countries she had a pleasure of visiting and Finland where she attended a conference in Security and Cooperation in Europe which dealt mainly with issues concerning

"Any student with at least a good academic standing is eligible," says Dr. George Kellner, a professor in charge of reviewing applications.

Campus car thefts down

Larcenies from autos increase 'significantly'

On Monday of last week, car thieves notched their thirteenth victim of the semester.

The theft brings the number of stolen cars to only half as many as last year at this time. However, the Security and Safety Department notes that while the numbers of stolen cars is lower, larcenies from cars have increased significantly this semester.

In a security advisory released last week, the department said that thefts from cars have occurred in almost every lot on campus. Radar detectors and radios head the list of stolen items, followed by clothes and other items left in plain sight in the

In the advisory, Richard M. Comerford, Director of the Security and Safety Department says that "there appears to be a misconception that the majority of auto thefts and larceny from autos occur only between midnight and 8:00 a.m. in the morn-

"Statistics [compiled] over the years have shown that these offenses are occurring both during the day and the night and from all areas of the campus," Comerford

Comerford notes that photographic surveillance and increased patrols are in use to try and curb. the number of larcenies.

The Security department offers the following suggestions to help protect cars and their contents:

·Lock your auto and roll up all windows.

·Place all valuables or loose property in the trunk when you leave the auto. (Disconnect radar detectors, and radios and place them in the trunk, if you can.)

·If a person is mechanically inclined, he/she could pull out the ignition lead to the coil as a deterrent to auto theft. Your mechanic of the Security department will show you how to connect and disconnect this wire.

·Have an auto-theft alarm system installed in your vehicle. (If you can afford it, have a tamper proof ignition system installed.)

 Install a steering column lock that will stop the steering wheel from turning.

Student groups continue fight for gay, lesbian rights

"They're so good at making soldiers, but they're just no good at making men," responded Jim Vincent, (quoting Natalie Merchant of the 10,000 Maniacs), when asked about his feelings towards the military's negative treatment of homosexuals. Vincent is the president of RIC's chapter of GLOBE Alliance, a campus support group for gays, lesbians, and bisexuals. The group is presently in its early stages of development, and it also welcomes (and encourages)

heterosexuals to join as "allies" to the gay community. "We have estimated that there are approximately 500 gay or bisexual students presentally on campus," Vincent continues. "However, most of these people stay in the closet. We respect everybody's right to privacy, and we are not radicals. We simply feel that gay students under 21 have no place to meet, and we like to provide these individuals with a social, educational, and communicational resourse."

Although GLOBE's membership is very small, it is joining forces with a newly established

coalition called RI Network of Pembroke Hall in protest of the Gay Students, (RINGS), which will include groups such as Brown University's LGBA, an organization known for its strength (it presently has the largest mailing list of any student group on Brown's Campus). However, the student union that is currently grabbing media attention is another Brown University student organization called RUQUS, (Radical University Queers, United & Strong).

On Wednesday, November 18th, at approximately 10 am, a crowd of students blocked off the central stairway of Brown's presence of Marine recruiters on campus. The students belonged to a coalition of three groups; RUQUS, FORCE, (a feminist organization) and ISO, (International Socialist Organization). They argued that school administrators were "violating their own anti-discrimination policy by allowing an institution that practices discrimination against homosexuals to recruit on campus."

RUQUS' leaders have since corresponded with the American Civil Liberties Union, as well as several of Rhode Island's gay and lesbian organizations, and they have been given the option of presenting their debate to one of two faculty committees.

"We welcome RI students from all campuses regardless of their sexual preference," states Kathy Latzoni of RUQUS, who also mentioned that one of the next goals of her group include fighting for anti-discrimination legislation to be passed. Earlier this year, a bill that would prohibit discrimination based on sexual orientation in the aeras of housing and employment made it to

the Senate, but wes rejected. The November 3rd election is bringing about twenty newcomers to the State Senate, and many seem hopeful that 1993 will be the year that a bill finally gets passed. However, people's fear of

"coming out" will linger.

"People's attitudes won't change overnight," comments Jamie Pulero, treasurer of the GLOBE Alliance. "Women and African Americans still face harrassment and discrimination despite the laws that are written on the books."

"We're not asking for anything special," adds Vincent, "just a guarantee of the legal protection of the rights we are born with as human beings. Society wants to treat us as less than human . . .

Let's stop trying to separate each other because of our differences, and accept the uniqueness of each individual."

On November 30th, GLOBE held a panel discussion on the media's portrayal of gays and bisexuals after presenting the film "Basic Instinct" in the Video Den. On December 1st, "World AIDS Day," group members passed out AIDS litersture on campus, and on Saturday, December 5th, participated in "Shopping in a Free State."





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
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Alper hones blades of experience

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Smart drugs harken "decade of the brain"

The 1990's is becoming the "decade of the brain," a phrase coined by President George Bush. Unlike the "tuned-out" hippies of the 1960's, people nowadays are "tuning in" by searching for alternatives to unhealthy lifestyles of the past, through conscious effort to solve the formulas of good health, longevity, and "intelligencia." The "young and modern" of today are experimenting with a possible solution, appropriately labeled "smart drugs."

The concept of smart drugs is not new; herbalists of ancient China used a species of indigenous club moss to reverse memory loss in people who suffered brain diseases similar to our Alzheimer's, or to counter the onset of aging.

Smart drugs made their way into America in 1976 in a study by Psychopharmacologia Magazine, leading to big trends of smart drug use in San Francisco and New York night clubs.

Most of the time, smart drugs are legal, prescription drugs. When a healthy person takes Peracetam or Hydergine capsules, for instance, the drugs' effects, which make up for deficiencies in thought processes in damaged brains, intensify the thought processes of healthy users. Intensified experiences on auditory, visual, and thinking levels are reported, as is enhanced athletic ability, according to some

Janz Morgan, musician and editor of Mondo 2000 Magazine, takes Peracetam daily and says "you begin experiencing this incredible auditory phenomenon. You are able to perceive the blank space between two closed sounds. When you hear eight violins, you can discern the unique pitch of each one."

Many prescription drugs used in the formulation of smart drugs are illegal in the United States, due to the lack of evidence of adverse side effects. Mail-order systems (like those found in pornographic magazines) provide addresses of sources outside the U.S. Switzerland, England, the Bahamas, and Mexico are popular places from which these products are sent. However, it's difficult to get these packages through U.S. Customs inspectors.

A second type of prescription drug falls under inhalants. Vassopressin, for instance, is used in medical treatments for diabetes.

For healthy users, "it gives you everything you want from (cocaine) without the adverse side effects," says R.U. Sirius, editor of Mondo 2000 Magazine. "It also makes for intense orgasms. Very localized, but intense." Ad-

verse side effects of excessive use of Vassopressin include damage to nasal passages and swelling of the lymph nodes.

Smart drugs also include nonprescription drugs that can be purchased at any health food store in the forms of vitamins and minerals, amino acids and herbs, and B-complex vitamins that contain Niacin and other minerals. Each of these produce their own particular effects on neurotransmission that may spark and/or fuel smart drug experi-

The most common type of smart drugs, though, are actually combinations of any of the drugs mentioned above, mixed with fruit juice in a blender, and served as "smart drinks." These are the strongest of all smart drugs, because the combination of the fruit juice "sugar high," brainfeeding supplements, and psychoactive prescription drugs chemically hits the brain on a variety of levels, producing a holistic effect.

Smart drinks are hidden behind names like Energy Elicksure, Power Punch, Psuper Psonic Psyper Tonic, Wow, Go For It, Personal Radical Shield, Power Maker, and Agent 666D9.


Smart drinks are reported to boost energy and detoxify the body from alcohol and residueproducing drugs like marijuana, and to aid in weight loss. Certain drinks provide an adrenaline "buzz" like the one from a strong cup of coffee. Visually, things become sharper. Cyper-punks call it the "new edge."

The Food and Drug Administration frowns upon the use of smart drugs on grounds of a lack of evidence, since none of the claims for smart drugs have been subjected to controlled testing.

Thus, no data has been sent to the FDA for review. Other reasons include the lack of quality in imported drugs.

Some users have reported side effects like fainting and severe headaches after ingesting excessive amounts of Choline and vitamins. Tacrine causes liver dam age as a result of consumption. Above all, says the FDA, without valid data on the negative effects of each drug, a user could be destroying internal organs.

The 1990's will see Cyperpunks and Techno-hippies further explore the new frontier of experience, without the concerns of addiction or waking up with a hangover. The best advice, says the FDA, is to stay from experimenting with these drugs, which haven't been tested and aren't known to be safe.

Record Reviews

Well, devoted Anchor readers, I am back to answer all of your queries (Please shut up, you may demand).

First, the headline: The members of Biohazard proudly proclaim their hometown. "When you're in Brooklyn, you'd better watch your back," they warn. And the Brooklyn they describe is a far cry from "Welcome Back, Kotter." Theirs is a world of racism, murder, drugs, pain, and fear. Their songs reflect their world. In "Loss," bassist/vocalist Evan Seinfeld moans the death of a friend. "We think we know what life is worth until they lower us beneath the earth/ Mother crying, forever hurt, my face like stone I shovel dirt." It's about time we got a hardcore album that could convey more emotion than just joy or rage.

The rest of the band consists of guitarist/vocalist Billy Graziadei, guitarist Bobby Hambel, and drummer Danny Schuler. This is one tight lineup. You get raw riffs that bleed fury and attitude, yet convey a weighty sense of doom. Schuler blasts out rhythms you'd expect to hear from thrash-death bands. The vocals are typical to the current punk-thrash style (bands such as Sick of It All) but work well with the music. And the lyrics are just as you'd expect: upfront and nasty. Nothing is left open to interpretation. This is the school of the anti-Morrison, where everything is so crystal clear that it just overwhelms you with raw force while you catch some amaz-

The new R.E.M. album, Automatic For The People, is loaded with contradictions. on one hand, it shows the band going "back to basics," and yet it also shows progression. Either way it shows that after the huge success of Out Of Time, that these Georgia boys are still R.E.M.

This happens often: a band has a successful album and is under pressure to put out a block-buster follow-up. Sometimes the pressure is so great that bands almost break up because of it. For example, Pink Floyd after Dark Side Of The Moon, the Beatles after Sgt. Pepper's and even the Cars after Heartbeat City, (no, we won't mention Boston, will we?) However, R.E.M. went back to the studio, wrote some songs, played some music, and the result is Automatic For The People. To them, it was as it was before.

It's a darker album than *Out* Of Time. No "shiny happy people" here. Nothing is forced; it's R.E.M. being R.E.M.

The album opens with "Drive," the first radio single. It's a quiet song with electric guitars added

Coppola draws blood with Dracula

As is the case with many other big Name Directors (Kubrick, Lean, and Spielberg), a movie from Francis Ford Coppola is usually an event. Coppola has indeed helmed some extraordinary events ("The Godfather Trilogy", "Apocalypse Now", and the failed "One from the Heart" are obvious ones). He has also directed some smaller films that are no less in-

triguing (e.g. "The Outsiders", "Rumble Fish", and "Peggy Sue Got Married"). Bram Stoker's Dracula falls somewhere between the scale of these films. It is a small production shot on, what looks like, a grand scale; however, in "Dracula looks are deceiving."

Like "One from the Heart" Coppola has shot his newest film entirely within the controlled conditions of the studio. All the exteriors in this film are interiors and the effect is astounding. The sets: Dracula's castle, the Carpathian Mountains, London, and Carfax estate are superbly designed and give a greater view into Stoker's Gothic imagery that the other "Dracula"

films (yup, even Tod Browning's 1931 classic) tended to ignore. In fact, one of the greatest joys of Coppola's production is its Faithfulness to Stoker's epistolary novel.

The special effects that one comes to expect from a horror production are not overdone although many sequences are filled with cinematic illusion. A number of the effects are so subtle as to be almost unnoticed amidst the acting and set design. Coppola manipulates the lighting in order to make Dracula's shadow seem to have a mind of its own(even though, traditionally, vampires cast no shadows). Coppola does not take many liberties with Stoker's classic except


to add an extraordinary prologue about the count's origins. It's a neat, visually exciting history lesson that sets the romantic tone of the film while justifying the reasons for Count Vlad's transition from Christian crusader to evil blood-drinker.

It's clear that the logistics of Coppola's exquisite production could not have been achieved if the film had been shot on location. The film is visually dense with the costume design and optical tricks making every scene unforgettable.

While the visual sumptuousness of the production is highlighted it is the terrific acting that makes the film a must see. Winona Ryder and Keanu Reeves

(as Mina Murray-Harker and Jonathan Harker) give low-key performances that anchor the film in reality. Their English accents and attitudes are played to perfection even when sharing the screen with the very English Anthony Hopkins as Van Helsing. Hopkins himself gives a lighter performance than his Hannibal Lecter role, yet it retains the slightly demented humor of that performance. His explanation of the stakings and beheadings is grusomely funny. Then, of course, there is the Count himself--Sid Vicious-a.k.a. Gary Oldman. Oldman is




even figure it?" Get an editor!



Part of the strength of "Everybody Hurts," "Drive," "Nightswimming," and "The Sidewinder Sleeps Tonite" is the orchestral arrangements by former Led Zeppelin bassist John Paul Jones. It gives a fuller, richer sound than a synthesizer, and it sounds a great deal better. Also, the use of a cello in the songs "Sweetness Follows" and "Monty Got A Raw Deal" is a nice refreshing touch. It really helps "Sweetness Follows," which would probably be dull without

Automatic for the People is not without some of the uptempo songs. "The Sidewinder Sleeps Tonite" kicks in right between "Try Not To Breathe" and "Everybody Hurts." It's a goofy tune which harks back in part to the 50s classic "The Lion Sleeps Tonite." The chorus, sung "how are we gonna try to wake her up," is so quick it's hard to figure it out. The song is fun and you can sense that the band is having fun as well. You hear Stipe sing "Candy bar or fallen star or a reading from Dr. Seuss." He almost cracks up as he reaches the Dr. Seuss reference, but pulls through it. It's a nice touch.

Other more rockin' tunes are "Ignoreland," which is standard rock from R.E.M., and "Man On The Moon," which talks about the late comedian Andy Kaufman (Latka from Taxi), and asks if he's "Goofing On Elvis." The song questions what we should believe. Was the moon landing a

The Album closes with "Find the River." It's standard fare from R.E.M. On a radio interview, band members admitted there was conflict over whether this tune should close the album. The other option was "Man On The Moon." Well, they made the wrong choice. This is a good song, but anti-climatic. R.E.M., in my opinion, has never been good for their arrangement of songs on their albums and this is no exception. Overall, the album flow works, but it runs out of gas on the last two takes.

With the few petty complaints aside, Automatic For The People is a solid effort from R.E.M. and is more true to their nature. It's not the type of album that will offer smash hits, but it's better musically. If you're looking for a good album to listen to. this is up your alley, but if you're looking for "losing My Religion" or "Shiny Happy People," look elsewhere.

Danzig leaves us godless

Danzig Danzig III: How The Gods Kill Def American

Back in 1987, Glenn Danzig, ex-frontman of the Misfits and Samhain, assembled what has turned out to be one of the evilest forces in music today. How The Gods Kill is a continuation of Danzig's previous two albums: Danzig I (1987) and Danzig II: Lucifuge (1990), and it loses nothing of the previous albums' wicked flavor. Glenn says, "This album is full of violent frustration." He is absolutely right, too.

Many people have often looked at Danzig's music and misinterpreted what he is trying to say.

Do not be deceived. Glenn Danzig is not a Satanist, nihilist, nor is he a heretic. He has a very dark grip on realism, though, and many of his thoughts and ideals raise some very twisted images of topics like religious blasphemy and world crises.

"Godless" is a very dark eyeopener and a proper album opener. Danzig speaks about the concept of "godless" by stating, "people being fed up and saying you made me/ Godless because your religion is so hypocritical that it's bulls**t to me.'

Obviously, Danzig has lost all faith in the Church, but then again, so have many others. "I couldn't love it anymore/I had to listen to my heart/I couldn't take it anymore/and so you leave me...godless.'

The next track, "Anything,"

begins with a soft acoustic guitar rhythm by John Christ (who is quite an exceptional, well-trained guitarist), and develops into a very hard blend of hell-spawned blues. "Bodies" is a good song, even though the bassline resem-

bles Led Zeppelin's "How Many More Times." The title track, "How the Gods Kill" is a phenomenal piece of music in which Glenn plays the piano accompanied by Christ's dark, ballad-like acoustics. To make the song more interesting, it changes to a very evil overtone during the chorus, and shifts back to acoustic, creating a proper centerpiece for the album.

"Dirty Black Summer," the first track released to the public, reveals to us what Danzig says about his childhood: dirty, black summer nights out causing all sorts of trouble. "Left Hand Back" is about Danzig's wish to stand up and challenge the heavens by sending up all the earth's pain with "Triple Times The Strength." Other songs like "Do You Wear The Mark" show another side to Glenn Danzig. "Devil on the left/angel on the right/there's no mistake/who I'll be with tonight."

Danzig believes, "With this

band, anything I do, anything I write, can be carried out. No limitations. Wherever I want to take it, they can go." Obviously the truth once again, because there has never been a change in the line-up. John Christ on guitar, Eerie Von on bass, and Chuck Buscuits on the drums. All are superior musicians and make a perfect component for Glenn Danzig's magnificently overpowering voice.

Even with his growth in popularity, over the last couple of years, Danzig does not fear in selling out. After all, with a mentality like his, it is very difficult to attract followers. He closes by saying, "I still do what I always did. Which is to do whatever I want." Believe me, Glenn Danzig will do whatever he wants, too.
