Rhode Island College Free Computer stolen from Student Government office

On Wednesday, January 16, Julie Silvestri, Student Government President, discovered that a Macintosh computer was missing from the Student Government Office. The computer, printer, modem, and disk drive were all taken from Student Government Treasurer Alan Tenreiro's desk. Also missing was a telephone adaptor (similar to a modem but faster) which belonged to Sally Hindson, Administrative Assistant for Student Government.

Upon discovering that both computer and telephone adapter were missing, Silvestri called the Campus Security.

"Whoever stole the computer was strictly here for the computer and nothing else," explains Hindson, "we have plenty of answering machines that were not even touched."

According to Silvestri, the across the country have computer had a security kit locking the computer to the desk. The kit consisted of metal "cable-like chains," said Tenreiro, See BREAK, page 3 who added that the cables were,

Tenreiro and Silvestri agree that it's not likely the thief or thieves

will be found Cyrille Cote, Director of RIC Security, explained that there was no evidence of forced entry into the office

"This could mean one of two things," said Cote, "either the door was left open by accident, or someone entered with a key." When asked if crime was be-

coming a problem on campus, Cote said, "What may be a crime to you is not to someone else. For example, if your tire on your car was slashed, that is a crime committed against you personally, therefore of great importance to you. Someone hearing about what happened to your car considers it a shame, not necessarily a crime.'

"Do I think there is a crime wave occurring here, no, I do not think that is the case," Cote added.

Cote has spoken with Tenreiro about upgrading security in the Student Union building, and all over campus. "We try our best to make this campus as safe as possible, however,

money is not there," said Cote. There is a new security sys-

tem being tested for a trial period said Grey Guenther, Computer Manager of the Student Union. Guenther explains that once the key has been inserted into the lock of the new system, an inferred laser will scan the pattern of the key and then run it through the database in which the lock is connected to. If the pattern matches up with the da-

Internships a learning experience for screenwriter

(CPS) An internship may sound glamourous, but in fact, at times the work involved can be downright dull. Screenwriter Nora Ephron recalls how, in college, she discovered this the hard way, with internships at CBS News and the White House

A prolific and witty writer, Ephron is known for her journalistic essays and for writing the screenplays for Silkwood, Cookie, Sleepless in Seattle, and When Harry Met Sally. She graduated from Wellesley College in 1962.

CPS: We read that you served as a copy girl at CBS.

Ephron: I had worked for two summers at CBS in Los Angeles doing all sorts of horrible things that needed to be SPORTS +

done, like updating the database me in New York, and I got a twoof advertising contacts. It was a classic college person's horrible summer job. It was a true nightmare, one of those things where towards the end you're in a little race against yourself of how many you can do in an hour.

CPS: Did you get anything at all out of the experience?

Ephron: Well, it was 1959, and I thought to myself that if I write a letter to the president of CBS News on CBS stationery, he will have to look at it; whereas if I go back to college and write him on my own stationery, he will throw it away. So I wrote the president a memo saying that I was on my college newspaper and I wanted to work as a copy girl at the (Democratic National) convention. He interviewed

week job (at the Convention) ... It was very exciting to see...Kennedy was nominated. And Adlai Stevenson was a kind of phantom figure, and when he finally appeared at the convention the place went crazy ...

CPS: Then in 1961 you had a full-fledged internship at White House with JFK's press secretary, Pierre Salinger?

Ephron: Yes, but I was deskless and functionless. I didn't do one thing for six weeks, except that I got to go to the President's press conferences and the daily briefings. And I got to see a little bit of how the White House press corps worked ... meanwhile, I literally spent every day standing around and looking through the files. (Once) I was

ry to say it was the high point of the summer. CPS: So do you regret the

internship? Ephron: No. It taught me that there was no point in wanting a career in politics in 1961 because women weren't (doing substantive work in Washington). There were just no good jobs for women... So to learn that Washington was not the place to go absolutely and definitively was a huge thing to learn. I'm very grateful to (my internship) for that reason because I could have wasted some time in Washington. I would

CPS: If, right now, you had the chance to do an internship where would it be?

Ephron: I think it would be fun if I could intern at a theater. I'd like to see someone directing a play, that would be interesting to me. Now I could probably arrange to do that, but my point is that it would be very interesting to me because I don't really know how you do that. CPS: Any particular theater

in mind? Ephron: Yeah, I would love

to watch the New York Shakespeare Festival. One of my friends, a young woman I know at Brown (University), interned there last summer. She had a fabulous time.

CPS: Let's turn to your movie "When Harry Met Sally." Had Harry and Sally done internships in college, where would they have interned?

Ephron: Harry would have interned for his local Congressman. And he would have had one summer working at a law firm which should have decided him completely against becoming a lawyer... Sally would have been a camp counselor and the person in charge of the camp newspaper, if there was one. She would have had a summer in some sort of quasi-teaching thing that would have decided her against becoming a teacher. She would have spent a summer interning for the woman's page editor at her local newspaper, before journalism school.

If ambitiousness of scope, mor and involving drama mean anything to audiences, then perhaps Downey's latest efforts, Restoration, and Richard III, both now in limited release, might make the leap from art house films to mainstream crowd pleasers. Downey is at the heart of Restoration as Merivel, a 17th-century English "I'm starting to think I'm medical student whose life is transformed when he encounters King Charles II (Sam Neil), marries the King's mistress, Celia (Polly Walker), and is rewarded with a country estate. Then, after a period of drinking and debauchery, Merivel makes the most grievous of mistakes:

comes swept up in a rush of change, he relearns his ability to heal, romances a mental patient (Meg Ryan), fathers a child, and deals with both the Plague of 1665 and the Great Fire of London a year later.

It's pointed out to Downey that Merivel marks yet another gutsy character in his resume. Downey, talking during an interview at a Manhattan hotel, downplays the issue. "I don't know if it's gutsy or brave or if it's just that I'm game," he says. "If something feels like it could be a disaster or it could fly, let's try. I don't care. A, I'm not particularly modest about what I'm uncomfortable doing and having it be filmed, and b, I like high stakes. High stakes make it more exciting.'

Does he think those stakes will pay off for Restoration?

Downey pauses, then replies, "Whatever happens, happens. I'm just glad that, primarily, people are enjoying the film and that it's a good movie. That's all I've ever wanted "

Downey takes another high stakes gamble in "Richard III," a modernized film rendering of Shakespeare's classic tale of politics, sibling rivalry, sex, and death. The actor was recruited by Sir Ian McKellen, who plays Merivel's servant/ confidant in "Restoration." 


