# SCG postpones elections

Allegations
against
candidate
moves
elections to

Three spots in the Student Community Government, Inc. (SCG) roster will remain vacant, at least for another week.

An executive order from acting-President Jay Carreiro early last week postponed SCG's elections to fill vacancies for three officers who resigned without explanation during the summer break.

Carreiro said that implications of plagiarism committed by one of the Student Parliament members nominated to fill one of the vacant positions was the reason for the postponement.

According to Carreiro, the Parliament member, who he would not name, entered a paper on one of the computers in the SCG office and the paper was later turned in with another students name on it.

Carreiro said he expected to be able to investigate the problem and have the elections on Wednesday, September 23.

"My motive [is to] avoid pitfalls for SCG in future," Carreiro said. And "to avoid another resignation."

Carreiro said he didn't want to "walk away from something" that may cause problems for SCG in the future. Carreiro also added that he intends to remain Vice-President, and will not run for President.

Also at the Wednesday meeting of Student Parliament, Carreiro appointed temporary Finance Commission. This funding arm of SCG had not been formed yet this semester because of the lack of a Treasurer. When Carreiro attempted to form a committee at the last Parliament meeting, the idea was met with opposition because the Student Parliament members weren't comfortable with the idea of the incoming Treasurer not being able to select students for the committee. The committee members temporary status will allow for the new Treasurer to select new members or keep those already named. Carreiro added that

all of the students named to the committee had "shown interest" in being on the committee.

While the Finance Commission will meet Wednesday afternoon to hear allocation and reallocation requests, Carreiro says that student organizations shouldn't look for large allocations anytime soon.

"Organizations have to work within [their] budgets... [their] Finance Commission] is going to be very cautious as to how much money goes out." Carreiro says that enrollment changes will mean a decrease in the amount the college collected through the Student Activities Fee, leaving SCG with less money.

# Burst pipe puts library staff to the test

Slow response from campus authorities raises questions about handling of emergency situations

"It was really just a horrible mess, It looked like all the rusted water that had been in the pipes had just let go and splattered everything. So besides having the puddles and the mess, you had these blotches from that dirty water that was sitting on the shelves and on the books," recalled Government Publications Librarian, Frank Notarianni, of the disaster resulting from a broken pipe in the library last summer.

On July 7, workers from the Physical Plant were trying to fix the air conditioning system in the library. What should have been an easy adjustment to the "univent" heater/air conditioner in the former smoking room on Level 3 quickly turned into a major problem. The water pipe for this univent was not fitted or seated properly. The poor design of this joint goes back thirty years, to when the building was built. The joint was defective, and should have been soldered around the pipe.

"The workers were not aware that it was such a precarious situation," said Library Director, Richard A. Olsen. When the valve was turned on, the pipe separated. "If the pipe was fitted properly," added Olsen, "this never would have happened."

"It could have happened in the middle of the night," said Olsen. Luckily, members of the library staff were on hand to handle the situation.

It was about 1:30 on Wednes-

day afternoon and Reference Librarian, Patricia "Tish" Brennan, was preparing to teach a Preparatory Enrollment class when she was alerted to the situation.

"I found out when circulation people sort of came huffing and puffing through the lobby going 'We got a leak forming on level 1A!" Concerned, she went downstairs to see for herself. "Circulation staff and some people from Technical Services were already working, trying to move books away from where the water was cascading through

the ceiling. It was truly a water-

Needless to say, Brennan canceled her 2:30 appointment with the P.E.P. students. "I realized that what we had was a real, genuine full-scale disaster underway. [There was] a bucket brigade of people moving books [and] Physical Plant was trying to shut the water off at it's source."

The water had leaked from Level 3 to Level 1B, through the

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# Burst pipe puts library staff to the test

stacks and through the floor down

Brennan called Beth Perry of the Department of State Library Services, and called several companies asking for freezer space to freeze the books. Freeze-drying is the standard procedure for saving books during such situations. Perry arrived close to 4:30 to help.

"Beth Perry had been called because she's the contact person in case of a disaster in Rhode Island," explained Notarianni, "She brought a manual and she has a listing of phone numbers of people to call."

In an agreement with state libraries, the Providence Journal Bulletin sends newsprint to help wrap wet books to facilitate transport and minimize damage. The Journal sent two large rolls to the library within a half-hour of being notified.

Perry was very bewildered by the lack of college backup, recalls Brennan. "She asked 'Where are the people trying to soak up the water?""

Several Physical Plant workers were on the scene trying to move books, but help was slow in coming. The Circulation Department had called the office of the Physical Plant several times for help; for wet vacuums and personnel assistance.

"One of our problems was upper management outside the library didn't come to realized that it was a real disaster until late in the afternoon," Brennan fumed, "They didn't seem to get it, from what we described, that what we had here was a very, very large problem, not just a minor annoyance." Circulation Department Librarian David Maine agreed. "I was trying to impress upon everyone I talked to how serious the situation was, but they have it on their minds 'Oh, it's an overflowed toilet' or something like that ... it doesn't seem to register," Maine


Maine explained that some of the problems with getting help hat and housekeeping personnel being in between shifts. The 'dayside' housekeeping shift ends around 3:00 p.m. and the night crew doesn't come on until 4:30 p.m. Maine added that after 2:30 p.m., in the Summer, "You get no movement, no one's around." The work

Plant are similar. "Somebody had made it through to Physical Plant on the phone earlier and told them the situation and they brought up a box a box of rags. I guess they got it from Donovan Dining Center. And they came in, the water's all over the floor, all over the place, and they dump the box of rags and go: 'Here's your rags!' That was the only response we got from Physical Plant. Now once the nightside house keeping came on at 4:30, they came over with the wet vacs and other cleaning stuff," Maine said.

As the problems persisted, frustration grew, Librarian Lisa Maine called Dr. James Cornelison, Assistant Vice President for Administration, and he was not in. Periodicals Librarian Judith Stokes called Vice President for Administration and Finance, Dr. Lenore DeLucia and could not get through because DeLucia was at a meeting with President Nazarian. Angered with the state of affairs, Judith Stokes, Assistant Professor in the library, and Perry interrupted the meeting and took the President, Dr. John Nazarian, and DeLucia to the library to see the situation for themselves.

"The fact that Vice President DeLucia came down in person with President Nazarian to really see what was going on really made things happen more quickly and effectively," commented Supervisor Sharon Giacobbi. "We didn't have to go through the normal red tape measures of filling out requisitions and getting approvals in a time format removed from the immediacy of the problem."

While Nazarian and DeLucia were there, Patrick Kennedy of Capital Records management Corporations arrived to see the extent of the damage. Some of the staff questioned the move, wondering if it was a business move or if the corporation really wanted to help. After much deliberations, Capital Records was given the contract to clean the books. Some staff members wanted to get estimates from other companies first, but Capital Records Providence location swayed the decision. The other companies contacted were in New York and there was a concern that mold would set in before the books

reached New York. Once mold sets in, a book is destroyed. Going with Capital Records, who had admitted that they primarily with flat document material and not with books with binding, seemed to be the only wise solution.

As the library staff, student workers, and student Eric Kent worked to pack the books, Robert the Naval War College, Newport, arrived around 4:30 p.m. with supplies, including aprons and rubber gloves. The staff, as well as the crew from Capital Records, stayed late packing the damaged books.

"I put on an apron, the rubber gloves and worked until about 9:30, quarter of ten. I was on Level 1B." recalled Notarianni. "It was boiling in the stacks; it was sweltering."

Hours after the water had been turned off, it still "dripped and oozed," Brennan said.

"The Capital crew did a good job. They worked hard while they were here," said Technical Services Librarian, Carol Hryciw-Wing, "They were about as professional a company as we expected."

Library Supervisor Sharon

Giacobbi said of her staff, "They were beat up... tired, overworked and dirty as the devil because of the staining from the liquid and I think they did a wonderful job as far as I'm concerned, because who would stay here but a dedicated person?"

"I think given the situation, that we weren't trained or very well prepared for the event, I think it was handled well by the library staff and by the cooperation we got from Bet Perry," added Giacobbi.

All totaled, Capital Records packed 102 boxed of books to be dried. 2,807 books came back, 349 of them having to go to the bindery and 385 will have to be discarded. None of the library staff is sure if the books can be replaced.

The library staff's quick response was credited with minimizing the amount of books that were completely destroyed. The areas affected were the 'D's' and '\*,' mostly history sociology books.

"The major problem we have here," stated Giacobbi, "is that we really don't have a way of dealing with major disasters... in a knowledgeable, coordinated fashion. When I say 'we' I refer to the campus as a whole." The library does possess a manual which outlines procedures to take in such events.

Noting that the pipes are getting old, Giacobbi summed up the situation. "Preventative maintenance is not really the patternhere. Things just get old and break down and when they break down, then there's a response. But I am to understand that there has been a request placed to have these pipes looked at on this side [of the library] to make sure that we wouldn't have to sustain similar kind of damage in the future if it can be prevented."

Looking back, Hryciw-Wing echoed many of the staff members feelings. "One of the difficult parts of all of this was the fact that we couldn't seem to rouse Physical Plant in a timely fashion."

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
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# Sports Roundup







# Heavy metal sampler is "very neutral"

# Kalifornia's road trip is sidetracked by its soundtrack

Kalifornia, the new movie staring Brad Pitt and Juliette Lewis, is about a couple fascinated with serial killers who accidentally pick one up on their road trip. It has just been released last weekend. The soundtrack to the movie isn't as good as the movie itself but has more ups than downs.

The album starts off with Mind Bomb's well-orchestrated "Do You Need Some?," an OK rock tune that seems to drag a little. Quicksand lends a power fist to the brew with "Unfulfilled," definitely the best song on its soundtrack. East 17's "Deep" comprises the soundtrack's rap song with a sound like P.M. Dawn and Boys II Men. Drivin' N' Cryin' donates "When You Come Back" to the collection, a slow, bluesy number that I feel isn't worth squat. "No One Said It Would Be Easy," by Sheryl Crow, could be categorized as the soundtrack's love song, and she pulls it off perfectly. The Indians, unfortunately the featured artist on this album, give "I Love This World" and "Look Up to the Sky," two acoustic harmonica-drowned Southern backwoods crap. What


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

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

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# Digging its way up the college charts

Dig Die Wasteland Records

Out of the far reaches of feedback rock, hardcore, and punk comes Dig. No, it's not an archeological dig or the phrase, "I dig this funky groove." It's Dig, the band and their latest release is fresh fruit compared to the orchard of generic alternative music these past few years. Although the album is a hit over-produced (they probably should have left it a little raw), the album still comes out as energetic and on-the-spot as a live perfor-

Getting its name from its songwriter's dog, Dig was formed in February '92 when they released the "Runt EP" which charted on 224 Top 40 college alternative and metal stations. The members are all from Southern California

and name their influences as punk rock, freedom rock, and Pink Floyd. Dig, their self-titled album, is their first full-length release

'Let Me Know," a last attempt plea through a guitar distortion pedal, starts the album off with a kick, wading through waves of white noise and playful chords. "I'll Stay High," the current single, is determined and raw, not actually hitting vocals until a minute and a half of the song has passed. It gets its uniqueness from the simple lyrics of Scott Hackwith and the power of the ripping feedback chords of Jon Morris on guitar. "Unlucky Friend" switches back and forth between a light ensemble on a beach to a raging storm of noise, while "Anymore" smoothly glides through a melodic pop ballad that comes out sweet and swollen. "Conversation" is played upon a plethora of background conversations, drifting slowly in and out of useless chatter

and screams of restlessness. "Feet Don't Touch the Ground" is a straightforward jam in 2/4, as is "Ride the Wave," both of which could be better, seeing as how the band does have three guitarists. But it's done well enough. Other

honorable song mentions are "F-You," a love song incorporating anger and "Green Room," which echoes a format as seen in "Unlucky Friend," six songs back.

All in all, Dig is a powerful new

LP and band, sure to make noise on the alternative circuit and college charts. I'll give the album a thumbs up as well as giving one of their favorite interests in their bio a thumbs up: colorforms. Don't you just miss those things?
