Portes speech shatters the 'American Dream'

According to a recent study, the children of recent immigrants to the US face a much more grim reality upon arrival than do the children of immigrants who arrived at the turn of the century.

Alejandro Portes, John Dewey Professor of Sociology and International Relations at The John Hopkins University, lectured this past Wednesday on the topic as part of the October Series organized by the Faculty of Arts and Sciences.

Co-author of City on the Edge: the Transformation of Miami (1993) and several other books dealing with immigration, Portes lectured on research he has done which indicates that assimilation into American culture no longer means achieving the so called 'American Dream.'

Over 100 faculty and students along with a nine-member panel listened as Portes he described the new reality awaiting those who come to the US with hopes of making it and achieving everything they were not able to get back home. Portes described as unrealistic the persistent notion that the faster one assimilates to the US culture and leave behind their own personal values, the sooner one

will succeed.

The old blueprint of the process of assimilation, said Portes, assumes that "you arrive, you learn the language and culture, become a citizen, and finally become accepted and as a result move up."

Portes, who based all of his research on studies of mostly high school students, said that present times indicate a "segmented assimilation" which not only allows immigrants to move into the mainstream but also into the inner-cities way of life. The inner-cities located in places like Miami and California lack all kinds of resources, most importantly moral resources, he said

This then leads to the conclusion, said Portes, that the children of immigrants should, for the beginning stages of their life in the US, remain within their own community and family values which offer a greater possibility for moral resources than do streets filled with gangs, drugs and crime.

"The resources of the inner cities are opposite of those required for progress and mobility," said Portes. "People who remain in their own closed knit community have a better chance of making it." With time, he said, assimilation will happen on its own.

The Russian-Jewish immigration was cited as a successful example of maintaining a closedin community without immediately attempting to assimilate. As a result, he said "businesses proliferated... so this tightness helped the second generation."

During the two-hour lecture, Portes also described how difficult the process of assimilation can be for some children of immigrants. He said that in one high school located in the Bronx, N.Y, Puerto Rican students were teased by other students for trying to "be white." Another study of 200,000 Haitian students within a public high school system in another state, concluded that they were "labeled as too docile and subservient." They were made fun of "for their use of French and Creole." So in a sense, said Portes, "to remain Haitian, you have to face social ostracism.'

Portes said the school system could be a main factor in helping students move away from what he called a "downward assimilation." He said many students are not motivated by their teachers and somehow learn attitudes like, "why should I make an effort to graduate, I'll get a better job at the 7-11." Not only should the schools emphasize the opportunities of going to college, he said, but also the importance of vocational schools.

Soon after Portes had a chance to answer questions from the panel and the audience, the discussion was moved to the Unity Center where the discussion continued.

George Sanchez, 24, a second generation immigrant from Cuba, was one of those who attended the reception. A student at the RI School of Design, Sanchez said he attended Portes' lecture because he was concerned about his children and how the current situation would affect them.

"We are going to let them go, so what's going to happen to them," he said.

There was also continued discussion at a 4 p.m. class taught by Dr. Carolyn Fluehr-Lobban, where

Portes' research was found to be incomplete. According to Dr. Fluehr-Lobban, Portes offered valuable sociological information, however his discussion failed to bring up the topic of race.

"Whether the student is a lighter Cuban or a darker Cuban is going to have an effect" on whether they make it successfully, she said.

Another problem with Portes' research was brought up by a student who said that undocumented immigrants also face very different situations than do those with legal status and that this distinction should have been made when discussing whether immigrants will be able to move up the ladder of success.

Save time, money taking the CLEP route through college


"CLEP tests helped my son complete his four-year degree program in two years," Julie Albright proudly states about her son, a RIC alumnus who manages a theatre group in Bridgeport, Connecticut. For this reason, Albright, (who presently works at RIC's Center for Evaluation and Research as a Test Coordinator) strongly recommends the CLEP (the College Level Entry Program) alternative to students who would like to reduce the amount of time it takes for them to get through school.

Steve Hesford, 41, of East Providence, has participated in CLEP for other reasons. He works full time to support his family and the time that he has to spend in a classroom is limited. Furthermore, it is often difficult for him to find classes scheduled during the hours

of the week that he has available. Participating in CLEP has helped him to earn credits while studying at home.

CLEP is an examination program offered by the College Board, a nonprofit membership organization that provides tests and other educational services for students, schools, and colleges. It is the most widely accepted credit-by-examination program in the country, with a membership composed of more than 2500 colleges and universities, including RIC, URI, and CCRI.

For a \$47 fee per examination, RIC students participating in CLEP save time and tuition money by opting to take an exam as an alternative to registering for a class. The score that one receives on a CLEP exam does not affect one's grade point average, and RIC awards the recipient his/her corresponding credits on a pass/failure basis. There are five general



examinations and 30 subject examinations, and each may be taken twice if one fails the first

CLEP examinations are offered once a month at RIC (with the exceptions of September and February), and the deadline to register is the fifteenth of the month preceding the examination. Out of the 35 exams offered, the English with essay exam (which fulfills a

student's 'Writing 100' requirement) is the only test that is held only four months out of the year.

Albright says that she can never predict how many students will show up at the testing center each month. She says that despite the fact that she has had months where 25 or more students have registered for exams, she still sees months in which only a handful of students participate. Albright says that this

may be attributed to the fact that many students are unaware of the program's existence. Others have suggested that many students feel that they do not have the confidence or the self-discipline to learn a subject by themselves, and that they need to be in a classroom environment in order to become motivated to study. However, Albright says, there are those few ambitious students who are an exception to the rule who she sees returning to the testing center each month.

"Many students who take many of the CLEPs go on to take the ACT PEPs," she adds. The ACT PEP (American College Testing Proficiency Examination Program) gives students recognition to satisfy advanced course requirements in their majors. The program's popularity has been growing in recent years due to the fact that many older students are returning to college and seeking alternative methods of learning.

"RIC's student body is changing . . . "Albright states. "And so are students demands."

Jesse Jackson in public, unheard of for a Democratic Presidential candidate. Moreover, his running mate, Tennessee Senator Al Gore, was one of the few Democrats to vote in favor of the use of force in the Persian Gulf. Additionally, back in the mideighties, Gore's wife Tipper sent the record industry, usually populated with liberal Democrats, into a tizzy with her successful attempt to have warning labels placed on albums with "offensive"

minute differences. Schneider, during her years in the House, held the distinction of voting against President Reagan more than any other Republican in Congress.

Battling, though not overly harshly, with the moderates are the "new conservatives." Massachusetts Governor William Weld is often described as being typical of this group, which combines fiscal conservatism with more moderate social attitudes. Weld, for instance, has been somewhat tolerant, if not hospitable, to the concerns of the homosexual community. The new conservatives are the Republicans who would probably be the most capable of leading the party back to prominence in the nineties. Penn Jillette, the comic/magician, spelled it out in the April 1994 issue of Reason magazine. He told the story of talking to President Bush's campaign press secretary, telling her that there were vast amounts of voters like him, who love the fiscal conservatism espoused by the GOP, but cannot abide by their positions on gays, abortions, pornography, etc. According to Jillette, if they would just change those stances, which is what the new conservatives seem to want, they would entice millions of voters to change their minds. That gives us a good segue to the rising 'Religious Right.'

President Bush, despite what many people felt, was never a conservative. His views moved to the right a bit to conform to President Reagan's positions while he was Vice President, but he was generally reviled by the right wing. Bush was in reality a moderate, like Clinton. Being a moderate, or centrist, sounds good philosophically, but in politics, that is usually the nice way of calling someone an "elastic man;" that is, he can be pulled in many different directions, because he doesn't actually stand for much. It is now known, for example, that Vice President Quayle, a "true" conservative, was not on good terms with Bush's right hand man, James Baker, This conflict was a microcosm of what began to afflict the Republican

Opponents can say what they want about President Reagan, but there is no doubting his skill at being a leader. Under him, the GOP made a major comeback from the days of Nixon, and stood for the ideals of conservatism: fiscal prudence, a strong military, and an adherence to "morals," whatever they may be. But President Bush lacked Reagan's charisma, as well

as his ability to promote and stick with an agenda. Right wing Republicans grew antsy, as evidenced by Pat Buchanan's move into the party primary. As Bush waffled more and more, and the economy, which he largely ignored, worsened, the charming Clinton picked up momentum. All of this contributed to the mobilization of a faction of vocal Republicans, fed up with their party's lack of focus and abandonment of "family values.." Before anybody realized it, they were on the verge of taking control of the GOP. Needless to say, the convention in Houston was acrimonious, at best. It was becoming clear that Bush, with his frequently humiliated running mate, probably would not win the election. Mix that with Governor Weld and Pat Buchanan both speaking to the convention, and you have one confused and angry party. As Buchanan spoke of battling for the "soul of a nation," Weld's lighter brand of conservatism was featured as a possible wave of the future. The stage had been set for a battle rovale.

In this upcoming election, candidates of the "Religious Right" have garnered more support than ever before, fragmenting a party which is paradoxically on the verge of winning the majority of at least one house of Congress. Senator John Warner of Virginia has publicly distanced himself from the Republican candidate for the other Virginia seat... Lt. Col. Oliver North! The man with the nine lives is back, and with his mix of mainstream and religious conservatism, stands a very good chance at joining the body of politicians he has despised and ridiculed for years.

For the American voter, these are strange days indeed.. No longer can we look at a party affiliation and automatically have a pretty good idea about the candidates' positions. Where we are heading is anyone's guess, which may be the reason the two parties are in such disarray in the first place. The Democrats and Republicans are made up of, believe it or not, somewhat normal people; they more or less reflect the population. It is no surprise, then, that they have lost their way, since most people would probably agree that the good old US of A is embroiled

We may look to the 1992 Presidential election for some of our answers. P-Bruins tame Ice Cats

They are the new kids on the block, and their new neighbors did nothing to make them feel welcome. The expansion Worcester Ice Cats, 0-4-1 to start their inaugural season, were once again denied their first victory in a 5-2 loss to the Providence Bruins on October 14.

The Ice Cats organization, noticing the astounding success the Bruins have had since moving from Maine to Providence, have hoped for similar fortunes. However, it has become apparent that they are facing an uphill battle. First and

foremost, Worcester is the only member of the 16-team AHL not affiliated with an NHL club; they almost became the farm team of the Florida Panthers, but the deal fell through at the last minute. Thus, they are unable to rely upon a parent organization and its money to find players for them, That weakness has become even more pronounced this season, as NHL clubs are sending some of their younger skaters to the minors to receive playing time during the lockout (sorry, I meant postponement). The city of Worcester also does not share the same hockey history that Providence, whose Reds were one of the original

members of the AHL, has enjoyed. This was not one of the Bruins'

This was not one of the Bruins' best efforts of the young season, as evidenced by the fact that they were outshot by their opponents, 32-30. The first period featured a particularly sluggish effort from the hometown team, as they mustered only one goal, Tim Tookey's 4th of the season. If not for the play of goaltender Scott Bailey, the Ice Cats would likely have had the lead at the first intermission. Bailey was very impressive in his first period of action of the season in Providence, stopping all 13 shots he faced.

After the lackadaisical play of the first period, the Bruins probably heard an earful from coach Steve Kasper, as they came out revved up for the second stanza. Alex Nikolic, quickly becoming adored by fans for his bruising style of play, registered his first point of the season, slipping the puck past Ice Cat goaltender Wayne Cowley. The goal came during a scramble in front of the Worcester net as Nikolic, Fred Knipscheer, and Mike Bodnarchuk exerted great pressure on the Ice Cats' defense. Nine seconds after scoring, Nikolic was sent to the penalty box for roughing; he was joined there less than a minute later by defenseman Phil Von Stefenelli, giving Worcester a two-

man advantage. The outstanding work of penalty-killers Daniel Lacroix, Guy Larose, Bill Armstrong, and Jeff Serowik gave both the team and the fans a major boost.

After their shorthanded success, the Bruins found themselves trapped in their own zone, until a pass from Armstrong sent Brett Harkins streaking down the right wing side of the ice; he was allowed to penetrate too far into the Worcester zone, and at 6:28, he lifted a wrist shot over Cowley's shoulder, sending the crowd of 8,849 into delirium. Without a

The Bruins scored twice more in the period, 12 seconds apart. At 10:05, rookie Clayton Beddoes notched his first professional goal. Captain Guy Larose had the other assist, as his tenacious forechecking put the entire play into motion. At 10:17, Phil Von Stefenelli's shot bounced off Cowley's pads, and Sandy Moger, from his customary spot in front of the net, rifled in the rebound. The power play goal, which was scored on a rare 4 on 3 situation, was Moger's fifth tally of the season, tops on the club. The offensive

explosion cooled off for the second half of the period, as play began to resemble that of the beginning of the game. Scott Bailey continued his fine play in net, turning aside each of the 11 bullets fired at him by the Ice Cats.

The third period was probably the most dismal for the Bruins, as Bailey lost his shutout, and the B's failed to score. Former Providence and Boston Bruin John Carter tipped a slapshot into the Bruins' net, his third of the season at 6:42. He was followed by Worcester captain Jim Nesich on a power play at 9:50. Of particular note during play was a save Bailey made with his mask, a ringing shot which appeared to leave him momentarily stunned. Despite not being named one of the three stars of the game, Bailey was very solid, probably

saving Providence from an upset; he was arguably the team's best player.

It was not a thrilling or dominating victory, but it does provide them with something to build on as they embark on a long road trip, which started Saturday, October 15. They have four other road dates to play before returning home to host the division rival Albany River Rats on Friday, October 28.

Gigolo Aunts Flippin' Out RCA Records

It has catchy hooks and a beat you can dance to, plus roaring guitars and sweet backing melodies. Yes, it's pop-rock, and the Gigolo Aunts play it well on Flippin' Out, their major label debut.

"We developed on our ownwe've always done what we want," says Steve Hurley, bassist and lyric writer, "Probably because we originally came from such an out of the way place," he continues, "we've always had a slightly offkilter way of doing things." Growing up in Potsdam, New York (near the Canadian border), Steve and pal Dave Gibbs, lead singer and guitarist, joined up with drummer Paul Brouwer and guitarist Phil Hurley to form the band. This was when they were in junior high. By high school, they were playing gigs at local bars. In 1987 they headed for Boston. Dave's folks, who were big Pink Floyd fans, suggested the name "Gigolo Aunts" from their favorite Syd Barrett song.

Flippin' Out opens with their single, "Cope." There is a Syd Barrett-esque opening to the tune. The opening drum beats and guitar

effects are very similar to the intro to "Astronomy Domine," a 1967 Pink Floyd hit. This band mixes classic rock and pop in a very effective way. "Cope's" refrain, "Got a hole in my head/ Got a hole in my heart/ Got a hole in my soul/ supposed to be/can't you see this is hard for me," is extremely catchy. Quite simply, it's a fun

The second track, "Lemon Peeler," is a bit harder. The guitar is more aggressive, but it still keeps a pop beat. "I'm much more interested in writing about the small moments that make life more bearable than the big things that make this world more horrifying," says Steve. This is apparent in all of the songs, especially in "Gun." This song has a funny way of looking at gun control, offering lyrics, "It's your constitutional right/to sleep soundly through the night/with a .38 or a combat .45/It feels great today to be alive." However, in "Pin Cushion," they sing about a dysfunctional family, "Your at a silent dinner table/and the two of them aren't able/to face each other a wed/so they bounce off you instead/and your tired of feeling like a pincushion."

Steve states, "The easiest thing in the world is to write a 'life sucks' song; cynicism is too easy. I'm not interested in sitting around watching TV and complaining." Yet he does try to get a message to

the listener. "Often times I write about details I notice that I hope others have noticed as well," he continues, "and when people hear the song, hopefully they'll go, 'Wow! I've been there.'

Flippin' Out, overall, is a very good album. The music is clean, catchy, and very professionally produced. It will appeal to alternative rock fans as well as overs of classic rock. It will also be "music to the ears" for those

who loved the pop-rock of the eighties. "I'm obsessed- and everyone in the band is obsessedwith making music that will sound as good twenty years from now as it does at this moment," says Steve, "We don't care about being topical or fashionable, we aspire to be timeless.'

Priscilla: it's got a good beat, and you can dance to it

The Adventures of Priscilla, Queen of the Desert Motion picture soundtrack Polydor Records

The soundtrack to *The Adventures of Priscilla, Queen of the Desert* is a compilation of prereleased songs from 1950 to the present. It's got everything in it from the big band sound to top 40 music. It's got mixes, re-mixes, and re-mixed remixes. It's got love, romancing, breakups, and dancing. In short, it's got a good beat and you can dance to it.

If you're into retro 70's sound, this disc has plenty of it. It's got three mixes of "I Love the Nightlife," two mixes of Gloria Gaynor's classic, "I Will Survive," two of "Go West," and two versions of "Shake Your Groove Thing."

I found the best version of "I Love the Nightlife" to be the "Real Rapino 7" mix." The only difference between this mix and the original (which is also included) is that the tempo has been stepped up a a bit. It's better to dance to than the original, but hasn't been given that 90's dance music backbeat. In other words, it doesn't sound like Ace of Base, and you probably won't hear it on KIX 106. If, however, you'd rather hear the KIX 106 version, check out the "Philip Damien Extended Vox." It's been really souped up,

and it's twice as long as the original.

As far as "I Will Survive" goes, you've got the original version (which I prefer), or the KIX 106 version. One version for everyone.

Next comes a song by The Village People, "Go West." I had never heard it before, yet I had heard it before. It sounds just like "YMCA," only the words are different. Insert the word "together" where you would say "young man" in "YMCA," and you've got "Go West." You probably know whether or not you'll like it already. You've got it in the original version, or the one that's twice as long and sounds like Kool and the Gang got hold of it.

The retro sound wraps up with Peaches and Herb's "Shake Your Groove Thing." Two mixes were included, but the only difference that I can pick up between the original and the 12" mix is that the 12" is about a minute longer and has some sort of bongo intro. So, for all you bongo fans, track 18 is for you (I guess).

If you like dancing, but prefer the rhumba, this soundtrack's got a few good ones for you, too. "Can't Help Lovin' That Man" and "I Don't Care If the Sun Don't Shine" feature the classic big band sound, with just a hint of Billie Holiday. Lena Horne provides the vocals for "A Fine Romance." The sounds of the brass provide a great contrast for Horne's throaty voice. Together, they make for a great

This disc also has a couple of tunes that deserve a category of their own. They are upbeat, happy tunes about depressing issues. "Billy Don't Be a Hero" has a Partridge Family feel to it, only the Partridge Family generally didn't sing about war, death, and the fianceé that gets left behind. "Take a Letter Maria" is about a guy who came home and found his wife "in the arms of another man." Still, he remains upbeat. Talk about smiling in the face of adversity.

The rest of the album includes some recent hits like: "Finally" by CeCe Peniston, and Vanessa Williams' "Save the Best For Last." There's also "My Baby Loves Lovin'," which sounds like abad Monkee's tune, and "Mamma Mia," by Abba, which sounds like, well, Abba.

Out of 19 tracks, there is really only one flop. "I've Never Been To Me" is a sappy ballad with some touching advice for us all. You can travel all over the world, and do everything and everyone, but you won't be truly happy until you know yourself. Take it from Charlene (the singer), she's been there. Touching.

That song aside, I think that *The Adventures of Priscilla, Queen of the Desert* is a great soundtrack. It has a little of everything. It's great, even down to the hot pink and purple packaging. So, if you like snappy tunes popular in their day, pick up this soundtrack. You can't go wrong
