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"Great Minds Blossom at RIC" Is Summer Session Theme

Even though final exams still lie ahead, the beginning of a new season is just a few weeks away. The RIC Summer Session offers a chance to explore fresh fields of knowledge. Over 250 undergraduate and graduate courses will be offered between June 26 and August 19. Of these, 48 are scheduled for the late afternoon and evening. The theme chosen for the advertising campaign announcing summer session is "Great Minds Blossom at RIC". A drawing of iris flowers is the illustration appearing in all ads and bulletins.

Among the workshops included in the summer session are a theater workshop on masks and mime, a physical science workshop on alternate energy sources, and an instructional technology field workshop in practical photography with emphasis on the preparation of slide-sets. The Department of Industrial Education will offer a workshop in photography focusing on its application in the graphic arts, and NASA will participate in an aerospace workshop designed to service elementary and secondary school teachers as well as counselors and administrators. The purpose of this workshop is to increase awareness of the aerospace industry in daily life. A basic workshop in chemistry will again be offered to high school students and pre-freshmen interested in nursing and medical technology. The National Science Foundation will sponsor a workshop entitled "Project in K-8 Science: An Emphasis on the Environment," for a group of selected teachers who will meet in regular session from July 10 to August 4, and then attend a bimonthly, follow-up seminar during the 1978-79 school year.



Special cultural events occurring at RIC this summer will be the Chamber Music Festival and a music program for young people to include a boy's choir concert. The popular Cabaret theater will return again along with the Summer Theater for Children, now in its third season.

Opportunities

Applications are invited for 1979-80 Fulbright-Hays awards for university teaching and advanced research in about 100 countries and areas. The Council for International Exchange of Scholars (CIES) is administrating the awards.

Approximately 500 awards in a wide variety of fields, and some unrestricted as to field, will be available to Americans during the 1979-80 Fulbright program year. Applications are due by June 1, 1978, for the American Republics. Australia and New Zealand, and by July 1, 1978, for Africa, Asia, and Europe. About 75 percent of the awards are for university teaching which usually allows time for some research; most research scholars also give some lectures or seminars. Although most awards are for an entire academic year, there are also a number of awards for short-term appointments and for travel grants to those with financial support other than the Fulbright program.

Faculty Grants and Awards

DR. NANCY OPPENLANDER of the Political Science Department has been selected to receive a grant of \$2500 for summer study and research by the National Endowment for the Humanities. She will attend a seminar at the City University of New York from June 12 through August 4. The seminar is part of a series developed particularly for college teachers of undergraduates who do not have access to a major library for research.

Dr. Oppenlander will be using the research facilities of the Library of Congress to review the political biographies of the 98 congresswomen who have served in the House and Senate. This study will be an elaboration of her paper, "The Ascent of Women to Elective Office in the U.S.: The Case of Congresswomen," which she presented at the annual meeting of the Northeastern Political Science Association held at Mt. Pocono, Pennsylvania in November, 1977.

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The National Eye Institute has made a research award of about \$100,000 to DR. NEIL GONSALVES and Rhode Island College for a threeyear project on "Eye and Lens Development in the Anophthalmic Mouse." Dr. Gonsalves will be the principal investigator working along with DR. HERMAN B. CHASE who is retiring from Brown University this year, and will become an adjunct professor of biology at RIC. Dr. Chase originally developed the unique strain of eyeless mice and maintained it for 38 years. The colony of mice will now be transferred to RIC for continued research.
