October series focuses on children on the street

The theme of this year's October Series on campus will be the troubling topic of "Children on the Street." All month the college will host exhibits, debates, speeches, and films that describe the horrors that have engulfed children who do not have a stable family life, or those who have no family due to running away or being thrown out.

Among the exhibits will a photo-artist exhibition by Jim Goldberg called "Raised by Wolves" that will run Oct. 2 through Nov. 2 at Bannister Gal-



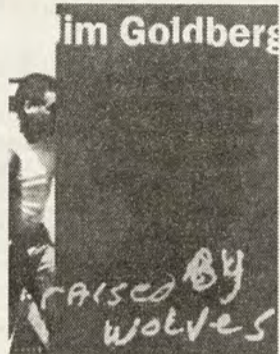

lery. From 1986 through 1993 Goldberg went through the underbelly of Los Angeles and San Francisco to examine how children and young adults cope with the grim realities of city streets that are filled with the dangers of prostitution, drugs, and overall misery.

In the exhibition are not only photographs and drawings by Goldberg, but works from the runaways themselves. These works give the exhibit visitors an insight into the lives of these children. Insights in how dark the streets can become when you do not have a stable home life.

Goldberg will be at Bannister Gallery Oct. 21 at 4 p.m. to discuss his works.

Movies will also be prevalent in the series. Among the films showed will be *My Own Private Idaho*, a 1991 movie directed by Gus Van Sant that was a portrait of young male prostitutes. The tragic irony is that the star of the movie, River Phoenix died in 1994 of a drug overdose outside a trendy Los Angeles nightclub, highlighting the fact that the streets can even get those who seem to have it all. *My Own Pri-*



ate Idaho will be shown at 2 p.m. on Oct. 9. Shown on Oct. 22 at 2 p.m., will be the Brazilian movie *Street Children in Brazil*. The streets of Brazil, especially in Rio De Janerio are filled with thousands of children that spend all day struggling to live. The city's police are notorious for clamping down on the kids, sometimes with deadly results. The children are strictly barred from the famous beaches. The city wants to hide its poor from the tourists who flock to Rio for fun. For the children, fun is making it through a day without being beaten up by a cop.

Wednesday evening accident ties up campus traffic

An accident involving five cars early Wednesday night sent one person to the hospital and tied up traffic leaving the college for about an hour.

According to report filed with the North Providence Police Department, a car driven by Juana Hinojosa, 107 Superior St., Prov., was traveling south on sixth avenue (the road that runs along parking lot J, from the New Building to college road) when she hit (or was hit by) a car leaving the parking lot. Her car then veered to the right, went up on the grass embankment, through a light pole, then hit and uprooted 15 to 20 feet of guard rail before hitting another light pole at the corner of College Road.

Hinojosa was taken to Fatima Hospital for treatment.

After the accident, the hood of the Hinojosa's car lay in the street, about halfway down the area where the guardrail had been. Firefighters from North Providence had to cut the guardrail in order to move Hinojosa's car. North Providence police towed the car from the scene and labeled the car as totaled on the report.

As the accident was being cleared, officers from the college's Security and Safety Department had to block off traf-

fic leaving the rear off the college and redirect all traffic through one lane behind the Physical Plant and out to Fruit Hill Ave.

The three other cars involved were waiting at the stop sign at College Road and were not hit by Hinojosa's car, but by debris thrown up by her car as it passed them on the right.

The drivers reported broken

and cracked windshields and windows, torn off molding, and a scratches and dents among other complaints.

The other drivers included: Gayle Justinski, 102 Glen Meadow Dr., Pawtucket; Timothy McMullin, 49 Wood St., Warwick; Ralph Montella, 7 Nelson St., Prov. and Tracy Schiano, 170 Midvale Ave., Cranston.

College looks to keep mall clean with 'no vehicles' policy

As the finishing touches to the campus mall are being made, the college is taking steps to keep the area clean and safe.

New signs reading "No vehicles allowed beyond this point" and "No bicycles, skateboards, or inline/rollerskates allowed," have been installed in several areas on the outskirts of the mall.

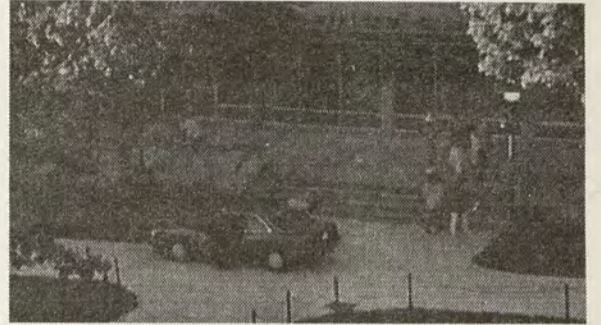
According to Dr. James Cornelison, Vice President of Administration, the college is hoping to "maintain aesthetics... the white, clean concrete." The rule applies to all vehicles, including college vehicles, he added.

Cornelison acknowledged that the no vehicles policy had been in place before the renovations and said that it "was ignored... no one really cared." Asked what has changed, besides the new signs, to keep vehicles off, Cornelison said "more people are attentive... their sensitivity to their environment is increasing."

Even with the new rule, Anchor staff members were able to photograph vehicles on the campus mall at least once each day last week leading up to production deadline.

Vehicles will be allowed on campus, with the proper clearance, for special events. So far this semester, two vehicles have been allowed on campus: the C-SPAN bus and a WHJJ/WHJY van doing voter registration, according to Cornelison.

The no bicycles, skateboarding and inline/rollerskates policy stems from problems the college was having with large groups of people skateboarding on the ramps in front of the New Building. Cornelison said the college wanted to put up the signs and stop people from skating "before someone gets injured."

"Date rape" drug bill goes to Clinton

(CPS) The U.S. Senate Thursday passed and sent to President Clinton for signature a bill toughening penalties for possession and use of a so-called "date-rape drug."

The bill would increase penalties for the use of any imported controlled substance in the commission of a felony. It was particularly aimed at the prescription drug Rohypnol, which is not sold in the United States but is marketed in 60 other countries as a sedative and has been showing up in the United States.

The drug is sold outside the United States by Hoffmann-La Roche Inc, an affiliate of the multinational group of companies headed by Roche Holding Ltd of Basel, Switzerland.

Police from various cities have reported that the drug was being given surreptitiously to unsuspecting women who then became victims of rape by their dates.

The bill, sponsored in the House of Representatives by New York Republican Jerry Solomon, provides for penalties of up to 20 years in prison for distribution of Rohypnol, or any other controlled substance, with intent to commit a violent crime, including rape.

In July Hoffmann-La Roche announced its support for the legislation. "We are encouraged by this bill because it recognizes that other substances besides Rohypnol are misused to commit sexual assault," Robert

Armstrong of the company said.

The bill would also bring penalties for manufacture, distribution, dispensing or possession of Rohypnol up to those in place for heroin or LSD and add a new penalty of up to three years for simple possession of the drug. "Reports of drug-induced sexual assaults appear to be on the rise," said Sen. Orrin Hatch, a Utah Republican and one of the bill's sponsors.

He said it would strike at "those who would use controlled substances to further violent assaults against women."

Separately, police in El Paso, Texas, Thursday said a 15-year-old Texas girl was killed by an overdose of Rohypnol at a party last month.

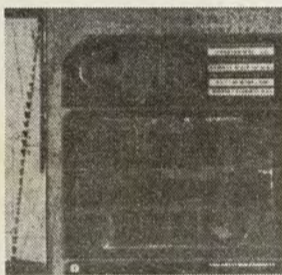

Call them Nine Inch Nails wanna-be's or the next wave in industrial music. This foursome from St. Louis are every kid's dream story. Their story goes something like this: four guys meet to play music. They want to enter a local music contest to get on a compilation. The lead

singer drops out several days before the track is recorded and turned in. Who's to sing the final cut? "Let's call my cousin," said one band member and sure enough, one day later the track is recorded and turned in about an hour before deadline. "Wow, that was close," they say. Not so fast, fate is still turning its head. Some time later, the phone rings, the song is to be put on the soundtrack for *Seven* and *Mortal Kombat*. Soon, the song "Guilty" is number one in St. Louis and record companies are knocking on the door.

What label did they choose? Warner? Columbia? No, Wax Trax!/TVT Records of Chicago. Soon, in March of 1996, *Gravity Kills* is released as well as a video for their hit single "Guilty." Now, after opening for one of industrial music's big names, Sister Machine Gun, the

group has veteran rockers Stabbing Westward opening for them. Seems kind of odd, a veteran band with two albums opening for a band that has just released their first album? Shouldn't it be vice versa? Kinda makes one think...

Several questions arise after listening to their album and reading several press releases. One, are these guys the next Nine Inch Nails? Nah, the music is not dark enough. Two, is Wax Trax!/TVT trying to replace the Nine Inch Nails they lost in the early 1990's? Yeah, probably. Three, are these guys any good? Most definitely, the keyboard sequencing and distortion make the album a pulsating piece of work.

Well, the big question arises—is industrial going to make it big and stay big? Dave Kendall of MTV noted that he was

surprised that industrial didn't shoot out into the mainstream with Nine Inch Nails' release *The Downward Spiral*. The

With Gravity Kills, I would say yes. They do not rely on the voice distortion such as Ministry or REVCO. This band relies more on their electronics, and use of a guitar that grabs and shakes you. The lyrics are dark, to an extent, the first songs of side one read like a person's broken life. Concentrating on the loss of a love one as opposed to Reznor's "I suck" style of writing. Granted, it's all depressing in the long run, but

one gets down in the dumps faster than the other.

Live, the band is absolutely fantastic. A friend of mine went to see them open for the Sex Pistols this last summer and came back in a music induced stupor. He vowed to see them again. He will get his chance—they will be at Club Babyhead with the English band-Republica (*Ready to Go*) on October 18.

All in all, I must give the album three point nine stars out of four. The music is great; it will certainly make one get up out of their chair and sing along with Jeff Schneel in "Guilty." As well as begin a pit in their room when it's played...

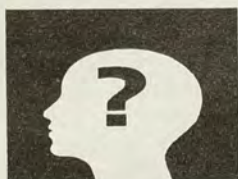

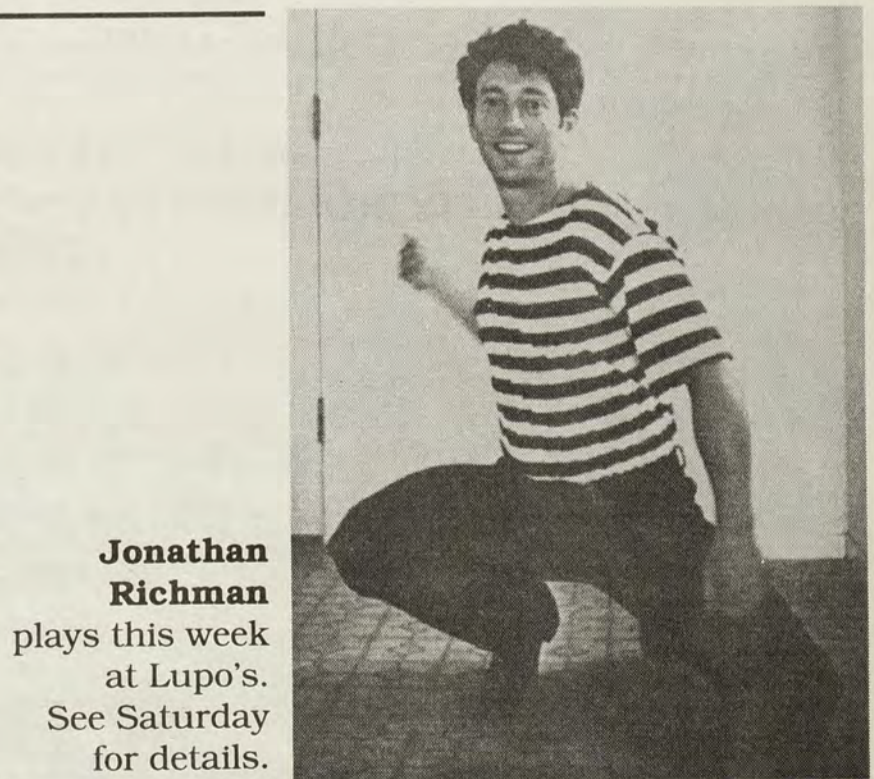

Who says Skinny Puppy is broken up? With their release last year, it would seem natural that all would go their separate ways, right? Not so fast. Out of Vancouver, B.C. comes Download.

Download is the creation of cEvin Key, who founded Skinny Puppy and Mark Spybey (Dead Voices on Air). These two teamed up with Skinny Puppy "helpers" of the past, Ken Marshall and Anthony Valcic. Take all of these names, combine them in a musical blender, and *schoom!* - out comes a hard, distortion-ridden ride, one that takes one to the depths of imagination with its mixes of wild background noise. When this noise combines with toy sounds, the usual techno bass beat, and killer keyboards,

one's mind is taken back. While one is in this noise induced stupor, cEvin lets one know, that "now is the time to make noises, playing the games of mixing..."

Of course, lyrically, the usual industrial overtones of darkness and that deep sense of foreboding pour out of the album. It can really depress your day if one is not prepared to face this music. Although depressing, musically, the album is a trip.

With the amount of innovation involved, this album is a ride for the mind. The mix of ambient, techno, and industrial leaves the listener coming back for more. If one is a Skinny Puppy fan, one will truly like Download. It is a throwback to the past. A true ride that will probe your mind and stay with it for a good, long time. I give it three and a half out of four.
