RIC-TV production to be shown on Channel 36

RIC-TV, the student-run television organization on campus, will have its production "Trends in Television News" aired on WSBE-TV Channel 36 on March 24 at 7:30 p.m., marking the first time the organization has had programming shown anywhere but the Statewide Interconnect Channel A on cable television.

This represents a huge step forward for the organization, which is now in its second year. Robert Perrotti, who produced the program under the advisement of professor Fred Lewis, is encouraged by this success and says the show is "an example of what can be done here if we have the proper funding and motivated individuals to produce it."

"Trends in Television News" is essentially a question-and-answer session between RIC students and local newsmen Dave Layman of Channel 6 and Doug White of Channel 10. They discuss a number of issues surrounding broadcast news, ranging from the concerns of students seeking to enter the field to the delicate relationship between a news station and

The subject of ethics in the news is most dominant in the discussion. The two anchormen make plain their strong feelings about the topic. Layman is particularly upset by what he calls the "tabloid format" because he sees "stations

running (stories) that should never be on the newscast. I see them selling it, I see them emphasizing parts of the story that are not significant because they know it's titillating (and) it's going to get people talking. It's like a cancer. Before you know it, day in and day out, (the broadcast) has the same stench to it.'

When asked about stations "playing the ratings game," White responded that a station "must always be able to point to its reporters and its stories and make sure that the reporters and the stories answer the questions 'Is it accurate? Is it responsible? Is it in good taste?' If the answer is no to any one of those questions...you've

failed in my estimation."

RIC-TV has recently begun work on a program with the Tomorrow Fund, dealing with the issue of children with cancer. They will also attempt to air the completed show on Channel 36.

Past RIC-TV productions are shown Wednesday nights at 7:30 p.m. on Statewide Interconnect Channel A on cable television.

Employers expect to hire more graduates while doing less recruiting on campuses

(CPS) Although employers are ployers were planning to cut back expecting to hire more college graduates this year, recruiting efforts on campuses are expected to be lower than in previous years, a study by the College Placement Council found.

flexible in the types of positions Oberman, a statistical services specialist with the College Placement Council. "Many came into school four years ago in hopes of landing a job with a major corporation in a particular area of the country. They will have to be willing to relocate, perhaps work for a smaller employer and not expect high salaries."

In the survey, 316 employers said they plan to hire more graduates this year than they did in 1992. Overall, the firms said they project hiring 7.7 percent more graduates than they did in 1992.

Services employers were planning to increase hiring by 12.5 percent, and manufacturing employers were projecting a 5.4 percent increase. Government and non-profit organizations, however, were decreasing their college hires by 18.4 percent because of hiring freezes and downsizing.

Nearly 40 percent of the employers are decreasing the number of campuses they will visit, "Students will have to be more the survey said, and will visit 11.3 percent fewer campuses in they want to take," says Dawn the 1992-93 recruiting season than they did last year. They will visit an average of 23 campuses this year, compared to an average of 26 campuses last year.

Firms can be picky in their hiring this year, the report said. The 1991-92 job market for new college graduates was a buyer's market-and 1992-93 promises to be more of the same, the report

Part of the reason is that with many companies restructuring and eliminating jobs, there are fewer job openings, analysts said, and, depending on the major, there is a glut of certain jobs in the market. Salaries and job availability in health-related fields are still growing, but other areas, such as aerospace engineering and the humanities, are shrinking.

Graduates from nursing programs can expect initial salary offers to rise 7.2 percent to \$31,732. Allied health graduates also gained, posting a 3.8 percent

Is Clinton's economic package just what this country needs?

Following President Clinton's speech on his economic package for America, Republican Senator Phil Gramm stated at the Conservative Political Action Conference that the only form of bigotry still

acceptable in America is against the wealthy. Bigotry is an awfully strong word. Used in that context, it seems to lessen the significance of the real bigotry faced by many minorities in this country. Now, I'm sure someone will accuse me of calling Gramm a bigot by implication. Let me make it perfectly clear: I'm not calling Gramm a racist or a bigot. Nor am I calling those who follow the Republican philosophy predisposed to a racist ideology. But it did seem awfully odd that I found absolutely no minorities among his audience of hundreds at the conference. Nor can I remember any Republican

present that evening who did not have smooth white skin and straight hair. But according to Gramm, anyone who thinks that the rich should pay their equitable share in taxes is a bigot.

The facts are these: The Rich, as powerful as they are, are synonymous to The Republicans. The

Rich, of course, must protect their source of power: their money. The

Republicans, serving as advocates for The Rich, (and vice-versa), are determined to find more and more ways for The Rich to hold on to their wealth by providing tax breaks and loopholes. But do they deserve these breaks when everyone else has to dole out their fair share in taxes?

The Republican philosophy of economics, what is now known as the Trickle-Down Theory, implies that if the wealthy corporations are to pay more in taxes, there won't be any revenue left in the company to create more jobs and opportunities. Yet the Republicans

to do that under the Reagan and Bush administrations. It didn't happen. The enormous profits generated by tax breaks and loopheles were not invested to create more jobs. Nor were the profits put into Research and Developmentwhich is why Japan is beating the pants off of us in technological sciences. In the areas where we had breakthroughs in research (audio/video especially), American companies did not put the money in development. But our Eastern cousins did. Anyone who hates Japan for "stealing" our ideas is a kook. They didn't steal our ideas. We gave them away when we allowed these industries to run themselves. Instead, the profits ended up in the pockets of the executives and CEOs-that is, the richest 1.5% of America's citizens. What

Am I talking regulation, another buzz word despised by the Republicans? Regulation means smaller profit margins because it prevents businesses from doing exactly what they did in the eighties. Regulation completely contradicts the Trickle-Down Theory. What's the matter, my fellow Republicans? Didn't account for greed in that theory, did you?

Or did you?

Yes, there was gridlock in Congress between the Democrats and the Republicans. It was caused by two sharply divided groups of people with two sharply different philosophies. One group's main concern is to protect the wealth of The Rich by administering varying techniques aimed at maintaining a fat berth in the profit margins. The other group is one whose main concern is people. People like me and my neighbor down the

When Reagan dropped the corporate tax rate to 31% during the Eighties, America suffered a great loss in revenue. Three points does not seem like much, but multiply that by billions, and you have billions and billions of lost revenue. When Reagan increased spending in defense by billions and billions of dollars, the money suddenly

wasn't there. So, we borrowed it.

To sum it up, more money was going out than was coming in. Final analysis: our ballooning deficit. It is now four times greater than what it was when Reagan took office. As long as the deficit inflates, it becomes harder and harder for small businesses to borrow money to buy more capital and to create more jobs.

So, who's to blame? Forget the blame. Although it's easy to unload the problem on the Republicans, no one should take the blame for a national (i.e., international) problem. We're all in this together, right? Even though most of us had no choice in the matter, we won't blame the Republicans for Reagan's failed philosophy of eco-

Take the National College Student Sex Survey

What? Another survey? Aren't students pestered enough with taking pages and pages of notes and studying for test after test? Why would students want to volunteer their precious free time to take part in a national sex survey of college students?

The 21st Century is less than seven years away! Students in colleges today are now preparing to enter into that century, with a newly elected president, a new sense of national purpose, a new program of career opportunities undreamed of in their parent's generation, and a new sexual identity focused on political correctness. 

increase for an average of \$30,555. Starting salary offers to electrical and mechanical engineers increased only slightly (1.7 percent and 1.4 percent respectively), be-

cause there is a surplus of these graduates. The percentage of job offers to aerospace engineers reported to the College Placement Council has fallen. In 1989-90, aerospace engineers represented 4.2 percent of all engineering jobs offered, and it has fallen to an estimated 1.6 percent this year.

The situation remains about the

same for humanities and social sciences graduates: salaries are remaining flat and are lower. Starting salary offers for humanities graduates were expected to be 2.7 percent lower than last year, for an average of \$22,941. Social sciences graduates saw their initial salary offers rise slightly to an average of \$21,623.



Financial aid increase delayed

CPS) College students who expected rapid improvements in financial aid under President Clinton's administration will be disappointed by the most recent news coming out of the nation's capital.

Education Secretary Richard Riley said budget problems will prevent the government from increasing the current \$2,300 Pell Grants to individual students right now.

In addition, President Clinton's plan to let students work off college debts through community service, the proposed National Service Trust Fund, likely will be phased in gradually over a period of time, rather than launched in a massive program, White House assistants said.

Press Secretary Dee Dee Myers said the new administration is facing a deficit that is \$60 billion to \$100 billion higher than it was last year when Mr. Clinton proposed the National Service Trust Fund. The President "had to reconsider a lot of his options based on the higher deficit numbers," she said in a February news conference.

Riley didn't make too many friends on the collegiate level in one of his first public appearances when he warned that his department will probably be unable to offer much financial aid immediately because of budget deficits.

"I don't want to bear bad tidings," Riley said at a meeting of the National Association of Independent Colleges and Universities (NAICU), which represents about 1,600 private colleges. But that's exactly what he did.

Raising the maximum grant to needy college students from \$2,300 to \$2,400, as recent proposals have suggested, is "not possible under the current circumstances," he said.

During his campaign, Mr. Clinton promised to increase dramatically the amount of financial aid for higher education. Mr. Clinton also said one of the top priorities was to give any person, regardless of income, the opportunity to go to college. Working in public service after graduation would be a means of paying off college loans.

But Riley said those plans will have to be phased in more slowly

than the new administration had anticipated.

"I don't like it; you don't like it," he said at the meeting.

Riley has not elaborated on his comments since the February speech, and Department of Education officials said they have no new information to add.

Riley's sobering news came on the heels of a congressionally mandated report that called for a plan that would require about \$7 billion in government funding to enable every college student to get some form of financial aid.

According to reports in the Washington Post, the Education Department has been one of the most neglected in the federal government, and some of its computers are so outdated that they are nearly useless.

Riley said he recently learned that his department's budget deficit was \$600 million worse than what he had expected because of miscalculations. Part of the department's shortfall stems from debts incurred during the last two years, when \$2 billion more was doled out in college grants than was available.

Roundtable critiques of ad designs will be offered at the end of



The men's basketball team looked set to make a run for the playoffs, after they broke a 16game losing streak by beating Nichols College, 76-72, on February 17 at OLP

The team made scoring look easy with their expert passing and shooting. Patrick Smalley, a 6'7" sophomore center, took advantage of his height and led the Anchormen with 22 points

Michael Kolesnik, the 6'1" guard and unofficial leader of the squad, also stepped forward to lead

"We have a real good team, despite the lack of experience of most of the players in this kind of competitive basketball. We'll do well for a good portion of the game, but somehow we lose concentration," he said.

When asked about his "unoffi-

At seven minutes left in the game, the Anchormen found themselves down by six points, 66-60. After an impassioned time out and a few instructions from Coach Richard Adams, the team went on a 14-3 run, and took a 74-69 lead into the final minute.

Sports Medicine Club to sponsor body fat evaluation

On March 10, 1993, from 12:30 to 2:00 p.m., the Sports Medicine Club will evaluate percent body fat using the Bioelectric Impedance Analyzer. This is a non-invasive technique which determines the percent body fat by measuring the amount of resistance of fat and water as a current passes from electrodes placed on your right hand and right foot. It has been determined as one of the most effective methods for determining percent body fat.

Upon entering the Recreation Facility, you will be asked fill out a form with your age, height, and activity level. You will then be weighed on a digital scale and escorted to the enclosed area to be analyzed. This takes approximately 3-5 minutes. Once analyzed, you will be escorted to an area and an assistant will help you evaluate your body fat.

The cost of \$2.00 will be collected by a club member.

Optional stations will include blood pressure, flexibility and a numbers skill game (25¢ for each). You do not have to change your clothing. Please do not wear nylons or participate in an athletic or recreational activity prior to testing.

Mandatory auto will solve more problems than it will create

The issue of mandatory automobile insurance (henceforth referred to as "mandatory auto") is but the latest in a long string of divisive issues facing the state. In its essence, it pits trial and personal injury lawyers against the insurance companies, and those able to pay against those who are not. Mandatory auto, however, will be the solution to at least one deeper problem than inability to pay insurance premiums: the danger of Rhode Island's roadways.

With this new law, drivers will be held more accountable for their adherence to driving guidelines, public transit will boom, and the streets will be safer in general. Hopefully, more competent, or at least, "safer" drivers will be on the road, and the possibility of accidents will substantially decrease, along with environmental pollution.

Imposing mandatory auto will actually remove more "dangerous" drivers from the road, since it's been proven that under the present system, uninsured motorists pose more of a danger, not only physically, but financially, than their insured counterparts. For example, have you ever been hit by an unin-

As another example, have you ever been hit by an uninsured motorist, only to be approached by a personal injury lawyer seeking damages when his client has a different version of who is at fault? Typically, these lawsuits are completely inane, including such cases as a wife of the "guilty," uninsured motorist, suing a defendant for damages because she can't have sex with her husband. Mandatory insurance will not only rid the courts of such ludicrous lawsuits, but will also probably put law firms who "specialize" in these suits out of business.

Maybe, just maybe, these sharks will be taken out of the now-profitable personal injury business (how many personal injury lawyers do you see driving Pintos?), and move into Workman's Compensation law. Then, yet another area that needs improvement will finally get it, thanks, though indirectly, to mandatory auto.

Overall, it looks from here as if mandatory auto will do more good than harm.



Racism and the Youth Violence Initiative

A national petition drive has been in effect to stop the Youth Violence Initiative, a plan developed by the Department of Health and Human Services to invest \$400 million in five years towards programs directed at the youth of America's inner cities scheduled to begin in 1994.

Although it has not received much mainstream attention, there is a large grassroots movement to halt the plan nationwide, consisting mostly of groups led by mental health experts and minority activists. An October protest which resulted in the cancellation of a conference scheduled by the National Institute of Health has raised more than a few eyebrows.

According to various media sources, the focus of the conference was to promote genetic studies in the area of violent behavior. The NIH has recently faced accusations of having claimed to find a "crime gene" carried by African-Americans, and suggesting that violent behavior is hereditary. In the past, the NIH has compiled results of research indicating that genetic differences exist between the races. They also claim that recent studies have provided evidence of a higher susceptibility to glaucoma and tuberculosis in blacks than whites. Little information is available on the details of these studies, and it is unknown whether environmental factors, such as diet and socioeconomic status, played a role in determining the conclusions of the studies.

Similarly, the results of studies by the DHHS revealed that blacks are seven times more likely to commit murder than whites, and are overall more likely to commit violent crimes. It appears as though these studies are being used to support the argument that the biochemistry of blacks is different from whites.

The implementation of the Youth Violence Initiative would allow for greater availability of psychiatric treatment for inner city youths, as well as the development of school programs designed to help children curb aggression. Psychologists and counselors would be strategically placed in school districts with higher violent crime

rates, and students would be under close observation. The program also allows an increase in drug treatment for youth who have aggressive tendencies. In general, this program would be an experimental, "public health" approach to preventing the spread of violence in inner cities, funded mostly by government grants.

Opponents of the plan are furious. They claim that the government is abusing its power by brainwashing large groups of children, particularly African-Americans. Some opponents say they see citizens confronting one of their darkest fears: the threat of genocidal, biological warfare. Howard University political scientist Ronald Walters claimed that there was evidence that such studies target blacks exclusively.

Opponents of the plan also point to suspicions about the origin of AIDS. Theories abound that AIDS is, in effect, a government project gone bad, a virus mutated in some government laboratory, they say. These conspiracy theorists now wonder if the government deliberately infected certain groups of people, opponents of the Youth Violence Initiative contend. Theorists also point to the fact that hundreds of blacks were infected with syphilis when the Tuskagee Experiment got out of control. Moreover, the opponents ask, why have blacks always been the government's experimental subjects, instead of whites?

Perhaps the motives of the

program's developers are best revealed by their public statements. In a speech last February, Dr. Frederick Goodwin, former Director of the National Institute of Mental Health., described the inner cities as being "like jungles, and the kids who live there behave like violent and hypersexual monkeys.

Sociologist Troy Duster called statements like this typical. In a recent press conference, he said that the field of genetics has a "long history of ranking animals from advanced to primitive, and then doing the same for groups of humans." He also pointed to statistics showing that eight blacks are sent to prison for every white.

The issue of racism has been rekindled this past month, African-American History Month. Unfortunately, it took the horror of the Los Angeles riots to draw attention to this problem last year, but the media seemed to put it on the back burner after the hype wore out. However, the recent release of Spike Lee's Malcolm X has helped to rekindle the spirit of activism in the nation's youth. Hopefully, the trend of activism, epitomized in the URI protests recently, will continue, and more young people will speak out against the injustices of the government.

Let the L.A. riots serve as proof of the fact that the government has historically done little to solve the problem of violence, yet it can certainly receive credit for causing it.

Small claims court: a journey through hell

Small Claims Court is specifically "designed to dispense speedy and final justice" in a process for making the collection of retribution easier. Because awards are limited to \$1500, it is supposed to make it possible to present your case without the aid of an attorney. However, when one of the parties decides to be stubborn, going through Small Claims Court can turn into a journey through hell.

Take the case of "Jean Jones" vs. "Mike's Mechanic." What should have been an open and shut case has turned into an elaborate panacea of turmoil.

Jones, an elderly widow, brought her camper van into Mike's during the week of October 24, 1992, for a routine inspection. At the time, Ms. Jones reported to Mike Rizz, manager of Mike's Mechanic Auto Shop, that her van sometimes hesitated and was sluggish on hills. Although a new carburetor had been installed only two years earlier, Mr. Rizz told Ms. Jones that he would have his mechanic check the carburetor anyway.

The following day, Ms. Jones sent her neighbor, 'Jim,' to the garage to check on her van. Mr. Rizz told Jim that the problem did not lie with the carburetor, but with the timing chain. After taking the engine apart, it was determined that the timing chain was in good

shape. The mechanic then suspected that the cam shaft was worn and proceeded to disassemble the engine to inspect the cam. He wrote out an estimate for the work in the amount of \$576.15.

Jim told Ms. Jones what the mechanic was doing. Because she did not think the van's problem was with the carburetor in the first place, and because the engine was already disassembled, she felt the estimate was not out of her ability to pay and did not stop the progress of the work.

However, the next day, when Jim went back to the garage, Mr. Rizz told him that the cam shaft was fine. Instead, the mechanic suspected that the exhaust system was clogged. Mr. Rizz explained that the mechanic had hacksawed the exhaust system in half that morning in order to blow out the exhaust.

Ms. Jones' neighbor, a sixtyyear-old who all of his life has worked on cars non-professionally, told Mr. Rizz's mechanic that he did not understand why the mechanic would cut the exhaust system. "To blow out the crap in it," the mechanic explained. When asked if anything came out of the exhaust system after its purging, the mechanic replied, "Nope. I guess the problem is somewhere else."

Mr. Rizz and his mechanic tried to tell Jim that Ms. Jones would have to buy a new exhaust system. Jim said, "Absolutely not. You can weld it back together."

The mechanic then told Jim that the van's problem was essentially due to a faulty distributor cap. Later that afternoon, this also was determined not to be the case.

The following day, Jim went to the garage to pick up the van. Mr. Rizz presented him with the news that the van's problem was the carburetor after all, and had gone ahead and installed a new one that morning. Incensed that the mechanic would install a new carburetor without Ms. Jones' authorization, Jim demanded that Rizz remove the new carburetor at once, and install the original.

Mr. Rizz informed Jim that that was impossible because the original was sent away to be rebuilt. Still, Jim insisted.

Mr. Rizz, perhaps aware of his mistake, told Jim, "I'll take care of it." The next day, Ms. Jones and her daughter were in for a startling surprise when they went to the garage to pick up the van. Mr. Rizz then presented Ms. Jones a bill for \$647.75 for the installation of a new carburetor. Afraid that the garage could legally seize her van, she paid the bill.

Ms. Jones feels that because she had never given authorization for the installation of a new carburetor, she is entitled to \$250 for unnecessary and exorbitant labor costs and the new carburetor.

"In fact," Ms. Jones also reported, "Mr. Rizz charged me \$25 for gasoline he claims he put in the van. What's awfully strange about that is that I was at the garage when he put ten dollars' worth in

the tank. I was there because the tank has a lock-cap, and I had the only key. I saw him put ten dollars' worth of gas in the tank and put the cap back on. And I took the key home. So where did the \$15 go? And I'm supposed to feel safe around these people?"

Ms. Jones tried to make a settlement with Mike's Mechanic Auto Shop, but to no avail. On November 3, 1992, she filed a complaint with the Better Business Bureau in an attempt to make recovery, but Mr. Rizz continued to ignore her plea. She filed a claim at Small Claims Court on November 30, 1992.

Ms. Jones had to wait until February 1, 1993, before she could call Sixth District Court to determine if Mr. Rizz and Mike's Mechanic had responded to the court

If Mr. Rizz did respond, he would have had to appear in court to defend himself and his business against the allegations set forth by Ms. Jones. However, if Mr. Rizz failed to respond, he would have automatically forfeitted the case and waived his right to appeal the findings. In other words, if he did not answer the court, Ms. Jones would win the case.

Much to Ms. Jones' dismay and reserved surprise, Mr. Rizz did not respond. The next step was to have an Execution for Payment delivered to Mr. Rizz. A sheriff from the court served the Execution and demanded payment for Ms. Jones. If Mr. Rizz had paid the sheriff, the money would have been turned over to Ms. Jones and the

case would have been closed.

However, Mr. Rizz had the option to refuse to pay. And, in fact, he did refuse to pay. All the sheriff could do was to send this news to Ms. Jones.

When she received the letter from the sheriff in the mail, she was obviously upset.

"I can't understand these people," she said. "They obviously think they're above the law." When asked what her next step was going to be, she said, "I don't know. They're obviously ignorant to the law. I'm an old woman. I'm afraid. If they're not going to pay attention to the law, how do I know what may happen to me?"

Ms. Jones then had to decide whether or not to pursue the case further in Small Claims Court, seek advice from her attorney, or drop the case. If she followed through in Small Claims Court, her next step would have been to pay \$100 to file a Citation, which would have demanded that Mr. Rizz come before the judge and prove hardship. Mr. Rizz, who initially refused to verify his name and to comment on the case, did not guarantee that he would have bothered to show up if served the Citation.

However, Mr. Rizz informed this writer that he did intend on paying Ms. Jones for the full amount of the award, plus court fees, which added up to over \$100.

On February 24, Ms. Jones received a certified check for \$298.75 from Mr. Rizz as an out-of-court settlement. Ms. Jones said she was pleased.



You know this idea came out of a drunken stupor: take two of the biggest acts of the late '70's, Led Zeppelin and Elvis, add a heavy dose of reggae and humor, and you have Dread Zeppelin, a band who have already established themselves as the weirdest band around. Now, with their latest release, It's Not Unusual, the Dreadheads keep up their tradition of injecting the already fetid mix of Led-heavy riffs and Elvistine voice caricatures with disco and reggae. Grab a snorkel.

There's already enough reason to like Dread, if only for their oddity. Now, after a temporary absence after their famous "Stairway to Heaven" album (*Dread Zeppelin 5,000,000**), they return with a new line-up. Gary B.I.B.B., the former bass player (whose aliases include Putt-Mon, Butt-Mon, and Butt Boy), now fronts

the band, charting them through the turgid waters of such disco hits as "Night Fever," "Shaft," and "Jungle Boogie," backed up by Carl Jah on guitars, Jah Paul Jo (duh!), drummer "SPICE,"

and "dub master producer" Rasta Li-Mon. Where before DZ outright bastardized Led Zep for their zany covers, on Unusual, the LZ influence is secondary to the absurdity; the kick-off track, "Disco Inferno," incorporates the Page work of "Achille's Last Stand" in the mix, making for a poignant counterpoint to the "Burn, baby,

burn!" vocals

DZ, though, don't forsake their roots; on "Ramble On," they really are playing Led Zep's "Ramble On," but B.I.B.B. drenches the lyrics in his really bad Elvis im-

personation, and the reggae guitar techotronics and "Ramble-ay-oh" chorus make the classic sound like it's been run through a Jamaican meat grinder.

Probably the most fun of listening to this

album comes from trying to guess which original Zep tunes are being ripped off, though not as fun as trying to replicate DZ's sadistic covers

Give Dread points for finding yet another, though less painful, way to resurrect the late 1970's. At least it isn't a BeeGees reunion album. (Where's Tortelvis? -ed.)

her dead boyfriend's power? How will the media (in both Metropolis and the real world) treat these heroes?

Superman is an almost cosmic/inhuman character, so it's almost acceptable to watch the power be transferred to another being (this is a comic book, after all) after his death. The same tactic can not, however, be used on a more human/mortal character. This is where the killing of Batman, if the storyline ever happens, may ultimately fail.

For the last couple of months, since the Vengeance of Bane oneshot, Batman has been pursued by a character with the same drive as his own, but with evil intentions. Bane wants to take Gotham from Batman and make the city his. In order to accomplish this, he is releasing all the inmates from the Arkham Asylum and dosing them with a drug called Venom. This "Venom" enhances physical strength and agility, making even weak-muscled villains formidable match.

Rumor has it that the Dark Knight's downfall, be it death or retirement, will happen in *Batman* #500. So, where do we go from there?

1. Dick Grayson, the original Robin, may become Batman. Grayson, now known as Night Wing, leader of The Titans, would be a good replacement, but the stories would be missing some of the flavor necessary for the Batman legend.

2. Azrael, an unstable character trained to kill, who has been acting as Batman, may also step in, but this would be worse than Grayson taking over. At least Grayson has the stability and head strength

needed to handle the responsibility. Azrael would need to be watched by Tim Drake, the new Robin.


3. Bruce Wayne may not die, but only retire from his night job. This could lead into Frank Miller's *Returns*, a story which happens in the future, where the original Batman comes out of ten-year retirement to once again clean up Gotham. At the end of the story, Superman defeats Batman in final combat, so Batman "goes underground" to train some of his followers in the hope that they can fight for his cause at some point in the future.

The first two options seem to be the most limited in possibilities; just another guy dressed as a bat swinging from building to building beating up thugs. The third might actually work.

DC is publishing four monthly Batman titles at this time: Detective Comics, Batman, Legends of the Dark Knight, and Shadow of the Bat. DC might think about splitting the different possibilities between the titles. Batman could follow the Grayson-as-Batman storyline as he would fill that persona. Detective Comics could follow the Bruce Wayne post-Dark Knight Returns storyline and Legends of the Dark Knight could stay the same as it is now, since the stories in that book are timeless, meaning they take place at no particular point, continuity-wise.

The only positive change brought out by this would be the post-*DK* storyline. The others would fall short and have a long way to go before they add anything noteworthy to the legend that is Batman.

If you're intrigued by the possibilities of this storyline, check out current issues of *Detective* and *Batman* along with issues #7 and #8 of *Showcase* '93. You will also want *Vengeance of Bane* and the *Sword of Azrael* miniseries from the back issue racks.




Second Hand Dance Company struts their stuff



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Drivin-N-Cryin's intensity cuts through Smoke

Even as Seatlle is establishing itself as the rock town of the early '90's, there's an East Coast stepsister state who's been relatively ignored: Georgia. The cleaner sound, straightforward tone, and true diversity in towns like Athens and Atlanta is a refreshing break from the grunge factory that, unfortunately, Seattle has become. The truest division between the two areas is the outward volume of music from each; where you can count ten or twelve "new" Seattle bands, only a handful of groups have emerged from the swamps of Georgia over time to reach mainstream success: the Black Crowes, R.E.M., the B-52's, and now, Drivin-N-Cryin.

With their latest release, Smoke, DNC draw on the styles of their Georgia brothers (and sisters) and bring their own riff-driven, manic guitar sound to the studio. Though no one song on Smoke establishes itself as powerfully as 1991's "Fly Me Courageous" from the album of the same name, DNC have their

moments. The drum and guitar work on the epic "Patron Lady Beautiful" (seven minutes, 36 seconds) is exemplary, setting the melancholy mood and staying with it. "1000 Swings" is a hyper one-off, propelled by lead guitarist/ singer Kevn Kinney and Buren Fowler (guitar) in a slick distortion-laced duel.

Drummer Jeff Sullivan and bassist Tim Neilsen provide a solid rhythm, though they sound subdued, the only fault of producer Geoff Workman, who has also worked with Queen and Ron Wood, DNC sound less like a functioning unit than two guitarists showing off over an adequate rhythm section. Sullivan's force is confined to a tap, and Neilsen's thump to barely a whimper. On Fly Me, the band sounded more full, and exerted more raw power than this "live" album. Smoke was recorded in three months at Atlanta's Triclops Studios, in an attempt to capture the group's spontaneity. Unfortunately, the power usually associated with live takes was swallowed up in postproduction.

Even through the screen of poor production, DNC does show a level of intensity, mainly through the

personal nature of the songs. "I write songs to rid myself of what is troubling me, to rid myself of demons," Kinney says.

Smoke also draws its intensity from the complexity of the tracks. Songs like "Eastern European Carny Man" (what a hell of a phrase to use as a chorus!) incorporate different voice filters and guitar layers to achieve its intensity.

The first release from Smoke is the highly catchy "Turn It Up Or Turn It Off," now a staple for local AOR stations. "Turn" is the tightest offering on the disc, with its infectious guitar line driving the tune along through its four-minute course. The only drawback is when Kinney hits the top-end of his vocal range, and sounds like AC/ DC's Bon Scott. In DNC's earlier releases, Kinney's top-end sounded almost juvenile, and made for a unique vocal style. Another fault with the album as a whole is the complete lack of harmonies, but when the obvious attempt is to showcase the singer, that danger is always present.

The last track on the CD is a bonus track, not listed in the cover. In fact, it's not even an actual "track;" wait for about 45 seconds after the end of "Turn," and the

track will wind up. It's a sedate, groove-oriented jam, where all the members of the band get to show their colors. Here, the intensity of the band is shown most prominently; there are a couple of crescendos, but no resolution, no piledriver of a chorus or solo that raises the tune out of the late-night

bar sound. It's a great track, and Kinney's wah work only hints at a talent not entirely explored on the rest of the disc.

DNC really don't put up a screen on *Smoke*, but with tracks like the untitled last, but you may be left doubting whether the rest of the disc is the real DNC.

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



Bedlam shows the colors of American rock: red, white, and hot

"Now there's something about a howling moon/Catholic girls locked up in the bedroom, knocked up by the sandman..." - "Sunday to Sunday," Bedlam

Throw in references to backseats and drinking, slide guitars, the right musicians, and of course, the American rock and roll tradition, and you have Bedlam.

I guess the band one would most likely pigeon-hole these guys with would be the BoDeans. It's an accurate comparison, except that Bedlam lacks the forced emotion that occasionally crops up in a BoDeans tune.

The band is led by lead singer/ guitarist/songwriter Jay Joyce, who says, "I just wanted to play guitar and scream. I had been involved for a long time in some recording sessions that were pretty slick, so I wanted to do something raw and fast. No click tracks, no

samples, no drum machines, just rock and roll."

Bedlam has done just that. From the opening track "Drink It Down" to the aptly-titled final track, "Closing Time," you get a col-

lection of authentic rock tunes that point straight toward the band's Nashville roots.

Joyce is joined by guitarist Chris Lancio, bassist Chris Feinstein (check out the killer lines on the opener, "Madhouse," and "Heaven"), and the solid, tasteful Mike Radovsky, whose drumming, especially on "Just About Time," keeps the tunes right on the edge 'till it's time to push them over.

There are also a couple of those

I've-had-one-too-few-beers-topass-out-and-stop-feelin'-sorryfor-myself ballads: "Lucky," an acoustic number, and "Hiding

Place" ("What do they mean by the break of day if it's a rainstorm?"). Some of the lyrics are comparable to Paul Westerberg's (The Replacements) before he considered sobriety.

As Joyce suggests,

Bedlam isn't interested in rock that is pre-programmed as sonic bubble gum that quickly loses its flavor.

They're clearly chasing down real meat and potatoes, angst-peppered rock. "I hate seeing bands that are overly rehearsed," he says. "I'd rather see a band that's real. I want to get up and have a good time, and if you don't like it, f**k you. It only takes an hour to listen to a record. Why should it take six months to make one?"

Finally, some recognition of hardcore existence has come about with Quicksand's signing onto Polydor, a major record label. With influences such as Fugazi, the Smiths, and Abba, Quicksand's

first LP, Slip, comes out fresh and fast.

The band released a self-titled four-track LP (including "Omission" and "Unfulfilled," which appear on Slip) in 1991 which ended up selling very well (over 20,000 were sold). Lead singer Walter Schreifel's signature vocals and Tom Capone's hard riffs, mixed with Sergio Vega's bass and Alan Cage on drums, seem to go beyond the usual hardcore

group

The album is no joke, either. Songs like "Head to Wall" scream "I don't know anything but I can read what's on your face," while favorites like "Omission" blare "it doesn't feel like the same ann, it doesn't feel the same at all." While "Transparent" criticizes not standing up for yourself, "Can Opener" realizes the total worthlessness of life in and of itself.

Although Slip does lose some of



the first EP's rawness, it still makes way for other hardcore bands to get signed by major labels as well

as making its own statement as an awesome album. If you like hardcore, you'll like *Slip*.



"Fifteen years ago, as you know, our country converted to National Health. Do you know why, Stewart?"


"I remember reading it was because the doctors were abusing our medical healthy insurance," I

I did. "And that's why we converted to National Health?"



From the four most evil people ever to set foot in Clearwater, Florida, namely Deicide, comes Amon: Feasting the Beast, a remastered release of their two demos, Sacrificial and Feasting the Beast. Either this is a shameless attempt at moneygrubbing, or this is a worthwhile release for Deicide fans.

The first 6 tracks are from their Sacrificial demo, recorded in 1989, and produced by Scott Burns. All of the tracks were originally released as a part of Deicide's self-titled debut. These earlier versions, though, actually have more teeth to them. There is much more bass response for that heavy sound, with enough treble to crush. Thus, we'have a collection of killer tunes. The opener, "Lunatic of God's Creation," has that trademark Deicide complexity; difficult, but not overdone. It contrasts with the thrashier, more driven tracks such as "Carnage in the Temple of the Damned." This is a good tape for all die-hard metalheads.

The remaining four tracks are from Feasting the Beast. These songs were recorded on an eight-track in a garage in 1987 and subjected to numerous remastering attempts. The sound

quality is pure garbage, and the songs fall far short of spectacular. "Oblivious to Nothing" has a few decent riffs. Set as the band was in its infant stages, "Oblivious" shows that they were severely lacking in character and style. True Deicide fans should enjoy this early peek at the band, but most others will laugh.

Much ado has been made about Deicide's Satanic leanings. Well, who really cares? So what if they worship Satan and then turn loose on an unsuspecting population, probably to cause some mayhem (like buying a carton of milk at the corner store)?
