## BSW students push curriculum changes to fall of '96

After meeting last week with the Bachelor of Social Work Organization to discuss the proposed curriculum changes, Dr. George D. Metrey Dean of the School of Social Work agreed to push the changes back to the fall of 1996, according to representatives from that group.

The new admissions criteria, according to the student representatives, is a minimum grade point average of 2.67, a letter of intent, a letter of reference and volunteer experience.

"Our main concern was over the short notice" to accomplish the new standards, said Sheryll Deney, President of Bachelor of Social

Work Organization (BSWO). The meeting in Dewey's opinion was, "A great opening for communication between the BSW Department faculty and students."

Dewey continued by stating that the success of the meeting, "shows what happens when things go through the right channels, both sides benefited and a lot was accomplished."

Members of the organization wrote a letter to Metrey thanking the department and confirming the changes. The letter stated new criteria as well as the understandings. The letter went on to state, "students will be evaluated individually competing only with themselves and that depending on resource availability it may be necessary to extend their studies to three years."

## The sky is the limit for studying abroad

"The sky is the limit, the whole world is out there," says Dr. Carolyn Fluehr-Lobban, Director of the Foreign Study Program, when asked about study abroad options for RIC students.

According to Fluehr-Lobban, Rhode Island College offers a variety of international exchanges. Among schools that have an agreement with the college for exchange programs are Kingston and Essex Universities in the U.K., and also the Trefle International Language Training Center in Antibes, France, although students may travel to institutions practically anywhere in the world for various programs of study.

There is also a "Semester at Sea" program involving students, who while studying on a ship, get to travel around the world. Stops include South America, South Africa, the Philippines, Hong Kong, China, Japan, and Seattle. Dr. Fluehr-Lobban will be teaching on the next voyage, and says the trip is an "excellent opportunity for students who want to see the world but don't know where to begin." Jessica Campbell, a psychology major, is currently on the cruise.

The cost of a foreign semester is usually between five and six thousand dollars, varying on airfares and individual goals. Many times the airfare to Australia can be equal to the cost of school, states Fluehr-Lobban. However, there are various financial aid possibilities,

including the Ridgway F. Shinn, Jr. Study Abroad Fund. Application to the Shinn fund is available to any undergraduate students in good academic standing, and in any field of study.

Among the 1994-95 year award winners, were Rebecca Horne, who went for a semester in England, Kim Shepard who also spent her fall term in England, and Billy R. Ray, who spent a full year in England.

Credits can be transferable, and graduation won't be detained because of the your time away.

The college encourages foreign studies, and all the departments are happy and helpful when transferring credits, and Fluehr-Lobban says she "never had a problem," and the college is very cooperative.

Once you've had an international experience, employers look at you differently, you stand out among other applicants, as well as being "enriched" and exposed to other cultures, says Fluehr-Lobban.

Exchange and foreign programs are open to all students.

## Drink more Camellia

Named after the Asian, flower-bearing shrub, local act Camellia played their first show in

Providence last week at the Living Room. Their sound is cool. The melodies and guitar lines are completely messy, while the drums and bass keep the songs steady. "We're somewhere between ballad and mayhem," comments principal songwriter, Justin Michaelman. "All the songs are distinct from each other."

Indeed, their set does offer a nice variety. They deliberately skirt between passive and aggressive, like they know when they're crossing the line. When they do cross, however, you feel it. They can purr one minute, and explode the next.

The lyrics are great. Sometimes they'll be insightful, light-sounding but really deep when reconsidered.

Sometimes, it's just plain silly: "Hate your stuff/ Hate your stuff/ I got a turtle in my butt."

"I write songs so that we can have fun playing them," says Michaelman, "and so people walk

a w a y humming them." Their sound is catchy, and it really is obvious when watching them play that they really are just doing it to have fun. Michaelman was adorned with red gloves that extended to his upper arms, and a matching mask. Theatrics, however, took nothing away from their sound.

My favorite tunes are "5:37 a.m.," a song that contains a climatic ending of "Pat Sajak" being screamed repeatedly, and "Drink More Camellia," during which one band member jumped on another's back while still performing the song.

## Lives ruined by a child's lie

### RIC Theatre hosts *The Children's Hour*

Lillian Hellman's *The Children's Hour* is still a first-rate piece of theatre and 43 years have tended

to make it more generally pertinent than it was originally.

The play, about a couple of young women ruined by a monstrous child's lie about their "unnatural" relationship, raised the then (1934) taboo subject of lesbianism and was promptly banned in Chicago, Boston, and London.

Rhode Island College Theatre, under the direction of P. William Hutchinson, will bring the trenchant drama to the stage in Roberts Hall auditorium.

#### The plot

A malicious little girl, who is probably psychotic, gets herself released from boarding school by falsely telling her grandmother that the two headmistresses are lovers.

Since she is a child she may not realize the enormity of her slander. But the consequences are terrible.

Once the slander sweeps through

the community the victims are doomed.

The slander becomes the public truth and irrevocable.

In the last scene, the grandmother, having discovered her granddaughter's perfidy, makes an honest attempt to repair the damage she has done. But by this time one of the school teachers has

committed suicide: the other no longer has

any faith in herself, other people, or the humanity of the world, noted the New York Times theater critic, Brooks Atkinson, in his 1952 column concerning a revival of the play.

#### To be reckoned with

*The Children's Hour* made Hellman overnight a playwright to be reckoned with. It achieved great acclaim and ran for 691 performances on Broadway. It toured widely, attracting much attention.

After this initial success there followed a list of plays which, though unequal in the extent of their commercial success, steadily augmented her reputation as one of the most powerful, driving social dramatists and one of the strongest theater moralists on the American scene.

Adding greatly to this reputation were her works, *The Little Foxes*,

which dramatized greed with tremendous ferocity in 1939, and *Watch on the Rhine*, which put Hitlerism into dramatic perspective in 1941.

Miss Hellman was widely considered America's leading woman playwright. She died in 1984 at age 79.

*The Children's Hour* is running from October 5 to 8, with 8 p.m. performances on Thursday through Saturday, and a 2 p.m. matinee on Sunday. Tickets are \$4 for RIC students. They may be purchased at Roberts box office daily from 10 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. and until the time of performance on performance dates.

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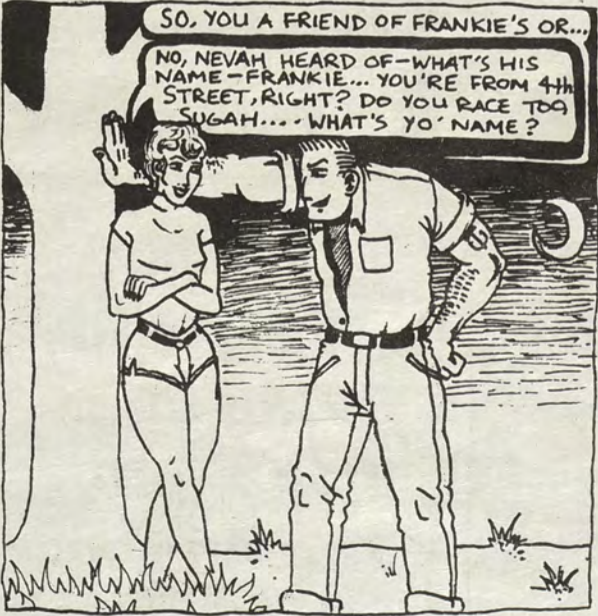
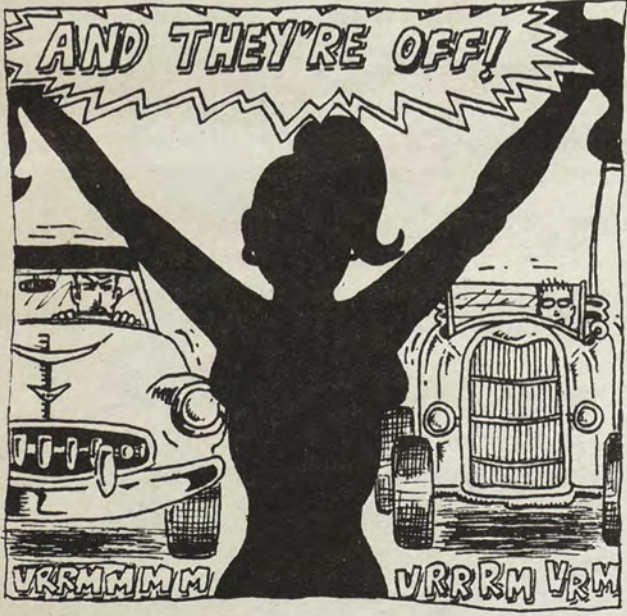

## Borromeo Strings join the Muir Quartet

The international performance artists known as the Borromeo String Quartet will join the highly acclaimed Muir String Quartet for the first concert in the Muir's return series this season at RIC.

The Borromeo Strings' appearance is supported by a grant specifically for this concert from the Rhode Island Foundation, reports John Custer, director of the RIC Performing Arts Series.

The fund from which the grant originates comes from the generosity of the late Aaron Roitman, founder and honorary chairman of Chamber Music United in Rhode Island, who set up the Aaron Roitman Chamber Music Fund within the foundation to sustain chamber music in Rhode Island.

"The Borromeo String Quartet's timing of the dissonances.. brought chills to my spine. This was music

making of utter genius," noted the critic for The Strad magazine.

The Boston Globe critic said of the quartet, "... the only treasure, it's been said, is spiritual treasure, and this was it."

Formed in 1989 by four young musicians from the Curtis Institute of Music, the Borromeo String Quartet has risen to international prominence, receiving praise for every aspect of its playing.

Its performances in North America have included the most distinguished chamber music series and festivals.

Its international tours have taken the artists from Moscow to Montevideo, Uruguay, and included concerts at Suntory Hall in Tokyo, the Concertgebouw in Amsterdam, Wigmore Hall in London and the Bastille Opera in Paris.

The quartet is the first ensemble

to receive the prestigious Artist Diploma from the New England Conservatory, where they now serve on the faculty.

### Muir String Quartet

What can one say about the Muir String Quartet which the media has not already said?

This season marks the third consecutive one for the Muir at RIC, which has seen one sold-out performance after another.

The composition of the Muir Quartet has changed this year. Weipin Kuo has joined the quartet as violinist, replacing Bayla Keyes, who recently retired from the quartet.

Kuo is already making a name for himself, a violinist whose playing is characterized by beautiful sound, impeccable intonation, and great musicality.

The Muir and Borromeo strings will perform separately and then


